RELATIVE TO THE MAYORS' COUNCIL OF GUAM SUPPORTING THE DEVELOPMENT OF A PRIVATELY OWNED AND MANAGED HOSPITAL AND SUPPORTING THE ISSUANCE OF A QUALIFYING CERTIFICATE TO THE GUAM REGIONAL MEDICAL CITY.

BE IT RESOLVED BY KONSEHELON MAHOT GUÅHAN:

- 2 WHEREAS, the Guam Memorial Hospital is the only civilian hospital available to 3 provide hospital services for the people of our island and it is often faced with overcrowded 4 conditions, limited equipment and supplies and limited financial resources; and
- 5 WHEREAS, the Guam Memorial Hospital is now over 40 years old and is no longer able
 6 to meet the demands of the patients of our island; and
- WHEREAS, every month hundreds of our island's people are forced to leave their
 homes to seek health care services in the Philippines, Hawaii, California and other off- island
 areas because the care they need is not available on Guam; and
- 10 WHEREAS, many of our people are left with the financial and emotional difficulties 11 associated with leaving their homes, leaving the support of family and facing the realities of 12 expenses associated with such off-island health care; and
- WHEREAS, based on a published June 2006 study by Megan Stratman and MatthewSpellman, Department of Economics, University of Oregon, which provides a basis forcalculating the number of hospital beds required to adequately serve the health care needs of acommunity, Guam has a shortage of approximately 319 hospital beds; and
- WHEREAS, this shortage of hospital beds supports the position that a new hospital providing additional hospital beds for our island is vitally important to the health, safety and welfare to the people of Guam; and
- WHEREAS, the realities of the financial constraints and limitations of the Government of Guam will make it difficult for any meaningful addition of hospital beds at the Guam Memorial Hospital, make it difficult to build a new Government owned hospital and make it difficult to purchase state of the art equipment for specialty health care services now only available off island; and

WHEREAS, approximately \$60,000,000 leaves Guam annually to provide care to our
 residents in hospitals and clinics located in places like Los Angeles, San Francisco, Seattle,
 Honolulu and Manila, which has an adverse impact to our island's economy; and

WHEREAS, a committed group of residents from our own community, recognized that
Guam needed a new hospital to meet the healthcare needs of our people. Residents from our
own island, worked approximately six years to create a business plan for the development of a
new privately owned and managed hospital on Guam; and

8 WHEREAS, in an effort to seek an investor to develop a new hospital, The Medical City 9 located in Manila, made a commitment to Guam and started the construction of a new 130 state 10 of the art acute care hospital in the northern village of Dededo: and

WHEREAS, this hospital has been named The Guam Regional Medical City, it is an investment into Guam of approximately \$250,000,000, has created up to 300 new jobs for construction workers and will create up to 400 new jobs for those that will work in the hospital; and

WHEREAS, in addition, The Guam Regional Medical City, will also outsource services
to other businesses on Guam, further contributing to our island economy; and

WHEREAS, The Guam Regional Medical City will offer services not currently available on Guam and provide specialty care that will reduce the number of our island's patients and residents that now must now leave island for care; *now therefore be it*

RESOLVED, that the Mayors' Council of Guam, does hereby, on behalf of the people of
 Guam, support the development of The Guam Regional Medical City; and be it further

RESOLVED, that *I Konsehelon Mahot Guåhan* will make itself available to provide assistance and support to the Guam Regional Medical City, for the purpose of carrying out its mission to provide the people of Guam with a higher standard of care, and be it further RESOLVED, that the President certify to and the Council Secretary attests the adoption
 hereof, and that copies of the same be thereafter transmitted to the Administrator, Guam
 Economic Development Authority, the Administrator, Guam Regional Medical City, to the
 Honorable Judith T. Won Pat, Ed. D., Speaker of *I Mina Trentai Dos Na Liheslaturan Guåhan*, and
 to the Honorable Edward J.B. Calvo, *I Maga'lahen Guåhan*.
