WHEREAS, this exhibit, brings together the ideas and examples of hundreds of people, organizations and movements dedicated to opening a path to lasting peace; and

WHEREAS, this exhibit was opened to the public on May 27, 2004, in the foyer of the United States House of Representatives' Rayburn House Office Building, Washington D.C., on Capitol Hill; and

WHEREAS, the M.K. Gandhi Institute of Nonviolence, the Martin Luther King Jr. International Chapel at Morehouse College and the Soka Gakkai International – USA (SGI-USA) organized a traveling exhibit entitled, "Gandhi, King, Ikeda: A Legacy of Building Peace", featuring Mohandas K. Gandhi, Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. and Daisaku Ikeda, as three peace makers from different cultures and continents that followed a common path of profound dedication in working to achieve global peace; and

WHEREAS, Gandhi, King and Ikeda each sought to build a legacy of peace with principles applicable to forging an existence filled with dignity, freedom and peace for all people; and

WHEREAS, this exhibition advocates some of the lessons taught by these three pioneers whereby we can begin to engage in dialogues that move us to action in relation to forging a destiny for others through mentorship; examining one's common beliefs in the innate dignity of humanity; translating noble principles into dynamic actions, exploring and applying nonviolence as a means to bring about positive change and using adversity to learn and grow: and

WHEREAS, the study of the lives of Gandhi, King and Ikeda has laid the foundation that enables and empowers people with the knowledge needed to set in motion organized activities in support of human rights campaigns, international earth summits, nuclear disarmament and sustainable peaceful development among our global communities; and

WHEREAS, we encourage our students, and our island community to revisit Dr. King's dream, to move forward and address global issues to eradicate the threats of nuclear war, terrorist attacks and indiscriminate violence; and

WHEREAS, we must reaffirm our commitment to address human rights issues, and take advantage of educational opportunities that impart knowledge for building a world without war and a firm resolve to bring about a fundamental peaceful solution; and

WHEREAS, we advocate the sharing of knowledge that empowers individuals to engage in participatory dialogues that focus on creative solutions for effective peaceful change against the struggles of social injustice, discrimination issues and violence; and

WHEREAS, such actions be centered around addressing the issues of poverty, crime, domestic and school violence, hunger, unsafe drinking water, environmental degradation and infectious diseases; and

WHEREAS, this exhibition serves to highlight the celebration of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. National Holiday and recognize the established common bonds existing between Gandhi and Ikeda's global peace legacy; and

1 **WHEREAS**, it further seeks to harness the imagination, dreams, energy, 2 spirit, and human drive of our island people to implement projects, activities 3 and programs throughout the year that addresses issues of poverty, homeless, 4 school and domestic violence, and social injustice in an effort to build road 5 maps to achieve global peace; and WHEREAS, we encourage each of you to take sufferings, social injustice 6 7 and discrimination issues as an opportunity to commit your works to 8 eradicating such ills in an effort to achieve dignity, inner strength, courage 9 and peace for both yourself; and 10 WHEREAS, the traveling exhibits of "Building a Culture of Peace for the Children of the World" and "Gandhi, King, Ikeda: A Legacy of Building 11 12 Peace" will be displayed on January 17 through 21, 2005, at the University of 13 Guam, R.
