

I MINA'BENTE NUEBI NA LIHESLATURAN GUÅHAN 2008 (SECOND) REGULAR SESSION

Relative to expressing the support of I Mina'Bente Nuebi Na Liheslaturan Guåhan for the Agent Orange Equity Act introduced by the Honorable Congressman Bob Filner (D-CA) in United States House of Representatives on July 23, 2008, clarifying the qualifications necessary for those with illnesses contracted due exposure to qualify for additional veterans benefits by mandating the inclusion of those members of the armed forces exposed while not explicitly on land, and to respectfully request that Guam and other areas in the theater of operations for the Vietnam War in which Agent Orange was stored and transshipped should be added to the list of areas in which military and civilian employees who were exposed to Agent Orange may qualify for additional benefits.

BE IT RESOLVED BY I MINA'BENTE NUEBI NA LIHESLATURAN

GUAHAN:

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- 3 WHEREAS, since the United States government began allowing the
- 4 people of Guam to become members of the United States armed forces, a
- 5 tradition of service has grown among the young adults of our island, and
- 6 many Guamanians have distinguished themselves by serving their
- 7 country, island and people with great distinction; and
- 8 WHEREAS, the people of Guam strongly support all of the many
- 9 veterans of American wars, and our island has the singular distinction of

- 1 having suffered more casualties on a per capita basis than any other
- 2 territory, state or insular area of the United States in both the Korean
- 3 conflict and the Vietnam War; and
- WHEREAS, it has been confirmed by the Agent Orange Act of 1991,
- 5 Public Law 102-4, that there exists a correlation between certain herbicide
- 6 agents containing dioxin or 2,4-dichlorophenoxyacetic acid, such as Agent
- 7 Orange, and diseases later contracted by veterans of the Vietnam War; and
- 8 WHEREAS, the Agent Orange Act of 1991 defines the scope of
- 9 eligibility for compensation to include all of those who were in active
- military, naval or air service in the Republic of Vietnam during the use of
- 11 the herbicide Agent Orange; and
- 12 WHEREAS, current United States Veterans' Administration (VA)
- procedures require Vietnam veterans to prove they have placed a foot on
- 14 land during the Vietnam War to qualify as victims of Agent Orange
- 15 exposure; and
- 16 WHEREAS, such VA procedures have resulted in an unjustified
- 17 withholding of benefits for "blue-water" veterans who served at sea off the
- coast of Vietnam and airmen who served in the skies above the Republic of
- 19 Vietnam; and
- 20 WHEREAS, the VA procedures have also resulted in an unjustified
- 21 withholding of benefits for military and civilian workers in staging areas

- 1 for the Vietnam War such as Guam through which military personnel,
- 2 equipment, munitions and supplies, including herbicides containing Agent
- 3 Orange were shipped; and
- 4 WHEREAS, both military and civilian personnel handled
- 5 transshipment of these goods and although the Department of Defense has
- 6 never officially admitted to storing and using Agent Orange and other
- 7 herbicides on Guam, a Dow Chemical Corporation's report has disclosed a
- 8 huge amount of dioxin contamination at Andersen Air Force Base (AAFB)
- 9 in Guam; and
- WHEREAS, in the August 9, 2007 issue of the Marianas Variety it 10 was reported that "At least two successful applications for benefit claims 11 filed by veterans deployed to Guam constituted the VA's virtual 12 13 acknowledgement of the use of defoliants on island. In March (of 2007), the 14 VA approved the benefits claim filed by Robert L. Burgett, a Vietnam War veteran who developed cancer of the larynx, eventually causing his speech 15 disability, as a result of his direct exposure to Agent Orange when he was 16 17 stationed at AAFB between 1968 and 1969. He received a full grant of benefits;" and 18
- WHEREAS, The Marianas Variety report went on to state that "In 20 2005, the U.S. Court of Appeals for Veterans ruled in favor of an 21 unidentified airman who was determined to have developed diabetes

mellitus as a result of his exposure to defoliants while he was deployed on

2 duty at AAFB from December 1966 to October 1968;" and

therefore, be it

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WHEREAS, the proposed Agent Orange Equity Act will correct 3 injustice, clarify eligibility and expedite the processing of veteran claims of 4 health conditions caused by Agent Orange exposure for certain veterans by 5 mandating the inclusion of those members of the armed forces who were 6 deployed in the Republic of Vietnam war zone who should be entitled to 7 8 compensation for such developed diseases as can be linked to Agent Orange exposure and receive the benefits to which they are entitled; and 9 WHEREAS, the proposed Agent Orange Equity Act should also 10 correct injustice, clarify eligibility and expedite the processing of claims of 11 health conditions caused by Agent Orange exposure in areas in which 12 direct exposure was proven to have taken place, such as Guam; now, 13

RESOLVED, that *I Mina'Bente Nuebi Na Liheslaturan Guahan,* does hereby, on behalf of the people of Guam, expresses its strong support for resolving the numerous health care needs of the many veterans of American military service who live in Guam; and be it further

RESOLVED, that I Mina'Bente Nuebi Na Liheslaturan Guahan, does hereby, on behalf of the people of Guam, expresses support of the Agent Orange Equity Act introduced by the Honorable Congressman Bob Filner

in United States House of Representatives on July 23, 2008 that seeks to

2 correct injustice, clarify the eligibility of affected veterans, and expedite the

processing of veteran claims of health conditions caused by Agent Orange

exposure; and be it further

RESOLVED, that *I Mina'Bente Nuebi Na Liheslaturan Guahan*, does hereby, on behalf of the people of Guam, respectfully requests that the Congress of the United States correct injustice and amend the Agent Orange Equity Act to include Vietnam War staging areas such as Guam, for which evidence exists that Agent Orange exposure has taken place; and be it further

RESOLVED, that the Speaker and the Chairperson of the Executive Committee certify, and the Secretary of the Legislature attest to, the adoption hereof, and that copies of the same be thereafter transmitted to Fred Gofigan, Administrator of the Guam Office of Veterans Affairs; to the Guam Veterans Commission; to the Secretary of the Department of the Interior Dirk Kempthorne; to the Secretary of the Department of Veterans Affairs James B. Peake; to Acting Deputy Assistant Secretary for Insular Affairs Doug W. Domenech; to the Honorable Judith T. Won Pat, Speaker, *I Mina'Bente Nuebi Na Liheslaturan Guåhan*; to the Honorable Madeleine Z. Bordallo, Guam Delegate to Congress; to the Honorable Congressman Bob Filner, Chairman of the House Committee on Veteran's Affairs; to the
