Relative to congratulating the incoming 2008 to 2009 command of the Father Dueñas Memorial School Naval Junior Reserve Officers Training Corps (NJROTC) Phoenix Company and to expressing *Un Dångkolo Na Si Yu'os Ma'åse'* and recognizing the outstanding accomplishments and service rendered to our island community by the 2007 to 2008 outgoing command.

BE IT RESOLVED BY I MINA'BENTE NUEBI NA LIHESLATURAN GUÅHAN:

3 WHEREAS, the Naval Junior Reserve Officers Training Corps 4 (NJROTC) unit at Father Dueñas Memorial School was formed in late August 1 1973 and was officially commissioned by the Honorable John Chafee,
 2 Secretary of the Navy, on 7 December of that year; and

WHEREAS, the unit was duly inaugurated by the late Governor of
Guam, the Honorable Carlos G. Camacho and RADM. George Morrison,
USN, Commander of the United States Naval Forces in the Marianas; and

WHEREAS, the core values of the NJROTC Program are Honor -6 compel the cadets accountable for their personal behavior and to be mindful 7 of the privilege bestowed the cadet to serve his fellow NJROTC cadets and 8 9 classmates; Courage - the value that gives cadets the moral and mental strength to do what is right, with confidence and resolution, even in the face 10 11 of temptation or personal adversity; and **Commitment** - the day to day duty 12 of every man and woman in the NJROTC program to join together as a team to improve the quality of its unit, fellow cadets and classmates, and 13 14 themselves; and

15 WHEREAS, the purpose of the Junior Reserve Officers Training Corps is 16 "to instill in students in United States secondary educational institutions the 17 values of citizenship, service to the United States, and personal responsibility 18 and a sense of accomplishment"; and

WHEREAS, additional objectives for each cadet include developing good citizenship and patriotism, developing self-reliance, leadership, and responsiveness to constituted authority, improving the ability to communicate well both orally and in writing, developing an appreciation of the importance of physical fitness, increasing a respect for the role of the United States Armed Forces in support of national objectives, and developing knowledge of basic
 military skills; and

3 WHEREAS, the NJROTC program was established by Public Law in 4 1964 and may be found in Title 10, U.S. Code, Chapter 102. The program is 5 conducted at accredited secondary schools throughout the nation, by instructors who are retired Navy, Marine Corps, and Coast Guard officers and 6 7 enlisted personnel. The NJROTC curriculum emphasizes citizenship and leadership development, as well as our maritime heritage, the significance of 8 9 sea power, and naval topics such as the fundamentals of naval operations, seamanship, navigation and meteorology; and 10

11 WHEREAS, classroom instruction is augmented throughout the year by 12 community service activities, drill competition, field meets, visits to naval 13 activities, marksmanship training, and other military training. Uniforms, 14 textbooks, training aids, travel allowance, and a substantial portion of 15 instructors' salaries are provided by the Navy; and

WHEREAS, the program constructed includes three (3) academic 16 classroom sessions and two (2) activity periods per week - Naval Science 1 17 introduces students to the meaning of citizenship, the elements of leadership, 18 and the value of scholarship in attaining life goals; engender a sound 19 appreciation for the heritage and traditions of America, with recognition that 20 21 the historically significant role of sea power will be important in America's 22 future; develop in each cadet a growing sense of pride in his/her 23 organization, associates, and self which are elements fundamental level; and

1 **WHEREAS**, the course includes, introduction to the NIROTC program; Introduction to Leadership; Naval Ships; Mission and Organization; The 2 Nation, Navy and the People in American Democracy; Maritime Geography; 3 4 Sea Power and Challenge; Naval History through 1815; Introduction to Navigation and Time; Basic Seamanship; Oceanography; Health Education; 5 First Aid; and Drugs, Alcohol and Tobacco Abuse Prevention; and 6 7 WHEREAS, Naval Science 2 builds on the general introduction 8 provided in Naval Science 1, to further develop the traits of citizenship and 9 leadership in cadets, introduce cadets to technical areas of naval science, and engender a deeper awareness of the vital importance of the world oceans to 10 11 the continued well-being of the United States. The course provides ongoing 12 instruction in leadership theory, Naval Orientation and Career Planning, 13 Citizenship in the U.S. and Other Countries, Naval History: 1815 through 1930, Naval Ships and Shipboard Evolutions, Naval Weapons: Gunnery, 14 Guided Missiles and Mines, Navigation Fundamentals and Rules of the Road, 15 Small Boat Seamanship, Meteorology and Weather, and Survival Training and 16 17 Orienteering; and

18 WHEREAS, Naval Science 3 broadens the understanding of students in 19 the operative principles of military leadership, the concept and significance of 20 teamwork, the intrinsic value of good order and discipline in the 21 accomplishment of objectives, the fundamentals of American democracy, and 22 naval academic subjects. The course provides ongoing instruction in 23 leadership and discipline, Military Justice, Astronomy, International Law and the Sea, National Strategy, Sea Power and Naval Operations, Naval History:
 1930 through the Nuclear Age, Naval Intelligence and National Security,
 Maneuvering Board, Challenges of Future Navy Research, and Electricity and
 Naval Electronics; and

WHEREAS, Naval Science 4 focuses solely on practical leadership. The 5 intent is to assist the senior in understanding leadership and improving their 6 leadership skills by putting them in positions of leadership, under 7 8 supervision, then helping them analyze the reasons for their varying degrees 9 of success through the year. Classroom activities include seminars, reading 10 assignments, classroom presentations, and practical work with younger 11 cadets. The course curriculum includes instruction in theoretical and applied 12 aspects of leadership, training, and evaluation of performance. Students will 13 become aware of the techniques used to create motivation, develop goals and activities for a work group, and the proper ways to set a leadership example. 14 15 Cadets will also apply these principles when dealing with younger cadets in 16 the areas of military drill and inspections, athletic events, and in other school 17 activities; and

18 WHEREAS, NJROTC cadets also participated in a number of 19 community service activities throughout the 2007 school year, including the 20 Academy of Our Lady of Guam Baccalaureate Mass and Graduation 21 ceremony, the American Cancer Society Relay for Life, the government of 22 Guam Bureau of Statistics and Plans International Coastal Beach Clean-up, the 23 Sinajana Village Clean-up, Chief Brodie Memorial School Day activities, and 24 the annual Veterans Day Ceremony; and

WHEREAS, the cadets' community service in 2008 encompassed the 1 2 Catholic Schools Week Celebrations at Santa Barbara, Bishop Baumgartner, 3 San Vicente, St. Anthony, Dominican, and St. Francis, the Santa Barbara Catholic School National Junior Honor Society Induction Ceremony, Guam 4 5 Hotel and Restaurant Association's (GHRA) annual trash clean-up, and the 6 Guam Special Olympics. Other community events at which the cadets illustrated their presence consist of the Santa Marian Kamalen procession and 7 8 the Guam Chamber of Commerce Annual Christmas Parade; and

9 WHEREAS, the unit's Color Guard Rifle Team – C/ENS RJ Limjap, C/CPO Dylan Taitano, C/CPO Ric Catalasan, commanded by C/ENS Joseph 10 L.G. Villagomez - won First (1st) Place at the March 2007 Guam Army Field 11 12 Meet held at Simon Sanchez High School. The same team consisting of C/LT RJ Limjap, C/ENS Dylan Taitano, C/ENS Ric Catalasan and commanded by 13 14 C/LCDR Joseph L.G. Villagomez again competed in the Guam Army Field Meet, Color Guard Rifle Team competition held at George Washington High 15 16 School in 2008 and garnered First (1^{st}) Place. Moreover, the company organized its first-ever Parent Orientation held at the NJROTC building on 17 18 Father Dueñas Memorial School campus in September 2007. An overview of the NJROTC program was introduced to the parents and they were provided 19 20 a tour of the facility; and

21 WHEREAS, the NJROTC cadets demonstrated their school support 22 during scheduled Friar Pride Days in August, September, October, and 23 November 2007. Furthermore, the NJROTC cadets provided Baccalaureate 24 Mass traffic and parking lot control, distinguished guests escorts, and parking 1 lot watch during the school's 2007 graduation ceremony. Additionally, the 2 unit escorted distinguished guests at the 2007 parent orientation, during the 3 archbishop's visits in September 2007 and February 2008, and the Catholic 4 Schools superintendent's visits in 2007 and 2008. Also, the cadets provided 5 color guard performances at numerous events including home games for 6 football and basketball, and the Father Dueñas Memorial School Song Fest 7 Celebration held on March 15, 2008; and

8 WHEREAS, the Phoenix Company's physical fitness teams won three 9 (3) First (1st) place and a Fifth (5th) place trophy for the current 2007 to 2008 10 school year. Most notable are the Academic Postal Competitions held at the 11 Father Dueñas Memorial School campus in the Naval Service Training 12 Command Academic Exam, the Joseph C. Gilliam Academic Competition, the 13 Fleet Reserve Association Branch 126 Academic Postal, the Brunswick High School Academic Postal Pisgah NJROTC Academic Test, and the 2007 14 15 Rehobeth Armed Services Vocational Aptitude Battery Challenge; and

16 WHEREAS, the teams further participated in Air Rifle Postal 17 Competitions at the Baldwin High School Braves Fall Sporter Shootout, the Ninth (9th) Baker High School Swamp Shoot Invitational, the Brunswick High 18 19 School Pirate Classical Rifle Postal, and the Secretary of the Navy Air Rifle 20 Competition held at Father Dueñas Memorial School campus; the NJROTC unit also hosted the Phoenix Company Physical Readiness Test at the George 21 22 Washington High School football field in which the unit took First (1st) place 23 in the male division; and

1 WHEREAS, the present Father Dueñas Memorial School Naval Junior 2 Reserve Officers Training Corps total eighty-seven (87) whose unit Chain of Command consists of Senior Naval Science Instructor CDR Olen Crowe, USN 3 (ret.), Naval Science Instructor CMDCM(SW) Valentino H. Separa, USN (ret.), 4 5 Commanding Officer C/LCDR Joseph L.G. Villagomez, Executive Officer C/LT RJ Limjap, Operations C/LTJG Joseph deJesus, Administration C/LTJG 6 7 Anacleto Duplito, Supply C/CPO Fredrick Varias, Honor Guard C/LTJG Carl 8 Mui, Color Guard C/ENS Dylan Taitano, Armed Drill Team C/LTJG 9 Gabrielle Camacho, Unarmed Drill Team C/LTJG David Mercado, 1st Platoon C/ENS Franklin Fegurgur, 2nd Platoon C/ENS Ric Catalasan, Academic Team 10 C/ENS Nathaniel Enriquez, Public Affairs C/ENS Daryl Dayrit, Rifle Team 11 12 C/ENS Lemal Tewid, Ordnance C/ENS Cyle Tass, and Chief Master at Arms C/SCPO Steven Rodrin; now, therefore, be it 13
