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Relative to Honoring Ana Acfalle Gogue on the celebration of her 101st Birthday.

BE IT RESOLVED BY I LIHESLATURAN GUÅHAN:

WHEREAS, the limits and well being of our people are not in its land or its location, but in how those who live and work here live their lives; and

WHEREAS, Tan Ana Acfalle Gogue of Malesso, born to Victorina Acfalle and

Antonio C. Acfalle, on April 20, 1906, celebrated her 101st Birthday. At the age of 25,

Tan Ana married Jose E. Champaco and together they have two daughters, Beatrice

7 and Dolores; and

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WHEREAS, Tan Ana is a member of the Christian Mothers and continues to remain devoted to her Catholic faith. In her younger days, Tan Ana was a Techa

1 (prayer leader). She has inspired many people in this role, and when called upon, was

2 always happy to help with the leading of prayers; and

WHEREAS, on July 16, 1944, her husband Jose was one of 30 men massacred by Japanese occupying forces during World War II. Eleven years later, *Tan* Ana married Geronimo Gogue; and

WHEREAS, *Tan* Ana has instilled many family values into her children. Their greatest memory is of *Tan* Ana always having food on the table. She would cook the tastiest dishes from her harvests of the sea and land. She would constantly make her way into the jungle in the back of her home and come out with a sack of goodies, including taro, tapioca, yams and even *tangantångan* for firewood. *Tan* Ana often gathered her grandchildren to go clamming to make her famous *kadon ta'pon* (clam soup). She is also known for making *titiyas fa'dang* (torillas made from the Federico Palm nut); and

WHEREAS, in 1992, *Tan* Ana won the first place prize for the longest *dågu* (yam) measuring six feet in length at the senior citizen fair in Malesso. During that same year, *Tan* Ana suffered a stroke following Typhoon Omar. Her family suspects that the stress caused by damage to her home of thirty six years from the typhoon triggered the stroke. However, through prayer and luck, *Tan* Ana's house was rebuilt and she was nursed back to health the following year; and

WHEREAS, Tan Ana has appeared in several publications on Chamorro culture. She is sometimes found in Chamorro books teaching the younger generations about Chamorro dishes like *konsetba* (candied papaya), *buñelos dågu* (yam donuts), sweet bread rolls, and *apigigi* (young coconut meat, fresh coconut milk, and tapioca wrapped and cooked in a banana leaf). Her unselfishness in teaching the younger children has not gone unnoticed in the community; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, that *I Mina'Bente Nuebi na Liheslaturan Guåhan*, on behalf of the people of Guam, hereby expresses its best wishes to *Tan* Ana Acfalle on the

- 2 sky so blue; A long hard climb; A bit of fatigue; But oh . . . what a wonderful view!";
