Relative to congratulating the incoming 2008 - 2009 command of the Father Dueñas Memorial School Naval Junior Reserve Officers Training Corps (NJROTC) Phoenix Company and to expressing *Un Dangkolo Na Si Yu'os Ma'ase'* and recognizing the outstanding accomplishments and service rendered our island community by the 2007 - 2008 outgoing command.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE OF I MINA'BENTE NUEBI NA LIHESLATURAN GUÅHAN:

3 WHEREAS, the Naval Junior Reserve Officers Training Corps unit at

4 Father Dueñas Memorial High School was formed in late August 1973 and

was officially commissioned by the Honorable John Chafee, Secretary of the

6 Navy, on 7 December of that year; and

WHEREAS, the unit was duly inaugurated by the late governor of

Guam, the Honorable Carlos G. Camacho and RADM. George Morrison,

USN, Commander of the United States Naval Forces in the Marianas; and

10 WHEREAS, the core values of the NJROTC program are Honor -

compel the cadets accountable for their personal behavior and to be mindful

of the privilege bestowed the cadet to serve his fellow NJROTC cadets and

classmates. Courage - the value that gives cadets the moral and mental

1 strength to do what is right, with confidence and resolution, even in the face

2 of temptation or personal adversity, and Commitment - the day to day duty

of every man and woman in the NJROTC program to join together as a team

to improve the quality of its unit, fellow cadets and classmates, and

5 themselves; and

WHEREAS, the purpose of the Junior Reserve Officers Training Corps is "to instill in students in United States secondary educational institutions the values of citizenship, service to the United States, and personal responsibility and a sense of accomplishment."

WHEREAS, additional objectives for each cadet include developing good citizenship and patriotism, developing self-reliance, leadership, and responsiveness to constituted authority, improving the ability to communicate well both orally and in writing, developing an appreciation of the importance of physical fitness, increasing a respect for the role of the United States Armed Forces in support of national objectives, and developing knowledge of basic military skills; and

WHEREAS, the NJROTC program was established by Public Law in 1964 and may be found in Title 10, U.S. Code, Chapter 102. The program is conducted at accredited secondary schools throughout the nation, by instructors who are retired Navy, Marine Corps, and Coast Guard officers and enlisted personnel. The NJROTC curriculum emphasizes citizenship and leadership development, as well as our maritime heritage, the significance of

sea power, and naval topics such as the fundamentals of naval operations, seamanship, navigation and meteorology; and

WHEREAS, classroom instruction is augmented throughout the year by community service activities, drill competition, field meets, visits to naval activities, marksmanship training, and other military training. Uniforms, textbooks, training aids, travel allowance, and a substantial portion of instructors' salaries are provided by the Navy; and

WHEREAS, the program constructed includes three (3) academic classroom sessions and two (2) activity periods per week -- Naval Science 1 introduces students to the meaning of citizenship, the elements of leadership, and the value of scholarship in attaining life goals; engender a sound appreciation for the heritage and traditions of America, with recognition that the historically significant role of sea power will be important in America's future; develop in each cadet a growing sense of pride in his/her organization, associates, and self pursued at the fundamental level; and

WHEREAS, the course includes introduction to the NJROTC program; Introduction to Leadership, Naval Ships; Mission and Organization, The Nation, Navy and the People in American Democracy, Maritime Geography, Sea power and Challenge, Naval History through 1815, Introduction to Navigation and Time, Basic Seamanship, Oceanography, Health Education, First Aid, and Drugs, Alcohol and Tobacco Abuse Prevention; and WHEREAS, Naval Science 2 builds on the general introduction provided in Naval Science 1, to further develop the traits of citizenship and leadership in cadets, introduce cadets to technical areas of naval science, and

1 engender a deeper awareness of the vital importance of the world oceans to

2 the continued well-being of the United States. The course provides ongoing

3 instruction in leadership theory, Naval Orientation and Career Planning,

4 Citizenship in the U.S. and Other Countries, Naval History: 1815 through

5 1930, Naval Ships and Shipboard Evolutions, Naval Weapons: Gunnery,

6 Guided Missiles and Mines, Navigation Fundamentals and Rules of the Road,

Small Boat Seamanship, Meteorology and Weather, and Survival Training and

8 Orienteering; and

WHEREAS, Naval Science 3 broadens the understanding of students in the operative principles of military leadership, the concept and significance of teamwork, the intrinsic value of good order and discipline in the accomplishment of objectives, the fundamentals of American democracy, and to expand their understanding of naval academic subjects. The course provides ongoing instruction in leadership and discipline, Military Justice, Astronomy, International Law and the Sea, National Strategy, Sea Power and Naval Operations, Naval History: 1930 through the Nuclear Age, Naval Intelligence and National Security, Maneuvering Board, Challenges of Future Navy Research, and Electricity and Naval Electronics; and

WHEREAS, Naval Science 4 focuses solely on practical leadership. The intent is to assist the senior in understanding leadership and improving their leadership skills by putting them in positions of leadership, under supervision, then helping them analyze the reasons for their varying degrees of success through the year. Classroom activities include seminars, reading

assignments, classroom presentations, and practical work with younger cadets. The course curriculum includes instruction in theoretical and applied aspects of leadership, training, and evaluation of performance. Students will become aware of the techniques used to create motivation, develop goals and activities for a work group, and the proper ways to set a leadership example. Cadets will also apply these principles when dealing with younger cadets in the areas of military drill and inspections, athletic events, and in other school activities; and WHEREAS, NJROTC cadets also participated in a number of

WHEREAS, NJROTC cadets also participated in a number of community service activities throughout the 2007 school year – the Academy of Our Lady of Guam Baccalaureate Mass and Graduation ceremony, the American Cancer Society Relay for Life, the government of Guam Bureau of Statistics and Plans International Coastal Beach Clean-up, the Sinajana Village Clean-up, Chief Brodie Memorial School Day activities, and the annual Veterans Day Ceremony; and

WHEREAS, the cadets' community service in 2008 encompassed the Catholic Schools Week Celebrations at Santa Barbara, Bishop Baumgartner, San Vicente, St. Anthony, Dominican, and St. Francis, the Santa Barbara Catholic School National Junior Honor Society Induction Ceremony, Guam Hotel and Restaurant Association's (GHRA) annual trash clean-up, and the Guam Special Olympics. Other community events the cadets illustrated their presence consist of the *Santa Marian Kamalen* procession and the Guam Chamber of Commerce Annual Christmas Parade; and

1 WHEREAS, the unit's Color Guard Rifle Team - C/ENS RJ Limjap, 2 C/CPO Dylan Taitano, C/CPO Ric Catalasan, commanded by C/ENS Joseph 3 L.G. Villagomez won First (1st)Place at the March 2007 Guam Army Field Meet held at Simon Sanchez High School. The same team consisting of C/LT 4 RJ Limjap, C/ENS Dylan Taitano, C/ENS Ric Catalasan and commanded by 5 6 C/LCDR Joseph L.G. Villagomez again competed in the Guam Army Field 7 Meet, Color Guard Rifle Team competition held at George Washington High 8 School in 2008 and garnered First (1st) Place. Moreover, the company 9 organized its first-ever Parent Orientation held at the NJROTC building on 10 Father Dueñas Memorial School campus in September 2007. An overview of 11 the NJROTC program was introduced to the parents and they were provided 12 a tour of the facility; and 13 WHEREAS, the NJROTC cadets demonstrated their school support 14 during scheduled Friar Pride Days in August, September, October, and 15 November 2007. Furthermore, the NJROTC cadets provided Baccalaureate 16 Mass traffic and parking lot control, distinguished guests escorts and parking 17 lot watch during the school's 2007 graduation ceremony. Additionally, the 18 unit escorted distinguished guests at the 2007 parent orientation, during the 19 archbishop's visits in September 2007 and February 2008, and the Catholic 20 Schools superintendent's visits in 2007 and 2008. Also, the cadets provided 21 color guard performances at numerous events including home games for 22 football and basketball, and the Father Dueñas Memorial School Song Fest 23 Celebration held on March 15, 2008; and

1 **WHEREAS**, the Phoenix Company's physical fitness teams won three (3) First (1st) place and a Fifth (5th) place trophy for the current 2007-2008 2 3 school year. Most notable are the **Academic Postal Competitions** held at the Father Dueñas Memorial School campus in the Naval Service Training 4 5 Command Academic Exam, the Joseph C. Gilliam Academic Competition, the Fleet Reserve Association Branch 126 Academic Postal, the Brunswick High 6 School Academic Postal Pisgah NJROTC Academic Test, and the 2007 7 Rehobeth Armed Services Vocational Aptitude Battery Challenge; and 8 WHEREAS, the teams further participated in Air Rifle Postal 9 10 Competitions at the Baldwin High School Braves Fall Sporter Shootout, the Ninth (9th) Baker High School Swamp Shoot Invitational, the Brunswick High 11 12 School Pirate Classical Rifle Postal, and the Secretary of the Navy Air Rifle 13 Competition held at Father Dueñas Memorial School campus; the NJROTC 14 unit also hosted the Phoenix Company Physical Readiness Test at the George 15 Washington High School football field in which the unit took First (1st) place 16 in the male division; and 17 WHEREAS, the present Father Dueñas Memorial School Naval Junior 18 Reserve Officers Training Corps total eighty-seven (87) whose unit **Chain of** 19 Command consist of Senior Naval Science Instructor CDR Olen Crowe, USN 20 (ret.), Naval Science Instructor CMDCM(SW) Valentino H.
