Relative to supporting H. Res. 121 introduced in the 110th Congress expressing the sense that the Government of Japan should formally acknowledge, apologize, and accept historical responsibility in a clear and unequivocal manner for its Imperial Armed Forces' coercion of young women, known to the world as "comfort women," into sexual slavery during Japan's colonial and wartime occupation of Asia and the Pacific Islands from the 1930s through the duration of World War II; and to request that Guam be included among the Pacific Islands affected. BE IT RESOLVED BY I MINA'BENTE NUEBI NA LIHESLATURAN
 GUÅHAN:

WHEREAS, the island of Guam is an unincorporated Territory of theUnited States of America; and

5 WHEREAS, Guam has a long history of colonial rule, being controlled
6 by Spain until it was ceded to the United States in 1898; and

7 WHEREAS, Guam was invaded and occupied on December 8, 1941 by
8 Japanese forces; and

9 WHEREAS, Guam is the only United States territory, possession or state
 10 that was occupied by Japanese Armed Forces during World War II; and

11 WHEREAS, the people of Guam were subjected to death, personal 12 injury, rape, forced labor, forced marches, and internment during the Japanese 13 occupation; and

WHEREAS, the Government of Japan officially authorized the Imperial Armed Forces to acquire young women, who are now known to the world as *"ianfu"* or "comfort women," for the purpose of sexual servitude during Japan's occupation and control of foreign lands prior to and during World War II; and

WHEREAS, the "comfort women" system of forced military prostitution by the Government of Japan, considered unprecedented in its cruelty and magnitude, included gang rape, forced abortions, humiliation, and sexual violence resulting in mutilation, death, or eventual suicide in one of the largest cases of human trafficking in the Twentieth (20th) Century; and

24 WHEREAS, H. Res. 121 refers to Japanese schools using new textbooks

that downplay the atrocities such as the tragedy of the "comfort women" and
 Japanese officials recently expressing a desire to dilute or rescind Chief
 Cabinet Secretary Yohei Kono's 1993 statement on the "comfort women",
 which expressed the Government's sincere apologies and remorse; and

WHEREAS, despite numerous attempts by the people of Guam to seek
reparation and recognition for the suffering they experienced during Japan's
occupation, no resolution has been achieved; and

8 WHEREAS, H. Res. 121 seeks to have the Government of Japan make a 9 formal acknowledgment, apology and acceptance of historical responsibility 10 relative to its Imperial Armed Force's maltreatment and coercion of women 11 into sexual slavery during its colonial and wartime occupation of Asia and the 12 Pacific Islands from the 1930s through the duration of World War II; now, 13 therefore, be it

14 **RESOLVED,** that *I Mina'Bente Nuebi Na Liheslaturan Guåhan* does 15 hereby, on behalf of the people of Guam, petition the United States House of 16 Representatives to adopt H. Res. 121; and be it further

17 **RESOLVED,** that *I Mina'Bente Nuebi Na Liheslaturan Guåhan* does 18 hereby, on behalf of the people of Guam, request that the United States 19 Congress, in H. Res. 121, state that Guam was affected by the Japanese Armed 20 Forces' vicious coercion of young women into sexual slavery and for their 21 cruelty to the people of Guam during the occupation; and be it further

RESOLVED, that the Speaker certify, and the Secretary of the Legislature attest to, the adoption hereof, and that copies of the same be thereafter transmitted to the Honorable Nancy Pelosi, Speaker of the United States House of Representatives; to the Honorable Mike Honda, Member, U.S.
 House of Representatives; to Mr. David Cohen, Deputy Assistant Secretary of
 the United States Department of the Interior's Office of Insular Affairs; to the
 Honorable George W. Bush, President of the United States of America; to the
 Honorable Madeleine Z. Bordallo, Guam's Congressional Delegate, U.S.
 House of Representatives; and to the Honorable Felix P. Camacho, I
 Maga'lahen Guåhan.
