COMMITTEE REPORT DIGEST

I. OVERVIEW

Bill No. 9-33 (COR) was introduced on January 5, 2015, by Senator Dennis G. Rodriguez, Jr. The bill was subsequently referred by the Committee on Rules to the Committee on Finance & Taxation, General Government Operations, and Youth Development on January 6, 2015.

The Committee on Finance & Taxation, General Government Operations, and Youth Development held a public hearing on March 12, 2015, in *I Liheslatura*'s Public Hearing Room. Among the items on the hearing agenda was Bill No. 9-33 (COR). The hearing convened at 10:01 a.m. and was recessed at 11:57 a.m. The hearing reconvened at 2:03 p.m. and was adjourned at 5:35 p.m.

II. TESTIMONY & DISCUSSION

Chairman Michael San Nicolas: We'll go ahead and continue this hearing on Bill No. 9-33 introduced by Senator Rodriguez. An act to adopt the rules and regulations relative to responsible alcohol server seller training programs by amending chapter 2 Alcoholic Beverage Control Board of Title 3 Guam Administrative rules and regulations and business regulations and at this time I would like to yield to Senator Rodriguez for his opening statement on the bill.

Senator Dennis Rodriguez: Good Morning. Thank you very much Mr. Chair for the opportunity to speak on this bill. To briefly give a synopsis of the bill but also for having a public hearing on it. What Bill 9 is Mr. Chairman and members of the committee and the public is an act to adopt the rules and regulations relative to responsible alcohol server selling training programs by amending chapter 2 Alcoholic Beverage Control Board of Title 3 the Guam administrative Rules and Regulations, Business regulations. About 20 months ago, this body, the Guam Legislature passed a public law 3251 that provides for the demanded requirement for anyone who wishes to sell and serve alcohol for them to obtain a server seller training program certification and so really just to give a little bit of history this was something that was inspired by members from our Department of Youth Affairs and members from our Guam Behavioral Health and Wellness Center who had already and put into a place a volunteer program that would train servers and sellers of alcohol of alcohol establishments. And so what this bill does Mr. Chairman is because the initial law had required the ABC Board to promulgate rules and regulations within 150 calendar days and that has not happened its really to move this process forward and this body to adopt these initial rules and regs. And then for the ABC board then to make any changes in the future. We've been working as an anticipation of this public hearing with the members of Guam Behavioral Health and Wellness and DYA to even fine tune this measure even further. This proposed rules and regs was also provided to members of the board a few months ago I think sometime last year. But then you know I understand that the board members are volunteer members and they have a lot on their plates. One of the busiest boards and so would like to be able to facilitate this by passing it through a legislative action. Thank you very much Mr. Chairman.

Chairman San Nicolas: Thank you Senator Rodriguez. Present to testify on behalf of Bill No. 9-33 we have Ms. Audrey Topasna, Ms. Sarah Harold, and Ms. Mary Rhodes if you can please join us at the table. And Mr. Bart Jackson also joined us. So we have two groups basically represented in this panel. We have Guam Behavioral Health and Wellness Center and the Guam Hotel and Restaurant Association and the Private Sector so we'll go ahead and yield I guess to our private sector members who are present or would you like to yield to our government members who are present? Up to you. Okay so we'll go ahead and start with Audrey.

Audrey Topasna: Guess I'm the lucky one. Okay, Good Morning. Senator San Nicolas, Senator Rodriguez and all the other senators and we thank you for allowing us to testify this

morning. Just for the record, my name is Audrey Topasna. I am the Underage Drinking Prevention Coordinator for the Guam Peace project and I also serve as the team leader for the Non-Communicable Disease alcohol prevention and control group and I'm here in support of Bill 9-33 on the act to adopt the rules and regulations relative to be responsible alcohol server and seller training programs. (Read testimony. Please see attached testimony). To reduce alcohol abuse and prevent underage drinking, it requires a multi-strategic approach and in saying that it requires individual and environmental level interventions and individual we refer to such as family based or school based, with environmental, we look at raising the alcohol price of alcohol, raising the minimum legal drinking age and also to include the alcohol servers seller intervention skills training and that is why we are here to support this bill. So it moves basically moves it forward on what was passed which was public law 32-51. And that's what which it established the responsible alcohol sales and service act. Our Island has dealt with far too many issues with alcohol related such as motor vehicle crashes, family violence, cancer, and suicides. We must continue to improve Guam environmental interventions and so the passing of Bill 9 will move that process forward. So we can begin to implement the Alcohol Server and Seller Training programs as required by Public Law 32-51. So I'd like to thank Senator San Nicolas, Senator Rodriguez, and all the other committee members for taking the necessary steps needed to improve our island community's health and addressing safety issues. Thank you so much.

Chairman San Nicolas: Thank you very much, Audrey. Next we have Sarah.

Sarah Harrell: Hafa Adai. My name is Sarah Harrell. I work as a program coordinator for the Guam Behavioral Health & Wellness Center prevention and training branch. But I'm also here as a member or representing the alcohol control group reaction group from the NCD Consortium and that's a partnership among many other government agencies and non-profit organizations. It's being lead by the Department of Public Health and Social Services. The information that I will present is basically in addition to what Audrey, my colleague here had already shared with you. Because of the passing of Public Law 3251 and thank you for the members of the 32nd legislature initiated by Senator Rodriguez. We joined; Guam joins 43 other states and territories in having responsible beverage server trainer and other related practices throughout US so it's really a national strategy. It's an objective that even in the national field they are implementing so it's a good step. It's a positive step for Guam in making sure that underage drinking doesn't happen. That drunk driving doesn't happen and that we don't lose lives anymore to alcohol related injuries or deaths. Aside from that, because of Guam Behavioral Health's partnership with Department of Youth Affairs in 2013 like what Senator Rodriguez had already shared earlier. Audrey and I, together with four other trainers, we underwent a training through the Pacific Institutive Research and Evaluation and that's brought in by Department of Youth Affairs they are a non-profit organization and that was funded by the underage drinking laws by DYA. Before the public law was a law we were able to meet at least 50 servers and sellers in the private industry in the beverage serve industry and we were able to provide them the responsible

beverage server seller training. So I would like to share with you how they positively evaluated the training how they thought it was a very good tool for them to use. Like I said 100% of those 50 trainees positively evaluated the training specifically when we asked them in their evaluation form if they will be able to use the skills from the RBS training in their work place like 64% strongly agree that yes they will use it and 36% agreed so that's 100% of them telling us that yes, they will use it when they are at the bars when they are the restaurants, when they are at the mom and pop stores. Having access to alcohol for the consumer for the customer. When we asked them if they would recommend the training to their colleagues in the industry, 92% strongly agreed and 8% agreed. So this is not us program coordinators saying that RBS or any server intervention training is necessary in our community, these are the servers themselves. I would like to share a story that was also shared during one of the trainings. Part of the training is that we discuss experiences and we try to do problem solving kind of discussion with the servers that are involved in the training and one of the servers in one of the trainings that we held shared that as an individual, as a server, or as a licensed server no matter how hard they tried to stop somebody if they have their doubts that this person is under 21. If their boss or if their manager says that I got that person covered go ahead and give them that bottle of beer. As a mere employee it's very hard for them to say no but with the RBS training it's almost like a license, pun intended, a license to say no because they are being provided the skills on how to properly put their foot down and make sure that underage drinking doesn't happen. Not on their watch. So with what we just shared we are very certain that our sellers and servers, they are very ready. They are ready for this training to happen to be provided to them so as programmatic people I think that we really need to do what we have to do to make sure that it does happen. Thank you.

Chairman San Nicolas: Thank you Sarah. Ms. Rhodes.

Mary Rhodes: Hafa Adai everybody. For the record my name is Mary Rhodes and I am the president for the Guam Hotel and Restaurant Association. Thank you for this opportunity. I just want to be clear that Public Law 32-51 did pass and we all understand and really appreciate the intent of the spirit of the law. I think that what both Audrey and Sarah who I both know personally and very well. What they are saying and of course as an industry, as a tourism industry especially those who are responsible as servers and for businesses that are serving alcohol and licensed and permitted to do so take their job seriously and all of these things are important. Which is really why public law 32-51 did pass. Today's draft bill, Bill 9 is really about the promulgation of the rules and regulations. So I don't think we're here to talk about whether or not this is necessary because we've already been there. We've talked about the value of responsible beverage serving before and if you look at the record GHRA was actually supportive. We didn't come in a speak against the bill. We wanted to work directly with the ABC license board on promulgating rules and regulations. I did call the chairman of the ABC License Board because when I saw the draft bill I wanted to make sure that he was aware that this was being heard. To give you a little bit of background starting last year when we thought

that the ABC License Board was going to have to promulgate Rules and Regs. I personally talked to Senator Dennis Rodriguez about where they are at with this timeline which they did not meet. They had already passed this timeline. So GHRA requested a meeting with the ABC License Board. We also invited all of the potential trainers who were interested in providing this RBS training so that we can help identify what are the challenges in training and again without taking anything away from the public law this is really about the promulgation of rules and regulations. So the ABC licensing board has had probably four different meetings with the trainers including GCC a private trainer, who works, actually a couple of trainers who work in the industry and one who doesn't and also GHRA with our food and beverage committee. We talked about what the curriculum should look like which was already written into law, what the specific requirements should be, we talked about a timeline to be inclusive of an RFP we actually asked the ABC licensing board to document a letter requesting for an extension because they had missed the deadline to promulgate rules and regulations. So that's where we're at today. Unfortunately in my call this morning with Chairman Frank Leon Guerrero he had indicated that he did receive a letter being aware that this was happening but he did not receive any copy of the legislation. He was quite surprised to understand and I am only explaining because we meet on a regular basis. I just saw him in December, I saw him in January. We were wondering when we were going to actually get an extension of this. But what this Bill 9 is putting out is to circumvent ABC license board from doing their job. This is actually promulgating the rules and regs. to move forward and there are some I actually submitted I do approve to move forward with it but with some changes. So what I'd like to recommend since this draft bill is still in committee that we have a roundtable discussion and we include public health we include Department of Youth. Affairs but we also include the industry, the trainers, and especially ABC License Board together with the administrator. We've never done that just so you know. We have only done individual meetings with Senator Rodriguez or separately with ABC License Board. None of us have ever come together on this and there are some things that are very important that we've discussed that would make this a better set of rules and regulations. Nowhere in here do we talk about an RFP process. We only give the administrator the authority to approve the training program. That can carry a lot of weight and political influence which I think is a very dangerous slippery slope for anyone in the government giving an agency that authority. I think that Mr. Juan Carlos is a great man and I've worked with him both with insurance industry and now with tourism. Love him to death but I think that's some who knows when he's going to retire too and so we don't want to give that much authority to one person that is why you have an ABC Board and that ABC Board actually is made up of individuals who yes, they volunteer. Yes, they have other jobs but they are not associated with the industry. They are not associated with being a trainer. They are not associated with having license or permits to handle or distribute alcohol. So it's very clear that to be on that ABC Board they asked me for example I didn't want it. He tried to get me to do it many times. I didn't want it because too many of our members that are their business but they are a very neutral group and I think we need to include them. When this bill was first introduced they were not included that is the reason why they were so confused and just so you know ABC

License Board has gone through two changes in the last three years because of their inability to have a quorum and so there are a lot of challenges with the board they worked through them this last year and let's give them that opportunity to promulgate rules and regs. And not side step them. Lets actually, we've identified our timeline just so you know to get to promulgating rules and regs, getting and RFP process, getting trainers approved, and also having training within the first year because this does allow a 12 month extension or grandfather period for servers to still keep their job and then get a three year training program. So that's really all I'm asking is for more collaboration to include the ABC Board. I think all your industry representatives both social and non-profit and business for profit are willing to get together because we do need to identify the specific curriculum and the RFP process and we need to ensure that the administrator and Rev. & Tax with the ABC License Board is included in this because ultimately it is their responsibility and ultimately they should be able to weigh in on this so thank you for your time.

Chairman San Nicolas: Thank you Ms. Rhodes. Mr. Jackson.

Bartley Jackson: Thank you Mr. Chairman. Hafa Adai. Hafa Adai everyone. I'm really here to speak on the next bill but I do want to support the GHRA position in this matter and that is of course we are very supportive of responsible beverage server training and it's really a question of creating the consensus. So as Mary said our position we would really like to see a roundtable all parties represented so that we can sit down and talk through these rules and regs. Which really need to be implemented as quickly as possible.

Chairman San Nicolas: Thank you Mr. Jackson.

Ms. Rhodes: Sorry Mr. Chairman. Can 1 just add one more thing?

Chairman San Nicolas: Sure, Ms. Rhodes.

Ms. Rhodes: GHRA has voluntarily just so you know has worked with providing responsible beverage training since 1999 with our distributors. So we've been providing responsible beverage serving with a particular program since 99 so there are a lot of people who are voluntarily either certified as a train the trainer or train but we certainly don't have everybody in the industry. So we do this on a voluntary basis. I'm sure that the training you guys provided is a voluntary right now because nothing is in to effect because of the public law.

Chairman San Nicolas: Thank you Ms. Rhodes. Senator Rodriguez.

Senator Rodriguez: Thank you very much Mr. Chairman and thank you for your testimony. You know I respect everyone's opinion but I really think that speaking on behalf of ABC Board, you're out of place in doing that. I think if you speak on behalf of GHRA that's fine. I think even the comment about this is circumventing the ABC Board. If they just did their job then you know we wouldn't be here today and so its passed about 20 months since the passage of the law and so that's why we are here today to make sure it moves forward. They received copies of these many months ago when they came to my office. I think Mr. Leon Guerrero was first appointed it was Mr. Llaneta and also Ms. Maya. So they have copies of this the regulatory individual Mr. Juan Carlos also has a copy of this. They are all part of it and so I think to say that we need another roundtable we need more discussions we've been having discussions. Even when the first bill was introduced and passed Public Law 3251, the board was involved. We had John Ray Taitano who was intimately involved with us in moving this forward. So that is why I think it's very dangerous when we speak or are speaking for other individuals and so you know I just want to say that this really needs to move forward. We have done everything in ensuring that alcohol stays out of the hands of our youth. We have done things to ensure that now the age of legal authority to consume alcohol is 21. The bars now close at 2 am. That's all the back end stuff. This is really the front end where we are saying we need to train and educate our servers and sellers on how to appropriately and responsibly serve these alcohols and so you know sure Mr. Chairman we can have another roundtable. I think that we should respect that but this is time that we move forward and ensure that the law is carried out. Thank you very much.

Ms. Rhodes: Mr. Chairman.

Chairman San Nicolas: Thank you. Hang on Ms. Rhodes.

Ms. Rhodes: Just for clarification I am not speaking on behalf those are the meetings I attended with them. Just so you know.

Chairman San Nicolas: Sure. Okay. Thank you. I actually very much appreciate the efforts of Senator Rodriguez to drive the issue forward. Very clearly the Alcohol Beverage Control Board had a deadline to meet. They were participating in the original passage of the law that set that deadline for the establishment of these rules and regulations. They didn't meet that deadline and so Senator Rodriguez is driving this issue forward and he's taking the helm on it and that's very much appreciated but also too we do want to listen as well and I know Senator Rodriguez wants to also. So what the committee is going to do is we're going to schedule as quickly as possible a roundtable discussion as requested so that we can get round of input on the measure but as Senator Rodriguez stated we should not be delaying this issue any further than it already has been due to the nonproliferation of rules and regulations that should have been completed by now. He's absolutely right that it needs to get done. So we will get this roundtable scheduled right away. We'll coordinate with all the interested parties who should participate and once that roundtable is concluded we will work with the sponsor of this legislation to craft the final version that will be reported out of committee soon after that. So we're looking at no more than one more month of back and forth on this measure but Senator Rodriguez is right. Any more than

that will be a detriment to the community at this point. So thank you very much for your testimony, all of you. It was very well delivered. I was actually very impressed Ms. Sarah about the data that you provided and you were very concise and it was very well delivered so thank you very much for everyone's testimony. If there are no further questions from the panel we'll go ahead and conclude the hearing then on Bill No. 9-33. Thank you very much.

III. FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

At the request of the Guam Hotel and Restaurant Association, the Committee convened a roundtable discussion with regards Bill No. 9-33 (COR) on March 31, 2015. Various community stakeholders were invited to discuss the provisions of the Bill with several recommendations incorporated into an amended version of Bill No. 9-33 (COR), which is attached herewith.

AN ACT TO ADOPT THE RULES AND REGULATIONS RELATIVE TO RESPONSIBLE ALCOHOL SERVER/SELLER TRAINING PROGRAMS, BY *AMENDING* CHAPTER 2 -ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGE CONTROL BOARD, OF TITLE 3, GUAM ADMINISTRATIVE RULES AND REGULATIONS -BUSINESS REGULATIONS.

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF GUAM:

Section 1. Legislative Findings and Intent: 1 Liheslaturan Guåhan finds 2 that Alcohol Beverage Control Board has not promulgated to the requisite Rules 3 and Regulations, as mandated pursuant to §2107(c) of Chapter 2, Title 3, Guam 4 Administrative Rules and Regulations, which provides, "[t]he Administrator shall 5 approve classroom alcohol server/seller training programs that meet the 6 regulations duly promulgated by the Board pursuant to 11 Guam Code Annotated 7 \$3124." Further, Section 11(a) of P.L. 32-51 provides, "The Board shall 8 promulgate the requisite rules and regulations mandated pursuant to §3124 of Title 9 11, Guam Code Annotated, within one hundred fifty calendar days of the effective 10date of this Act." Public Law 32-51 was enacted into law on July 05, 2013, and 11 12 eleven (11) months have passed without ABC Board action.

6 (d) The required fee must have been paid into the treasury of Guam 7 before the Board will consider the application of any person for an alcoholic 8 beverage control license. The acceptance of the fee by the Treasury of Guam does 9 not constitute Board approval or extension of license required under provisions of 10 11 GCA §3309.

§ 2102. Qualifications of Prospective Licensees. (a) Prior to the Board considering an application for an alcoholic beverage control license, a thorough investigation into the applicant's background will be conducted by the Alcoholic Beverage Control Administrator. The Board will carefully consider the results of this investigation and may make a determination as to approval or disapproval of the application upon such action.

(b) Where the applicant for a license is a corporation, all individuals who own stock in such corporations or are otherwise involved in any way as proprietors, managers, employees or agents of the business being licensed shall be listed by legal name in the current application on file with the Administrator. No license shall be issued or renewed unless these listings are complete and legally accurate and reveal compliance with the intent of 11 GCA §§3300 and 3301, as each may be applicable.

§ 2103. Premises Qualifications. (a) Prior to the Board considering

an application for an alcoholic beverage control license, the Alcoholic Beverage
Control Board will require the Administrator to conduct an inspection of the
premises to determine that they meet the requirements of the law. Results of this

This suspension shall remain in effect until removed, modified, or other action as may be deemed necessary and appropriate has been taken by the Board.

8 (b) All Class 4, On-Sale establishments shall have a duly registered 9 manager or assistant manager on the premises, in the absence of the licensee, and 10 during the hours from 7:00 p.m. daily until closing. The manager or assistant 11 manager shall be capable and competent in maintenance of order and 12 responsible for compliance with pertinent laws and regulations as pertains to the 13 licensed premises.

(c) A licensee proposing to transfer or in the process of transferring his license to another party shall remain responsible for the conduct of the licensed business and liable for compliance with all terms of the license and all laws and regulations pertaining thereto until such time as the Board has approved the transfer and the transferred license has been re-issued by the Administrator in the new licensee's name.

(d) A licensee who proposes to be absent or who may be absent from
the Island of Guam for a period of forty-eight (48) hours or more shall, prior
to departure, notify the Board in writing of the name of the person or persons
who are designated responsible for the licensed premises during such absence.
The person so designated must meet all qualifications for owner or manager as

specified by law and/or regulations and must agree in writing that he is so qualified and accepts this responsibility prior to the licensee's departure. The Board may refuse to accept or approve such designation if, in the Board's consideration, they decide such would not be in conformance with the law, these regulations, or otherwise not in the best interest of the public.

(e)A licensee shall post a list of employees and their specified duty 6 hours on the premises where such list shall be at all times available for 7 inspection by duly authorized representatives of the government of Guam. These 8 specified work periods shall clearly indicate the hours when each employee is 9 considered to be on duty. The list shall be posted in advance and shall not be 10 changed except for a bona fide reason. When such changes are made to a 11 posted list, the change shall be initialed by the person making the change, the 12 date and time of such change entered thereon. 13

(f) Licensees of General On-Sale establishments shall be required to register or cause to be registered with the Alcoholic Beverage Control Administrator all persons employed by his establishment and engaged in the mixing and/or the serving of alcoholic beverages, within seventy-two (72) hours after their employment.

(g) Licensees shall not engage in business practices which are inimical or
discriminatory to public interest or that which may tend to create a monopoly.
Credit extended by or to any whole sale or retail licensee beyond forty-five (45)
days from date of sale or delivery of the alcoholic beverages shall constitute a
violation of provisions of 11 GCA §3429.

24 (h) Class 4, 5, 6, 7, 9, 10, 11 and 12 ABC licensees shall not hire or

§ 2100.1. Definitions. For the purposes of this Chapter, except as
otherwise specifically provided, the following shall have the meaning prescribed in
this section:

(a) *Board* means the Alcoholic Beverage Control Board, as provided
 pursuant to § 3106 of Chapter 3 of Title 3, Guam Code Annotated.

(b) Administrator means the Alcoholic Beverage Control Administrator, as
 provided pursuant to §§ 3102 and 3506 of Chapter 3, Title 11, Guam Code
 Annotated.

§ 2101. Applications. (a) Applications for any Alcoholic Beverage
Control license or transfer or any license authorized under 11 GCA Chapter 3, shall
be submitted upon proper forms approved by the Board and furnished by the
Alcoholic Beverage Control Administrator;

(b) Each applications must be properly and completely filled out and
accompanied by any and all require data supplementing the application forms. If
the Board feels that additional information is necessary, consideration of the
application may be postponed and a reasonable period of time may be afforded the
applicant to comply with this requirement.

(c) Applications or other documents to be formally presented to the

Board must first be filed with the Alcoholic Beverage Control Administrator. These documents shall be marked or stamped to indicate time and date of receipt. He Administrator shall review all applications or other documents and if not complete according to instructions on the form or according to instructions on the form or according to regulations, shall mark them "rejected as incomplete" and return them to applicant to completion and resubmission;

7 (d) The required fee must have been paid into the treasury of Guam 8 before the Board will consider the application of any person for an alcoholic 9 beverage control license. The acceptance of the fee by the Treasury of Guam does 10 not constitute Board approval or extension of license required under provisions of 11 11 GCA §3309.

§ 2102. Qualifications of Prospective Licensees. (a) Prior to the Board considering an application for an alcoholic beverage control license, a thorough investigation into the applicant's background will be conducted by the Alcoholic Beverage Control Administrator. The Board will carefully consider the results of this investigation and may make a determination as to approval or disapproval of the application upon such action.

(b) Where the applicant for a license is a corporation, all individuals who own stock in such corporations or are otherwise involved in any way as proprietors, managers, employees or agents of the business being licensed shall be listed by legal name in the current application on file with the Administrator. No license shall be issued or renewed unless these listings are complete and legally accurate and reveal compliance with the intent of 11 GCA §§3300 and 3301, as each may be applicable.

§ 2103. Premises Qualifications. (a) Prior to the Board considering an application for an alcoholic beverage control license, the Alcoholic Beverage Control Board will require the Administrator to conduct an inspection of the premises to determine that they meet the requirements of the law. Results of this inspection will be included with the application and made available to the Board upon its consideration thereof.

7 (b) Licensees shall provide, at the time of application or renewal of any 8 Class 4, General On-Sale license, and maintain in a sanitary and functioning 9 manner adequate separate toilet and/or lavatory facilities with hot and cold running 10 water for men and women. Such facilities shall provide for reasonable security 11 and privacy.

§ 2104. Transfer of Licenses. (a) Where a license has been issued to or in the name of a partnership, no substitution, addition, removal of other change to the licensed partnership shall be made until the proposed change has first been considered by the Board upon application for a transfer by the licensee in the same manner and procedure as application for a transfer between two distinct business entities;

(b) No application for transfer of a license will be considered by the Board unless the applicant has met the same personal qualifications as that required of an applicant for an original license nor will an application for transfer be considered by the Board if the proposed premises do not meet the qualifications as that required for premises in an application for an original license. This procedure does not apply to transfers as defined in 11 GCA §3310(1).

24 § 2105. Responsibilities of the Licensee. (a) It shall be the

responsibility of a licensee to notify the Administrator in writing of any and all 1 changes in licensed business ownership, management, agents or any other changes 2 which materially affect or modify the data on file and recorded as the basis for 3 granting or renewal of such license, prior to the time such change occurs. Failure 4 to do so within twenty-four (24) hours of such change shall require immediate 5 temporary suspension of the license pending investigation and review by the 6 Board. This suspension shall remain in effect until removed, modified, or other 7 action as may be deemed necessary and appropriate has been taken by the Board. 8

9 (b) All Class 4, On-Sale establishments shall have a duly registered 10 manager or assistant manager on the premises, in the absence of the licensee, and 11 during the hours from 7:00 p.m. daily until closing. The manager or assistant 12 manager shall be capable and competent in maintenance of order and 13 responsible for compliance with pertinent laws and regulations as pertains to the 14 licensed premises.

15 (c) A licensee proposing to transfer or in the process of transferring his 16 license to another party shall remain responsible for the conduct of the licensed 17 business and liable for compliance with all terms of the license and all laws 18 and regulations pertaining thereto until such time as the Board has approved the 19 transfer and the transferred license has been re-issued by the Administrator in the 20 new licensee's name.

(d) A licensee who proposes to be absent or who may be absent from
the Island of Guam for a period of forty-eight (48) hours or more shall, prior
to departure, notify the Board in writing of the name of the person or persons
who are designated responsible for the licensed premises during such absence.

The person so designated must meet all qualifications for owner or manager as specified by law and/or regulations and must agree in writing that he is so qualified and accepts this responsibility prior to the licensee's departure. The Board may refuse to accept or approve such designation if, in the Board's consideration, they decide such would not be in conformance with the law, these regulations, or otherwise not in the best interest of the public.

A licensee shall post a list of employees and their specified duty (e) 7 hours on the premises where such list shall be at all times available for 8 inspection by duly authorized representatives of the government of Guam. These 9 specified work periods shall clearly indicate the hours when each employee is 10 considered to be on duty. The list shall be posted in advance and shall not be 11 changed except for a bona fide reason. When such changes are made to a 12 posted list, the change shall be initialed by the person making the change, the 13 date and time of such change entered thereon. 14

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(h) Class 4, 5, 6, 7, 9, 10, 11 and 12 ABC licensees *shall not* hire or
employ any employee that *does not* have a valid alcohol employee license from an
approved alcohol server/seller training program twelve months from the effective
date of this act, provided, however:

5 (1) that a current ABC license *shall* continue to be valid until 6 expiration, but the licensee *shall* be required to have taken the alcohol 7 server/seller training program prior to license renewal. Further, the 8 unexpired license *shall not* be portable, as provided pursuant to §3212.1(b) 9 which only applies to a licensee who has passed an alcohol server/seller 10 training program.




