Relative to requesting the United States Congress to properly reimburse the government of Guam its actual costs for services provided as a result of the Compact of Free Association Act.

BE IT RESOLVED BY I MINA'BENTE NUEBI NA LIHESLATURAN GUÅHAN:

WHEREAS, the Compact of Free Association Act implemented in 1986
and amended in 1994, established the relationship between the United States

and the Federated States of Micronesia (FSM), the Republic of the Marshall
 Islands (RMI), and the Republic of Belau; and

3 WHEREAS, Compact immigration provisions authorized unrestricted 4 immigration into the United States, its territories and possessions, enabling 5 citizens of these nations to enter into, and to lawfully engage in occupations 6 and establish residence as non-immigrant aliens; and

7 WHEREAS, in recognition of the adverse impact to Guam's economy of 8 providing health care, Congress promised to appropriate sums to cover costs 9 incurred by the government of Guam resulting from any increased demands 10 placed on health, education, and welfare services by immigrants from the 11 Federated States of Micronesia, the Republic of the Marshall Islands, and the 12 Republic of Belau (collectively known as the Freely Associated States, or FAS); 13 and

WHEREAS, Guam's Compact Impact Reconciliation Report, attested by 14 15 an independent accounting firm, was submitted to the Department of the Interior on April 13, 2004. The un-reimbursed Compact Impact cost for the 16 17 period FY 1987 to FY 2003 totaled Two Hundred Sixty-nine Million Dollars 18 (\$269,000,000). The un-reimbursed costs include One Hundred Seventy-eight 19 Million Dollars (\$178,000,000) for education, Forty-eight Million Dollars 20 (\$48,000,000) for health, welfare, and labor, and Forty-three Million Dollars (\$43,000,000) for public safety. The accounting firm also examined the 21 amount of assistance provided to citizens of the Freely Associated States by 22 Guam for the period FY 2004 through FY 2007, and provided an update to the 23 Compact Impact Reconciliation Report; and 24

WHEREAS, the government of Guam found that the current locally
funded cost incurred for providing educational and social services to citizens
of the Freely Associated States was \$23.95 Million Dollars in FY 2004, \$29.35
Million Dollars in FY 2005, \$38.15 Million Dollars in FY 2006, and \$40.42
Million Dollars in FY 2007, for a total of \$131.87 Million Dollars for these fiscal
years; and

7 WHEREAS, the governments of Guam, Hawaii, and the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands have identified significant 8 9 Compact migration impact. These island areas have estimated costs to local 10 governments of at least Three Hundred Seventy-one Million Dollars (\$371,000,000) for 1986 through 2000 that are associated with services 11 12 provided to migrants from the FSM, the RMI, and Belau. All three (3) areas 13 have reported that costs have been concentrated in the areas of health and education, though other costs have also been identified; and 14

WHEREAS, the health care systems of the Federated States of Micronesia, the Republic of the Marshall Islands and the Republic of Belau are viewed by the U.S. and island area governments as inadequate to meet the needs of the population, providing incentive to travel *or* move to the United States in order to receive appropriate health care; and

WHEREAS, the migration has clearly had a significant impact on Guam and has required government services in key areas. Compact migrants have required local expenditures in areas such as health and education and, further, have particularly affected the budgetary resources of the government of Guam; and WHEREAS, because the Compact allows these citizens who have
 limited financial means and ability to pay for health care to enter the United
 States with few restrictions, U.S. island areas are absorbing much of the health
 care costs of this population; and

5 WHEREAS, as the *sole* governmental, non-profit institution for 6 healthcare, the Guam Memorial Hospital cannot deny care and services for 7 reasons of residence *or* the ability to pay. Prior to the Compacts, citizens of 8 what are now the Freely Associated States (FAS) were Trust Territory of the 9 Pacific Islands (TTPI) citizens, and as such, received medical care from 10 Department of Defense at the Naval Regional Medical Center; and

11 WHEREAS, to improve the service and the ability to provide adequate 12 healthcare in our hospital, there must be a recognition and proper 13 reimbursement for the costs incurred as a result of the Compact migration; 14 now, therefore, be it

15 **RESOLVED,** that *I Mina'Bente Nuebi Na Liheslaturan Guåhan* does 16 hereby, on behalf of the people of Guam, express its unequivocal concern that 17 the government of Guam requests for appropriate reimbursement for services 18 provided to Compact citizens have been continuous and annual challenge for 19 the last ten (10) years; and be it further

RESOLVED, that *I Mina'Bente Nuebi Na Liheslaturan Guåhan* does hereby, on behalf of the people of Guam, petition the President of the United States, the Honorable George W. Bush; Dirk Kempthorne, Secretary of the Interior; the Chairman and Members of the Interagency Group on Insular Areas; the Chairman and Members of the Senate Appropriations Committee;

the Chairman and Members of the Senate Committee on Energy and Natural 1 2 Resources; the Chairman and Members of the House Appropriations 3 Committee; the Chairman and Members of the House Subcommittee on Insular Affairs and Guam's Delegate to the United States Congress to support 4 5 the findings and recommendations made by I Mina'Bente Nuebi Na 6 Liheslaturan Guåhan that the government of Guam be reimbursed the amount 7 of Four Hundred Million Dollars (\$400,000,000) for costs directly related to and associated with services provided as a result of the Compact of Free 8 9 Association; and be it further

10 **RESOLVED,** that *if* for any reason a timely and immediate 11 reimbursement is not achievable, the people of Guam demand an explanation 12 and suggested course of action the government of Guam can implement to 13 reduce future Compact Impact costs; and be it further

14 **RESOLVED**, that the Speaker certify, and the Secretary of the Legislature attest to, the adoption hereof, and that copies of the same be 15 16 thereafter transmitted to Dirk Kempthorne, Secretary of the Interior; to the 17 Chairman and Members of the Interagency Group on Insular Areas; to the 18 Chairman and Members of the Senate Appropriations Committee; to the 19 Chairman and Members of the Senate Committee on Energy and Natural Resources; to the Chairman and Members of the House Appropriations 20 21 Committee; to the Chairman and Members of the House Subcommittee on 22 Insular Affairs; to the Honorable George W. Bush, President of the United 23 States of America; to the Honorable John McCain, United States Senator; to the Honorable Barack Obama, United States Senator; to the Honorable Hillary 24

- 1 Clinton, United States Senator; to the Honorable Madeleine Z. Bordallo,
- 2 Guam's Congressional Delegate, U. S. House of Representatives; and to the
- 3 Honorable Felix P. Camacho, I Maga'lahen Guåhan.
