III. PROJECT NARRATIVE

A. Overview of sexual assault services currently available to victims. Throughout the territory, both government and non-government organizations (NGOs) provide services for victims of sexual assault – that includes women, men, and children. Government services carry out their individual mandates that address certain intervention, advocacy, referral, accompaniment and related assistances. NGOs also provide similar services. Such services also include those that address special needs/underserved populations such as the elderly, cognitively and physically challenged individuals.

B. Efforts in place to address sexual assault include those provided by:

Government agencies such as social service agencies and Criminal Justice System (CJS) which include: Guam Police Department (GPD), Office of the Attorney General (OAG) – Victim Witness Ayuda Services (VWAS), Judiciary of Guam (JOG) -- Marshals Office/Probation Division, Healing Hearts Crisis Center (HHCC) - Department of Mental Health & Substance Abuse (DMHSA), Department of Integrated Services for Individuals with Disabilities (DISID), Department of Public Health & Social Services (DPHSS), Department of Youth Affairs, etc. These agencies provide services that are called for by the mandates and missions of their respective departments.

NGOs and public corporations, to include faith and community-based organizations are: Alee Shelter, Archdiocese of Agana – Division of Pastoral Ministries, Elim Pacific Ministries-Oasis Empowerment Center, Guma'Mami, Inc. (*Our House, Inc.*), Guam Sexual Assault & Abuse Resource Center Association (GSAARCA), Guam Coalition Against Sexual Assault & Family Violence (GCASAFV), Immaculate Heart of Mary (IHOM) Catholic Parish, Public Defender Service Corporation (a public corporation) and Victim Advocates Reaching Out (VARO).

Between government and NGOs, victim services range from those that support rape crisis centers providing core services, direct intervention and related assistance to victims of sexual assault. These may also include a range of related services such as those provided DMHSA and DPHSS to include medical examinations/treatment/others such as sexual transmitted diseases, counseling services, intervention, law enforcement, prosecution, disposition of cases by the courts, victim advocacy, accountability, information and referral, emotional support, transportation for victims (if necessary) to court or appointments related to their cases, assistance in filing claims with the Criminal Injuries Compensation Commission, juvenile justice, various services for youth, childcare while victims are in court or meeting with prosecutor, victim notification of trial dates, case related information, case dispositions, restitution advocacy, assist requests for parole/release notification of perpetrators, etc.

On a rotational basis all program partners both government and NGOs contribute to scheduled outreach events, education and prevention services, etc. In addition, cross-training will be extended for program partners in coordination with STOP VAW program partners to include our community and military allies such as the Andersen Air Force Base Sexual Assault Response Center, Guam National Guard, Naval Criminal Investigations Section, and U.S. Navy Fleet and Family Support Services – Sexual Assault Victim Intervention.

Healing Hearts Crisis Center (HHCC), a division of the Department of Mental Health & Substance Abuse (DMHSA) is the only rape crisis center on the island. It was established by public law in 1992 and continues to be Guam's only rape crisis center. HHCC provides services 24 hours a day, seven days a week to sexual assault victims and their families. These services include intake and assessments, forensic interviews, forensic medical examinations, referrals to other support services, counseling, sexually transmitted diseases exams/treatment and/or other related testing services, etc.

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C. Subgrant awards will be made based on the: 1) proposals received in response to the FY 2013 SASP solicitation distributed during GCO-FPO's regular subgrantee meeting; 2) how proposals address the FY 2013 program scope, statutory purposes, and special priority areas, etc.; 3) the significance of the applicant's proposal in terms of addressing gap areas; and 4) the applicant's record and/or history of compliance with project requirements, of related and other grant programs, etc.

D. How SASP complements the STOP implementation program. SASP project activities add to efforts that the STOP VAW projects are unable to provide. Essentially, these are gap areas identified through various forums, previously discussed as well as those provided by potential program partners. As an example, HHCC-DMHSA is the island's only rape crisis center. However, STOP VAW funds cannot be used to support services at HHCC simply because it is a government operation; as such, it is rendered unqualified to receive STOP funds. GSAARCA provides treatment and counseling services, training and several other supports to HHCC. SASP funds have been identified to provide support to GSAARCA. SASP complements the STOP VAW project by providing support to the rape crisis center. Related needs that can be provided by other potential program partners are those organizations listed on pages 8. Obviously, funding opportunities provided by the SASP will add for expansion of efforts and help to reinforce STOP VAW Program activities.

E. Meaningful involvement of sexual assault coalition and representatives from underserved communities in developing the application, including:

1. Process and communication method used to involve the sexual assault coalition (SAC) and representatives from underserved communities.

All of Guam fit the definition of underserved communities because of "...geographic location, underserved racial and ethnic populations, special needs population ...," etc. SAC and

representatives from underserved communities participate in 1) regular subgrantee monthly meetings called by GCO-FPO; 2) planning committee meetings; 3) other special meetings by related support organizations; 4) annual workshops and conferences; 5) written, telephonic and electronic communications; and 6) individual meetings and consultations with various agency and NGO heads to include the executive director of the sexual assault coalition, representatives from underserved communities, and all potential SAS program partners and community allies.

2. Which underserved communities the State or Territory included in the above process and what methods were used to reach out and communicate with these communities. Communication methods include all of the above to reach out to these communities. In addition, annual conferences, various workshops and outreach events include underserved communities, to include special needs populations such as the elderly, cognitively and physically disabled, etc.

3. How many times the State or Territory has met with the coalition and representatives from underserved communities to discuss and develop this application. Since initial participation with SASP, GCO-FPO held monthly and special meetings with GSAARCA, GCASAFV and all other sub-grantees. This process may include: 1) Several telephonic and electronic communications with both potential as well as support program partners; 2) other community allies subsequent to submittal of proposals; and/or 3) follow-up requests for proposals, write-ups and/or updates from prospective subgrantees and/or sexual assault service program partners. A good majority of coalition members are also the same subgrantees since initial development, planning, and implementation in 1995 of the STOP VAW program. Follow-up calls and requests for additions and/or changes – subsequent to requests for proposals during regular monthly subgrantee meetings were made for last-minute inclusion, if any, to this application.

4. Whether the coalition and representatives from underserved communities were provided an opportunity to review this application and provide comment, prior to its

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submission. Delayed dissemination of program solicitation renders limited review time for all concerned given that normal review and application development time normally take from 4 - 5 months. On a positive note, however, review of application and submission of comments are part of regular ongoing dialogue and interaction between program partners that take place during regular monthly meetings (to include one-to-one meetings) with subgrantees and/or mass communications that call for input.

5. How Guam has incorporated feedback and input from the coalition and representatives from underserved communities into this application. As previously stated, the entire population of Guam is underserved. In addition, a majority – if not all – coalition members are the same representatives that comprise program partners of the STOP VAW, including associated programs such as SASP. These partners actively take part in regular monthly meetings; joint or special planning committee meetings; annual family violence & sexual assault conference; faith-based conferences; workplace training workshops; and by individual meetings with government agencies and NGOs about possible participation and interaction in application development. Because of the limited budget allocations of the SASP, GSAARCA has been and will continue to be the sole recipient of funds. These funds provide support for a range of vital services for victims and their families that embrace the SASP program purposes and special areas of priority. Specific services funded are those that provide aid for the recovery of survivors, TA/other trainings, and outreach activities gauged at providing comprehensive victim services as discussed in ongoing dialogue through the following forums: proposals that respond to advance announcement of GCO-FPO plans during regular monthly meeting as well as those responding to mass email requests for input.

F. Meaningful involvement of GCASAFV and representatives from underserved communities in implementing plans to administer SASP.

1. The territory of Guam, per above, works with SAC and representatives from underserved communities through ongoing dialogue and interaction in the various forums, as previously discussed. Some suggestions were incorporated into this application through proposals submitted by GSAARCA that also included ongoing discussions between GCO-FPO and the GCASAFV as well as GSAARCA. In March 2011, the GCASAFV conducted a Regional Summit where U.S. Territories and neighboring islands were represented; they also represented underserved communities. Subsequent discussions and meetings centered on reports summarizing the needs of respective island communities.

2. All of Guam is underserved; hence, all of Guam is included in the decision for funding distribution.

3. Methods used in reaching out to underserved communities to ensure active

participation in implementing plans to administer SASP funds is previously addressed. This would obviously depend on whether the funding allocations to be provided would accommodate the budget proposed for this application. Otherwise, project funding decisions would rest with the GCO-FPO in consultation with program partners, as appropriate, and based on the following: 1) proposals received in response to GCO-FPO requests; 2) how proposals address the 2013 SASP program scope, statutory purposes, and program priorities, etc.; 3) the significance of the applicant's proposal in terms of addressing gap areas that are aligned with SASP; 4) the applicant's record and/or history of compliance with project requirements; and 5) consultation, as appropriate, with the sexual assault coalition, underserved population, and/or appropriate subgrantees of related programs administered by GCO-FPO.

4. The role that the territory of Guam envisions for the GCASAFV and representatives from underserved communities in implementing plans will be those previously discussed. Guam's SASP will be modeled after the STOP VAW program, e.g.: partnership building

through outreach events and prevention services carried out island-wide; etc. engaging partners in regular monthly meetings and other regular forums that encourages input and feedback, etc. As previously mentioned, all of Guam will be included as all fall under "underserved communities." Methods to be used to reach out to all underserved communities will include telephonic/electronic communications, newspaper or radio publications, regular monthly meetings, etc.

GCO-FPO also expects to use the STOP VAW model to implement plans: i.e., continuous engagement of program partners will aid in sustaining relationships and partnerships. Close collaboration/consultation with all involved would comprise of community allies, including those that are not a beneficiary of funds. GCO-FPO envisions the coalition and representatives from underserved communities to take up new initiatives, consultation, coordination and supporting roles in implementing the SASP plan similarly to the partnership charted under the Guam STOP VAW program model.

G. Detailed description of procedures to be used by the territory to ensure equitable distribution of grants and grant funds within the territory and between urban and rural areas. All SASP-funded projects will be providing services for all of Guam's sexual assault victims. Depending on the grant allocation, all proposals that address program scope and special interest areas will be addressed. Projects to be supported will not distinguish whether funds are for an urban or rural area as all of Guam's populations are underserved as previously mentioned.

H. Brief summary of how the optional 5% administrative funds will be used.

Depending on the state and territory allocation, five percent of funds will be used for central administration and program coordination, such as supplies, etc.

IV. PROPOSAL ABSTRACT

Summary of Proposed Project. Guam Sexual Assault Abuse Resource Center (GSAARCA) will be the sole recipient of project funds and will work closely with Department of Mental Health & Substance Abuse (DMHSA) - Healing Hearts Crisis Center (HHCC) – Guam's only rape crisis center – to help improve services for victims of sexual assault. Enhancement of services will be those that are closely aligned with the statutory purposes or areas of priority under the SASP.

Depending on funding availability, these may include the following general areas such as: 1) intake and assessments; 2) forensic medical examinations; 3) referrals to other support services and/or other related services; 4) technical assistance and/or training support in coordination with GCO-FPO; and/or 5) strategies and interventions to end sexual assault.

Organizations to be involved will primarily include GSAARCA, DMHSA-HHCC, GCO-FPO and support organizations and/or all program partners (government and NGOs alike).

What Will be Done. As stated above.

Service Area will include all individuals who seek services at DMHSA-HHCC, the only rape crisis of the island territory of Guam.

The proposal will impact all individuals who seek services at DMHSA-HHCC; hence, all of the island territory, as per above.


