RELATIVE TO REQUESTING CONGRESSIONAL SUPPORT FOR THE ON-FARM ALTERNATIVE ENERGY POLICY ADOPTED BY THE NATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF CONSERVATION DISTRICTS INCLUDING THE APPROVAL OF FUNDS FOR THE DEVELOPMENT OF A DEMONSTRATION PROJECT ON GUAM FOR OCEAN POWER TECHNOLOGY

1 BE IT RESOLVED BY THE PEOPLE OF GUAM:

2 WHEREAS, Guam's Northern and Southern Conservation 3 Districts are members of the National Association of Conservation 4 Districts, an organization comprised of the more than 3,000 5 Conservation Districts within the United States and the territories; 6 and

WHEREAS, the National Association of Conservation Districts
is the voice of the nation's 3,000 Conservation Districts and 17,000
men and women who serve on their governing boards; working with
land owners, other organizations and agency partners to protect our

nation's soil, water, forest, wildlife and other resources for over 60
 years; and

3 WHEREAS, the mission of the National Association of 4 Conservation Districts is to enable conservation districts to pool their 5 resources to accomplish collectively-what would be difficult or 6 impossible to accomplish individually; and

goals of the National Association 7 WHEREAS, the of 8 Conservation Districts are to represent districts as their national voice on conservation issues; provide useful information to conservation 9 districts and their state associations; build partnerships with federal 10 and state agencies and other organizations in order to carry out 11 district priorities and programs; analyze programs and policy issues 12 that have an impact on local districts; and to offer needed and cost-13 effective services to districts; and 14

WHEREAS, the National Association of Conservation Districts
has approved a policy in support for On-Farm Alternative Energy
Production through resolution adopted as follows:

18 "NACD Seek Support for On-Farm Alternative Energy 19 Production

2 - 194 8 - 19 Farmers are recognizing an emerging energy crisis as increasing fuel cost and declining supply will have an adverse effect on production agriculture. The continued energy impact may reach proportions equaling the Dust Bowl Era.

5 Conservation districts were instrumental in solving the Dust6 Bow crisis.

NACD is currently working on alternative energy programs
such as biomass, solar and wind power for farms and ranches.

Conservation districts in Alaska, Hawaii and the Pacific 9 10 Islands, surrounded by vast areas of oceans, are exploring the use of waves, tides and geothermal energy for farms and 11 ranches. Technology is available that utilizes ocean-going 12 buoys to capture and convert wave energy into a controlled 13 mechanical force to drive electrical generators. As compared to 14 conventional energy production, ocean-power technology is 15 16 less costly, easier to scale to accommodate changing needs, does not require valuable real estate and does not generate 17 noise or visual pollution or disturbances. 18

NACD shall seek support from Congress to provide incentives
 to and to receive funding for developing and refining
 alternative energy systems for farms in the United States.

Bordallo, the Secretary of the United States Department of Interior, 15 the Secretary of the United States Department of Agriculture, the 16 17 Secretary of the United States Department of Energy, and to Felix P. Camacho, I Maga'lahen Guahan. 18
