Relative to recognizing every Friday as "I Ha'ånen I Antin Chamorro" or "Chamorro Spirit Day".

1 BE IT RESOLVED BY I MINA'BENTE OCHO NA LIHESLATURAN 2 GUÅHAN:

WHEREAS, the Honorable Felix P. Camacho, I Maga'låhen Guåhan and I
Mina'Bente Ocho Na Lihesturan Guåhan, working with the Åñon Fino' Chamorro
yan Kottura Executive Committee and the Department of Chamorro Affairs,
have by executive proclamation and legislative resolution, declared this year
"Åñon Fino' Chamorro yan Kottura - Inina Deskubre yan Setbisiu - The Year of the

Chamorro Language and Culture 2005 - Enlightenment, Discovery and
 Service"; and

WHEREAS, for years the government of Guam, the private sector,
countless thousands of school children, and other cultures have participated
in previous "*Chamorro* Week", and "*Chamorro* Month" events; and

6 WHEREAS, annually it is recognized that during these occasions the
7 *Chamorro* language, heritage, and culture be honored and celebrated; and

8 WHEREAS, the *Chamorro* people are blessed with a rich history 9 scientifically dating back approximately four thousand (4,000) years; and

WHEREAS, many aspects of the *Chamorro* culture are still being
discovered in historic documents, and the study of artifacts, ancient remains,
and villages; and

WHEREAS, a vestige of the ancient *Chamorro* language still exists today
despite hundreds of years of external influence from the Spanish, Americans,
and Japanese; and

16 WHEREAS, thousands of indigenous cultures around the world are 17 rapidly being affected by globalization through the aggressive evolution of 18 new information technologies; and

WHEREAS, I Mina'Bente Ocho Na Liheslaturan Guåhan also wishes to
 assist in the promotion, perpetuation, protection, and preservation of the
 Chamorro language, arts, heritage, and culture; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, that *I Mina'Bente Ocho Na Liheslaturan Guåhan* does hereby,
on behalf of the people of Guam, recognize every Friday as *"I Ha'ånen I Antin Chamorro"* or *"Chamorro Spirit Day"*; and be it further

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RESOLVED, that the Speaker of *I Mina'Bente Ocho Na Liheslaturan Guåhan* shall recognize every Friday as "I Ha'ånen I Antin Chamorro" or *"Chamorro* Spirit Day" and encourage all legislative employees and the 4 Members of *I Mina'Bente Ocho Na Liheslaturan Guåhan* and forthcoming *Liheslaturan Guåhan* to carry out the intent of this Resolution; and be it further

6 **RESOLVED**, that I Mina'Bente Ocho Na Liheslaturan Guåhan during this 7 day, encourages I Maga'låhen Guåhan, the government of Guam, the private 8 sector, and private and public school students to speak to or greet others 9 using the Chamorro language, visit institutions that promote the Chamorro 10 culture, recite the *Inifresi*, sing the Guam Hymn, play *Chamorro* music, cook or 11 eat *Chamorro* cuisine, purchase *Chamorro* goods and products, prominently 12 display the Guam flag, and to wear or display items representing the 13 Chamorro culture. These items include the sinahi or new moon pendant or Spondylus shell. The *sinahi* pendant is made from *hima* or the giant clamshell 14 15 and is now being replicated by contemporary Chamorro artists. The sinahi 16 pendant was worn by ancient Chamorro men who were Maga'låhi or leaders 17 who were of the noble caste known as the Matao. To many, the pendant 18 symbolizes the new moon or the main hull of the *galaide* or outrigger canoe. 19 Maga'Håga or women leaders of the Matao caste valued the orange colored 20 Spondylus shell and traded it or wore it as jewelry. Some believe the color 21 signifies Guam's ancestral connection to Asia. The rarity of the shell, the condition of the shell, how the shell was obtained, and the amount of the 22 23 shells gathered all add to the worth of the shell or shells. People are 24 encouraged to wear the color orange in recognition of the Spondylus shell and

its link to our forefathers. People are also encouraged to wear the colors
 white, black, and red, colors which were used to paint the ancient *galaide* or
 sakman or ocean sailing outrigger canoe; and be it further

RESOLVED, that *I Mina'Bente Ocho Na Liheslaturan Guåhan* recognizes that there are hundreds of other ways to appropriately show pride in the *Chamorro* culture and all cannot be listed but it is our hope that the island accepts every Friday as a day to promote and honor the *Chamorro* culture. It is through this weekly recognition and celebration that we hope the *Chamorro* spirit will permeate the other days of the calendar and continue through the years to come; and be it further

11 **RESOLVED**, that the Speaker certify, and the Secretary of the 12 Legislature attest to, the adoption hereof, and that copies of the same be thereafter transmitted to the Guam Chamber of Commerce; to the Guam 13 Hotel and Restaurant Association; to the Guam Visitors Bureau; to the Añon 14 15 Fino' Chamorro yan Kottura Executive Committee; to the Division of Chamorro 16 Studies and Special Projects within the Department of Education; to the 17 Department of Chamorro Affairs; to the University of Guam's Center of Excellence for *Chamorro* Language and Culture; to the Guam Education Policy 18 Board; to the Superintendent of Education; and to the Honorable Felix P. 19 20 Camacho, I Maga'låhen Guåhan.
