

Chairman Rory J. Respicio called the public hearing on Bill No. 201-33 (COR) and 202-33 (COR) in conjunction with a Public Hearing on Bill No. 204-33 (COR) and allowed Senator Brant McCreadie to provided remarks on the bill as the main sponsor.

Senator Brant McCreadie

Thank you Mr. Chairman for an expediting a hearing for these bills. There doesn't have to be much said about my piece of legislation, it deals with the senate. I truly believe that the senate we are in has to have its responsibilities and accountability. This bill doesn't make me popular amongst my colleagues. But I think it's the right thing to do since I've been elected, the first time was with then-Senator Mike Limtiaco. This is the fourth time I have tried to repeal raises for the senators. It's not a political move, it's the right move. I don't believe we should tie everyone together and try and bring everyone down. Bill 201 and 202 is about the senate. I didn't ask anyone here to come and support it. I don't know if anyone is supporting or opposing it. Here is the bill. Let us vet it through the proper process, lets vote on it on Session floor, yes or no and let us move forward.

Former Senator Howard Trapp

I support the idea of reducing the salaries of senators. If I can give you a background of the Legislature: Do any of you know why you are called senators? I was legislative counsel for the Guam Legislature in the 8th Legislature the salary was for \$5 a day and \$400 a year. They could only meet for two (2) sessions. One was the appropriation session and one was the substantive session where laws were passed. The Congress of the United States got tired of paying for the \$400 and decided to amend the law so that the Legislature could itself decide when it could meet and how much it was going to pay and what it was going to do with the Legislature. It was my opinion, that was when the Government of Guam went down the tubes. The reason you are called "senators" is because we passed that legislation Congress set out that message in the 8th Guam Legislature the old Territorial Party, I guess they were democrats then and they decided that they want to be called "senators." We have a unicameral Legislature and that was done. There are still 21 members to be reduced. The people in the Legislature weren't getting paid all that much. The good thing about the part-time Legislature under the Organic Act was that you had people who could during the day practice law and a lot of professionals sitting there and we met at 5 or 6 every night because they worked during the day. They had other jobs. Their job wasn't being in the Legislature. Being in the Legislature has become such a job. We are size like a little town in California and a third the size of Fresno, California and look at what we are doing with all the money we are spending on the Legislature, the Governor. We don't have an independent executive branch anymore because Mark Forbes was a pretty smart guy. He got everyone to agree on cutting back the number of senators to save money. That's not why he wanted to cut back. He wanted to cut back because he had the votes to become Speaker and he only wanted it to be the 15. You aren't a Legislature anymore, you are a parliament. The Governor is trying to run the government, you're trying to run the government. You pass a bill and you say "the Governor is going to repeal it, we will get it back in a few days and override it." He turned it into taking advantage, I don't think Congress thought it through, taking advantage of the amendment of the Organic Act. It became a parliament which turned into the government. So here we are day after day, running the government through the Legislature, much more than the executive branch. Now I suggest that it be relevant that I'm in favor of rolling back the salaries of the senators. Why are the senators being paid? Why aren't they just public servants like they were before? We have a little tiny population here. You don't need to have that kind of a Legislature. The Legislature should be like a city council. The governor should cut ribbons and we should hire somebody who has a background in running a town, like a city manager, run the government. I know this is not going to become a bill, I know its not going to happen, I am a citizen of this island and I just want to express my opinion about this that we should do away with this and not pay senators anything at all, just \$5 a day for their gas and oil. If you don't want to serve because you are public-spirited, no one serves for nothing anymore because they are public-spirited. Everyone is on boards and commissions gets money and they are appointed in overlapping positions. When the governor can't control it, they resign and the governor comes in. It is all politics. I strongly suggest and I can't imagine how it would happen, someone got a petition and circulated it, changed the law, and its not going to happen because we have voters out there who voted on groups who don't have a clue what the issues are. If Senator Barnes would forgive me for bringing this up, you have some guy for example in Malesso and you are asking him to vote on medical marijuana. He gets off of work, he's a construction worker, before he goes home, he goes to vote and not know anything about medical marijuana but he's doing it because the guy down the street is asking him to. People are asking him to. This kind of thing. Government has gotten to be totally out of control here in Guam.

Ms. Trini Torres

I'm glad you are all here today and that you are trying to correct things that really got out of hand. I believe that these increase salaries and retroactive backwards for a whole year should be rolled back. Its not "taken away" because it wasn't yours in the first place. We are suppose to be doing things democratically and there was no public hearing. I'm sure this should have been avoided. Now you have given us a chance. I want all the pay raises for everyone that was affected during this time to be returned and retroactive payments should be forfeited and taken back. During Marcos' time in the Philippines, poor people were really having a hard time and the same thing is going to happen here. There are already a lot of poor people out there. We cannot afford to pay the utilities. The prices are always going up by one or two dollars. It is your job to take care of the people. I don't agree with what he was saying about you not getting paid. But please return back to everyone what you underhandedly taken. I would be so proud of you as human beings to. We will have more faith and confidence in you, especially those who are so strong-hearted to push for this again. Please let's not be greedy. Do it properly.

Mr. Ken Leon-Guerrero

Dr. Ron McNinch

I am professor at the University of Guam. I am a public administration personnel specialist; it is my academic field that I do a whole lot of. Public personnel is the big area that I work on also a senior profession in human resources, advanced credential in that field of human resources. Tomorrow is Veteran's Day and many of our government employees are veterans and I certainly appreciate and respect their service. I believe it is a reflection of how strong our government is. I'm a selection and equal opportunity specialist and I'm not a compensation specialist. I am very familiar with the process called the "Hay Methodology". The Hay Methodology particularly for the directors was used to justify these pay raises for the directors. I have high confidence in that methodology. The Hay Group is highly respected. I believe that the directors' salaries if they are reflective on that methodology are just and they should be supported. Many of the directors and mayors that I have worked with over the years, government service is an extremely honorable profession and they certainly merit that kind of compensation services which are greatly appreciated by me and the community. Quite often, our mayors in particular serve as community directors and serve a vital role for our community. Those under the Hay Methodology, I would strongly support. It's a very good method to do fair compensation levels. Related to the Legislature and Governor's raises, not only is government service an honorable profession, politics also is an honorable profession. Our politicians do many things that the public quite often doesn't see. I believe in looking at the data. If we look at the National Council of State Legislators, the average amount of pay for a legislator and a full time legislature is gaged at \$\$1,000 a year. The current compensation for legislators is about \$\$85,000 so it is well within the general range. There's a few other factors that make the Guam Legislature a little different. The average state legislators and ours 15. The

Governor Eddie Baza Calvo

For the senate's pay increase was \$5,000. Whatever you think about the mechanism for that pay increase, maybe there were some issues there on how it was put out. If you look at the compensation of the Hay Plan, its \$80,000. Every dollar that I've borrowed as governor is not because of expenditures in the

Calvo-Tenorio administration. Since I've been governor, we have been making good in out debts and we haven't been borrowing. My recommendation: keep your pay raises senators.

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF GUAM:

2 Section 1. Section 1 of Public Law 32-208 is hereby *amended* to read:

"Section 1. Section 1 of Public Law 32-126 is hereby repealed and reenacted to read:

*Section 1. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, rule, 5regulation, policy, or procedure, the salaries of I Maga'lahen Guåhan. I 6 7 Segundu na Maga'lahen Guåhan, Senators of I Liheslaturan Guåhan, and the Attorney General of Guam, shall be set to the respective salary rates pursuant to 8 the Competitive Wage Act of 2014, which was transmitted and received by I 9 Liheslaturan Guåhan on January 15, 2014. The appropriations from FY 2015 1011 are hereby authorized for the payment of salaries of the positions identified in this Section. The salaries of the Public Auditor of Guam and staff of the Office 12

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Testimony against Governor, Lt. Governor and Legislative Pay Raises

By Ken Leon-Guerrero Santa Rita Resident & Community Advocate

Back in April 2014, Senator Cruz introduced legislation to raise Guam's minimum wage to \$10.25 over three years, an act that would have greatly improved the living standards of Guam's struggling families.

Notice was given according to the rules, and the business community testified this bill would destroy the economy of Guam. In July'; after another round of public notices and hearings, the bill was effectively reduced to a dollar an hour raise of Guam's minimum wage law.

I contrast this with the speed of light secretive process the legislature implemented to make Guam's senators among the highest paid of all the 50 state legislatures.

Unlike the Minimum Wage Act, there were no published hearing announcements, no public input, not Economic Impact Studies required. This whole situation regarding your self-approved pay raises reminds me of the book Animal House. In that book, one of society's rules was "All animals are created equal." Over time, was modified by the leaders to read, "but some animals are more equal than others." And they used that rule to give themselves special privileges.

Much in the same way Guam's elected officials gave themselves preferential treatment over the way they treated Guam's minimum wage earners on the same subject. That special privilege you have given yourselves is the reason why the public is STILL angry about the pay raises.

I acknowledge that Guam's legislators have a tough job and have done many great things for the people of Guam. But with three simple acts:

- 1) Giving yourselves a pay raise after the election, and not before the election,
- 2) Doing it secretly hoping the public would be to pre-occupied with the holidays to notice, and

- 3) Making it retroactive for the entire year;...
- ...you destroyed years of hard earned trust.

Senators are employees of the people. Employees that are hired through the election process to represent our interests. It is a hard thing for those of us who have placed so much faith in our elected leaders, to watch the way you bent the rules to better yourselves over bettering the public you all claim to serve. You actions in giving yourselves the kind of raises you denied minimum wage earners have broken our trust in your abilities to represent our interests fairly.

I am one of the many thousands of voters who are watching your actions very closely. I will tell you that in this instance it is not going to be easier to get forgiveness that it would have been to have gotten permission had you followed the same process you forced Guam's minimum wage earners to follow.

There is no easy way out of this situation. Accountability to the public demands that at a minimum you retract the raises. Honor should compel you to reimburse the people of Guam their hard earned tax dollars.

I believe that some level of pay raises are justified, but you must go through the process from the beginning. I have talked with a number of people who favor breaking the raises into four separate bills:

Raises for the Governor, Lt. Governor

Raises for the Department Heads

Raises for the Mayors

Raises for the Senators

Hear and vote on each bill separately in a proper manner with timely notice. Schedule hearings after 7pm during the week, and after 10am on Saturday to make it convenient for the people to participate and make their options on raises for each group without pitting one group of employees against the other as we are seeing happen in the San Nicolas Bill. In this manner, the people, who are the employers, will have a chance to review and reward performance of each different group of public employees.

Complete the process before the next election to give the people a chance to let you know whether or not you have done a good job.

Make any partraises for the Legislature effective only after two voting cycles have passed, to eliminate the possibility of self interest dominating your decision process.

But the real bottom line here today, is that your actions in the way you treated Guam's minimum wage employees and the way you enriched yourselves shows that there needs to be changes to the way elected public officials are managed by the public that pays their wages and benefits to prevent this type of situation from happening again.

There needs to be a more intense level of scrutiny of the legislature by the public, and that is going to require making a lot of changes to make the legislature more accessible, more transparent, and more accountable to the public.

So I guess that in addition to testifying on the various pay raise bills before the legislature, I am also testifying in support of the Bill 206-33 mandating a public referendum on reforming the Guam Legislature. You have proven to the public that only through intense public involvement, will there be changes to make to make the legislature more transparent and accountable to the public.

I ask you to give very serious consideration to our request that you break this process into four separate bills and let the public have adequate time to make their feelings known about who deserves how much of a pay raise. We are watching, and we have high expectations you fail to meet at your own peril.

Full- and Part-Time Legislatures

It seems like an easy question: Which legislatures are full-time and which ones are part-time? But with 50 different formulas for designing a state legislature, it's difficult to paint this issue in black and white. So we've done it in green, gray and gold.

Being a legislator doesn't just mean attending legislative sessions and voting on proposed laws. State legislators also spend large amounts of time assisting constituents, studying state issues during the interim and campaigning for election. These activities go on throughout the year. Any assessment of the time requirements of the job should include all of these elements of legislative life.

Beyond that point, NCSL prefers to look more broadly at the capacity of legislatures to function as independent branches of government, capable of balancing the power of the executive branch and having the information necessary to make independent, informed policy decisions. To measure the capacity of legislatures, it's important to consider the amount of time legislators spend on the job, the amount they are compensated and the size of the legislature's staff.

NCSL has grouped the 50 state legislatures into three major categories: Green, Gray and Goldand for those who want to know more, NCSL has provided some shading within those categories.

Green Legislatures (Full-time, well-paid, large staff)

Green legislatures require the most time of legislators, usually 80 percent or more of a full-time job. They have large staffs. In most Green states, legislators are paid enough to make a living without requiring outside income. These legislatures are more similar to Congress than are the other state legislatures. Most of the nation's largest population states fall in this category. Because there are marked differences within the category, we have subdivided the Green states. Those in Green generally spend more time on the job because their sessions are longer and their districts larger than those in Green Lite. As a result, they tend to have more staff and are compensated at a higher rate. Within subcategories, states are listed alphabetically.

Gray Legislatures (Hybrid)

Legislatures in the Gray category are hybrids. Legislatures in these states typically say that they spend more than two-thirds of a full time job being legislators. Although their income from legislative work is greater than that in the Gold states, it's usually not enough to allow them to make a living without having other sources of income. Legislatures in the Gray category have intermediate sized staff. States in the middle of the population range tend to have Gray legislatures.

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In the Gold states, on average lawmakers spend the equivalent of half of a full-time job doing legislative work. The compensation they receive for this work is quite low and requires them to have other sources of income in order to make a living. The Gold states have relatively small staffs. They are often called traditional or citizen legislatures and they are most often found in the smallest population, more rural states. Again, NCSL has divided these states into two groups.

The legislatures in Gold are the most traditional or citizen legislatures. The legislatures in Gold Lite are slightly less traditional. States are listed alphabetically within subcategories.

Table 1 shows the breakdown of states by category. Table 2 shows the average scores for the Green, Gray and Gold states for time on the job, compensation and staff size. For 2009 legislator compensation figures, take a look at the latest figures.




