### **COMMITTEE REPORT DIGEST**

### I. OVERVIEW

Bill No. 351-33 (COR) was introduced on July 11, 2016 by Senators Frank B. Aguon Jr. and Rory J. Respicio, and was subsequently referred on July 11, 2016 by the Committee on Rules to the Committee on Transportation, Infrastructure, Lands, Border Protection, Veterans' Affairs and Procurement.

The Committee on Transportation, Infrastructure, Lands, Border Protection, Veterans' Affairs and Procurement convened a public hearing on September 27, 2016 at 1:00 pm in *I Liheslaturan's* Public Hearing Room to receive public testimony on Bill No. 351-33 (COR).

### **Public Notice Requirements**

Public Hearing notices were disseminated via email to all senators and all main media broadcasting outlets on September 20, 2016 (5-Day Notice) and again on September 23, 2016 (48-Hour Notice), fulfilling the 5-Day Notice and 48-Hour Notice of the Open Government Law requirement.

The public hearing was Called-to-Order at 1:02pm.

### II. SUMMARY OF TESTIMONY AND DISCUSSION

Chairperson Ada calls the Public Hearing to order and asked the sponsor of Bill No. 351-33 (COR) to give an introduction.

**Senator Aguon:** States Bill No. 351-33 (COR) relative to Hazardous Pay differential for customs officers. He said in June there was a finding from the Department of Administration that there is no written legal authorization for Guam Customs, being able to receive Hazardous Pay without going through the regular process on an annual bases. He said because the Men and Women of the Guam Customs in their duties are exposed to Hazardous conditions. He said they asked for this piece of Legislation to codify Customs Officers to receive Hazardous Pay. He said this proposal is budget neutral, because Customs Officers were previously receiving Hazardous Pay. He said Customs will have to adopt a table of organization to indicate, which positions are eligible for Hazardous Pay.

**Chairperson Ada**: Called those who have signed up to give testimony.

**Major Philip S. N. Taijeron, Jr.** *Guam Customs and Quarantine*: Reads his written testimony. (see attached)

**Major Darlene R. Merfalen,** *Guam Customs and Quarantine, Acting Director*: Reads her written testimony. (see attached)

She went on to say there were certain sections receiving Hazardous Pay. She said this piece of legislation will add fairness to who receives Hazardous Pay. She said in June of 2016, we were told by Department of Administration to stop paying Hazardous Pay. She said we are doing things the right and legal way. She said she and the eighty some Officers are in support of Bill 351-33. She said thank you.

**Senator Aguon:** He said Major Taijeron you alluded in your testimony to almost every position available at Customs. He said in Major Merfalen's chart, in her testimony there are specific qualifications to be able to receive Hazardous Pay. He said Major Taijeron are you taking this opportunity to expand the individuals able to receive Hazardous Pay. He said we want to get back the previous payments of Hazardous Pay. He said there are other agencies that have requested Hazardous Pay. He said they have been working with the Department of Labor and Department of Administration to resolve the Hazardous Pay issue. He thanked everyone for giving testimony.

**Senator Espaldon**: He said in the testimony that the responsible internal controls found that Department of Labor, Office of Occupational Health assessment certifications were not properly certified. He said were the certifications met and later not recertified.

**Major Philip S. N. Taijeron, Jr.** *Guam Customs and Quarantine*: He said yes that is correct. He said when we were GOSH approved us, they were supposed to come by annually to recertify the positions. He said we did not have them come back. He said we have been budgeting for Hazardous Pay.

**Senator Espaldon**: He said is it an annual requirement. He said because the positions were not recertified you stopped paying Hazardous Pay.

**Major Philip S. N. Taijeron, Jr.** *Guam Customs and Quarantine*: He said that is incorrect. He said even though the positions were not recertified we still paid Hazardous Pay. He said DOA noticed a discrepancy in our pay, they advised us to cease paying all Hazardous Pay. He said the Bill is proposing thru statue, the table of organization be adopted, the positions indicated, and that the Director be authorized to pay Hazardous Pay.

**Senator Espaldon**: He said does this table have all the positions at Customs, which is entitle to Hazardous Pay.

**Major Darlene R. Merfalen,** *Guam Customs and Quarantine, Acting Director*: She said the inequity was for specific functions. She said Line Officers were not being compensated. She said if any position requires them to be put in a hazardous situation they are entitled to Hazardous Pay.

**Senator Espaldon**: He said now I understand because I am uninformed.

**Major Darlene R. Merfalen,** *Guam Customs and Quarantine, Acting Director*: She said other Law Enforcement Agencies request for assistance and there maybe hazardous situations.

**Senator Espaldon**: He said on the Chart are these the positions

**Chairperson Ada**: Thanked all for coming, to include Mr. Borja. Then stated that Bill No. 351-33 (LS) had been duly been heard.

Chairperson Ada adjourns the Public Hearing for Bill No. 351-33 (COR).

### III. FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATION

The Committee finds that Bill No. 351 submitted by Sponsor on Nov. 1st. Bill No. 351 was initially introduced to authorize a 10% Hazardous pay to C&QA officers who, by virtue of the tasks they have to perform are exposed to "extreme physical hazards". The introduced bill followed the format of Sec. 6225 which pertained to Hazardous Pay for GPD. The substitute bill is now more encompassing because it now addresses and proposes to give hazardous pay diff to five other agencies, which not discussed at the PH, or subsequent round-table discussion. Because the substituted Bill No. 351 is more encompassing, introduction of a new bill is deemed warranted.

The Committee on Transportation, Infrastructure, Lands, Border Protection, Veterans' Affairs and Procurement, hereby reports out Bill No. 351-33 (COR), as substituted, with the recommendation to report out only.

AN ACT TO ADD A NEW § 6225.2 TO ARTICLE 2 OF CHAPTER 6, TITLE 4, GUAM CODE ANNOTATED, RELATIVE TO PROVIDING FOR A HAZARDOUS PAY DIFFERENTIAL FOR CUSTOMS OFFICERS WITHIN THE GUAM CUSTOMS AND QUARANTINE AGENCY.

### BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF GUAM:

Section 1. Legislative Findings and Intent. I Liheslaturan Guåhan finds

that Customs Officers within the Guam Customs and Quarantine Agency (CQA),

3 have inherent tasks and functions that are considered egregiously hazardous. The

4 primary duty of Customs Officers is to enforce existing laws and rules and

5 regulations governing illegal drugs and other contrabands as provided for in

6 Chapter 73 of Division 7, Title 5, Guam Code Annotated. Customs Officers carry

7 firearms in the performance and enforcement of mandated rules governing the

importation of illegal drugs and other contrabands and to arrest those individuals

attempting to import such materials into Guam. Customs Officers assigned to

board United States (U.S.) and foreign vessels may require them to be within close

11 proximity of passengers with blunt objects that may be used against them by drug

- dealers, and these Customs Officers must quickly traverse through slippery decks
- 2 on vessels, confine spaces, and on uneven walking surfaces. These duties expose
- 3 Customs Officers to extreme physical hazards when boarding vessels.
- 4 I Liheslaturan Guåhan further finds that the CQA policy and practice of
- 5 allowing hazardous pay was in effect up until June 2016, at which time it was
- 6 administratively discontinued at the recommendation of the Department of
- 7 Administration Human Resources (DOA HR). At the recommendation of DOA
- 8 HR, the agency must apply for hazardous pay designation through the Department
- 9 of Labor Guam Occupational Safety and Health (GOSH).
- Furthermore, due to the prior practice of hazardous pay designation
- payments, the amounts necessary for hazardous pay designation payments were
- included in both Fiscal Year 2016/2017 budget requests rendering the proposed
- statute budget neutral.
- It is, therefore, the intent of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* to reinstate the policy
- and practice of providing hazardous pay differential to Customs Officers within the
- 16 Guam Customs and Quarantine Agency whose actual performance of work
- activities are determined to be hazardous; and only for the duration of such work
- activities. Other uniformed positions within COA not actually involved in the
- 19 performance of such duties are to be considered "not exposed" to the hazardous
- 20 duties of Customs Officers within COA.

**Section 2.** A new §6225.2 is hereby *added* to Article 2 of Chapter 6, Title 4,

2 Guam Code Annotated, to read:

### "§ 6225.2. Customs and Quarantine Agency Officer--Hazardous Pay.

Notwithstanding any other provision of law, rule, regulation and Executive Order to the contrary, the Director of the Customs and Quarantine Agency *shall*, by General Order, adopt a Table of Organization for uniform positions, to include Customs Officers within the Guam Customs and Quarantine Agency. The Table of Organization *shall* identify by rank and duty positions within various units, sections, branches, divisions and commands in the Guam Customs and Quarantine Agency entitled to hazardous pay differential. Customs Officers and uniformed personnel performing duties identified in the Table of Organization for hazardous pay differential *shall be* entitled to a ten percent (10%) hazardous pay differential."

Section 3. Effective Date. This Act *shall be* effective immediately upon enactment.

"§ 6225. Hazardous Duty Positions Identified. (a) The Chief of Police *shall*, by general order, adopt a Table of Organization and Equipment (TOE) for the uniform positions within the Police Department. The TOE shall follow generally the organizational structure established by the reorganization plan for the Police Department which became effective September 11, 1989. The TOE shall identify by rank and duty the positions within the various units, sections, branches, divisions and commands in the Police Department. Hazardous duty positions shall be identified in the TOE.

(b) Notwithstanding § 6304 of Article 3, Chapter 6, Title 4, Guam Code Annotated, the Civil Service Hazardous/Environmental Pay Policy and Procedures, or any other provision of law, rule, regulation and

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### Written Testimony of Major Philip S.N. Taijeron , Jr. Testimony in Support of Bill 351-33 (COR)

An act to add a new § 6225.2 to Article 2 of Chapter 6, Title 4, Guam Code Annotated, relative to providing for a hazardous pay differential for Customs Officers within the Guam Customs and Quarantine Agency.

Hafa Adai and Good Afternoon Honorable Senator Thomas C. Ada and Honorable Senators of this esteemed committee.

Mr. Chairman,

I am here today to testify in favor of Bill 351-33. I would like to thank you for prioritizing and setting the time to hear the proposed Customs Hazardous Pay Differential Bill.

Prior to June of 2016, certain Customs officers received compensation for hazardous duty. Historically, for close to 10 years, the agency was budgeted and paid hazardous pay differential for officers performing hazardous duty. During those times, the only officers receiving hazardous duty pay differential were Customs Officers performing work boarding sea vessels, participating in drug raids, and maintaining custody and transport of arrestees.

In June of 2016, the agency was budgeted to compensate hazardous pay differential for specific duties and positions previously certified and recognized as hazardous. However, responsible internal controls discovered the Government of Guam Department of Labor Occupational Safety and Health annual assessments and certifications for hazardous duty conditions were not properly recertified. Moving forward I will refer to the Guam Occupational Safety and Health as GOSH for the rest of my testimony.

Hazardous pay differential ceased, but officers performing hazardous duty work did not. Because of our mandates at the border, Customs officers continued to perform hazardous duty at our borders minus the compensation. The budget supports the ability to compensate officers but our financial controls do not. I think we can overcome this situation through legislation. Yet another problem is that only CERTAIN positions were originally assessed by our GOSH partners.

Therein lies the paradox of the hazards our Customs border security heroes face on a daily basis and the segregated few of the agency identified by GOSH as certified to receive hazardous pay differential. Through passage of this bill into law, the vexing inconsistencies within the agency concerning hazardous pay differential will be resolved.

As instructed by the Acting Director of the Guam Customs agency, I would like to present a letter introducing our Table of Organization to the Honorable Chairman and his distinguished Committee.

Those of this committee and our public who are most familiar with Guam Customs would be surprised by the uncommon use of a Table of Organization by the Guam Customs Agency. However, unlike our Guam Police Department colleagues, our Table of Organization is simply that: A TABLE OF ORGANIZATION as opposed to the expanded Table of Organization and Equipment TO & E used by our Police Department counterparts. Our intent was to present tools common to Guam Law Enforcement and I Lehislaturan Guahan.

I spoke of a paradox earlier and the opportunity for a solution; in the past only specific customs officers were certified by GOSH, and we know today this process needs to be performed annually, yet many other Customs officers wished for their positions to be annually reviewed and certified to receive just compensation for the hazardous duty they perform. It is no secret that Guam Customs Border operations continue to evolve and expand to meet current day security threats. Our table of organization represents our officers' voices, and we seek the support of this esteemed body to pass this bill and provide resolution.

As the guardian of the purse, I understand I Lehislaturan Guahan's concerns with an across the board hazardous pay differential for all Customs Officers once they assume duty. I urge this body towards an extension and shift of that paradigm. As a society, we are no longer naïve to the effects of terrorism, transnational crime, and the weaponizing and natural occurrence of contagious diseases leading to pandemics during border security operations. The events of 911 and the ensuing threats to national and local security bolster my plea for the approval of hazardous pay differential for all Customs officers identified in the TOO. I am asking for this committee to transfer responsibility for Hazardous duty compensation of Customs Officers through statute to the Director of Customs through passage of Bill 351-33.

The Director of Customs is responsible for the budget of the Guam Customs Agency and fittingly, the appropriated funding that currently exists to support 2016 hazardous pay differential. I am asking for this body to approve the Director of Guam Customs' ability to retroactively compensate officers for hazardous duty work performed from June 2016 till the passage of Bill 351-33 into law for the hazardous duty they continued to perform to protect our borders and our people.

Till this point my appeal has been to the hearts of this esteemed body but please allow me to come full circle from the perspective of "hearts and minds" in my testimony by appealing now to your minds and expertise in the application of controls.

The TOO lists authorizations for hazardous pay differential for officers performing activities under the following:

a) During the time of detainee, suspect, or arrestee interview or interrogation; processing, detention, control, or transport

This work activity was originally certified by GOSH. So, I will not expand in this area.

b) During the time of active boarding of conveyances when assigned duty as the boarding officer for aircraft or watercraft boarding

The boarding of vessels was originally certified by GOSH. However, aircraft boarding was not. Aircraft boarding presents noise and exhaust fume physiological discomforts at the time the aircraft approaches the air-bridge or jet-way. The aircraft and surface conveyance boarding officer is Guam's true first line of defense. Upon the opening of the aircraft doors, the officer is immediately exposed to potential communicable diseases such as H1N1 (swine flu), H7N1 (influenza Type A), SARS, Tuberculosis, and other contagious diseases, as well as potential for other pandemics. A logical fallacy might be, "aren't the other people who work for the airlines equally exposed." The fallacy in that thought is the contagion or hazard is not neutralized or eliminated by the presence of others. This is part of the reason Guam Customs restricts the number of people that can be in the jet-way or air-bridge during aircraft door opening. The same exposures and boarding restrictions hold true for vessel boarding.

c) During the time of active detector dog handling in cargo, passenger, mail, prison, house raid, or other canine search operations

As a former canine handler and founder of the Guam Customs Detector Dog Unit, I am aware of the hazards of utilizing a live animal to perform searches at the border. Although, these animals and their handlers are highly trained their work is performed in dirty or dusty areas; rough, uneven, and slippery surfaces; in close proximity to extremely loud aircraft engine noise and exhaust fumes; on sea vessels traversing from deck to deck and up and down narrow ladders; areas working the dog at heights above 50 ft. where railings do little to prevent the detector dogs from slipping on water and oil slick decks and falling through wide

guardrail spacing potentially dragging his handler with him; or in warehouse elevated shelvings, etc.

d) When performing site visits to business or suspected criminal violator establishments to detect violations of import/export laws or regulations

Any time off-site border inspections are performed at locations away from secured inspection sites, the risk increases for officers to be overwhelmed and overpowered. Weapons on their person as well as weapons in the possession of criminals or terrorists can be used to disable and injure officers. These circumstances exist as importers or businesses seek methods to reduce their costs by requesting for satellite inspections. The lack of a proper customs inspection facility and the ever-increasing levels of container and merchandise imports at the Commercial Port of Guam contribute to this problem.

e) During the time of performing Biosecurity enforcement activities such as agroterrorism, importation reconditioning that requires the use of chemicals, fumigations to eradicate pests, or re-inspections due to pest infestations

I think that these condition in and of themselves are self-explanatory. Biosecurity Officers are the Guam Customs agency's primary response team for identification, control, and eradication of biosecurity threats and dangerous and venomous pests at Guam Ports of Entry. As the Biosecurity mission expands and evolves exposure to virulent and pathogenic vectors, biological contaminants, and disease persists. Further information and an extensive explanation of the hazards involving blood borne pathogens can be found at U.S. OSHA's 29 CFR 1910.1030.

f) During the time of performing active Marine Interdiction Operations as a crew member of a Customs or Government official vessel that is underway This work activity was originally certified by GOSH and as well further ahead in my testimony. I will not expand in this area.

g) During the time of performing inspection activities such as secondary baggage, cargo, mail, aircraft or watercraft vessels, passenger pat downs, strip searches, internal body concealment exam procedures, other enforcement activities targeting border crimes or terrorism

Although this activity as described may appear redundant, these activities exude, extend and encompass combinations of hazards explained in greater detail in other customs work activities.

h) When performing criminal investigations requiring surveillance, arrests, controlled buys, controlled deliveries, house raids, undercover work, evidence gathering, and other criminal investigation activities recognized as hazardous by the Director

This work activity was originally certified by GOSH and as well further ahead in my testimony

i) When performing Container Freight Station or Satellite Hold inspections away from secured Customs facilities

The justifications explained under activity d) apply equally to this activity

j) While officers are utilizing or operating X-ray equipment in mobile X-ray vehicles as well as stationary X-ray machines

Exposure to leaking chemicals, triggering devices that injure or kill by surprise, and dirty bombs are real exposure threats our X-ray teams might experience.

k) When assigned to a Federal, Local Law Enforcement Task Force, or Special Duty Assignments such as to GPD or VIP Security.

Assignments of Customs Officers to Federal or Local Task Forces often times pairs officers with officers from the Guam Police Department who are paid hazardous differential pay for the entire duty day during which time customs officers perform exact duties receive pay only for the periods of actual controlled deliveries and transport and custody of arrestees that was originally approved by GOSH. I am asking for parity so when GPD officer assigned to the Task Forces receive hazardous duty compensation for the full duty period then Guam Customs officers also assigned to the Task Forces receive similar compensation as their GPD counterparts.

From the perspective of VIP security and by summary of 4 GCA subsection 6222 Superior Court of Guam Marshalls are entitled to hazardous duty pay for providing security for a Justice, Judge or Referee so long as such Justice, Judge or Referee and the Administrator of the Courts certify that such duty exposed the employee to potentially dangerous circumstances; this statute provides a platform to request reasonable allowances for the Director of Guam Customs to also approve hazardous pay differential for customs officers performing VIP security or work-related duties involving exigent circumstances resulting in imminent danger of bodily injury to the employee or others; or exposure to potentially dangerous circumstances

1) During the time of performing search and seizure of locations or persons, evidence discovery, handling, and/or processing

This activity exposes officers to dangerous substances, disease, and direct contact with criminals.

As an industry comparison, the U.S. Government Office of Personnel Management presents a valid center of gravity by which to also base my justification for the approval of hazardous pay for the positions identified in Guam Customs' TOO.

Their official website exists at

https://www.opm.gov/faqs/topic/payleave/?cid=c4c7e7ca-48be-4650-bbc8-6ec08e8fd479. I provide this for ease of reference and source identification. The specific page I reviewed presented the U.S. Office of Personnel Management's Frequently Asked Questions concerning PAY & LEAVE and specifically, hazardous duty.

The site provides the following information as a reference:

5 CFR Part 550, Subpart I, Appendix A to Subpart I of Part 550 – described as Schedule of Pay Differentials Authorized for Hazardous Duty Under Subpart I

Under the major section entitled:

Exposure to Hazardous Weather or Terrain:

Specifically, in sections;

(1) Work in rough and remote terrain. When working on cliffs, narrow ledges, or near vertical mountainous slopes where a loss of footing would result in serious injury or death, or when working in areas where there is danger of rock falls or avalanches

Our officers assigned to the Marine Interdiction Task Force performs coastal patrols and are specifically exposed to this condition when they are not at sea performing vessel boarding at sea.

Although not identical in language,

(2) Traveling under hazardous conditions. (a) When travel over secondary or unimproved roads to isolated mountain top installations is required at night, or under adverse weather conditions (such as snow, rain, or fog) which limits visibility to less than 30 meters (100 feet), when there is danger of rock, mud, or snow slides

We are all too familiar with typhoon conditions that place our officers under similar circumstances. In past typhoons, our Marine Interdiction Task Force was instructed to perform verifications of major roadway passage to assist our GPD counterparts through the use of agency equipment capable of traversing fallen obstacles, typhoon debris, and flooded areas.

### At number 4);

4) Water search and rescue operations. Participating as a member of a water search and rescue team in adverse weather conditions when winds are blowing at 56 km/h (35 m.p.h.) (classified as gale winds) or in water search and rescue operations conducted at night

Our Marine Interdiction Task Force could find themselves operating under similar conditions.

(6) Hazardous boarding or leaving of vessels. When duties (a), (b), or (c) are performed under adverse conditions of foul weather, ice, or night and when the sea state is high (0.9 meter (3 feet) and above)

To summarize a, b, and c, our officers performing vessel clearance and boarding experience these hazards consistently at the Port Authority of Guam. Our vessel boarding activities require officers to move personnel and equipment from dock to vessel and many times over unsecured planks and hopping from one vessel to

another when vessel are aligned side by side against the pier or dock, which is sometimes a moving or floating pier or dock.

In courtesy to others wishing to provide testimony on Bill 351-33; from this point forward, I will simply read the hazardous exposure conditions

Exposure to Hazardous Agents, work with or in close proximity to:

- (1) Explosive or incendiary materials. Explosive or incendiary materials which are unstable and highly sensitive
- (3) Toxic chemical materials. Toxic chemical materials when there is a possibility of leakage or spillage
- (5) Virulent biologicals. Materials of micro-organic nature which when introduced into the body are likely to cause serious disease or fatality and for which protective devices do not afford complete protection

### Height Work:

Working on any structure of at least 15 meters (50 feet) above the base level, ground, deck, floor, roof, etc., under open conditions, if the structure is unstable or if scaffolding guards or other suitable protective facilities are not used, or if performed under adverse conditions such as snow, sleet, ice on walking surfaces, darkness, lightning, steady rain, or high wind velocity

This is but a short list of hazardous exposures Customs Officers experience. As I contemplate the duties customs officers perform daily at our borders, the reality that sets in for me is the physical hardship and the real, yet uncertain threat of WMD and Terrorism at the border. When a logical analysis is performed of the mission of the Customs agency, one must seriously consider; if we are charged to

safeguard Guam against such treachery, then to perform our job effectively would cause absolute exposure.

To close, and to provide two industry standards; I present a question asked and answered on the U.S. Office of Personnel Management's web page:

The questions is:

If an employee performs a hazardous duty (as listed in appendix A) for an hour during the work shift, does he or she receive the hazard pay differential for only that hour?

The response provided was:

No. When an employee performs a duty for which a hazard pay differential is authorized, the agency must pay the hazard pay differential for all of the hours in which the employee is in a pay status on the day on which the duty is performed. (5 CFR 550.905)

The other standard is the differential percentage comparison. The Government of Guam's hazardous duty differential is 10% but the U.S. OPM standard for hazardous pay differential is 25%.

Perhaps our Government might consider adopting similar best practices.



### 2. Table of Functions

### DIRECTOR'S OFFICE

- 1. Develop Agency policies, procedures, regulations, staffing, planning, coordinating, work operations, personal records, maintaining liaison with various government and civic organizations and secures and maintains equipment needed to successfully accomplish the mission and objectives of the agency.
- 2. Monitors and disseminates information to various government and civilian entities regarding changes in regulation requirement, handles and resolves operational needs, staff complaints, and grievances.
