Dear Madam Speaker,

Pursuant to my authority to veto acts of the Legislature under §1423i of the Organic Act of Guam, I am returning Substitute Bill No. 38-32, also known as the proposed budget act for Fiscal Year 2014, with the following objections:

- 1. The Legislature lumped funding for the health agencies together, carved out appropriations for various programs, then left the balance for operations. This balance left the health agencies \$3.7 million short of what they will need to operate.
- 2. The Legislature lumped funding for the safety agencies with the rest of the line agencies, delivering a total cut of \$6.7 million from current levels. Every line agency, including the public safety agencies, already are operating at levels affecting the delivery of services.
- 3. The Legislature used the funding taken from these critical operations to help fund two empty promises: full implementation of the Hay Plan pay raises for all classified employees, and full restoration of the annual COLA. This is \$15.4 million in new spending that is (a) taken at the expense of the health and safety of the Guamanian people, and (b) unsustainable and, therefore, subject to being cut through the fiscal year or in subsequent years. Furthermore, the Legislature failed to authorize the Hay raises for the unclassified service, effectively shafting the mayors and their staff, and hundreds more in critical positions of public service. The inequity would be onerous.
- 4. In addition to the fantasy appropriation for the Hay raises that neglects to include the unclassified service, the Legislature placed a bureaucracy of regulations in front of the implementation of the raises. It is completely disingenuous for the Legislature to claim its support of the full implementation of the Hay, when the language in this bill expressly prohibits implementation before January 15, 2014.
- 5. The Legislature had a lapse in memory dating to March 2007, when Standard & Poor's placed the island on CreditWatch for issuing a line of credit to pay for the Department of Education's operations. In fact, the ding on our credit was "based on (GovGuam's) disclosure of the need to borrow \$6 million from local banks to meet its current payroll obligations for public school system employees," the report stated. It hasn't been seven years later, and the Legislature wants me to use this same line of credit to pay for DOE and Judiciary operations. This is completely irresponsible, irrational, and beyond

comprehension; not to mention insensitive to the Judiciary and DOE employees, whose hopes were raised falsely by yet another empty promise from the Legislature.

- 6. There is no reason the Provision for Tax Refunds should be any higher than \$113 million. We expect to pay about \$107 million from the Provision this year. What mathematical formula did the Legislature use to add \$13 million more to next year's Provision? A bump of \$6 million is more than adequate to meet the Provision.
- 7. The Legislature created a lockbox provision over General Fund revenues, greatly restricting the administration's ability to manage cash flow. Such a lockbox endangers the viability of the government during low cash collection months. The Legislature disregards the ebb and flow of cash collections, pretending that tax payments are somehow beholden to a schedule created by the Legislature.
- The Legislature created a lockbox provision over the Tourist Attraction Fund that, if etched into statute, would jeopardize tourism marketing operations during low cash collection months.

Thank you for considering my objections. I hope, with all sincerity, that the Legislature will consider the points I am making. No one among us would deny every reward we could give to our hardworking employees and retirees if the money was available. Alas, we must be prudent and responsible, because the taxpayers' well is not endless. Yes, we are in a much better position than we were when we last considered the budget, but we must remain frugal and fully cognizant of our financial limitations. We can't shortchange the health and safety of our people in order to maintain our political patronage to constituencies. We can't promise to spend money we don't have. Otherwise, the very people we will hurt are those who are counting on us to tell them the truth beyond all these empty promises.

**BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF GUAM:** 1 CHAPTER I 2 GENERAL PROVISIONS 3 Section 1. Short Title. This Act shall be known as the "General 4 Appropriations Act of 2014." 1 Section 2. Increments. The sum of One Million One Hundred Sixty 2 Thousand Two Hundred Ninety Six Dollars (\$1,160,296) *shall* be allocated from 3 the General Fund appropriation in Section 1 for the sole purpose of paying salary 4 step increments for Fiscal Year 2014.

Section 3. Notwithstanding any provision of law for the School Year 5 2013-2014, pursuant to 17 GCA Chapter 12 §12116(e), the Department of 6 Administration (DOA) is hereby authorized and directed to deduct Five Thousand 7 Five Hundred Dollars (\$5,500) per enrollee for the Guåhan Academy Charter 8 9 School from the total General Fund appropriation to the GDOE based on the actual enrollment at the time, multiplied by the per pupil cost. The Guåhan Academy 10 11 Charter School shall submit a monthly invoice to the DOA. Upon receipt of said invoice, the DOA shall remit it to the GDOE. Upon receipt of remitted invoice the 12 GDOE shall verify the invoice for accuracy and report its findings within ten (10) 13 days of receipt of said invoice to the DOA prior to the release of funds. If the 14 GDOE fails to report its findings, the invoiced amount received by the DOA shall 15 be automatically transmitted to the *Guåhan* Academy Charter School. 16

Section 4. No less than the sum of Four Hundred One Thousand Two 17 Hundred Seven Dollars (\$401,207) shall be allocated from the General Fund 18 appropriation in Section 1 for the Chamorro Studies Division administered by the 19 20 GDOE to be expended for personnel salaries and benefits, contractual services, professional development and training, supplies and materials, and equipment for 21 the support and the implementation of the Content Standards and Performance 22 Indicators of the course syllabi for the emphasis of fluency and for the promotion 23 of the proficiency skills in the areas of listening, speaking, reading, and writing in 24 the Chamoru language. 25

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Section 5. GDOE Miscellaneous Healthy Futures Fund Allocations.

Interscholastic Sports Fund. (1) The sum of Five Hundred 1 (a) 2 Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$520,000) shall be allocated from the Healthy Futures Fund appropriation in Section 1 for the Interscholastic Sports Fund 3 administered by the GDOE to be expended pursuant to §7108 of Chapter 7, 4 Title 17 GCA. Appropriations made herein *shall* be available to fund the 5 6 outrigger canoe, rugby, and other sports programs, to include the payment of 7 head coaches, assistant coaches, league fees, and other expenses normally associated with interscholastic sports programs. (2) The sum of Ninety Two 8 Thousand Dollars (\$92,000) shall be allocated from the Healthy Futures 9 Fund appropriation in Section 1 of this Part of this Chapter for busing 10 services for interscholastic sports programs. To the maximum extent 11 practicable, GDOE *shall* contract busing services to support the programs. 12

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(b) Health and Physical Education Activities. The sum of Two Hundred Seventy Nine Thousand Seven Hundred Fifty Four Dollars (\$279,754) shall be allocated from the Healthy Futures Fund appropriation in Section 1 of this Part of this Chapter for the GDOE Health and Physical Education programs, intramural sports, and similar activities.

18 Section 6. Textbooks and Collateral Materials. The following are 19 appropriations to the GDOE for the purchase of textbooks, e-book readers, and 20 collateral materials, to include musical instruments, software, sheet music, and 21 music books in accordance with the following terms and conditions:

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(a) Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the sum of One Million Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (**\$1,500,000**) is appropriated from the General Fund from Fiscal Year 2015 revenues to the GDOE for the purchase of textbooks, e-book readers, and related classroom instructional materials to include musical instruments, software, sheet music, and music books. The Superintendent of GDOE may, if necessary, through agreements with textbook vendors, defer payment for said materials until after October 1, 2014, but *no later than* December 31, 2014 with the full faith and credit of the government of Guam.

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The Superintendent of GDOE shall order materials funded by (b)4 this Section for Fiscal Year 2014 no later than March 1, 2014. The Bureau 5 of Budget and Management Research shall release such allotments as are 6 necessary to ensure that said materials are ordered by March 1, 2014. The 7 Superintendent of GDOE *shall* receive said materials and distribute them to 8 schools no later than thirty (30) days before the start of the school calendar 9 established pursuant to §4111, Chapter 4, Title 17, GCA. All funds 10 appropriated for said materials *shall not* be used for any other purpose. 11

On the first (1st) day of each fiscal quarter of Fiscal Year 2014, 12 (c)the Superintendent of GDOE shall provide to I Maga'låhen Guåhan and the 13 Speaker of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* and post on the GDOE website, a detailed 14 report regarding all receipts and expenditures for textbooks, e-book readers, 15 and collateral classroom instructional materials to include musical 16 instruments, software, sheet music, and music books. Said report shall be 17 accompanied by the certified list of textbooks approved by the Guam 18 Education Board and a list or copies of all purchase orders issued. The report 19 shall summarize: 20

(1) purchases by allotment account number, unit cost, and
the total cost of books charged against an appropriation account, the
vendor, quantity, title, copyright date, and ISBN of books ordered, the
allocation of such books by school and grade, whether books are for
teachers or students, and whether books are textbooks, e-books, or
workbooks; and

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1 (2) other information that may be useful or that is requested 2 by *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* regarding the funds appropriated and 3 authorized herein.

4 Non-compliance with these reporting requirements by the
5 Superintendent of GDOE *shall* result in the sanctions and penalties imposed
6 by this Act.

Section 7. JROTC Fund. The GDOE is hereby authorized to expend
funds from the JROTC Fund for the *sole* purpose of expenditures related to the
operations for the JROTC program.

Summer School Fund. Pursuant to §6119 of Chapter 6, Article 10 Section 8. 1, Division 2, Title 17 GCA, which established the Summer School Fund, such 11 sums as are necessary to fund the operations of the 2014 Summer School Program 12 are hereby appropriated to the GDOE. The Superintendent of GDOE shall submit a 13 detailed report to I Maga'låhen Guåhan and the Speaker of I Liheslaturan Guåhan 14 regarding the receipt and expenditure of said funds *no later than* thirty (30) days 15 after the close of summer school and post the same on the GDOE website. Such 16 report *shall* include the following: 17

- 18 (a) total revenues received, including identification of each revenue
   19 source;
- 20 (b) total expenditures and encumbrance by object classification and by21 school; and
- 22 (c) the fund balance.

23 Section 9. Website Posting. The Superintendent of GDOE *shall* submit to 24 the Speaker of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* and post and maintain on the GDOE 25 website: 1 (a) all payments for prior year obligations to be paid by current 2 appropriations when authorized, including the funding source to be used, by 3 month;

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(b) salary adjustments by position, effective date of adjustment, and the funding source for each, by month;

(c) mandated Cash Disbursement Schedules; and

7 (d) number of filled FTEs, costs, and funding sources by school
8 and division by month.

9 Section 10. Reports. The Superintendent of GDOE *shall* electronically
 10 report the following to *I Maga'låhen Guåhan* and the Speaker of *I Liheslaturan* 11 *Guåhan*:

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 (a) Within fifteen (15) days after the start of Fiscal Year 2014, the Superintendent of GDOE *shall* provide a copy of the GG-1 or contract of employees hired for School Year 2013-2014.

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(b) Thirty (30) days after the start of Fiscal Year 2014 and monthly thereafter, the Superintendent of GDOE *shall* provide a copy of the GG-1 or contract of each employee hired to fill any vacancy or new position.

Section 11. Utilities Reduction Incentive. Each School Principal of the 18 GDOE is encouraged to practice energy conservation within their respective 19 schools. Any school whose Principal and staff is able to reduce their annual utility 20 consumption by at least fifteen percent (15%) of their prior annual billing, 21 22 measured each quarter for each utility type *shall* have that dollar value of savings transferred from the utility pool to their respective school to supplement the needs 23 of that school and shall be available to be spent to support school activities for 24 students and staff. The savings shall be available to the school within thirty (30) 25 days of the close of each quarter. 26

1 Section 12. Budgetary Transfer Authority for Guam Department of 2 Education (GDOE). The Superintendent of the GDOE may transfer funds from 3 the appropriations made to GDOE within object classes, *except* that no funds shall 4 be transferred into the Personnel Services category, *except* as otherwise provided 5 herein. If a surplus in funding exists within the appropriation for Increments and 6 Promotions and Reclassifications, such amount may be used to support payment of 7 prior year obligations.

8 Section 13. Cost Saving Incentive. The Superintendent of the GDOE is 9 encouraged to implement a Cost Savings Plan, to include but *not* be limited to, 10 consolidation of programs and entities, maximizing on student-teacher ratios, and 11 practicing energy conservation. If the Superintendent is able to implement any cost 12 savings within the GDOE authorized appropriations level, the Superintendent *shall* 13 have that dollar value of savings available for payments of prior year obligations 14 and the purchase of supplies and materials.

Section 14. Authorization to Transfer Funds. Up to the sum of Two 15 Million Two Hundred Eighty Five Thousand Eight Hundred Seventy One Dollars 16 (\$2,285,871) from the Operations Object Categories (220 to 450) in the 17 appropriation in Section 1, is authorized to be transferred to Personnel Object 18 Categories (111 to 115) only if the Personnel Object Categories (111 to 115) 19 appropriation in Section 1 is not sufficient to fund up to the necessary number of 20 teachers required by the GDOE in Fiscal Year 2014. The Superintendent of GDOE 21 shall sign a certification letter stating no negative impact will arise from such 22 transfer and submit it to the Speaker of I Liheslaturan Guåhan five (5) days after 23 such transfer is made. 24

The GDOE *shall not* be authorized to transfer from the Operations Object Categories (220 to 450) in the appropriation in Section 1 to the Personnel Object Categories (111 to 115) in the appropriation in Section 1 for the payment of merit bonuses pursuant to § 6203, Chapter 6, Article 2, Title 4 GCA, salary step
increments pursuant to § 6202, Chapter 6, Article 2, Title 4 GCA, Overtime,
Special Pay, and Employee Reclassifications.

Section 15. Local Funds Reimbursement. Funds appropriated to the 4 GDOE in accordance with the appropriations to the GDOE in this Act shall not be 5 6 used to pay for federally-funded program activities and expenditures, *unless* such payment is specifically authorized by Guam statute or unless such payment is 7 made pursuant to grants that require that local expenditures be made prior to 8 receiving federal reimbursement. The Superintendent of GDOE shall submit a 9 quarterly report within thirty (30) days after each quarter to the Speaker of I 10 Liheslaturan Guåhan, I Maga'låhen Guåhan, and the Office of Public 11 Accountability in a Microsoft Excel file and a written report of all local funds 12 13 expended in Fiscal Year 2013 for federally-funded programs. The report shall contain the details of such expenditures by object class, the number of FTEs 14 working in said programs, the amounts reimbursed by federal funds, and the 15 amounts that have not or will not be reimbursed by federal funds. Said report shall 16 cite the authority to expend local funds for federal programs, shall name the 17 certifying office, and *shall* give the date of every expenditure. 18

Section 16. Merit Bonus Payments. Up to the sum of Six Million Four Hundred Ninety Five Thousand Dollars (\$6,495,000) is authorized from the Line of Credit pursuant to § 22413, Chapter 22, Title 5 of the Guam Code Annotated for the payment of GDOE merit bonuses.

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### Section 17. Appropriation to GDOE for Y Kuentan Salåppe' Prinsepåt.

The amount of One Million Eighty One Thousand One Dollars (**\$1,081,000**) is hereby appropriated from the General Fund to the Guam Department of Education to the fund "*Y Kuentan Salappe' Prinsepat*", established pursuant to Section 10102 of Chapter 10, Title 17 of the Government Code of Guam. Those schools with enrollments of one hundred (100) to five hundred (500) students will
be allocated funds for five hundred (500) students. Schools with enrollments of
five hundred one (501) or greater will be allocated funds based on actual
enrollment.

Within the Fiscal Year 2014, the Office of the Superintendent of Schools 5 shall create the "Y Kuentan Salappe' Prinsepat" budget category allotted to each 6 school at a rate of Thirty Dollars (\$30) per student with the exception of the 7 following schools with student populations at less than five hundred (500) which 8 will receive a minimum of Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000) per school. These 9 schools are as follows: Inarajan Elementary; Merizo Elementary; J.P. Torres; 10 Talofofo Elementary; L.B. Johnson; B.P. Carbullido Elementary; Chief Brodie 11 Memorial Elementary; Harry S. Truman Elementary; Juan Q. San Miguel 12 Elementary; Marcial A. Sablan Elementary; Ordot/Chalan Pago Elementary; and 13 Oceanview Middle. The funds *shall* be made available in two installments, payable 14 in an amount equal to the number of students officially registered at each school as 15 reported in September and February, except for schools stated above. This 16 category, "Y Kuentan Salappe' Prinsepat", shall be exempt from any 17 administrative transfer authority granted or authorized pursuant to this Act. 18

# CHAPTER II EDUCATION PART II – UNIVERSITY OF GUAM

1 Section 1. Legislative Intent. It is the intent of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* to 2 provide a lump sum appropriation to the University of Guam (UOG). The funds 3 *shall* be expended in accordance with the budget request submitted and the 4 priorities stipulated by the University of Guam Board of Regents.

It is also the intent of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* that external funds available to agencies and departments *shall* be taken into consideration to determine the current appropriation level needed. *I Liheslatura* further intends to maximize the use of these funds and that material external funds received *shall* be used to maximize services and programs of the agencies through pursuit of indirect cost reimbursements to reduce the local funding where applicable.

11 Section 2. Appropriation. The amounts in the Subsections below are 12 appropriated from the respective Funds and for the following purposes to UOG for 13 Fiscal Year 2014:

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 (a) General Fund Appropriations for Operations. The sum of Twenty Five Million Six Hundred Sixteen Thousand Seven Hundred Thirteen Dollars (\$25,616,713) is appropriated from the General Fund to the UOG for its operations in Fiscal Year 2014.

(b) Federal Matching Grants-in-Aid. The sum of Four Million
Four Hundred Forty Four Thousand Seven Hundred Fifty Four Dollars
(\$4,444,754) is authorized from Federal Matching Grants-in-Aid to the UOG
for its operations in Fiscal Year 2014.

22 Section 3. Appropriations to the University of Guam for Scholarships 23 and Training Programs. The sum of Three Million Five Hundred Ninety Nine

Thousand Three Hundred Fifty Eight Dollars (\$3,599,358) is appropriated from the 1 2 General Fund to the UOG for Fiscal Year 2014 for the following purposes:

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Student Scholarships, Financial Assistance Programs and (a) Program Administration. Such appropriation in this Section is for: Merit Awards, Student Loans, the Nursing Training Program, Professional and Technical Awards, the Reserve Officer Training Corps (ROTC), Regent Scholarships, Marine Lab Graduate Assistance Programs, Early High School Admission Program, the Pedro "Doc" Sanchez and the administration of all student financial assistance programs. The President of the University of Guam shall allocate this appropriation in order to fund said student 10 scholarships, financial assistance programs and program administration subject to §15113 of Chapter 15, Article 1, Division 3, Title 17 GCA. The 12 Nursing Training Program shall receive no less than Five Hundred 13 Thousand Dollars (\$500,000) of the appropriation contained herein, except 14 that if a surplus exists, such remaining funds shall be distributed to fund 15 other scholarship programs contained in this Subsection. 16

Not more than ten percent (10%) of the total appropriation (b) 17 herein in this Section 3 of Part II of Chapter II shall be used for the 18 19 administration of these programs. The President of the UOG shall post on the UOG's website all reports mandated by this Act and existing law 20regarding the Dr. Antonio C. Yamashita Educator Corps, the Student 21 Scholarships, and Financial Assistance Programs. 22

Section 4. Appropriation for the Aquaculture Development and 23 **Training Center.** The sum of One Hundred Twenty Five Thousand Two Hundred 24 Fifty Four Dollars (\$125,254) is appropriated from the General Fund to the UOG 25 for Fiscal Year 2014 for the sole purpose of funding the continued operations of 26

the Aquaculture Development and Training Center. Said funds *shall not* be
 transferred *or* used for any other purpose.

Appropriation for WERI's Guam Hydrologic Survey. The Section 5. 3 sum of One Hundred Eighty Two Thousand Six Hundred Ninety Four Dollars 4 (\$182,694) is appropriated from the General Fund to the UOG for Fiscal Year 5 2014 for the sole purpose of funding the Guam Hydrologic Survey (GHS) 6 administered by the Water and Environmental Research Institute of the Western 7 Pacific (WERI). WERI shall continue to administer the GHS for those purposes 8 previously established by Guam law. Such funds shall not be transferred or used 9 10 for any other purpose.

Section 6. Appropriation for WERI's Comprehensive Water Resource 11 Monitoring Program. The sum of One Hundred Fifty Five Thousand Six 12 Hundred Twenty Six Dollars (\$155,626) is appropriated from the General Fund to 13 the University of Guam for Fiscal Year 2014 to fund the Water and Environmental 14 Research Institute of the Western Pacific (WERI). Such funds shall be used for the 15 sole purpose of matching the Federal funding for the Comprehensive Water 16 Resource Monitoring Program. WERI shall continue to administer the 17 Comprehensive Water Resource Monitoring Program for those purposes 18 previously established by Guam law. Such funds shall not be transferred or used 19 for any other purpose. 20

Section 7. Appropriation to the University of Guam for the Northern and Southern Soil and Water Conservation Districts (SWCD) Program. The sum of One Hundred Forty Nine Thousand Three Hundred Eighty Four Dollars (\$149,384) is appropriated from the General Fund to the UOG for the operations and activities of the Northern and Southern Soil and Water Conservation Districts (SWCD) Program for Fiscal Year 2014 and *shall* be equally divided between the SWCD. Expenditures from this appropriation *shall* be made upon the approval of the District Directors, with the consent of the SWCD Board, and *shall not* require
further approval by the UOG *or* any other government entity. Such funds *shall not*be transferred *or* used for any other purpose.

The sum of One Hundred Forty-Nine Thousand Three Hundred Eighty-Four Dollars (**\$149,384**) of General Funds appropriated in this Section is authorized for use as a local match for Federal Grants-in-Aid.

Section 8. Appropriation to the UOG for KPRG (Public Radio). The sum of Eighty Nine Thousand Four Hundred Sixty Seven Dollars (\$89,467) is appropriated from the General Fund to the UOG for the KPRG Fiscal Year 2014 operations. The President of the UOG *shall* disburse the funds to KPRG. *No later than* thirty (30) days after the close of each fiscal quarter of Fiscal Year 2014, the General Manager of KPRG *shall* submit to the President of the UOG and post on KPRG's website all reports mandated by this Act.

The sum of Eighty Nine Thousand Four Hundred Sixty Seven Dollars (**\$89,467**) of General Funds appropriated in this Section is authorized for use as a local match for Federal Grants-in-Aid.

17 Section 9. Appropriation to the Guampedia Foundation. The sum of 18 One Hundred Forty Thousand Dollars (\$140,000) is appropriated from the Tourist 19 Attraction Fund to the UOG for the operations of the Guampedia Foundation. 20 Notwithstanding the general provisions of \$30107.1 of Chapter 30, Title 11 GCA 21 and this Act, this appropriation *shall* continue to be available until expended.

The sum of One Hundred Forty Thousand Dollars (**\$140,000**) of Tourist Attraction Funds appropriated in this Section is authorized for use as a local match for Federal Grants-in-Aid.

25 Section 10. UOG Capital Improvements Fund Continuing 26 Appropriation. The sum of Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$500,000) is 27 appropriated from the Guam Highway Fund to the UOG Capital Improvements Fund for the purpose of paying for the debt service pursuant to § 16132, Chapter
 16, Title 17 GCA.

Section 11. Program Revenue and Expenditure Reports. No later than 3 thirty (30) days after the end of each fiscal quarter, the President of the UOG shall 4 post on the UOG's website and submit to I Maga'låhen Guåhan and the Speaker 5 of I Liheslaturan Guåhan, in a Microsoft Excel file and written report, quarterly 6 program revenue and expenditure reports for the Aquaculture Development and 7 Training Center, the WERI Guam Hydrologic Survey, the WERI Comprehensive 8 Water Resource Monitoring Program, the Northern and Southern Soil and Water 9 Conservation Districts Programs, and KPRG. Said reports shall be in the format of 10 basic financial statements or such format as may be prescribed by I Liheslaturan 11 Guåhan. 12

Section 12. Program Annual Reports. The President of the University of 13 Guam shall post on the UOG's website and shall submit to I Maga'låhen Guåhan 14 and the Speaker of I Liheslaturan Guåhan, in a Microsoft Excel file and written 15 report, annual reports for the Aquaculture Development and Training Center, the 16 WERI Guam Hydrologic Survey, the WERI Comprehensive Water Resource 17 Monitoring Program, the Northern and Southern Soil and Water Conservation 18 19 Districts Programs, and KPRG. At a minimum, said reports *shall* include: program mission statements, objectives, sources of revenue, expenditures by budget 20classification, number of employees, contracts, and shall describe program 21 accomplishments in the fiscal year reported. 22

23 Section 13. Scholarships, Financial Assistance and Other Reports. Sixty 24 (60) days after the end of Fiscal Year 2014, the President of the UOG *shall* submit 25 to *I Maga'låhen Guåhan* and the Speaker of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan*, in a Microsoft 26 Excel file and written report, and post on the UOG's website, a report of 27 expenditures from appropriations made in this Act for student scholarships, student

financial assistance and the Dr. Antonio C. Yamashita Educator Corps. Said report 1 shall include each program's name, the number of scholarships or loans issued by 2 each program, the names of the recipients awarded by each program, the university 3 or college each award recipient is attending by each program, the date the 4 scholarship or loan was awarded by each program, the anticipated date of cohort 5 graduation by each program, the total amount of awards or loans, the total amount 6 of loans repaid to date by each program, the balance of the outstanding awards or 7 loans by each program, the amount of collections to date for outstanding loans and 8 repayments due by each program, the number of awards for each field of study by 9 each program, and the number of recipients working to complete their academic 10 and financial obligations by each program. 11

Section 14. Appropriation to the Guam Cancer Trust Fund. The sum of 12 Two Million Fifty One Thousand Two Hundred Four Dollars (\$2,051,204) is 13 appropriated from the Healthy Futures Fund to the UOG for the administration of 14 the Guam Cancer Trust Fund, pursuant to §26603(d)(2) of Chapter 26, Article 6, 15 Title 11, GCA. This appropriation *shall* be used to fund cancer screening, 16 treatment, and support services for Fiscal Year 2014. Any grant to organizations 17 pursuant to §26603(e) (2) of Chapter 26, Article 6, Title 11, GCA shall only be 18 19 used by such organizations for direct services to individuals for cancer screenings, treatment, and support services. The President of the UOG shall submit a monthly 20 report of all expenditures of these funds to the Speaker of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan*. 21

22 Section 15. Transfer Authority for the UOG. Appropriations for the 23 operations of the UOG, contained in Section 2 of Part II of Chapter II of this Act 24 *or* for the prior years, *may* be transferred by the President of UOG out of 25 operations and into the appropriation for statutorily mandated scholarship 26 programs, exclusive of administrative costs, contained in Section 3, Part II, 27 Chapter II of this Act. 1 Section 16. Continuing Appropriation. The appropriations made for the 2 Student Financial Assistance Programs and the Dr. Antonio C. Yamashita 3 Educator Corps to the UOG for Fiscal Year 2013 *shall not* lapse and *shall* continue 4 until fully expended, to include payment of prior year obligations, exclusive of 5 administrative costs for Student Financial Assistance Programs and the Dr. 6 Antonio C. Yamashita Educator Corps.

Section 17. Debt Service Remittance/Reimbursement Exemption for FY 2014. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the UOG *shall* be exempt from remitting or reimbursing any amounts from its tuition revenue or Current Fund to the General Fund or the UOG Bond Fund for the purpose of paying debt service for the General Obligation Bond Business Privilege Tax 2013 Series C or the General Obligation Bonds, Series 1993 A in Fiscal Year 2014.

13 Section 18. UOG Capital Improvements Fund Appropriation. The sum 14 of Two Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$250,000) is appropriated from the 15 Guam Highway Fund to the UOG Capital Improvements Fund for the purpose of 16 paying rental payments due under the lease-back agreement pursuant to Section 18 17 of P.L. 31-229, as amended by P.L. 31-277.

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# CHAPTER II EDUCATION

### PART III - GUAM COMMUNITY COLLEGE

1 Section 1. Legislative Intent. It is the intent of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* to 2 provide a lump sum appropriation to the Guam Community College (GCC). The 3 funds *shall* be expended in accordance with the budget request submitted and the 4 priorities stipulated by the GCC Board of Trustees.

5 It is also the intent of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* that external funds available to 6 agencies and departments *shall* be taken into consideration to determine the current 7 appropriation level needed. *I Liheslatura* further intends to maximize the use of 8 these funds and that material external funds received *shall* be used to maximize 9 services and programs of the agencies through pursuit of indirect cost 10 reimbursements to reduce the local funding where applicable.

11 Section 2. Appropriation. The amounts in the Subsections below are 12 appropriated from the following Funds and for the following purposes to the GCC 13 for Fiscal Year 2014:

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 (a) General Fund Appropriation for Operations. The sum of Thirteen Million Two Hundred Sixty One Thousand Eight Hundred Fifty Nine Dollars (\$13,261,859) is appropriated from the General Fund to GCC for its operations in Fiscal Year 2014.

(b) Appropriation to the GCC Licensed Practical Nursing and
 Vocational Guidance Programs. The sum of Seven Hundred Eighty Two
 Thousand Five Hundred Seventy Dollars (\$782,570) is appropriated from
 the General Fund to the GCC for Fiscal Year 2014 to support the operations
 of the Licensed Practical Nursing Program and the Vocational Guidance
 Program.

GCC Lodging to the Management (c) Appropriation 1 Program/ProStart Program. The sum of Twenty Four Thousand One 2 Hundred Fifty Four Dollars (\$24,154) is appropriated from the Tourist 3 Attraction Fund to the GCC for Fiscal Year 2014 for the Lodging 4 Management Program/ProStart Program. Unexpended funds appropriated 5 for the GCC Lodging Management Program/ProStart Program shall not 6 lapse and *shall* remain available for use in succeeding fiscal years until all 7 said sums are expended. 8

Appropriation to the GCC Apprenticeship Program. The 9 (d)sum of One Million Seven Hundred Seventy Thousand Two Hundred Three 10 Dollars (\$1,770,203) is appropriated from the Manpower Development Fund 11 and Five Hundred Twenty Two Thousand Two Hundred Forty One Dollars 12 (\$522,241) is appropriated from the Tourist Attraction Fund to the GCC for 13 the GCC Apprenticeship Program for Fiscal Year 2014. In addition to the 14 authorization contained in §7120 of Chapter 7, Title 22 GCA, this 15 appropriation herein *shall* be available and authorized to be used by the 16 17 GCC to fund the operations of other programs at GCC, as approved by the Board and Administration of the College, after all Apprenticeship program 18 19 requirements and obligations have been fully funded.

(e) Federal Matching Grants-in-Aid. The sum of One Million
 Sixty Eight Thousand Four Hundred Sixty Three Dollars (\$1,068,463) is
 authorized from Federal Matching Grants-in-Aid to the GCC for its
 operations in Fiscal Year 2014.

Section 3. Reports. The President of GCC *shall* submit quarterly reports to *I Maga'låhen Guåhan* and the Speaker of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan*, in a Microsoft Excel file and written report, thirty (30) days after the end of each fiscal quarter and post said report on the GCC website. Said reports *shall* include, but are *not*  limited to, the number of participants in each GCC program, the amounts expended
from appropriations in this Act by object classification, a description of each
program, the academic courses offered, and the requirements for participation in
each program.

Section 4. GCC Capital Improvements Fund Appropriation. The sum
of One Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$100,000) is appropriated from the Guam
Highway Fund to the GCC Capital Improvements Fund for the purpose of paying
rental payments due under the lease-back agreement pursuant to Section 22 of P.L.
31-229.

# CHAPTER II EDUCATION

### PART IV - GUAM COMMISSION FOR EDUCATOR CERTIFICATION

1 Section 1. Legislative Intent. It is the intent of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* for 2 the Guam Commission for Educator Certification (GCEC) to expend its funds in 3 accordance with the allocations by object class set forth in Section 3 of this Part of 4 this Chapter.

Appropriation. The sum of Two Hundred Two Thousand Six 5 Section 2. Section 4. Government Claims Fund. The sum of One Hundred 3 Thousand Dollars (\$100,000) from the appropriation in Section 1 is authorized to 4 the DOA for the Government Claims Fund for payment of approved government 5 claims in Fiscal Year 2014. The Director of DOA shall, no later than thirty (30) 6 days after the close of each quarter of Fiscal Year 2014, submit a report to the 7 Speaker of I Liheslaturan Guåhan, in a Microsoft Excel file and written report, 8 describing expenditures made pursuant to this appropriation, and post the same on 9 the Department's website. 10

11 Section 5. Government of Guam's General Purpose Financial 12 Statement and Single Audit Report. The sum of Three Hundred Seventy-Seven 13 Thousand Dollars (\$377,000) from the appropriation in Section 1 is authorized to 14 the DOA for the Fiscal Year 2013 Audit of the Government of Guam's General 15 Purpose Financial Statement and the Single Audit Report. The Public Auditor *shall* 16 administer said funds and *shall* oversee the annual audit.

17 Section 6. Single Audit Report on the Tourist Attraction Fund. The 18 sum of Eighteen Thousand Dollars (\$18,000) from the Tourist Attraction Fund 19 appropriation in Section 1 is authorized to the DOA for the Fiscal Year 2013 Audit 20 of the Government of Guam's Tourist Attraction Fund Financial Statement and 21 Single Audit Report. The Public Auditor *shall* administer said funds and *shall* 22 oversee the annual audit.

23 Section 7. Single Audit Report on the Guam Highway Fund. The sum 24 of Eighteen Thousand Dollars (\$18,000) from the Guam Highway Fund 25 appropriation in Section 1 is authorized to the DOA for the Fiscal Year 2013 Audit 26 of the Government of Guam's Highway Fund Financial Statement and Single Audit Report. The Public Auditor *shall* administer said funds and *shall* oversee the
 annual audit.

3 Section 8. Training. The sum of Thirty Thousand Dollars (\$30,000) from 4 the appropriation in Section 1 is authorized to the DOA for the purposes of 5 training.

6 Section 9. Guam Building Code Council. *No more than* the sum of One 7 Hundred Five Thousand Dollars (\$105,000) from the Guam Contractors License 8 Board Fund appropriation in Section 1 is authorized for the Guam Building Code 9 Council (GBCC) for Fiscal Year 2014, and funds *shall* be further allocated as 10 follows:

23 Section 11. Cost-Sharing Initiative Related to the Criminal Justice 24 Information System (CJIS) Integration Project. The sum of Eighty Thousand 25 One Hundred Sixty Four Dollars (\$80,164) from the appropriation in Section 1 is 26 authorized to be paid to the Unified Judiciary for the GPD and DOC share of 27 twenty five percent (25%) each, of the total annual cost of message switch maintenance and National Law Enforcement Telecommunications System
(NLETS) membership totaling One Hundred Sixty Thousand Three Hundred
Twenty Six Dollars (\$160,326) pursuant to the Multi-Agency Agreement to
Facilitate a Cost Sharing Initiative of May 2013 entered into by the Chief of Police,
the Director of Corrections, the Attorney General of Guam, and the Administrator
of the Courts.

Section 12. Cost of Care and Custody for Prisoners Confined in Federal

Facilities. The sum of Six Hundred Ninety-Six Thousand Dollars (\$696,000) from
the appropriation in Section 1 is authorized to the DOC for the payment of Fiscal
Year 2014 obligations for prisoners confined in federal facilities of the Federal
Bureau of Prisons.

12 Section 13. Youth Program Appropriation. The sum of Three Hundred 13 Twenty One Thousand Five Hundred Fifty-Six Dollars (\$321,556) from the 14 appropriation in Section 1 is authorized to the DYA for Fiscal Year 2014 to fund 15 programs contracted out to non-governmental organizations for services to youths 16 who are runaways, homeless, or victims of abuse.

17 Section 14. Closure, Monitoring, and Opening of the Island's Landfills. 18 The sum of One Hundred Ninety-Nine Thousand Three Hundred Fifty-Eight 19 Dollars (\$199,358) from the Solid Waste Operations Fund appropriation in Section 20 1 is authorized to the GEPA. The appropriation recognizes the duties and 21 responsibilities of the Agency related to the closure, monitoring, and opening of 22 the island's landfills.

Section 15. Beach Monitoring. The sum of Ninety-Nine Thousand Three Hundred Fifty-Eight Dollars (**\$99,358**) from the Tourist Attraction Fund appropriation in Section 1 is authorized to the GEPA for the *sole* purpose of beach monitoring. The Tourist Attraction Fund *shall* provide resources to the GEPA for tasks performed by the Agency related to the monitoring of the island's beaches, and any other tourist infrastructure. As tourism represents a major contributor to
the island's economy, this appropriation ensures that the island's beaches are safe
for recreational and commercial use.

This appropriation *shall* continue to be available until expended. This appropriation is *not* subject to transfer or use for any other purpose.

Section 16. Appropriation to the Worker's Compensation Fund. The 6 sum of Seven Hundred Ninety-Eight Thousand Five Hundred Ninety-Three 7 Dollars (\$798,593) from the appropriation in Section 1 is authorized to the DOL 8 for the Worker's Compensation Fund for Fiscal Year 2014 for Worker's 9 Compensation payments pursuant to § 9144 of Chapter 9, Title 22 GCA, including 10 obligations incurred in past years and in the future. Said appropriation may be used 11 to pay for medical, surgical, and other treatment; nurses; hospital services; medical 12 travel and per diem costs; medicine; crutches; and equipment required by a 13 claimant for such period as his injury and the recovery therefrom may require. Said 14 appropriation shall not be expended for disability compensation payments for 15 FTEs funded by this Act. The Director of Labor may use no more than Forty 16 Thousand Dollars (\$40,000) from said appropriation to pay for legal services for 17 Worker's Compensation hearings. 18

Section 17. Maintenance and Repair of Public Restrooms. The sum of 19 Four Hundred Thousand One Hundred Sixty-Six Dollars (\$400,166) from the 20 Tourist Attraction Fund appropriation in Section 1 is authorized to the DPR for the 21 maintenance and repair of restroom facilities in public parks island-wide for Fiscal 22 Year 2014. No later than thirty (30) days after the end of every fiscal quarter, the 23 Director of the DPR shall submit a quarterly report to the Public Auditor and the 24 Speaker of I Liheslaturan Guåhan, in a Microsoft Excel file and written report, of 25 the expenditures from this appropriation and post the same on the Department's 26 website. 27

Section 18. Maintenance of Pool Facilities. The sum of Three Hundred 1 Forty-Nine Thousand Two Hundred Eleven Dollars (\$349,211) from the Tourist 2 Attraction Fund appropriation in Section 1 is authorized to the DPR for the 3 maintenance of pool facilities for Fiscal Year 2014. These funds shall be used for 4 the Northern Pool and the Hagåtña Pool. No later than thirty (30) days after the 5 end of every fiscal quarter, the Director of the DPR shall submit a quarterly report 6 to the Public Auditor and the Speaker of I Liheslaturan Guåhan, in a Microsoft 7 8 Excel file and written report, of the expenditures from this appropriation and post 9 the same on the Department's website.

10 Section 19. Guam Territorial Band. The sum of Forty Thousand Dollars 11 (\$40,000) from the Tourist Attraction Fund appropriation in Section 1 is authorized 12 to the CAHA for the Guam Territorial Band. Notwithstanding the general 13 provisions of \$30107.1 of Chapter 30 of Title 11 GCA and this Act, this 14 appropriation *shall* continue to be available until expended.

15

### Section 20. Public Streetlights Appropriations.

(a) Special Fund Appropriations. The sum of Three Million Six
 Hundred Eight Thousand Two Hundred Twelve Dollars (\$3,608,212) from the
 Streetlight Fund appropriation in Section 1 is authorized to the Department of
 Administration to pay the Guam Power Authority for the operation of public
 streetlights in Fiscal Year 2014.

(b) The sum of Four Million Two Hundred Ten Thousand Sixty Three
Dollars (\$4,210,063) from the Guam Highway Fund appropriation in Section 1 is
authorized to the Department of Administration to pay the Guam Power Authority
for the operation of public streetlights in Fiscal Year 2014.

Section 21. Veterans Affairs Office Authorization. The sum of Six

 from the appropriation in Section 1 is authorized to the VAO for its operations.

Section 22. Fleet and Fuel Management Monitoring System. The sum of 1 2 Two Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$250,000) from the appropriation in Section 1 is authorized to the DPW to fund up to one (1) year of contracted services for 3 fleet and fuel management monitoring systems for all operable buses maintained 4 and operated by the Bus Operations Division of the DPW. Services shall include, 5 6 but is *not* limited to, the installation of tracking devices which provide real-time information that generates global position system coordinates, idle events, 7 odometer readings, tracking of engine hours, and other necessary features. 8

### **CHAPTER X**

### **GUAM VISITORS BUREAU**

**Section 1.** Appropriation. The amounts below are appropriated from the Tourist Attraction Fund (TAF) to the Guam Visitors Bureau (GVB) for its operations in Fiscal Year 2014. This appropriation *shall* be expended in accordance with the allocations outlined in this Section. Notwithstanding the general provisions of § 30107.1 of Chapter 30, Title 11 GCA and this Act, this appropriation *shall not* lapse but *shall* continue to be available until expended.

Appropriation to GVB for Special Projects. The sum of Two 14 Section 2. Million Dollars (\$2,000,000) is appropriated from the TAF to the GVB to fund the 15 Tumon and Hagåtña Beach Cleaning, the Tumon Landscaping and Maintenance, 16 the Island Roadway Maintenance, the San Vitores Road Streetlight and Sidewalk 17 Repair, the Tumon and Hagåtña Bay Surveillance System Phase II, the Visitor 18 Safety Patrol Program, the Holiday Illumination Project, and Contract 19 Administration and Inspection Services in Fiscal Year 2014. After all of the 20 foregoing projects within this Section are fully funded, the GVB Board of 21 Directors may approve the use of surplus funds for other Board-approved projects. 22 Notwithstanding the general provisions of § 30107.1 of Chapter 30, Title 11 GCA 23 and this Act, this appropriation *shall* continue to be available until expended. 24

Section 3. Appropriation to GVB for På'å Taotao Tåno'. The sum of

Eighty Thousand Dollars (\$80,000) is appropriated from the TAF to the GVB for 1 the Fiscal Year 2014 operations of På'å Taotao Tåno' to provide for the local 2 match for the AmeriCorps Program, the ANA SEDS Grant, and the Dinaña 3 Minagof Dance Competition. Notwithstanding the general provisions of § 30107.1 4 of Chapter 30, Title 11 GCA and this Act, this appropriation shall continue to be 5 available until expended. No less than Forty Thousand Dollars (\$40,000) of the 6 appropriation herein shall be disbursed to organizations who are members of På'à 7 Taotao Tåno' for their programs. 8

Section 4. Appropriation to GVB for the Historic Inalåhan 9 Foundation. The sum of Twenty Five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000) is appropriated 10 from the TAF to the GVB for the Fiscal Year 2014 operations of the Historic 11 Inalåhan Foundation. Notwithstanding the general provisions of § 30107.1 of 12 Chapter 30, Title 11 GCA and this Act, this appropriation shall continue to be 13 available until expended. 14

15 Section 5. Appropriation to GVB for the Pacific War Museum 16 Foundation. The sum of Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000) is appropriated from 17 the TAF to the GVB for Fiscal Year 2014 operations of Pacific War Museum 18 Foundation. Notwithstanding the general provisions of § 30107.1 of Chapter 30, 19 Title 11 GCA and this Act, this appropriation *shall* continue to be available until 20 expended.

Section 6. Appropriation to GVB for the Tourism Education Council.
The sum of Thirty Thousand Dollars (\$30,000) is appropriated from the TAF to the
GVB for the Fiscal Year 2014 operations of the Tourism Education Council.
Notwithstanding the general provisions of \$ 30107.1 of Chapter 30, Title 11 GCA
and this Act, this appropriation *shall* continue to be available until expended.

Section 7. Appropriation to GVB for the Håya Cultural Preservation
 Foundation (Sinangån-ta Outreach). The sum of Fifteen Thousand Dollars

(\$15,000) is appropriated from the TAF to the GVB for the Fiscal Year 2014
 operations of the *Håya* Cultural Preservation Foundation (*Sinangån-ta* Outreach).
 Notwithstanding the general provisions of § 30107.1 of Chapter 30, 11 GCA and
 this Act, this appropriation *shall* continue to be available until expended.

5 Section 8. Appropriation to GVB for the Micronesian Cruise 6 Association. The sum of Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000) is appropriated from 7 the TAF to the GVB for Fiscal Year 2014 operations of the Micronesian Cruise 8 Association. Notwithstanding the general provisions of § 30107.1 of Chapter 30, 9 Title 11 GCA and this Act, this appropriation *shall* continue to be available until 10 expended.

11 Section 9. Appropriation to GVB for the Guam International Film 12 Festival. The sum of Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000) is appropriated from the 13 TAF to the GVB for Fiscal Year 2014 operations of the Guam International Film 14 Festival. Notwithstanding the general provisions of § 30107.1 of Chapter 30, Title 15 11 GCA and this Act, this appropriation *shall* continue to be available until 16 expended.

Section 10. Appropriation to GVB for the Guam FESTPAC & Folklife 17 Festival Trust Account. (a) The sum of Two Hundred Thousand Dollars 18 19 (\$200,000) is appropriated from the TAF to the GVB for deposit into the Guam FESTPAC & Folklife Festival Trust Account. Notwithstanding the general 20 provisions of § 30107.1 of Title 11 GCA and this Act, this appropriation shall 21 continue to be available until expended and shall not be subject to any transfer 22 23 authority of *I Maga'låhen Guåhan* or any inter-fund borrowing or use for any other purpose. 24

(b) Notwithstanding any other provision of law, in addition to the sum of
Two Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$200,000) appropriated in the previous paragraph
(a) above, all delinquent Hotel Occupancy Tax revenue due for any period prior to

September 30, 2013 *shall* be appropriated from the TAF to GVB for deposit into the FESTPAC & Folklife Festival Trust Account upon collection. Notwithstanding the general provisions of § 30107.1 of Chapter 30, Title 11, GCA and this Act, this appropriation *shall* continue to be available until expended and *shall not* be subject to any transfer authority of *I Maga'låhen Guåhan* or *any* inter-fund borrowing or use for any other purpose.

**Section 11. Appropriation to GVB for the GVB Rainy Day Fund.** The sum of Two Hundred Thousand Dollars (**\$200,000**) is appropriated from the TAF to the GVB for deposit in the Rainy Day Fund. Notwithstanding the general provisions of § 30107.1 of Chapter 30, Title 11 GCA and this Act, this appropriation *shall* continue to be available until expended and *shall not* be subject to any transfer authority of *I Maga'låhen Guåhan* or *any* inter-fund borrowing or use for any other purpose.

14 Section 12. Appropriation to GVB for the *Humåtak* Foundation. The 15 sum of Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000) is appropriated from the TAF to the GVB 16 for Fiscal Year 2014 operations of the *Humåtak* Foundation for the purpose of the 17 operation of a Heritage Museum at the former F.Q. Sanchez Elementary School. 18 Notwithstanding the general provisions of § 30107.1, Chapter 30, Title 11 GCA 19 and this Act, this appropriation *shall* continue to be available until expended.

Section 13. Appropriation to GVB for the *Amot Taotao Tano* Farm. The sum of Twenty Five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000) is appropriated from the TAF to the GVB for Fiscal Year 2014 operations of the *Amot Taotao Tano* Farm for the purpose of the preservation of traditional *Chamorro* healing arts. Notwithstanding the general provisions of § 30107.1, Chapter 30, Title 11 GCA and this Act, this appropriation *shall* continue to be available until expended.

26 Section 14. Forensic Audit of Hotel Occupancy Tax. The sum of Fifty 27 Thousand Dollars (\$50,000) is appropriated from the TAF to the DOA to procure a comprehensive audit of Hotel Occupancy Tax filings, return payments, and collections. The audit *must* be conducted by a Certified Forensic Financial Analyst and the audit period *shall* be for *no less than* the five (5) tax years prior to the enactment of this Act. The Public Auditor *shall* administer said funds and *shall* sasist in conducting the audit to the greatest extent possible. Notwithstanding the general provisions of § 30107.1, Chapter 30, Title 11 GCA and this Act, this appropriation *shall* continue to be available until expended.

8 Section 15. Service and Reporting Requirements. (a) Organizations 9 receiving funding from the TAF *shall* provide community service in the amount of 10 ten (10) hours of service per One Thousand Dollars (**\$1,000**) appropriated to them 11 for activities and/or events. These services *shall* be consistent with the services 12 provided pursuant to the respective TAF appropriations.

(b) All organizations that receive TAF pursuant to this Act *shall* provide a
 budgetary breakdown by object category to the GVB. These organizations *shall* attest under penalty of perjury that they are meeting the requirements of this
 Section.

Section 16. Authority to Transfer. The Board of Directors of the GVB may transfer funds from the appropriations made to GVB in Section 1 of this Chapter, *except* that no funds shall be transferred into General Administration.

### Section 17. Creation of the Hotel Occupancy Tax Surplus Fund.

(a) There is hereby created, separate and apart from other funds of the
government of Guam, a fund known as "The Hotel Occupancy Tax Surplus Fund"
(Fund). The Fund *shall* be kept in a separate bank account and *shall not* be subject
to any transfer authority of *I Maga'låhen Guåhan* or *any* inter-fund borrowing.

25 (b) The Director of the Bureau of Budget and Management Research 26 (BBMR) *shall* create a twelve (12)-month revenue budget based on the TAF 27 revenue estimate in Chapter I, Section 2, relative to statistical weighting of historical collections by month, by collection category. The report *shall* be
submitted to *I Maga'låhen Guåhan* and the Speaker of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan*within thirty (30) days upon the enactment of this Act.

4 (c) Notwithstanding any other provision of law, quarterly revenue 5 collections in excess of the revenue budget submitted by the BBMR pursuant to 6 Subsection (b) of this Section, *shall* be transferred and deposited from the TAF to 7 the Fund on the thirtieth (30<sup>th</sup>) day after the end of each quarter.

8 (d) The Director of Administration *shall* report to the Speaker of *I* 9 *Liheslatura* and the Office of Finance and Budget the amount of quarterly revenue 10 collections in excess of the revenue budget submitted by the BBMR pursuant to 11 Subsection (b) of this Section, on the twenty-fifth (25<sup>th</sup>) day after the end of each 12 quarter.

(e) The identification and recordation of such excess revenues *shall* be
performed by the Department of Administration in coordination with the BBMR
and the Department of Revenue and Taxation.

### CHAPTER XI

#### MISCELLANEOUS APPROPRIATIONS

Section 1. Section 7 of Chapter XI of Public Law 30-196 is hereby
 *repealed* and *reenacted* to read:

### "Section 7. The Government of Guam Competitive Wage Act of 2011.

(a) Implementation of the Government-wide Position 4 Classification, Compensation & Benefits Study. The sum of Ten Million 5 Nine Hundred Sixteen Thousand Six Hundred Sixty Seven Dollars 6 7 (\$10,916,667) is hereby appropriated from the General Fund to the Department of Administration for the purpose of implementing the salary 8 9 adjustments in Fiscal Year 2014, as recommended by the comprehensive 10 Government-wide Position, Classification, Compensation and Benefits 11 Study Plan, conducted by the Hay Group, Inc. pursuant to Section 13 of Public Law No. 29-52, and the Governor's Executive Order No. 2006-21. 12 This appropriation precedes transmittal by *I Maga'lahi* to *I Liheslatura* of a 13 final, implementable plan to adjust compensation, classification and benefits 14 for approval by I Liheslaturan Guåhan; and notwithstanding any other 15 provision of law or this Act, this Section *shall* be effective *only* upon formal 16 17 adoption by *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* of a plan consistent with the Hay Group, Inc. recommendations and consistent with this Act. 18

(b) The final, implementable plan to adjust compensation,
classification and benefits *shall* be submitted to the Speaker of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan no later than* January 15, 2014. The implementation
of salary increases due from said plan *shall* be retroactively applied effective
January 1, 2014 upon passage of a Legislative Resolution endorsing the
plan.

Funds appropriated in Subsection (a) *shall* be used *only* for the 1 (c)2 salary adjustments of permanent classified personnel filling authorized fulltime equivalent (FTE) positions, as approved in the department or agency's 3 Fiscal Year 2014 budget, or under this Act, and as recommended in the 4 Comprehensive Government-wide Positions, Classifications, and Benefits 5 Study Plan pursuant to Section 13 of Public Law 29-52, and Executive Order 6 2006-21. It is the intent of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* to not include position(s) 7 such as unclassified personnel, limited term appointees or any personnel 8 under non-permanent status, as part of the Government-wide pay adjustment 9 authorized herein, and to disallow the use of the funds appropriated in 10 11 Subsection (a) of this Section for such use.

(d)The appropriation contained in Subsection (a) *shall* be allotted 12 13 *pro rata* by the Bureau of Budget and Management Research to all branches, departments and agencies funded in this Act with the exception of the Guam 14 Memorial Hospital. The pro rata allotment formula shall be total payroll, 15 unclassified personnel, limited term appointees or any personnel under non-16 permanent status for the Branch, Department or Agency divided by the sum 17 18 of all branch, department and agency payroll, unclassified personnel, limited 19 term appointees or any personnel under non-permanent status funded in this 20 Act.

(e) Transfer Exemption. The funds appropriated in this Subsection(a) are *not* subject to *I Maga'låhen Guåhan's* transfer authority."

23 Section 2. Appropriations to Retirees for Supplemental Annuity
24 Benefits and for Other Costs.

(a) The sum of Nine Million Six Hundred Sixty Thousand Dollars
 (\$9,660,000) is appropriated from the General Fund to the Supplemental Annuity
 Benefits Special Fund for Fiscal Year 2014 for direct payments to government of

Guam retirees who retired prior to October 1, 1995, or their survivors, for the continuing payment of Four Thousand Two Hundred Thirty Eight Dollars (\$4,238) per year in supplemental annuity benefits, consisting of the sums of One Thousand Two Hundred Dollars (\$1,200), One Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$1,500), Seven Hundred Dollars (\$700), and Eight Hundred Thirty Eight Dollars (\$838) in annual benefits authorized by various General Appropriation Acts.

7 (b) No retiree who is eligible for Retiree Supplemental Annuity Benefits 8 provided for in Subsection (a) hereof shall receive said benefits *if* her or his annual 9 retirement annuity, excluding survivor benefits and excluding the supplemental 10 benefits authorized herein, is *greater than* Forty Thousand Dollars (**\$40,000**). No 11 retiree who is eligible for Retiree Supplemental Annuity Benefits shall receive 12 *more than* the sum of Forty Thousand Dollars (**\$40,000**) in combined retirement 13 annuities and Supplemental Annuity Benefits in any one (1) fiscal year.

The Director of DOA shall coordinate with the Director of the 14 (c) Government of Guam Retirement Fund (GGRF) and shall disburse to the retirees 15 or their survivors, the supplemental annuity benefits provided for in Subsection (a) 16 of this Section. The GGRF shall provide the Director of DOA with the information 17 needed to affect disbursement. To realize savings associated with the cost of 18 preparing separate checks and mailing separate checks for the supplemental 19 annuity for retirees, the Director of DOA may enter into a Memorandum of 20 Understanding (MOU) with the GGRF in which the Director of DOA remits the 21 supplemental annuity payments to the GGRF for disbursement to the retiree at the 22 same time the regular annuity check is issued, or by including the supplemental 23 annuity in the regular annuity check issued by the GGRF. 24

(d) Funds held in the Supplemental Annuity Benefits Special Fund *shall not* be commingled with the General Fund or any other fund, *shall* be held in a

separate bank account that shall continue to be administered by the Director of 1 DOA, and shall not be subject to I Maga'låhen Guåhan's transfer authority. 2

For Fiscal Year 2014, the Guam Power Authority, the A.B. Won Pat (e) 3 International Airport Authority, the Guam Economic Development Authority, the 4 Guam Housing Corporation, the Government of Guam Retirement Fund, the Jose 5 D. Leon Guerrero Commercial Port, the Guam Waterworks Authority and the 6 Guam Visitors Bureau shall remit to DOA an amount equal to the number of 7 retirees eligible pursuant to Subsection (a) hereof who have retired from that entity 8 multiplied by Four Thousand Two Hundred Thirty Eight Dollars (\$4,238). Said 9 remittances shall be paid in two (2) equal installments on or before October 10, 10 2013, and April 15, 2014, respectively. Said remittances shall not be subject to I 11 Maga'låhen Guåhan's transfer authority. 12

For Fiscal Year 2014, the Guam Power Authority, the A.B. Won Pat 13 (f)International Airport Authority, the Guam Economic Development Authority, the 14 Guam Housing Corporation, the Government of Guam Retirement Fund, the Jose 15 D. Leon Guerrero Commercial Port, the Guam Waterworks Authority and the 16 Guam Visitors Bureau shall remit to the GGRF payments for medical, dental, and 17 life insurance payments for retirees who have retired from those respective 18 agencies. Said remittances shall be paid in two (2) equal installments on or before 19 20 October 10, 2013, and on or before April 1, 2014, respectively. The agencies' remittances for medical, dental and life insurance mandated herein are ex gratia 21 payments, and are for Fiscal Year 2014 only. 22

For Fiscal Year 2014, the sum of Two Million Ninety Nine Thousand (g) 23 Four Hundred Dollars (\$2,099,400) is appropriated from the General Fund to the 24 GGRF to pay the cost of Medicare premiums, inclusive of premiums for Medicare 25 Parts B and D, for government of Guam retirees and their survivors domiciled on 26 27 Guam, and who are eligible to receive Social Security income benefits, and who

are eligible to enroll in the government of Guam Group Health Insurance Program.
 No government of Guam retiree or their survivor shall be required to enroll in the
 Government of Guam Health Insurance Program in order to receive the
 reimbursement.

(h) For Fiscal Year 2014, the sum of Two Hundred Fifty One Thousand
Dollars (\$251,000) is appropriated from the General Fund to the GGRF for *I Maga'låhi* and *I Segundu Na Maga'låhi/I Segundu Na Maga'håga* pensions.

8 (i) For Fiscal Year 2014, the sum of Three Hundred Fifty Eight 9 Thousand Dollars (**\$358,000**) is appropriated from the General Fund to the GGRF 10 for retirement annuities for former judges and justices of the Superior Court and 11 Supreme Court of Guam.

(j) The GGRF Board of Trustees *shall* enact and, if necessary, amend administrative regulations that establish procedures to ensure the proper submission, receipt and accounting of all sums remitted pursuant to Subsections (f) and (g) hereof.

Section 3. Survivor Supplemental Annuity Additions. §8135(d)(6) of
 Chapter 8, Article 1, Title 4 GCA, is hereby *amended* to read:

"(6) the prospective payment of supplemental benefits for the period
of October 1, 2013 through September 30, 2014 for survivors of those
employees who retired prior to October 1, 1995, to be paid in the following
manner:

(i) Four Thousand Two Hundred Thirty Eight Dollars
(\$4,238) in Retiree Supplemental Annuity Benefits, known as the sum
of One Thousand Two Hundred Dollars (\$1,200), One Thousand Five
Hundred Dollars (\$1,500), Seven Hundred Dollars (\$700), and Eight
Hundred Thirty Eight Dollars (\$838) in annual benefits formerly
contained in various General Appropriation Acts.

(ii) No person eligible for Retiree Supplemental Annuity 1 Benefits provided for in this Section shall receive such benefits if his 2 regular annual retirement annuity exclusive of the supplemental 3 amounts authorized hereby *exceeds* Forty Thousand Dollars 4 (\$40,000). No persons eligible for Retiree Supplemental Annuity 5 Benefits shall receive *more than* the sum of Forty Thousand Dollars 6 (\$40,000) in combined retirement annuities and supplemental 7 retirement annuities. 8

Any retiree or survivor eligible to receive 9 (iii) the supplemental annuity may waive their supplemental annuity payment 10 authorized herein by the filing of a notarized affidavit waiving such 11 payment with the Retirement Fund." 12

#### Section 4. Disability Supplemental Annuity Additions. §8129(g) of 13 Chapter 8, Article 1, Title 4 GCA is hereby *amended* to read: 14

15

Any disability retirement annuitant who commenced receiving "(g) a disability retirement annuity prior to October 1, 1995, and who is entitled 16 to disability retirement benefits under this Chapter shall receive, during the 17 period commencing on October 1, 2013 and ending on September 30, 2014, 18 prospective non-cumulative supplemental annuity benefits as follows: 19

Four Thousand Two Hundred Thirty-Eight Dollars (1)20 (\$4,238) in Retiree Supplemental Annuity Benefits, known as the sum 21 of One Thousand Two Hundred Dollars (\$1,200), One Thousand Five 22 Hundred Dollars (\$1,500), Seven Hundred Dollars (\$700), and Eight 23 Hundred Thirty-Eight Dollars (\$838) in annual benefits formerly 24 contained in various General Appropriation Acts. 25

No persons eligible for Retiree Supplemental Annuity 26 (2)Benefits provided for in Paragraph (g) of this Section shall receive 27

such benefit if their regular annual retirement annuity, excluding
 survivor benefits, prior to the supplemental amounts herein *exceeds* Forty Thousand Dollars (\$40,000). No persons eligible for Retiree
 Supplemental Annuity Benefits shall receive *more than* the sum of
 Forty Thousand Dollars (\$40,000) in combined retirement annuities
 and supplemental retirement annuities.

7 (3) Any disability retirement annuitant eligible to receive the
8 supplemental annuity may waive their supplemental annuity payment
9 authorized herein by the filing of a notarized affidavit waiving such
10 payment with the Retirement Fund."

Section 5. Retirees Supplemental Annuity Additions. §8122(d)(6) of
 Chapter 8, Article 1, Title 4 GCA is hereby *amended* to read as follows:

- "(6) Any retirement annuitant who commenced receiving a
  retirement annuity *prior to* October 1, 1995, and who is entitled to
  retirement benefits under this Chapter, *shall* receive, during the period
  commencing on October 1, 2013 and ending on September 30, 2014,
  prospective, non-cumulative supplemental annuity benefits as follows:
- (i) Four Thousand Two Hundred Thirty Eight Dollars
  (\$4,238) in Retiree Supplemental Annuity Benefits, known as the sum
  of One Thousand Two Hundred Dollars (\$1,200), One Thousand Five
  Hundred Dollars (\$1,500), Seven Hundred Dollars (\$700), and Eight
  Hundred Thirty Eight Dollars (\$838) in annual benefits formerly
  contained in various General Appropriation Acts.
- (ii) No retiree who is eligible for Retiree Supplemental
  Annuity Benefits provided for in this Section shall receive such
  benefit if her/his regular annual retirement annuity, excluding the
  supplemental amounts authorized herein and survivor benefits,

*exceeds* Forty Thousand Dollars (\$40,000). A retiree who is eligible
 for Retiree Supplemental Annuity Benefits *shall* receive *no more than* Forty Thousand Dollars (\$40,000) in combined retirement annuities
 and supplemental retirement annuities.

5 (iii) Any retiree or survivor eligible to receive the 6 supplemental annuity may waive their supplemental annuity payment 7 authorized herein by the filing of a notarized affidavit waiving such 8 payment with the Retirement Fund."

9

#### Section 6. Appropriation for Cost of Living Allowance (COLA).

(a) *I Maga'låhen Guåhan shall* provide, by a single lump sum payment, a
Cost of Living Allowance (COLA) of One Thousand Eight Hundred Dollars
(\$1,800) to each retiree of the GGRF who is retired as of September 30, 2013, or
his survivor, no later than November 1, 2013. The sum of Eleven Million Six
Hundred Sixty Five Thousand Eight Hundred Dollars (\$11,665,800) is
appropriated from the General Fund to the DOA to pay said COLA.

(b) The Guam Power Authority, the A. B. Won Pat International Airport 16 Authority, the Guam Economic Development Authority, the Guam Housing 17 Corporation, the Government of Guam Retirement Fund, the Jose D. Leon 18 19 Guerrero Commercial Port, the Guam Waterworks Authority and the Guam Visitors Bureau shall pay a COLA in a single payment of One Thousand Eight 20 Hundred Dollars (\$1,800) to every Government of Guam Retirement Fund retiree 21 who retired from each respective aforementioned agency as of September 30, 22 23 2013, or his survivor, no later than November 1, 2013.

(c) Each agency mentioned in Subsection (b) *shall* reimburse the General
Fund for any COLA paid by the Fund in Fiscal Year 2014 to retirees who have
retired from that agency and their survivors, *no later than* December 31, 2013.

Any retiree or survivor eligible to receive the COLA may waive their (d) 1 2 payment authorized herein by filing a notarized affidavit waiving such payment with the entity responsible for the Retirement Fund. 3

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If a retiree is both a Defined Benefit and a Defined Contribution (e) Retiree, her or his survivor shall only be entitled to a single COLA payment. 5

Section 7. Reimbursement to the Capitol District Fund. The sum of 6 Four Hundred Thirty-One Thousand Dollars (\$431,000) is appropriated from the 7 General Fund to I Liheslaturan Guåhan for the reimbursement of funds from the 8 General Fund to the Capitol District Fund for Fiscal Year 2014. 9

Guam Solid Waste Authority Board Appropriation. The Section 8. 10 sum of One Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$100,000) is hereby appropriated from the 11 Solid Waste Operations Fund to the Guam Solid Waste Authority for expenditure 12 by the Guam Solid Waste Authority Board of Directors. The appropriation 13 recognizes the duties and responsibilities of the Board of Directors related to the 14 closure, monitoring, and opening of the island's landfills and its need for legal and 15 administrative support. 16

#### Section 9. Retiree Medical, Dental and Life Insurance Expenses 17 Appropriated to the Government of Guam Retirement Fund (GGRF). 18

19 (a) The sum of Seventeen Million Six Hundred Twenty-Two Thousand Five Hundred Eighty-Four Dollars (\$17,622,584) is appropriated from the General 20 Fund and Three Million Three Hundred Seventy-One Thousand Nine Hundred 21Ninety Dollars (\$3,371,990) is appropriated from the Section 2718 Fund to the 22 GGRF to pay for retiree group medical insurance premiums to continue existing 23 programs currently contained in the semi-monthly payments. 24

The sum of Nine Hundred Sixty-One Thousand Six Hundred Thirteen 25 (b) Dollars (\$961,613) is appropriated from the General Fund to the GGRF to pay for 26

retiree group dental insurance premiums to continue existing programs currently
 contained in the semi-monthly payments.

3 (c) The sum of One Million Ninety-Four Thousand Five Hundred Sixty-4 Two Dollars (**\$1,094,562**) is appropriated from the General Fund to the GGRF to 5 pay for retiree life insurance subsidy to continue existing programs currently 6 contained in the semi-monthly payments.

- 7 Section 10. Appropriation for the Acquisition of Property for the *Tiyan*8 Parkway Project.
- 9 (a) Appropriation. The sum of One Million Three Hundred 10 Thousand Dollars (**\$1,300,000**) is hereby appropriated from the General 11 Fund to the Department of Public Works for the acquisition of property for 12 the *Tiyan* Parkway Project.
- (b) Authorization. The Department of Public Works is hereby
  authorized to expend the funds appropriated in this Section to purchase Lot
  No. 2097 (total area: 9,145 sq. meters) and Lot No. 2085 (total area: 17,494
  sq. meters) if the landowners voluntarily agree to the sale. All lots are
  located in the municipality of *Barrigada*. Nothing herein shall authorize
  eminent domain proceedings for these or any other lot.
- (c) Unused Appropriation. Unexpended funds *shall* continue to be
  available to the Department of Public Works for future acquisitions of Lots
  2093, 2088, and 2087-1.
- (d) Reporting Requirement. The Director of the Department of
  Public Works *shall* submit a report to *I Maga'låhen Guåhan* and *I Liheslaturan Guåhan, no later than* one hundred eighty (180) days after the
  date of enactment of this Act, detailing all the transactions pertaining to the
  funds appropriated herein.
- 27

(e) Effective Date. This Act shall be effective upon enactment.

## CHAPTER XII MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS

# **Section 1. Retirement Option for Government of Guam Employees.** A member of the Government of Guam Retirement Fund who is eligible for retirement may retire upon the complete remittance of his outstanding individual contributions to the Fund, including the employee and employer retirement contributions. Any and all fees, interest at actuarial rates, and penalties required by the Government of Guam Retirement Fund *shall* be paid by the Government.

This Section shall not restrict the continuing remittance of existing 7 Retirement Fund contributions as required by law or by the Government of Guam 8 Retirement Fund. By the fifteenth (15<sup>th</sup>) day of each month, the Director of the 9 Government of Guam Retirement Fund shall provide a detailed report to the 10 Speaker of I Liheslaturan Guåhan regarding said remittances and the number of 11 12 retirements pursuant to this Section during the previous month. Nothing herein shall be construed to abrogate any provision of § 8137(h) of Chapter 8, Title 4 13 GCA. 14

Temporary Employment of Retired Corrections Officers. 15 Section 2. The Department of Corrections (DOC) may hire retired Guam Corrections Officers 16 if a critical need arises. Retired corrections officers hired under this Section may 17 receive their retirement annuity while employed on this temporary basis. Officers 18 may *only* be hired under this Section to fill positions left vacant because of military 19 activation of corrections officers or absence due to a long term disability status 20 which has been certified by a medical doctor. The DOC may exercise this hiring 21 authority provided its authorized budget for personnel is not exceeded in filling 22 those positions and *shall* be terminated when the incumbent returns from military 23 service. Retired officers may be hired *only* in the ranks of Corrections Officers 24 Supervisor I and below, only at Step I, and shall not receive sick and annual leave. 25

Officers hired under this Section *shall* meet requirements for the position in question, except for written examinations, and the Director of DOC *shall* certify that every retiree hired is fit for duty. Notwithstanding §8121(a) of Chapter 8, Article 1, Title 4 GCA, retirees hired temporarily pursuant to this Section may continue to receive retirement benefits. Any employee hired under this Section *shall* only be eligible to enroll in the Government of Guam Health Insurance Program as an active employee.

**Temporary Employment of Retired Guam Police Officers.** Section 3. 8 The Guam Police Department (GPD) may hire retired Guam Police Officers if a 9 critical need arises because of military activation of police officers or absence due 10 to a long term disability status which has been certified by a medical doctor. The 11 GPD may exercise this hiring authority provided its authorized budget for 12 personnel is *not* exceeded. The retiree hired *shall* fill such a vacant position and 13 shall be terminated when the incumbent returns from military service. Retired 14 officers may be hired only at the ranks of Sergeant I and below, only at Step I, and 15 shall not receive sick and annual leave. Officers hired under this Section shall first 16 meet the requirements for the position in question, except for written examinations, 17 and the Chief of Police of GPD shall certify that every retiree hired is fit for duty. 18 19 Notwithstanding §8121(a) of Chapter 8, Title 4 GCA, retirees hired temporarily pursuant to this Section may continue to receive retirement benefits. The GPD may 20 pay for Civilian Volunteer Police Reserve stipends to the Police Reserve Officer to 21 provide temporary services because of military activation of the regular police 22 officer. Any employee hired under this Section shall only be eligible to enroll in 23 the Government of Guam Health Insurance Program as an active employee. 24

25 Section 4. Temporary Employment of Retired Guam Firefighters. The 26 Guam Fire Department (GFD) may hire retired GFD firefighters if a critical need 27 arises because of military activation of GFD firefighters or absence due to a long

term disability status which has been certified by a medical doctor. The GFD may 1 2 exercise this hiring authority provided its authorized budget for personnel is not exceeded. The retirees hired shall fill such a vacant position and shall be 3 terminated when the incumbent returns from military service. Retired fire 4 personnel may be hired only at the ranks of Fire Specialist and below, only at Step 5 I, and *shall not* receive sick and annual leave. Retired firefighters hired under this 6 Section *shall* first meet the requirements for the position in question, except for 7 8 written examinations, and the Fire Chief of GFD shall certify that every retiree hired is fit for duty. Notwithstanding §8121(a) of Chapter 8, Title 4 GCA, retirees 9 hired temporarily pursuant to this Section may continue to receive retirement 10 benefits. Any employee hired under this Section shall only be eligible to enroll in 11 the Government of Guam Health Insurance Program as an active employee. 12

Section 5. Employment of Temporary Retired 13 Customs and Quarantine Officers. The Customs and Quarantine Agency (CQA) may hire 14 retired Customs and Quarantine Officers if a critical need arises as a result of 15 military activation of Customs Officers or absence due to a long term disability 16 17 status which has been certified by a medical doctor or when vacancies cannot be filled within six (6) months because of the lack of qualified applicants. The CQA 18 may exercise this hiring authority provided its authorized budget for personnel is 19 not exceeded. The retired officer shall fill such a vacant position and shall be 20 21 terminated when the incumbent returns from military service or when a fullyqualified applicant is available. Retired officers may be hired only in the ranks of 22 Customs Officer III and below, only at Step I, and shall not receive sick and annual 23 leave. Retirees hired pursuant to this Section shall meet requirements for the 24 position in question, except for written examinations, and the Director of COA 25 shall certify that every retiree hired is fit for duty. The requirements of Chapter 51, 26 Title 17 GCA are waived for employment pursuant hereto *except* for §51104(b)(4). 27

Notwithstanding §8121(a) of Chapter 8, Title 4 GCA, retirees hired temporarily
 pursuant to this Section may continue to receive retirement benefits. Any employee
 hired under this Section *shall* only be eligible to enroll in the Government of Guam
 Health Insurance Program as an active employee.

Section 6. **Temporary Employment of Retired Department of Revenue** 5 and Taxation Employees. The Department of Revenue and Taxation (DRT) may 6 hire retired employees of the DRT when a critical need arises or absence due to a 7 long term disability status which has been certified by a medical doctor. The DRT 8 may exercise this hiring authority provided its authorized budget for personnel is 9 not exceeded in the areas of Tax Collection, Taxpayer Assistance, Tax 10 Investigation, Auditing, and Tax Processing. Said retirees shall be hired at Step I 11 for the position in question and *shall not* receive sick and annual leave. 12 Notwithstanding §8121(a) of Chapter 8, Title 4 GCA, retirees hired temporarily 13 pursuant to this Section may continue to receive retirement benefits. Any employee 14 hired under this Section shall only be eligible to enroll in the Government of Guam 15 Health Insurance Program as an active employee. 16

Section 7. Government of Guam Health Insurance Program 17 Enrollment for Employment Pursuant to § 8121(a), Chapter 8, Title 5 GCA. 18 Any employee hired pursuant to § 8121(a), Chapter 8, Title 5 GCA shall only be 19 eligible to enroll in the Government of Guam Health Insurance Program as an 20 active employee. 21

Section 8. Locum Tenens Exemption during the Absence of the Chief Medical Examiner. The Office of the Chief Medical Examiner is exempt from the government of Guam Procurement Law in contracting for the professional services of a qualified medical examiner to be provided when the Chief Medical Examiner is absent from work. 1 Section 9. Advance Payments for Medical Services. In order to expedite 2 acceptance of Medically Indigent Program (MIP) clients by facilities in California, 3 Hawaii or Manila for medical treatment approved by the MIP, the Director of 4 Public Health and Social Services may advance payments for said medical 5 treatment, and may establish escrow accounts for immediate and advance payment 6 of medical treatment at those Joint Commission Accredited hospitals determined 7 by the Director to be best able to serve Medically Indigent Program clients.

8 Section 10. Transfer of Employees. (a) Notwithstanding any other 9 provision of law and in recognition of personnel shortages in certain areas, *I* 10 *Maga'låhen Guåhan* is authorized to transfer employees during Fiscal Year 2014 11 within or between any line department or agency of the government of Guam, 12 *except* that:

(1) This Section *shall not* apply to any employee of the Legislative
or Judicial Branch, or any employee within the Mayors' Council of Guam
and Village Mayors' Offices;

16 (2) The transfer of an employee *shall not* result in a loss of pay or
17 salary;

(3) No employee shall be transferred if the employee has filed a
viable grievance with the Civil Service Commission for discrimination based
on political affiliation, gender, or sexual harassment, *unless* the employee
consents to said transfer;

(4) Notwithstanding any other provision of law or regulation, no
employee of an autonomous agency may be transferred to a line department
or agency;

(5) *I Maga'låhen Guåhan shall* transfer the funding authorized for
 that employee's position from the transferor agency to the transferee agency,

including GMHA, DPHSS, and GBHWC, unless the transfer is from a line 1 2 agency to an autonomous agency;

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(6)This Section *shall not* be used to transfer employees acting in good faith who report or expose bad business practices, illegal activities, or 4 inappropriate conduct by public officials; 5

(7)No employee occupying a classified position created by statute 6 within an agency shall be transferred out of an agency nor shall such 7 employee and position be transferred out of such agency. Any employee 8 whose classified position is created by statute within a specific department 9 or agency, and has been transferred out of such agency or whose classified 10 position has been transferred out of such agency shall be immediately 11 transferred back to such agency; and 12

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No employee who has filed a whistleblower complaint as (8) provided for in statute shall be transferred unless such employee consents to 14 such transfer. 15

I Maga'låhen Guåhan shall submit a report to the Speaker of I 16 (b)Liheslatura of the transfer of each employee pursuant to this authorization, with 17 the name and position of the employee being transferred, the line department or 18 19 agency the employee is being transferred from, the line department or agency the employee is being transferred to, the time duration of the transfer, and whether the 20 transfer is permanent. 21

Section 11. Restrictions on Hiring of Unclassified Employees. No 22 government funds of any kind or description may be expended for the employment 23 24 or hiring of unclassified employees in the Executive Branch of the government of Guam during Fiscal Year 2014, *except* for the following: 25

Certified persons in the Guam Department of Education, as 26 (a) identified in §715(12) of Chapter 7, Title 1 GCA; 27

(b) Any academic teaching positions at the University of Guam and 1 2 the Guam Community College;

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(c)Nurses, doctors, licensed health professionals and ancillary health employees necessary for clinical purposes at the Department of Public 4 Health and Social Services, the Guam Behavioral Health and Wellness 5 Center, the Office of the Chief Medical Examiner, the Guam Memorial 6 7 Hospital Authority, the Guam Police Department, and the Department of Integrated Services for Individuals with Disabilities; 8

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Department of Labor Survey Workers; (d)

Systems and Programming Administrator, Junior Systems 10 (e) Programmer, Senior Programmer Analyst, Junior Application Analyst, 11 12 Junior Programmer Analyst and Junior Application Programmer; and positions dealing with reporting, tax audits, tax investigations, tax 13 14 collections, and processing of taxes at the Department of Revenue and Taxation; 15

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(f)Federally-funded positions (matching and up to 100%);

Persons filling temporary vacancies created by the call to active 17 (g) military duty of employees who are members of the reserve components of 18 19 the Department of Defense and the Department of Transportation, including, but not limited to, the United States Army, United States Navy, United 20 States Marine Corps, United States Air Force, the Army National Guard, the 21 22 Air National Guard, and the United States Coast Guard, or created by 23 absence due to a long term disability status which has been certified by a medical doctor. Departments may exercise this hiring authority provided its 24 authorized budget for personnel is *not* exceeded; 25

- Positions within the Office of I Maga'låhen Guåhan, the Office 1 (h) of I Segundu Na Maga'låhen Guåhan and the Guam State Clearinghouse, 2 and department or agency heads, deputies and private secretaries; 3
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Positions within the Mayors' Council of Guam; (i)

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(i) Positions within the Guam Election Commission;

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Limited-term, part time substitute teachers of the Guam (k) Department of Education;

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All persons employed pursuant to this Section, effective **(D**) October 1, 2011, shall meet the minimum Knowledge, Abilities and Skills (KAS) associated with such position; and

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professional engineers required to fill Chief Engineer positions. (m)

Section 12. Board and Commission Stipends. Any compensation or 12 stipend owed to a Board or Commission member for attending a regular or special 13 14 meeting in Fiscal Year 2014 shall be paid from the budget of the department or agency responsible for the administrative support and operations of such Boards or 15 Commissions. Except for Commissioners of the Civil Service Commission, any 16 Board member who has served on a Board continuously for ten (10) years or more 17 may receive a stipend totaling no more than Two Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$250) per 18 month for meetings attended; *however*, Board and Commission members may elect 19 to not receive said compensation. I Maga'låhen Guåhan may by Executive Order, 20 21 waive the payment of meeting stipends owed to any Board or Commission member. 22

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Section 13. Contracts. Positions in the classified and unclassified service *shall not* be filled pursuant to a contractual arrangement, *except* as provided in this 24 Section for Fiscal Year 2014. 25

Subject to Chapter 5, Title 5 GCA, government of Guam (a) 26 departments and agencies may contract with independent contractors, 27

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provided that no agency may contract for services customarily provided by employees in the classified service, *except* as provided by law.

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(b) Government of Guam departments and agencies that *do not* customarily obtain professional services, such as licensed health professionals, licensed architects, licensed engineers, legal services, actuarial services and auditing services through an employee in the classified service in that department or agency, may contract to obtain such services.

The Office of the Attorney General and the Public Defender (c) 8 Service Corporation are authorized to contract with attorneys as independent 9 contractors to provide services in areas in which it is impracticable or 10 impossible for the office to proceed. Such contracts shall be let in 11 accordance with the procurement laws of Guam. No such independent 12 contractor hired pursuant to this Section may receive from the government 13 of Guam any remuneration in any form other than in payment for the 14 position into which such person is hired. The Office of the Attorney General 15 and the Executive Director of the Public Defender Service Corporation shall 16 file a copy of every such contract with the Chief Procurement Officer and 17 the Director of Administration together with a written certification stating 18 why it is impracticable to handle the matter within the office as otherwise 19 20 constituted.

(d) This Section *shall not* apply to the Guam Department of
Education; the University of Guam; the Guam Community College; the
Unified Judiciary when filling positions of justices and judges pro tem, law
clerks, and legal interns; the Department of Revenue and Taxation when
filling the position of legal counsel; *I Liheslaturan Guåhan*; the Guam
Memorial Hospital Authority, the Department of Public Health and Social

Services, and the Guam Behavioral Health and Wellness Center when filling positions of licensed health professionals.

(e) Any instrumentality of the government of Guam that fills any classified or unclassified positions by contractual arrangement in accordance with this Section *shall* file a copy of every such contract with the Chief Procurement Officer together with a written certification stating why it is impracticable to handle the matter within the instrumentality as otherwise constituted.

#### Section 14. Wireless Communications Restrictions.

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No government of Guam funds, regardless of source and including (a) 10 funds expended by autonomous agencies, shall be expended for the use of cellular 11 telephones, cellular telephone services and other wireless telephone services, 12 unless the government of Guam will be reimbursed from federal funds or other 13 grants. This Section shall not apply to I Maga'lahen Guahan; I Segundu Na 14 Maga'låhen Guåhan; the Speaker of I Liheslaturan Guåhan; the Chief Justice of 15 16 the Supreme Court of Guam; the Presiding Judge of the Superior Court of Guam; official use of the Crisis Hotline Program of the Guam Behavioral Health and 17 Wellness Center; law enforcement officials; on-call attorneys of the Office of the 18 Attorney General and the Office of the Public Defender Service Corporation; on-19 call health professionals at the Guam Memorial Hospital Authority, the Guam 20 Behavioral Health and Wellness Center, and the Department of Public Health and 21 Social Services; Village Mayors and Vice Mayors; GFD and EMS officials; on-call 22 emergency management personnel; the Chief Medical Examiner; the Guam 23 Visitors Bureau; and the Guam Election Commission. The restrictions of this 24 Section *shall not* apply to wireless internet services, stationary (non-mobile) 25 wireless telephone services, and wireless voice over internet protocol (VOiP) 26 services. 27

No appointing authority, manager, supervisor or public officer in any 1 (b) branch of the government of Guam shall require or exert undue influence on any 2 classified or unclassified employee of any branch of the government of Guam to 3 maintain or utilize for employment-related duties, at such employee's personal 4 expense, any form of wireless and/or internet communications, phone, tablet or 5 desktop or laptop computer. Nothing herein, however, shall be construed to 6 prevent an employer from calling an employee at a wireless phone/radio if the 7 employee designates such wireless phone/radio as a personal contact number. 8

Nothing herein shall be construed as to prevent an employee, voluntarily and
on his own accord, from using personal funds or resources for wireless telephone
services.

A violation of this Subsection (b) is subject to a fine *not to exceed* Fifty Dollars (\$50.00) for the first violation, and One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) for subsequent violations.

15 Section 15. Program Reporting Requirements for Employment, 16 Employment Placement, and Job Training Programs at the Guam 17 Community College, the University of Guam, and the Guam Department of 18 Labor.

The President of the University of Guam, the President of the Guam 19 (a) Community College, and the Director of the Guam Department of Labor shall 20 transmit a report to I Maga'låhen Guåhan and to the Speaker of I Liheslaturan 21 Guåhan, no later than June 30 of each year, the actual number of program 22 completers and/or certificates issued for each program, and employment data for 23 said program completer for the two (2) years following completion of their 24 respective programs, to include salary levels, job location, or whether the job is in 25 the same field as the program. 26

(b) The report mandated in Subsection (a) *shall* also be posted on each
 agency's respective website.

Section 16. Authorization for Legal Services for the Department of 3 Public Works, the Guam Building Code Council, and the PEALS Board. The 4 Department of Public Works (DPW), the Guam Board of Professional Engineers, 5 Architects and Land Surveyors (PEALS), and the Guam Building Code Council 6 7 (GBCC) may enter into a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) to jointly fund an Assistant Attorney General to specifically provide legal services to DPW, 8 GBCC, and the PEALS Board only. 9 Pursuant to the MOU, DPW, GBCC, and PEALS may jointly enter into an 10 MOU with the Office of the Attorney General to provide such legal services. 11 DPW, GBCC, and PEALS shall reimburse the Office of the Attorney General for 12

Section 17. Amendment to § 26208.2, Chapter 26, Title 11 GCA. §
26208.2, Chapter 26, Title 11 GCA is hereby *amended* to read as follows:

such services in equitable proportions from their respective funds.

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"§ 26208.2. Application of Guam Memorial Hospital Authority Pharmaceuticals Fund.

For the purpose of recognizing appropriated Pharmaceutical funds as 18 operating revenue by the Guam Memorial Hospital Authority, retroactively 19 and prospectively, the Hospital shall apply seventy five (75%) of the funds 20received towards the payment of bills for services incurred by qualified 21 Medicaid recipients involved in the program at the Hospital and to billings 22 for services provided to patients classified as "charity care" pursuant to 23 criteria adopted by resolution to the Board of Trustees. Said 75% shall be 24 deposited into the GMHA Medicaid Matching Fund. The Hospital will be 25 responsible to fully demonstrate the manner in which the payments were 26 applied via the Hospital's annual audited financial report. Such distinction 27

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shall in no way result in the recognition of additional revenue by the Hospital other than what was appropriated by *I Liheslaturan Guåhan*."

- Section 18. Creation of GMHA Medicaid Matching Fund. A new § 3 26208.3 is hereby added to Chapter 26, Title 11 GCA as follows: 4
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"§ 26208.3 GMHA Medicaid Matching Fund. There is hereby created, separate and apart from other funds of the government of Guam, a 6 fund known as the GMHA Medicaid Matching Fund (hereinafter the Fund). 7 The Fund *shall* be kept in a separate bank account, administered by the 8 Department of Public Health and Social Services. The Fund shall not be 9 subject to any transfer authority of I Maga'låhen Guåhan or any interfund 10 transfers. The sole authorized expenditure of the Fund is for the payments of 11 bills for services as authorized by § 26208.2. All payments from the Fund 12 for services incurred by qualified Medicaid recipients provided at the 13 Hospital *shall* include the federal matching funds of the Medicaid program. 14

The BBMR shall allot twenty-five percent (25%) of the annual 15 appropriation from the GMHA Pharmaceuticals Fund each quarter of the 16 fiscal year to the Guam Memorial Hospital Authority. Thirty (30) days after 17 the end of each fiscal quarter, all unexpended or unencumbered allotments 18 19 remaining in the Fund shall no longer be available as Medicaid matching funds and *shall* be immediately remitted to the GMHA." 20

Section 19. Approval of Financial Agreements or Arrangements. Any 21 financial agreement or arrangement between the government of Guam with any 22 bank, private banking firm, brokerage firm, bond brokerage firm, or similar 23 financial institutions which uses, pledges, or arbitrages any government revenue, 24 trust funds, debt service payment deposits with trustees, bond proceeds, or interests 25 on any of these, not specifically authorized by existing statute authorizing the 26 issuance or refinancing of bonds, *shall* require legislative approval and any income 27

generated from such financial agreement and arrangement *shall* require legislative
 appropriation.

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#### Section 20. Budgetary Amendments to Public Law 31-233.

4 (a) Section 3(a) of Chapter XI of Public Law 31-233 is hereby *amended* 5 to read as follows:

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### "Section 3. Appropriations to Retirees for Supplemental Annuity Benefits and for Other Costs.

The sum of Nine Million Nine Hundred Seventy Thousand (a) 8 Four Hundred Eighteen Dollars (\$9,970,418) is appropriated from the 9 General Fund to the Supplemental Annuity Benefits Special Fund for Fiscal 10 Year 2013 for direct payments to government of Guam retirees who retired 11 prior to October 1, 1995, or their survivors, for the continuing payment of 12 Four Thousand Two Hundred Thirty-Eight Dollars (\$4,238) per year in 13 supplemental annuity benefits, consisting of the sums of One Thousand Two 14 Hundred Dollars (\$1,200), One Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$1,500), 15 Seven Hundred Dollars (\$700), and Eight Hundred Thirty-Eight Dollars 16 (\$838) in annual benefits authorized by various General Appropriation 17 Acts." 18

(b) Section 3(h) of Chapter XI of Public Law 31-233 is hereby *amended*to read as follows:

"(h) For Fiscal Year 2013, the sum of One Million Two Hundred
Ninety-Eight Thousand Eight Hundred Forty-Nine Dollars (\$1,298,849) is
appropriated from the General Fund to the GGRF to pay the cost of
Medicare premiums for government of Guam retirees and their survivors
domiciled on Guam, and who are eligible to receive Social Security income
benefits, and who are eligible to enroll in the government of Guam Group
Health Insurance Program. No government of Guam retiree or their survivor

- shall be required to enroll in the Government of Guam Health Insurance
   Program in order to receive the reimbursement."
- 3 (c) A new Section 15 is hereby *added* to Part I, Chapter II of Public Law 31233 to read as follows:
- 5 "Section 15. JFK Maintenance and Insurance Agreement for FY 6 2014. The sum of One Million Five Hundred Sixty-Eight Thousand Dollars 7 (\$1,568,000) is appropriated from the General Fund for the Fiscal Year 2014 8 CaPFA Insurance and Maintenance agreement and the Maintenance and 9 Capital Replacement Reserve for JFK High School. Notwithstanding any 10 other provision of law, the appropriation made in this Section *shall not* lapse 11 and *shall* continue until fully expended for the purposes herein."
- (d) A new Section 14 is hereby *added* to Part II, Chapter III of Public Law
  31-211 to read as follows:
- "Section 14. Up to the sum of Two Hundred Twenty Five Thousand
  Twenty Seven Dollars (\$225,027) of the unexpended balance of the funds
  appropriated to the DPHSS Public Assistance Penalty for Fiscal Year 2013 *shall not* lapse and *shall* be available to the DPHSS Public Assistance
  Penalty for expenditures in Fiscal Year 2014."

# Section 21. § 66409(c) of Chapter 66, Title 21 GCA is hereby *amended*to read:

"(c) Creation of Revolving Fund. On the effective date of this
Section, a revolving fund, designated as the "DPW Building and Design Fee
Account," *shall* be established separate and apart from other funds of the
government of Guam, and separate records *shall* be kept therefore. All fees
collected for plan checking reviews by the Department of Public Works *shall* be deposited into the Fund, and *shall not* lapse at the end of the fiscal
year but *shall* rollover into the next fiscal year or until expended. The

1 Director of Public Works shall administer the Fund and shall issue vouchers properly certifying the use of the Fund's monies. The monies deposited in 2 the Fund shall be expended only for the operations of the Division of 3 Engineering-Capital Improvement Project Building Permits and Inspection 4 5 Section. The Director *shall* comply with all existing reporting requirements by issuing a quarterly accounting of the Fund to I Maga'lahen Guåhan, I 6 Liheslaturan Guåhan and the Office of Public Accountability. The Director 7 8 shall ensure the DPW Building and Design Fee Account Fund is in 9 compliance with all existing statutes, rules and regulations, codes, executive orders, and any other authority which is applicable to the Department of 10 Public Works Division of Engineering-Capital Improvement Project 11 Building Permits and Inspection Section. All monies in the Fund are hereby 12 appropriated and are not subject to I Maga'låhi's transfer authority." 13

Section 22. Continuing Appropriations Authorized. Any branch. 14 department, line agency, semi-autonomous agency, autonomous agency, public 15 corporation or entity of the government of Guam or non-profit entity receiving an 16 appropriation from the government of Guam shall only expend or encumber its 17 Special Funds continuing appropriation from any General 18 General or Appropriations Act or Supplemental Appropriations Act prior to Fiscal Year 2014, 19 upon the approval of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan, unless* such continuing appropriations 20 are specifically authorized in this Act. The branch, department, line agency, semi-21 autonomous agency, autonomous agency, public corporation or entity of the 22 government of Guam or non-profit entity receiving an appropriation from the 23 government of Guam shall submit a request to the Speaker of I Liheslaturan 24 Guåhan and, at the same time, provide a copy of such request to the Office of 25 Finance and Budget, detailing the amount and a description of the expenditure. 26

Section 23. Request for Proposal for Line of Credit. In accordance with 1 the authorized activities in § 50103(k), Chapter 50, Title 12 of the Guam Code 2 Annotated, no later than October 31, 2013, the Guam Economic Development 3 Authority shall solicit proposals pursuant to Guam Procurement Law, for financing 4 services for a Line of Credit pursuant to § 22413, Chapter 22, Title 5 of the Guam 5 Code Annotated, for the sole purpose of paying GDOE merit bonuses authorized in 6 Section 16, Part I, Chapter II of this Act and Unified Judiciary merit bonuses 7 authorized in Section 11(b), Chapter IV of this Act. Such Line of Credit shall bear 8 an interest rate *no more than* six and one half percent (6.5%). 9

10 Section 24. All matters related to the Pacific Community (formerly known 11 as the "South Pacific Commission") and the Economic and Social Commission for 12 Asia and the Pacific *shall* fall under the purview of the Office of the Governor.

#### **CHAPTER XIII**

#### **ADMINISTRATIVE PROVISIONS**

of Years' 1 Section 1. Authorization for Payment Prior **Obligations.** Appropriations made in this Act may be expended for the 2 payment of prior years' obligations, provided it does not negatively impact 3 the current operational needs of the department or agency requesting such 4 5 prior years' payment. The Director of the BBMR shall sign a certification letter stating no negative impact and submit it to the Speaker of I 6 7 Liheslaturan Guåhan and the Office of Finance and Budget at least fifteen (15) calendar days before each payment is released. If the Governor declares 8 9 that the non-payment of prior year's obligation will disrupt essential services 10 to a department or agency, he may utilize Fiscal Year 2014 appropriations for the agency provided BBMR imposes a corresponding reserve and 11 12 reduces the Department's current year allotment by the same amount.

Section 2. Authorization for Matching Requirements for
 Federal Grants-In-Aid. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, all
 departments are authorized to expend funds appropriated in this Act for
 matching requirements of Federal grants for Fiscal Year 2014.

17 Section 3. Carryover of Local and Federal Matching Program 18 Funds for Grants. The Local and Federal Matching Funds for programs 19 whose expiration dates extend beyond September 30, 2014 *shall not* lapse 20 and may be expended throughout the period of the grant award.

Section 4. Government of Guam Retirement Fund Rate of
Contribution. In accordance with §8137(e) of Chapter 8, Article 1, Title 4
GCA, the government rate of contribution to the Government of Guam
Retirement Fund throughout Fiscal Year 2014 *shall* be thirty and three
hundredths percent (30.03%).

Section 5. Autonomous Agency Revenues and Expenditures 1 Reported to I Maga'låhen Guåhan and I Liheslaturan Guåhan. 2 Notwithstanding any other provision of law, every autonomous and semi-3 autonomous agency or public corporation in the government of Guam shall 4 report all revenues and expenditures for all funds under its purview and 5 administration to I Maga'låhen Guåhan and the Speaker of I Liheslaturan 6 Guåhan, in a Microsoft Excel electronic file and a written report, on a 7 monthly basis and post the same on its website. Each monthly report shall be 8 9 due no later than thirty (30) days after the end of each month.

Section 6. Revenue Tracking Report. The Director of the Bureau 10 of Budget and Management Research, in collaboration with the Director of 11 Taxation and the Director of the Department of 12 Revenue and Administration, shall determine, after the end of each month of the fiscal 13 year, the revenue tracking for the balance of the fiscal year, based upon the 14 actual collections of the preceding month, and prepare a statement 15 comparing "actual" and "projected" revenues. Said statement shall be 16 certified as to its accuracy by each of the aforementioned Directors, and 17 submitted to the Speaker of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan*, in a Microsoft Excel file 18 and a written report, no later than thirty (30) days after the end of each 19 month of the fiscal year. Said statements shall be posted monthly on the 20 Bureau of Budget and Management Research's website. The Special 21 Economic Service *shall* meet and approve the format of the report no later 22 23 than October 15, 2013 for Fiscal Year 2014 reporting. The Bureau of Budget and Management Research, in collaboration with the Director of Revenue 24 and Taxation and the Director of the Department of Administration shall 25 retroactively re-issue the monthly reports for the previous twelve (12) 26

months based on any changes made by the Special Economic Service for
 Fiscal Year 2014 reporting.

Section 7. Prior Year Appropriations Report. I Liheslaturan 3 Guåhan finds that in order to work effectively to prevent deficit spending 4 and reduce and manage the deficit of the government of Guam, it will need 5 to repeal or de-appropriate past appropriations, which remain outstanding 6 but not expended. To assist in this effort, the Department of Administration 7 shall submit a report to the Speaker of I Liheslaturan Guåhan on January 1, 8 2014 of all open continuing appropriations from all fiscal years prior to 9 2014, which have not been encumbered or fully expended as of the date of 10 the report. Thereafter, quarterly updates to the report *shall* be submitted until 11 unexpended appropriations from prior fiscal years are eliminated by repeal 12 or other operation of law. 13

Section 8. Exemption from BBMR Allotment Release Control. 14 §1303 of Chapter 1, Article 3, Title 5 GCA, shall not apply to I Liheslaturan 15 Guåhan (including the Office of Finance and Budget), the Public Defender 16 Service Corporation, the Unified Judiciary of Guam, the Mayors' Council of 17 Guam, Office of Public Accountability and the Office of the Attorney 18 General. Said entities may draw against their respective appropriations as 19 needed to meet their obligations in accordance with a drawdown schedule 20 that said entities shall submit to the Director of Administration, no later than 21 October 31, 2013. Failure to submit such drawdown schedule shall subject 22 such entity to the allotment release control by the Bureau of Budget and 23 Management Research. 24

25 Section 9. Special Fund Transfer. Unless otherwise specified in 26 this Act, *I Maga'låhen Guåhan* is authorized to transfer to the General Fund 27 any cash available from any appropriated Special Fund to fund the

appropriations authorized by this Act. All cash amounts from Special Funds 1 transferred to cover the appropriations authorized by this Act or any other 2 act or law authorizing appropriations shall be promptly reimbursed to the 3 Special Fund from which it was withdrawn within sixty (60) days after 4 receipt of transferred cash amounts by the General Fund. I Maga'låhen 5 Guåhan shall submit a report to the Speaker of I Liheslaturan Guåhan on 6 the fifth (5th) day of every month on all transfers and reimbursements made 7 pursuant to this Section. Said report shall enumerate the amount of each 8 transfer, identify the funds to and from which the transfer was made, the 9 object class reduced by the transfer out and the object class receiving the 10 transfer and state the purpose of each transfer. Notwithstanding any other 11 provision of law, no funds shall be transferred out of the Chamorro Land 12 Trust Operations Fund and the Guam Department of Education Operations 13 14 Fund from Fiscal Year 2014 Special Fund appropriations made to the Guam Department of Education and the Chamorro Land Trust Commission. 15

16 Section 10. Facilities Insurance Requirements. Every department 17 and agency of the government of Guam, through the Department of 18 Administration, *shall only* expend such sums as necessary from the 19 department or agency's appropriations for operations contained in this Act, 20 for insurance of government-owned facilities, built or repaired with FEMA 21 grant funds, where such insurance is required by FEMA.

22 Section 11. Reporting Requirements for Non-Profit 23 Organizations. All non-profit organizations that receive funds pursuant to 24 this Act *shall* maintain financial records that accurately account for said 25 funds and *shall* provide a budgetary breakdown by object category to the 26 department or agency that oversees the appropriation. The non-profit 27 organization *shall* be provided a copy of this Section by the department or

agency overseeing such appropriation, but this duty *shall not* prevent any
 non-profit organization from carrying out its responsibilities under this
 Section. The non-profit organization *shall* also provide to said department:

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5 6 (a) A quarterly report describing its activities during the reporting period and the results it achieved *no later than* twenty (20) days after the end of each quarter;

7 (b) Notification of all procurement of equipment and
8 services of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) or more prior to
9 awarding the contract therefore;

10 (c) Access to the overseeing department or agency's duly 11 authorized representative, and government of Guam auditors, to 12 appropriate records for the purpose of audit and examination of books, 13 documents, papers and records of funds expended under the 14 appropriation;

(d) Submission of a detailed inventory listing of each year's
purchases, as certified by its certifying officer;

(e) A Final Report to the overseeing department or agency
for submission to *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* containing a full disclosure
of all expenditures of funds appropriated by this Act *no later than*November 15, 2014. The overseeing department or agency *shall* post
the same on its website; and

(f) Non-compliance with these reporting requirements will
subject the non-profit organization to a three percent (3%) reduction
of its appropriation(s) and the overseeing agency's contract with the
organization *shall* so provide.

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Section 12. Fund Reversions. Unless otherwise specified in this Act:

(a) General Fund Reversion. All unexpended or unencumbered, by a GG1, purchase order or contract, appropriations made from the General Fund pursuant to this Act shall revert to the General Fund on the last day of Fiscal Year 2014.

(b)Tourist Attraction Fund Reversion. All unexpended or unencumbered by a GG1, purchase order or contract, appropriations made from the Tourist Attraction Fund pursuant to this Act shall revert to the Tourist Attraction Fund on the last day of Fiscal Year 2014. 10

Healthy Futures Fund Reversion. All unexpended or (c)11 unencumbered by a GG1, purchase order or contract, appropriations 12 13 made from the Healthy Futures Fund pursuant to this Act shall revert to the Healthy Futures Fund on the last day of Fiscal Year 2014. 14

(d) Territorial Educational Facilities Fund Reversion. All 15 unexpended or unencumbered by a GG1, purchase order or contract, 16 appropriations made from the Territorial Educational Facilities Fund 17 pursuant to this Act shall revert to the Territorial Educational 18 Facilities Fund on the last day of Fiscal Year 2014. 19

(e) Guam Highway Fund Reversion. All unexpended or 20 unencumbered appropriations by a GG1, purchase order or contract, 21 22 made from the Guam Highway Fund pursuant to this Act shall revert to the Guam Highway Fund on the last day of Fiscal Year 2014. 23

Section 13. Restriction on the Home Use of Government of Guam 24 **Vehicles.** *Except* when expressly permitted by §1103(c) of Chapter 1, Title 4 25 GCA, or any other law, no government of Guam owned, leased or rented 26

vehicles may be driven home by an employee unless such employee is on 1 2 call as an emergency first responder.

Section 14. Transfer Authority of I Maga'lahen Guahan. Unless 3 otherwise restricted or specifically allowed by this Act, for Fiscal Year 2014 4 I Maga'låhen Guåhan is authorized to transfer up to ten percent (10%) 5 between Fiscal Year 2014 General Fund Executive Branch appropriations 6 contained in Chapter V and in Parts II, III and IV of Chapter III of this Act; 7 provided that notice of each transfer and justification therefore are delivered 8 9 at least fifteen (15) working days before the transfer is made to the Speaker of I Liheslaturan Guåhan and the Office of Finance and Budget. 10

Notwithstanding any other provision of law, no funds shall be 11 transferred out of the Guam Department of Education Operations Fund or 12 Fiscal Year 2014 General Fund appropriations made to the Guam 13 Department of Education, the Unified Judiciary, I Liheslaturan Guåhan, the 14 15 Office of Finance and Budget, the Mayors Council, the Public Defender 16 Service Corporation, the Ancestral Lands Commission, Office of the Attorney General and the Office of Public Accountability. 17

18 Section 15. Independent Contractors. The Office of I Maga'låhi, the Office of I Segundu Na Maga'låhen Guåhan and the Guam State 19 20 Clearinghouse may enter into agreements with independent contractors pursuant to Guam procurement laws. 21

22 Section 16. Email Addresses Paid for with Government of Guam Funds. The Office of I Maga'lahen Guahan shall create a list of all email 23 addresses paid for by any funds appropriated by this Act and shall post said 24 list on the respective agency's or branch's website, and the Office of I25 Maga'låhen Guåhan's website. 26

1 Section 17. Uniform Allowances. Uniform allowances authorized in 2 this Act *shall not* be less than One Hundred Fifty Dollars (**\$150.00**) for the 3 Fiscal Year, and *shall* be issued to the employees *no later than* the end of the 4 first quarter of Fiscal Year 2014.

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#### Section 18. Government Staffing Pattern.

6 (a) Staffing Pattern. No later than thirty (30) days after the end of each guarter of Fiscal Year 2014, every director, administrator or head of a 7 government of Guam agency, excluding line agencies, shall submit to the 8 9 Speaker of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan*, in a Microsoft Excel file and written report, and post the same on the agency website, a current staffing pattern in 10 the format of the Executive Branch Fiscal Year 2014 Budget Call, as of the 11 previous quarter's ending. The agencies required to submit are all 12 autonomous and semi-autonomous agencies, public corporations, the 13 Mayors Council of Guam, and the Unified Judiciary. Said staffing pattern 14 15 shall include, at a minimum, the name of every current employee and his position title, most recent hire date, salary, increment costs and benefit costs, 16 the funding source for his salary and benefits, and the gross salary and 17 benefits paid for during the quarter. 18

No later than thirty (30) days after the end of each quarter of 19 (b) Fiscal Year 2014, the Director of the Department of Administration shall 20 post the government wide line agency staffing pattern on the bit.guam.gov 21 portal on the budget website, in a Microsoft Excel file and written report. 22 The format of the report *shall* be the current staffing pattern in the format of 23 24 the Executive Branch Fiscal Year 2014 Budget Call, as of the previous quarter's ending. Said staffing pattern shall include, at a minimum, the name 25 of every current employee and his position title, most recent hire date, 26

salary, increment costs and benefit costs, the funding source for his salary 1 and benefits, and the gross salary and benefits paid for during the quarter. 2

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Section 19. Quarterly Statement of Revenues, Expenditures and Changes in Fund Balance Report. The Director of the Department of 4 Administration shall submit a Quarterly Statement of Revenues, 5 Expenditures and Changes in Fund Balance Report in accordance with 6 Generally Accepted Accounting Principles, to I Maga'låhen Guåhan and the 7 Speaker of I Liheslaturan Guåhan, in a Microsoft Excel file and written 8 report no later than thirty (30) days after the end of each quarter. Each 9 monthly report *shall* be posted on the Department of Administration's 10 11 website as a Microsoft Excel file no later than thirty (30) days after the end of each quarter. 12

Section 20. Monthly Cash Balance Reports for General and 13 Special Funds. The Director of the Department of Administration shall 14 submit a monthly report of beginning cash balances, cash deposits, cash 15 16 withdrawals, and ending cash balances of the government of Guam General, Special Funds, Bond Proceeds Trust Accounts held by Trustee Custodians 17 and Trust Funds and Accounts to I Maga'lahen Guahan and the Speaker of I 18 Liheslaturan Guåhan, in a Microsoft Excel file and written report, no later 19 20 than twenty (20) days after the end of each month. The Director shall prepare the report in the format that was prescribed and prepared by the 21 Office of Finance and Budget in Fiscal Year 2014. Each monthly report 22 shall itemize all General Fund and Special Fund cash balances by bank, by 23 bank account name, by bank account number, and by fund name. 24

Section 21. Funding Source. In addition to the appropriations 25 authorized in Chapter V, the following departments are authorized to expend 26 up to the level of revenues collected for their respective special revenue 27

- *Fiscal Year 2014 Run Rate shall* mean the estimated amount of expenditures for the entire fiscal year utilizing the nine (9) months of actual expenditures as of June 30, 2014 plus the three (3) months of projected expenditures through September 30, 2014 of each branch or agency.

1 Section 23. Energy Savings. As an incentive to conserve energy and water consumption, departments, agencies, and instrumentalities of the 2 government of Guam, inclusive of the University of Guam, the Guam 3 4 Community College, and all Mayoral Offices and facilities of the Mayors' Council of Guam, are hereby authorized to transfer any unexpended Fiscal 5 6 Year 2014 appropriations for utilities to other expenditure categories within 7 their respective budgets. Any unexpended utility funds *shall not* be subject to any transfer authority of I Maga'låhi (the Governor), and may be carried 8 9 over and are authorized for use by the departments, agencies, and instrumentalities of the government of Guam, inclusive of the University of 10 Guam, the Guam Community College, and all Mayoral Offices and facilities 11 12 of the Mayors' Council of Guam during succeeding fiscal years.

Section 24. Appropriation Allocation Report. The Director of the 13 Bureau of Budget and Management Research shall submit a written 14 Appropriation Allocation Report and a Microsoft Excel electronic file for all 15 the agencies in Chapters III and V identifying the amount of the 16 appropriations in Section 1, Chapter III and Section 1, Chapter V, by AS400 17 account number, inclusive of the appropriation type, appropriation year, 18 19 fund code, agency code, program code, object category, and by amount no later than October 15, 2013 to the Speaker of I Liheslaturan Guåhan and the 20 21 Office of Finance and Budget.

# Section 25. Government of Guam Health Insurance Program Reporting.

(a) All health insurance carriers for the government of Guam *shall*submit a monthly written report and corresponding Microsoft Excel file of
said report to the Department of Administration and the Office of Finance
Budget aggregating the:

1 (1) Enrollees, both subscribers and dependents, by active 2 employee and retiree subscriber counts by plan by class by groups 3 supported/paid by the General Fund, detailed by agency/department; 4 and enrollees, both subscribers and dependents, by active employee 5 and retiree subscriber counts by plan by class by groups 6 supported/paid by autonomous agencies of the government of Guam, 7 detailed by autonomous agency.

8 (2) Autonomous agencies within this Subsection *shall* 9 include the Guam Power Authority, the Guam Waterworks Authority, 10 the Jose D. Leon Guerrero Commercial Port, the A.B. Won Pat 11 International Airport Authority, the Guam Housing Corporation, the 12 Guam Economic Development Authority, the Government of Guam 13 Retirement Fund, and the Guam Visitors Bureau.

(3) This report and corresponding Microsoft Excel file *shall*be filed with *I Maga'låhen Guåhan* and the Speaker of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan no later than* twenty (20) days after the end of each month of
Fiscal Year 2014.

(b) All health insurance carriers for the government of Guam *shall* file a monthly written report detailing each individual health insurance premium payment received by the government of Guam health insurance carrier from the government of Guam, by date and by agency to *I Liheslaturan Guåhan no later than* twenty (20) days after the end of each month of Fiscal Year 2014.

Section 26. Severability. If any provision of this Act or its application to any person or circumstance is held invalid, the invalidity *shall not* affect other provisions or applications of this Act which can be given effect without the invalid provision or application and to this end the
 provisions of this Act are severable.
