PRESIDENT'S REPORT May 16, 2013

1. Good To Great

The University held a UOG Citizens Assembly on Thursday, May 9, 2013. Over 347 staff, faculty, administrators and students attended. I want to thank Regent Kathy Sgro for making the time to attend as well.

2. Commencement

The updated number of graduates for the Spring 2013 semester is now a total of 318, of which 30 are receiving are receiving bachelor of nursing degrees and 80 are receiving master's degrees. The commencement speaker is Mr. Henry Tan, who is an alumnus of UOG and will also be receiving an Honorary Degree at the ceremony.

3. Retirement of Dr. Helen Whippy

Dr. Helen Whippy, Senior Vice President for Academic and Student Affairs, will be retiring and moving to Hawaii in August, where she has been selected to serve as Provost at Chaminade University. Dr. Whippy has served as the rudder for this institution over the past 12 years, helping to stabilize the University and keep it on course in its mission of ina, diskubre, setbe. She is greatly appreciated and will be greatly missed.

4. Alumni Affairs

The G Factor 2, a talent showcase, will be held tomorrow night at the Westin Resort. Since this is our last meeting until the Fall, I would like to also remind you that the Founders Day Gala will also be held on June 8th at the Hyatt Regency Guam.

5. Capital Campaign Donors

This month's business partner is Froots, which is located in both the Agana Shopping Center and the GPO mall. Please tell them you are there to support the Big G, and 20% of your purchase will go to the capital campaign.

I would also like to express condolences to the family of UOGEF Executive Director Mark Mendiolo on the passing of his father, Benny Flores Mendiola. A memorial service will be held at the Seventh-day Adventist Church in Agana Heights on Tuesday, May 21st.

6. Students

At the last meeting, I reported that two faculty members, Dr. John Jenson and Dr. Mark Lander, of UOG's Water and Environmental Research Institute (WERI) were named as the recipients of the 2013 National Institutes for Water Resources (NIWR) National Impact Award for their project analyzing the salinity in the Northern Guam Lens Aquifer. While supervised by Dr. Jenson and Dr. Lander, the project was developed and undertaken by UOG graduate student Mrs. Christine Simard for her thesis research in UOG's graduate Environmental Science program last year. Mrs. Simard's thesis also earned her the first UOG Presidential Thesis Award, which was presented at the 2012 spring commencement. Mrs. Simard will deliver a presentation on the project at the Universities Council on Water Resources-NIWR Conference at Lake Tahoe in June, along with her advisor on the project, Dr. Jenson. The two-year study produced a comprehensive evaluation of salinity trends in the 153 production wells in the Northern Guam Lens Aquifer (NGLA), beginning with the earliest records dating back to 1973. The NGLA provides 80% of the potable water for the 186,000 residents of Guam.

7. Recognition

Dr. Margaret Hattori-Uchima will be awarded the Distinguished Dissertation Award at the College of Nursing Convocation for Villanova University to be held next week. In a letter from Dr. M. Louise Fitzpatrick, Connelly Endowed Dean and Professor of Nursing, Dr. Hattori-Uchima was informed that the committee found her dissertation "to be of exceptionally high quality that makes a valuable contribution to the literature about health disparities."

UOG will be paying the Merit Bonus to over 100 employees dating back to 1991, which will total about \$500K for active employees. This will increase when the cost to pay prior employees/retirees is calculated.

The CNMI Senate has passed a resolution thanking the University for its role in providing a quality education for the people of the CNMI, along with other institutions. Over the past 10 years, UOG has served 587 students from the CNMI.

WHEREAS, the University of Guam is the primary U.S. Land Grant institution accredited by the Western Association of Schools and Colleges (WASC) serving the post-secondary needs of the people of Guam and the region; and

WHEREAS, the University is submitting a grant application entitled "Estoriayi I Famagu'onta: Telling our Children Our Stories" under the Richard Flores Taitano Micronesian Area Research Center (RFT-MARC) to address the crucial need for literary resources that demonstrate Chamorro cultural values and practices in traditional and modern contexts; and

WHEREAS, University of Guam employees are offered membership in the Government of Guam Retirement Plan; and

WHEREAS, the proposed salaries and fees are in line with University of Guam salaries and fee schedules, the Government of Guam pay scale, and the local fair market value; and

WHEREAS, the "Estoriayi I Famagu'on-ta" project is approved for the current funding opportunity under Native American Social and Economic Development Strategies (SEDS) CFDA #93.612, for a period of three years, commencing August 2013, and the matching fund requirement is waived by U.S. Public Law 98-454 Title IV, Section 601(b).

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that upon recommendation of the Administration, the Board of Regents supports and approves the RFT-MARC proposal and authorizes submittal of the application, with the President of the University of Guam authorized to sign all application documents and negotiate on behalf of the University of Guam.

Budget Narrative

A. Personnel:

Total Personnel cost for the three year period is \$189,741. MARC will hire a Managing Editor and Graphics Editor. These two people will be responsible for the actual book development. The amount of \$111,000 (or \$37,000 x 3) covers the managing editor's salary. The managing editor is responsible for the development and implementation of program activities, will serve as editor and mentor to authors, and will assist with brand development and marketing. The Managing Editor is a full-time position. The amount \$78,741 covers the Graphics Editor's salary who is responsible for managing artists to meet deadlines, set layout and design work and assist with printing and marketing. This position holds a quarter load or 520 hours during the Academic year and half load or 720 hours during the summer.

B. Fringe Benefits:

Fringe benefits are calculated at the University of Guam at a range of 8% to 28% of the total salary. Fringe benefits include health, dental, and life insurance, retirement, and social security. The percent required for health is contingent upon family size and choice of health plan. The Managing Editor is a FTE position with full benefits i.e. health, dental, and retirement. That amount is \$14,035.

C. Travel

Travel cost is budgeted at \$39,000 for Post-award training and annual ANA Grantee meetings for 2 people. Travel and per diem is requested for Project Director +one project person to attend training in Hawaii and annual meetings in Washington, D.C.

D. Equipment

E. Supplies

Supplies cost amounts to \$6,260 which is allotted for two desktop computers, a laptop computer, software and general office supplies. The desktop computers will be used for grant management, database creation, promotional material and layout and design work. Managers would have access to the internet to the social media websites (i.e. Facebook, blogs, and dedicated website), in order to engage with community members in product development. The laptop computer will be used with Infocus projector (Estimated in-kind contribution \$1,250) for training sessions and CLAG meetings. The amounts listed for the computers were derived from the market price for computers recommended for book publishing or projects that deal with a high amount of graphics and for the software used for desktop publishing. General Office supplies equate to \$500. This cost is for writing instruments, staplers, legal paper, notepads, sticky pads, copier paper, toner cartridge, etc. This amount is conservative as compared to grants of similar size.

F. Other Direct Charges

Other Direct Charges carries the bulk of the budget at \$108,225. Over half or \$60,600 of this allotment is for professional services of the authors and illustrators for their intellectual property.

While the design and layout of the books can be done in Guam, the actual production of the books would be done off-island. The projected cost for a book run is \$3,500 (\$3.50 x 1000 copies). This manufacturing cost is based on online estimates for a work that has 32pages (the average number of pagers in a children's work) with full color processing. We added \$6,000 to cover shipping costs in the event the contracted printer does not include shipping as part of the contract. In addition, \$1,200 is allotted for postage and handling of books to University of Hawaii Press (MARC Book Distributor). UH Press's main distribution center is in Maplewood, Ohio.

To initiate its marketing plan, MARC will spend \$750 for website development. This will allow the Manager to engage with the community with product and conceptual development. MARC will purchase a list of ISBN numbers from Bowker Book Distributors for \$1,075. ISBN Numbers allows MARC to extend its marketing reach to a global scale. This series of numbers will be dedicated to the publishing of Chamorro Children's Books. Stipends of \$2000 will be given to the four participating schools for their assistance with this project. Marketing/Resource materials cover advertisements, lesson plans, activity sheets, and bookmarks.



RELATIVE TO APPROVING THE ELECTIONS RULES PERTAINING TO DIRECTORS, NORTHERN AND SOUTHERN SOIL AND WATER CONSERVATION DISTRICT BOARDS

WHEREAS, the governance and control of the University of Guam is vested in the Board of Regents (BOR) of the University of Guam; and

WHEREAS, the provisions of Chapter 71, Title 5, of the Guam Code Annotated, establishing the Northern and Southern Soil and Water Conservation District and District Boards, require the University of Guam to conduct, every three years, the election of all district directors, and in conjunction therewith, promulgate the necessary rules by which farmers, farm land owners, and land occupiers shall nominate and elect, from among their number, district directors; and

WHEREAS, the President of the University of Guam through his designee, the Dean/Director of the College of Natural and Applied Sciences, conducted a public hearing on June 14, 2013 for the Proposed Election Rules Pertaining to Directors, Northern and Southern Soil and Water Conservation District Boards; and

WHEREAS, having taken into consideration the testimonies presented during the aforementioned public hearing, the attached Proposed Election Rules Pertaining to Directors, Northern and Southern Soil and Water Conservation District Boards is submitted herewith for adoption; and

WHEREAS, the Dean of the College of Natural and Applied Sciences has certified that the Proposed Election Rules Pertaining to Directors, Northern and Southern Soil and Water Conservation District Boards complies with the appropriate Public Laws and University Rules and Regulations; and

WHEREAS, the Administration recommends to the Board for approval the Proposed Election Rules Pertaining to Directors, Northern and Southern Soil and Water Conservation District Boards.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that Board of Regents hereby approves the Election Rules Pertaining to Directors, Northern and Southern Soil and Water Conservation District Boards.

ELECTION RULES PERTAINING TO DIRECTORS, NORTHERN AND SOUTHERN SOIL AND WATER CONSERVATION DISTRICT BOARDS [As Authorized by Chapter 71, Title 5 of the Guam Code Annotated.]

I. DEFINITIONS.

1. **Director, or district director**, means a member of either the Northern or Southern District Board.

2. **District** means the Northern Soil and Water Conservation District and the Southern Soil and Water Conservation District.

3. Northern Soil and Water Conservation District, or Northern District, means the entire land area that is situated to the North of Route 4 that extends from Agana Bay Paseo Loop Bridge to Pago Bay Bridge.

4. **Southern Soil and Water Conservation District, or Southern District**, means the entire land area that is situated to the South of Route 4 that extends from Agana Bay Paseo Loop Bridge to Pago Bay Bridge.

5. **District Board** means the government of Guam board comprised of individuals elected by local farmers, farmland owners or land occupiers to fulfill the duties of Chapter 71, 5GCA.

6. Northern Soil and Water Conservation District Board, or Northern District Board, means the District Board which shall govern the Northern District as described in 3 above.

7. Southern Soil and Water Conservation District Board, or Southern District Board, means the District Board which shall govern the Southern District as described in 4 above.

8. Farmer means a resident registered as a farmer by the Department of Agriculture.

9. Farmland Owner means a person, firm, or corporation who is an owner or operator of land used for the purpose of producing aquaculture products, bushes, crops, fruit or nut-bearing trees, herbs, livestock, ornamentals, timber or vines.

10. **Land Occupier** means any person, firm, or corporation who holds title to or, in the case of leased land, the person, firm, or corporation who holds possession of any lands lying within a district.

12. **Registry of Active District Members** means the official listing of eligible voters and district director candidates for the district as required by law to be maintained and periodically updated by each district board.

13. **University** means the University of Guam.

II. NOMINATIONS AND ELECTION OF DIRECTORS, COMPOSITION OF DISTRICT BOARDS, TENURE OF DIRECTORS; AND BOARD VACANCIES.

1. **Nomination and Election of Directors**. Farmers or farm land owners or land occupiers from within each district shall nominate individuals, from among their number, to serve as non-partisan district directors; and shall elect five (5) directors from among those nominated.

2. **Composition of District Boards**. Each Soil and Water Conservation District Board shall: (a) be composed of five (5) directors, each of whom is largely engaged in farming and is a land occupier of the district to which they are elected to serve; (b) select a chairperson and a vice chairperson from among the five (5) directors, who shall be elected by at least three (3) affirmative votes; and (c) have assigned to it an advisor from the University.

3. **Tenure of Directors**. Each district director shall be elected to serve for a term of three (3) years.

4. **Board Vacancies**. Vacancies shall be filled for an unexpired term. The selection of a successor to fill a vacancy for an unexpired term shall be made by I Maga'lahen Guåhan within thirty (30) days of the notification of such vacancy; such selection to be subject to the advice and consent of I Liheslaturan Guåhan.

III. ELECTION PROCEDURES.

1. **Election Overseer**. The University, via the Dean/Director of the College of Natural and Applied Sciences (CNAS) or his/her designee(s), shall oversee the entire election process. Prior to each election cycle, the Dean/Director or his/her designee(s) shall: (a) obtain an updated copy of the Registry of Active District Members from each District Board, (b) call for nominations from each district, (c) develop and print ballots for election, (d) effectuate media coverage about the election as much as possible in both print and electronic media, (e) conduct the actual election, (f) tabulate the election results and forward same to the President of the University for certification purposes.

2. **Election Frequency**. Commencing August 2013, the Election of District Directors shall be held every three years thereafter.

3. **Number of Officials to be Elected**. As provided by law, a total of five (5) directors shall be elected for the Northern District and a total of five (5) directors shall be elected for the Southern District.

4. **Nominators, Candidates and Voters**. Only those individuals who are listed on the Registry of Active District Members are eligible to Nominate, to be nominated as a candidate for the office of district director and vote in their respective district.

5. **Call for Nominations of Candidates.** The call for nominations of candidates for both districts shall commence on the 15th day of July of an election year.

2

6. **Nomination Form.** The CNAS Dean/Director's Office shall make available nomination forms for use by eligible nominators in submitting names of eligible nominees. The nomination form shall include the "Consent to Nomination" provision indicating the nominee's willingness to accept and perform the duties and responsibilities of a district director upon successful election.

7. **Dual District Active Member.** In the event a Farmer, Farmland Owner and/or Land Occupier farms and/or owns farmland/land in both districts, said Farmer, Farmland Owner and/or Land Occupier shall be restricted to participating in nominating, voting and running for district director in ONLY one district. Said Farmer, Farmland Owner and/or Land Occupier shall decide as to which district he/she will exercise his/her rights to nominate, vote and run for district director.

8. **Deadline for Nomination of Candidates**. The deadline to submit all completed nominations forms shall be at 12:00 NOON on the First (1st.) Friday of August of an election year.

9. **Ballots and Write-In Candidates**. The University shall prepare two sets of ballots, one for the northern district and one for the southern district. Only those nominees listed on the Registry of Active District Members will be placed on the respective set of ballots. Provisions for write-in candidates will be made on the ballots but only those write-in candidates whose names appear on the Registry of Active District Members will be considered in the counting.

10. **Election Day**. The election will be held on the Third (3^{rd}) Tuesday of August of an election year.

11. **Voting Poll and Hours.** The voting of directors shall be held in a suitable building on the campus of the University and voting shall be held from 8:00 A.M. until 7:00 P.M.

12. Absentee Voting. There shall be no provisions for absentee voting.

13. **Ballot Counting.** The counting of the ballots shall commence the day after the election and will be conducted by designated University employees under the supervision of Dean/Director of CNAS at a designated building on the campus of the University. Up to two witnesses from each of the two districts shall be present at the counting as designated by each district board.

IV. CERTIFICATION OF ELECTION

1. The Dean/Director of CNAS shall present an Election Results Report, in writing, to the President, University of Guam, indicating the final tabulation of ballots to include the total number of votes each candidate received as well as to enumerate the winning candidates from one (1) through five (5) for each district.

2. Upon receipt of the Election Results Report and to his satisfaction, the President shall certify the results and a copy of the results be immediately transmitted to the Governor of Guam, the Speaker of the Guam Legislature, the Chairman of the Legislative Committee that oversees the Soil and Water Conservation Districts, and the respective District Boards.

3. All election related documents such as nomination forms, ballots and tabulations will be made available for review and will be kept in the Office of the Dean/Director of CNAS for a period of sixty (60) working days before they are destroyed. The report will be kept indefinitely for historical purposes.

RESOLUTION NO. 13-17

RELATIVE TO ESTABLISHING THE RESEARCH CORPORATION OF THE UNIVERSITY OF GUAM (RCUOG)

WHEREAS, the University of Guam (UOG) is the primary U.S. Land Grant institution accredited by the Western Association of Schools and Colleges (WASC) serving the post-secondary needs of the people of Guam and the region; and

WHEREAS, the governance and well-being of UOG is vested in the Board of Regents (BOR); and

WHEREAS, over the last decade, UOG's revenues from grants and contracts have grown to \$50 million, an over 200% increase; and

WHEREAS, these grants and contracts complement the government of Guam's appropriation to UOG by adding new revenues that assist in sustaining UOG and enabling it to grow; and

WHEREAS, this rate of increase has led to challenges in managing such remarkable growth and puts the University's ability to seek and achieve further grant and contract growth at risk; and

WHEREAS, there are over 200 research corporations at or affiliated with universities in many states and jurisdictions that have led to dramatic growth in grant and contract awards through infrastructure, regulations and systems that are tailored to research environments; and

WHEREAS, UOG has the capacity to grow and expand its economic, social and environmental benefits to the people of Guam and the region while fulfilling its mission as the premier institution of higher education in the region by continuing to increase its engagement in research and educational programs funded by private and federal sponsors, to include business development through commercialization of research and public-private partnerships; and

WHEREAS, the goals of the Research Corporation of the University of Guam include: i) Grow the University's capacity to address community and regional needs; ii) Grow science, engineering and other graduate programs thus building the next generation of regional researchers; iii) Enhance the research infrastructure and facilities to support Principal Investigators and Grant Administrators: iv) Create a fiscally realistic opportunity for business development through commercialization of research and public-private partnerships; and v) Serve as a public policy opportunity to move from good to great in competing for and growing grants; and

WHEREAS, the Research Corporation of the University of Guam will exist to support UOG in meeting its mission, "Ina, Diskubre, Setbe - To Enlighten, to Discover, To Serve."

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Regents hereby endorses the establishment of the Research Corporation of the University of Guam.

necessary to facilitate the conduct of the authorized activities described in sections

(c.) To buy sell, lease, rent, hold, maintain, use and operate any property,

under which it was received and under the purposes of the RCUOG;

(d.) To submit each year for the approval of the board of directors an annual
budget. Such budget will include projected income, including indirect/Facilities
and Administrative revenue and a cost of operating expenses of the corporation as
well as the distribution plan of the net proceeds for the University's use, which
shall include a reasonable corporate reserve. The allocation of indirect/Facilities
and Administrative cost will be determined by the Board of Directors.

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1 (e.) To receive through University policies and procedures by gifts, grants, 2 devises, bequests, or otherwise from private or public sources, any property, real 3 personal, or mixed, intangible or tangible, absolutely or in trust, to be used and 4 disposed of, either the principal or the income therefrom, in accordance with the 5 conditions under which it was received; except that no gift to the research 6 corporation shall be accepted unless approved or confirmed by the RCUOG Board 7 of Directors;



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AN ACT TO *ADD* A NEW §43116 TO ARTICLE 1 OF CHAPTER 43, DIVISION 4 OF TITLE 5, GUAM CODE ANNOTATED, RELATIVE TO PROVIDING FOR EDUCATIONAL PROGRAMS FOR MEMBERS OF BOARDS AND COMMISSIONS.

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF GUAM:

- 2 Section 1. Short Title. This Act *shall* be cited as the "Responsible Boards
- 3 and Commissions Education Act."
- 4 Section 2. Legislative Findings and Intent. *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* finds
 5 that Public Law 24-191 established a single educational program at the University

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of Guam to train members of boards and commissions. This educational program
 was repealed by Public Law 28-76.

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I Liheslaturan Guåhan further finds that, although the existence of training for board members is beneficial to the operations of boards and commissions, each board and commission generally has its own specific statutes and rules and regulations which it must follow. Such a program should be optimized to deal with matters most relevant for each board and commission.

8 Additionally, *I Liheslatura* finds that errors by the members of boards and 9 commissions can result in procurement delays, as well as litigations, which have 10 historically cost the government significant sums.

Therefore, it is the intent of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* to establish training and curriculum to educate members of boards and commissions on the various statutes, rules and regulations which they must follow, and of which they must be aware to accomplish the purposes for which each board or commission is established, by adding a new §43116 to Title 5 GCA.

Section 3. Boards and Commissions Educational Programs. A new
§43116 is hereby *added* to Article 1 of Chapter 43, Division 4 of Title 5, Guam
Code Annotated, to read:

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"§ 43116. Boards and Commissions Educational Programs.

Development of Training and Curriculum. Each board or 20 (a) 21 commission *shall* have an educational program established to prepare its members for the duties of the board or commission to which they 22 23 are appointed. Such educational program shall cover procurement 24 laws, as applicable, applicable statutes, executive orders, and rules and regulations which govern the board or commission and their 25 respective areas of purview. Each educational program shall be 26 established, within ninety (90) days of the enactment of this Section, 27

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by the Director of the agency with which the board or commission is associated, or his designee; or, if there is no such agency, then *I Maga'lahi* (the Governor), or his designee. Each educational program *shall* be updated, as needed, *no less than* annually, to reflect any changes to procurement laws, applicable statutes, and rules and regulations. The Director of each agency *shall* report to *I Maga'lahi* (the Governor) within thirty (30) days when member(s) of an associated board or commission complete the applicable educational program. The Director, or his designee, *shall* conduct the training sessions at a time and location to be determined by the Director, in compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act and other relevant statutes.

(b) Education of Current Board and Commission Members.
Each current member of a board or commission *shall* complete the
applicable educational program within thirty (30) days of the
establishment of the program.

(c) Education of New Board and Commission Members. Each new member of a board or commission *shall* complete the applicable educational program within thirty (30) days of his election and qualification, or his confirmation by *I Liheslatura* to the board or commission.

(d) Continuing Education for Board and Commission
Members. Each year, the members of each board and commission
shall, as a form of continuing education, complete the applicable
educational program for the board or commission on which they
serve.

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Failure to Complete an Educational Program. Failure to (e) 1 2 complete an educational program within one hundred eighty (180) days of a board or commission member's appointment shall result in 3 the member's removal and the appointment of a new member to fill 4 5 the vacancy, pursuant to §2101 of Chapter 2, Title 4, Guam Code 6 Annotated. Actions of a board or commission shall not be invalidated 7 by the failure of a member to complete the applicable educational program." 8
