No reports are required although every year Sanctuary reapplies for Licensure that includes site visits to ensure the health and safety of the clients. Periodic visits by DPHSS staff also occur to monitor the shelters for compliance and to meet with the clients.

The amount of reimbursement varies from month to month depending on the number of clients who are in residence for that period. In addition, a monthly clothing allowance may be added.

The current reimbursement rate per month is \$581.62 per child for a full month or a pro-rated amount thereof.

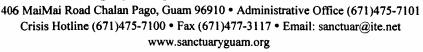

Project Description:

The *Programan Pas Para I Familia* provides a comprehensive continuum of intensive drug and alcohol as well as violence prevention and early intervention services to assist runaway, homeless and similarly troubled youth and their families. Project services assist families in resolving their issues of conflict in times of crisis, consequently decreasing the incidence of drug use and violence in their lives, as targeted in the SDFSCA, Sections 4114(b)(1)(A) and 4114(b)(1)(B). The focus of these services is to strengthen the family as a collective unit. The intent is to provide the family with an opportunity to come together and address presenting problems, working in partnership with staff to resolve their issues in a calm, non-threatening manner and to identify whether drug and alcohol issues are compounding them.

<u>Project Goals and Objectives; Project Activities; Project Performance Measures; Project Outcomes:</u>

Goal: The overall goal of the *Programan Pas Para I Familia* is to decrease the rate of reported drug and alcohol use of children in crisis situations and their families by 5% every project year, as well as decrease the rate of violence in Guam's homes with children by 5% every project year.

Objective 1. Increase the level of awareness of the consequences of drug and alcohol use in children in crisis situations and their families by 10% every project year.

Indicator/Outcomes/Periodicity: Awareness of consequences of drug and alcohol use in children in crisis situations and their families.

Activity A: The project will conduct 12 culturally competent skills training sessions on the effects of drugs and alcohol and related life-

Results:

• 2 skills training sessions on the effects of drugs and alcohol and related life-

skills topics for youth in crisis situations.

- skill topics for youth in crisis situations occurred this reporting period for 18 youth.
- Participants who take part in these skills training sessions are from the Department of Youth Affairs' Cottage Home and Youth Correctional Facility.

Activity B:

Conduct 80 support groups for youth in crisis situations to help them cope with maintaining a drug, alcohol and violence free lifestyle.

Timeline: Month 1-ongoing weekly sessions. **Responsible Parties:** Project Director and Prevention Specialists

Results:

- 17 support groups for 90 youth in crisis situations to help them cope with maintaining a drug, alcohol and violence free lifestyle were conducted this quarter.
- Youth attending the groups are from Sanctuary's shelters, DYA, the Juvenile Drug Court and other outside referrals.
- The program facilitates three different support groups weekly. The support groups are as follows:
- The Na'homlo support group serves as an outlet for youth who have in the past, or currently still have drug and alcohol issues. In this group the facilitators discuss issues directly involved with drug and/or alcohol use such as the negative effects and consequences. The facilitators also help group participants to understand why, with whom, how often, and the consequences of their drug and alcohol use. Each session addresses topics such as: habits of a drug users and conflict resolution. Also with each session, the participants continue their drug history chart, take part in their weekly processing, and have open discussion.
- Pathways is a more intensive support group for teenaged youth who have issues of drugs and/or alcohol use or abuse. This group meets for an hour and a half rather than the standard one-hour support group time. Facilitators focus on having participants gain a better understanding of why it is they do what they do; and also the consequences of each decision they

	make-not just about alcohol and drug use, but about all the decisions they make. They learn to recognize that every decision has a consequence, whether it be a negative or positive, depends on the decision. • The Smoking Cessation Class focuses on the short and long-term effects of smoking, the consequences of using tobacco - both mentally and physically - as well as implementing their individual program plan to quit. This is a 12-session group that utilizes the Minnesota Smoking Prevention Program to discourage tobacco use among adolescents. The curriculum is designed to influence the social and psychological factors that encourage the onset of smoking cigarettes or using smokeless tobacco. Project Description:

The Run Away Homeless Youth (RHY) Basic Center is a community based program specifically designed to assist runaway, homeless, victims of abused and other similarly troubled youth and their families. The program provides a 24-hour shelter and care as a safe home for runaway, homeless and victims of violence for up to 21 days during which case management services are provided in resolving their issues of conflict in times of crisis at the same time keeping focus on strengthening the family as a collective unit. The case management unit includes crisis intervention, individual development plan, group and family counseling, brief therapy, aftercare, outreach and referrals. The ultimate goal and focus is in promoting and achieving the individual's educational goals and personal growth within a safe and healthy environment.

<u>Project Goals and Objectives; Project Activities; Project Performance Measures; Project Outcomes:</u>

Goal: The overall goal of the Basic Center is to provide a safe and stable Emergency Shelter for run away and troubled youth and assist them in resolving crisis and conflicts by keeping focus on promoting family unity and improving quality of life for Guam's youth.

Objective 1. To increase the awareness of available services and issues related to Runaway and Homeless youth by conducting outreach efforts directed at youth, parents, and community agencies through a 24-hour crisis hotline, presenting information through the local media (newspapers, television & radio), schools, and shopping centers through out the island.

Indicator/Outcomes/Periodicity: Awareness of available services for run away and troubled youth for the community of Guam as a whole.

Activity A:

The Emergency Shelter program will provide individual counseling at least twice a week for each youth residing in the shelter.

Time Line: Daily; ongoing daily sessions Responsible Parties: Case Managers and/or Case Management Administrator, and Residential Workers

Results:

- During this reporting period a total of thirty-eight (40) contacts were made via 24-hour crisis hot line.
- For this reporting period,
 (1)Sanctuary, Inc. of Guam staff made outreach displays during which an average of fifteen (15) information brochures were handed out to the general pubic as follows:
 - Sanctuary, Incorporated month outreach activity at Guam Premium Outlet.
- During this reporting period, an average of (11) youth resided in the shelter per day. At least six individual counseling sessions were conducted on a daily basis that included educational, health, personal growth. Family sessions were conducted as well to develop a reunification plan. Residents were given the opportunity to request for special counseling sessions when they encountered problems during their stay in the shelter.

Activity B:

To provide therapeutic and recreational activities for youth to promote personal well being.

Timeline: Daily Responsible Parties:

Case Managers and/or Case Management Administrator, and Residential Workers

Results:

- On a daily basis, the program facilitates various support activities through out the month for therapeutic and recreational purpose such as sports, leisure walks, exercise, meditation and swimming to promote social skills and personal growth.
- On a monthly basis, the residents participate in beach activities during that are designed for youth to get in touch with nature while learning about the environment, natural resources and influences on Guam's culture and historical events. The activity also promotes social and physical well being for youth and

encourages them to participate in group activities. This is also seen as a positive activity that could be shared with youth and their fellow peers once released from our shelters.

Twice a month, the program
 facilitates arts and craft workshops to
 encourage residents to develop their
 creative ideas and allow them to
 acquire skills in creating their own
 arts and craft in activities such as
 baking cookies or cakes, creating
 cards for the holidays, and painting
 pictures.

Objective II.

To reduce the problems of runaway and homeless youth by providing temporary shelter and aftercare services to 250 youth and their families per program year while they resolve problematic issues.

Indicators/Outcomes/Periodicity: Accessibility of children and their families in crisis situations who use Emergency Shelter services.

Activity A: 24-hour hot line opens to the general public to provide immediate feedback, assessments and referrals to appropriate agencies.

Time line: on-going, 24-hours, 7days a week **Responsible Parties:** Crisis Intervention Worker, Case Managers and Case Management Administrator

Activity B:

Provide referral services for all youth and their family members assessed for services needed from other agencies.

Timeline: Month 1 -ongoing

- Ninety-nine (40) contacts were made via 24-hour crisis hot line.

Strengthen family relationships of 250 youth and families through individual, family and group counseling to resolve conflicts that wall lead to familial reconciliation and reunification.

Indicators/Outcomes/Periodicity: Conflict Mediation skills of children and their families.

Activity A:

Provide 175 family skills training sessions for youth and their families experiencing crisis situations through Sanctuary's 24-hour crisis hotline or Emergency Shelter Program

Time line: Month 1-ongoing Responsible Parties:

Crisis Intervention Worker, Case Managers and Case Management Administrator.

Results:

- Seventy-two (150) family skills training sessions were provided this reporting period to youth and their families experiencing crisis situations.
- Four (4) residents returned home after their family members received parenting skills training and counseling.
- One Resident (1) transitioned to Oasis Empowerment.
- One Resident (1) was transitioned to Sagan Na Homlo.
- Two residents (2) residents were in the process of transition to the Transitional Living Program (TLP).

Activity B:

The Project will conduct 45 Anger Management groups for children in crisis situations to learn assertive, non-violent ways of channeling their anger.

Timeline: Month 1 -ongoing

Responsible Parties: Project Director, Project

Coordinator and Case-Managers.

Results:

- Five (5) Anger Management classes were conducted this reporting period with thirty-eight (38) youth in attendance. The group's participants consisted of youth in Sanctuary's Emergency Shelter program, Transitional Living Program, as well as outside referrals.
- Mentoring is also done with the youth

	at this time. Thirty-eight (38) youth were mentored during the group session.
Objective IV: To decrease recidivism and problems of runaway and homeless youth and their families to assist with their transition back home and meet their long-term needs.

Problems Encountered:

The Parent/Legal Guardians of current clientele have reported they have issues with transportation in order for them to attend parenting skills classes and parent support group. Program staff encouraged the parent/legal guardians to utilize the public transportation system, yet they continue to report the transportation system is not very reliable.

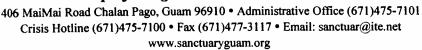
The shortage of staff is still a major concern as it makes it difficult to have adequate staffing for each shift. This is of great concern especially when there is an influx of clients. The program is in the process of recruiting residential staff to provide adequate supervision of the growing number of clients. Personnel from various sections within the organization have been assisting the effort to ensure services for residents are not jeopardized.

Future Plans:

The Case Management and Counseling Section have developed corrective action plans to address several deficiency areas such as improving data collections, monitoring of case management activities and case updates. This improvement is making significant progress on a daily basis. Partnering agencies such as Child Protective Services, I' Famaguon'ta, and Juvenile Investigation Section have been invited to attend regular case staffing on an as needed basis to better serve the clientele. The section would also like to employ at least two (2) more Case Managers to assist with the increase of clientele at the shelters.

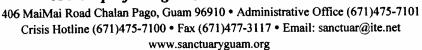
