

SUMMARY OF ACTIVITIES:

The 3rd quarter for fiscal year 2013 was extremely busy with various activities and program challenges. The visiting Leadership Team from the Sisters of Mercy, South Central at which the Program Manager is a member of was given a tour of the program on May 1st. Ms. Monica Rowsey, Victim Specialist for Federal Bureau of Investigation out of Honolulu Office paid a courtesy visit to the program on May 2nd.

The program experienced staff changes. In this quarter the program filled two vacant positions at Alee I. Staff M. Appleby (eff. 04/01/13) and staff M. Quintanilla (eff. 4/03/13). Staff L. Managaytay who was hired on March 25th, transferred to another program within CSS on June 22nd thus, leaving a vacancy of one full-time. The vacancy for part-time is yet to be filled. At Alee II, two staffs resigned. They are C. Guhit (eff. 5/14/13) and C. Santos (eff. 5/26/13). C. San Nicolas was hired on May 20th to fill one of the vacant positions. There are two official volunteers at Alee II. However, one of them has terminated her services effective May 20th.

After several follow-ups with the refund of the security deposit for the former Alee I house that was rented from Mr. Guo-Ming Whang through Shana Wu, Realtor for Coral Sea Realty then, the refund in the amount of \$1,100.00 was received on June 24th. Alee I's rental agreement expired April 30, 2012. The original security deposit was \$2,500.00. \$1,400.00 was deducted to

Alee Shelter Quarterly Report For the period of April, May, June 2013 Page 2 of 5 pay for repair expenses after being inspected and damages assessed. The damages that were assessed were first and second floors bathroom and kitchen ventilator.

The Sanitary Permit at Alee II with expiration date of June 30th was renewed.

The next project for Alee II is to obtain a permanent home conducive to the needs of the children and to be in compliance with the Child Care License. First Lady Christine Calvo offered her support in making this a reality through the Rigalu Foundation. The First Lady's project is called Rigalu House. On May 11, at Hilton Guam Resort & Spa. Sister Brigid Perez, RSM, the Program Manager was honored at the First Lady's Gala for her ten years of service as Program Manager of Alee Shelter. The gala was another form of raising funds for the Rigalu House and at the same time recognizing the donors in the different categories of sponsorships. The First Lady and the Rigalu Foundation will carry out the rest of the details for the acquisition of land, construction of the building, etc. As of the end of third quarter, there hasn't been any update.

Alee I Family Violence Domestic Program- served eighteen (18) women and their twenty-one (21) children. By the end of the quarter, all of the women exited the shelter. This quarter had been very challenging with some of the clients' behavior. For this quarter, there are four (4) shelter workers, however, one of them resigned/transferred to another program making June 21st her last day at Alee. Alee I is still in need of a part-time staff. With the inflow of clients at unexpected times and unknown exit date and lack of staff, support and assistance is still being extended by the Alee Office.

The Transitional Housing Program served **two (2)** women and **five (5)** children. Two of the three units (B1 & B5) are occupied while B7 remains unoccupied. However, a termination of program's services was given to client in B5. Client moved out on June 27th after a request for extension was granted. In March, the program manager formally recommended the transfer of the Transitional Housing Program from the management of Alee Shelter to the Executive Office. There was no feedback on the recommendation and thus the program was recalled back to Alee Office on May 28th. The position for social worker remains vacant since March 29th. An interview was completed on June 13th, and the sole applicant who is a male was recommended for the position. His employment will take effect July 23rd. In the absence of a social worker, the program manager and the administrative assistant continues to work with the women and provide assistance whenever necessary.

The Alee II Children's Shelter served **nineteen** (19) children for the quarter. By the end of the quarter, six (6) children exited the shelter, but one of them who left in April returned and the other left last quarter, returned at the end of the quarter. The children's ages varies from two months old to fifteen years old. The shelter is licensed to house up to twelve children. However, the Program Manager continues to accommodate Child Protective Services (CPS) to provide shelter temporarily on a case-to-case basis. The Department of Public Health renewed and released the Child Care License at which to expire on March 19, 2014.

Alee Shelters program manager and staff continue to strive to support and give utmost dedication to serving the women and children that arrive at the doors.

Alee Shelter Quarterly Report For the period of April, May, June 2013 Page 3 of 5 During the months of April, May, and June, Alee I sheltered <u>eighteen</u> (18) women, six (6) Chamorro, two (2) Chuukese, four (4) Filipino, three (3) Paluans, one (1) Korean, one (1) Caucasian, one (1) Chamorro/Japanese and their <u>twenty-one</u> (21) children.

Alee Children's shelter completed the quarterly count with **nineteen (19)** children. Two the children are returning clients. Our records show **fourteen (14)** Chamorro, **two (2)** Pohnpean, and **one (1)** Chamorro/Pohnpean, and **one (1)** Chamorro/Palauan.

Crisis Hotline Alee Shelter I responded to **two hundred twenty-two (222)** inquiry and intake calls for the quarter. Of the two hundred twenty-one, **thirty-eight (38)** were eligible. Eighteen (18) women were received into the shelter, seven (7) decided to stayed elsewhere, thirteen (13) did not call back for services. **Thirty-two (32)** women were seeking information only, and **one hundred fifty-two (152)** were not eligible for services but referred to other agencies or miscellaneous calls. Ten (10) were referred to Guma San Jose homeless shelter, two (2) Oasis Empowerment Center, one (1) GPD, two (2) Guam Behavioral and Wellness Center (former DMHS), one (1) Emergency Receiving Home, one (1) Healing Hearts, two (2) CPS, seventy-one (71) Client related, three (3) Donation, forty-one (41) office related, eight-teen (18) miscellaneous calls.

- -Used but usable children's clothing (Ms. Crystal Santos from Calvary Chapel Guam coordinated a children's clothing drive among her church members)
- -Soroptomist International of the Marianas donated a check for \$500
- -John F. Kenned High School NHS students donated assorted cannel goods
- -Kanoa Garrido, a 6th grader at Untalan Middle School delivered prepared meal (spaghetti and garlic toasts) and drinks on May 30th for the children's dinner as his Community Service Project

- -Mr. Nate San Nicolas, a recipient of the Shieh Su Ying Scholar Athlete 2013 sponsored by Dr. Shieh, selected Alee Shelter as its Charity of Choice to receive the \$1,000 check. (June 17th)
- -Love to Gift, Inc. (Nicole Brindejonc, Founder & Nate San Nicolas, Co-Founder) hosted an end of school summer event for the children held at Guam Premium Outlet (GPO). The children were treated to a meal and games at Chuck E Cheese and a movie at Regal Theater (June 9th)
- -Bank of Hawaii donated their old DELL computers (10 each) and a printer for the program's use on June 10th. The program is working with CSS IT department to make sure that the computers are usable.
- -The companies IZOD and Calvin Klein continue to donate their damaged/not for resale items to the program. Some of them are still usable. Some of the goods are usable when repaired and some are still usable despite some noticeable damage to the item.

The total monetary donation received from five donors was \$2,100.00.

INKIND DONATIONS continue to be dropped at the office, which consist of clothing, toys, house wares, furniture, and miscellaneous supplies, which are being distributed amongst the shelter clients as well as Guma San Jose and CSS main office. However, most of the donations are used and not very pleasing.

The 2nd quarter for fiscal year 2013 was extremely busy with various activities and program challenges.

Alee Shelter participated in activities, trainings/conferences, and meetings.

The Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) for the FY 2012 STOP VAW Grant Award Number 2012-WF-AX-0018 for budget period July 01, 2012 to March 31, 2014 for the amount of \$20,900.00 was signed and submitted to GCO-FPO on January 14th. The work request for this grant is forthcoming.

Citibank Women (Connie C. Moral-Mayers, Rosemary Atalig, Elizabeth Chaco and Mary Sablan) volunteered their services and conducted a Financial Literacy Workshop/Presentation to women only on the topics of Importance of Savings and Budget at Catholic Social Service Conference Room on March 2nd in conjunction with International Women's Day Celebration. Alee Shelter Program and Citibank Connie C. Moral-Mayers coordinated the event. An e-mail

Alee Shelter Quarterly Report For the period of January, February, March 2013 invitation was sent out to other programs of CSS, Alee's community partners, staff and their families at which some of them attended. The feedbacks received from the attendants were very positive and found it very informative and helpful.

Alee I Family Violence Domestic Program- served eight (8) women and their twenty (20) children. By the end of the quarter, all of the women exited the shelter. Two transitioned into Guma San Jose Homeless Shelter while the other one transitioned to Oasis Empowerment Center. With the inflow of clients at unexpected times and unknown exit date and lack of staff, support and assistance is still being extended by the Alee Office.

Staff turn over was an issue this quarter. Overtime hours were necessary to operate the short staffed shelter in addition to assistance extended by the Alee Shelter Office staff. These terminations and resignation left the shelter with four full time and a part-time position open. One resigned to take effect immediately and the other was termination due to abandonment of job. Interviews continue to be scheduled while an Alee II staff is being detailed to Alee I.

Three were hired in March to fill the three vacant positions. However, another resigned leaving one full-time and one part-time positions open.

The Transitional Housing Program served **two (2)** women and **five (5)** children. Two clients occupied units B1 & B5. Unit B7 remains unoccupied after former client K.V. who exited in December left behind damages that is now pending repairs. Client LT exited the program in mid January and client LK who was a former client of the Family Violence Shelter with a terminally ill child immediately occupied the unit.

The Alee II Children's Shelter served **fifteen (15)** children for the quarter. By the end of the quarter, five (5) children transitioned from the shelter. The children's ages varies from five months old to eleven years old. The shelter's child care license maximum capacity is twelve children. However, the Program Manager continues to accommodate Child Protective Services (CPS) to provide shelter temporarily on a case-to-case basis.

There are six children who have been with the program for a while who are being transported to and from school whose schools are not within district. There has also been a weekly visitation with family and other appointments. Thus, gasoline expenses are ever increasing. One of the vehicles 2003 Mazda Protégé broke down and had to be taken to the shop for maintenance and repair.

The program purchased an electric dryer to replace Alee II's dryer by purchasing one from its donation funds. Additionally, the maintenance person repaired the exhaust fan in the girls' bathroom

Alee Shelter Quarterly Report For the period of January, February, March 2013 In the early part of the quarter, the program experienced staffing challenges. Either a staff was on scheduled personal leave, emergency leave due to a death in a family off-island, or out sick. The Alee Shelter Office (Program Manager, Social Worker, and Administrative Assistant) provided assistance during the staff shortage and while others had to work over time to continue the operation of the shelter. At times, the shelter needed the assistance of CPS to assist with transportation during visitation, which was a great help to the program. The shelter was shorthanded in February when a staff tendered her resignation in the middle of the month. Program conducted interviews for the vacant position at Alee II. The program recommend the applicant thus filled the position in March.

The Child Care License for the shelter was expiring on March 19, 2013. After completing and passing the required inspections, the program submitted the application to renew the Child Care License to Department of Public Health.

The next project for Alee II is to obtain a permanent home conducive to the needs of the children and to comply with the Child Care License. First Lady Christine Calvo offered her support in making this a reality through the Rigalu Foundation. The name for The First Lady's project is Rigalu House. Regular monthly meetings are taking place to see this project through. On January 25th, the Rigalu House Project Committee was given a tour of the available government property and Chamorro Land Trust property where the Rigalu House can be built on.

Alee Shelters program manager and staff continue to strive to support and give utmost dedication to serving the women and children that arrive at the doors.

During the months of January, February, March, Alee I sheltered <u>eight</u> (8) women, two (2) Chamorro, two (2) Chuukese, one (1) Mexican, one (1) Hispanic, one (1) Palauan, one (1) Japanese/Caucasian and their <u>twenty</u> (20) children.

Alee Children's shelter completed the quarterly count with fifteen (15) children. Our records show ten (10) Chamorro, two (2) Pohnpean, and one (1) Chamorro/Pohnpean, and one (1) Chamorro/Palauan, one (1) Filipino/French.

Crisis Hotline Alee Shelter I responded to **two hundred three** (203) inquiry and intake calls for the quarter. Of the two hundred three, **fourteen** (14) were eligible. Seven (7) women were received into the shelter, one (1) decided to stayed elsewhere, six (6) did not call back for services. **One hundred seventeen** (117) were not eligible for services. Fifteen (15) were referred to other agencies. Twelve (12) were referred to Guma San Jose homeless shelter, one (1) Sanctuary, one (1) Adult Protective Services, and one (1) CPS. One hundred two (102) not referred; thirty (30) Client related, five (5) private caller, one (1) wrong number, forty-nine (49) office related, seventeen (17) miscellaneous calls. **Seventy-two** (72) women were seeking information only.

Therapeutic outings for the children this quarter were:

For the 2nd quarter, the program received monetary donation from nine (9) donors totaling \$3,266.

- -Love to Gift, Inc. hosted a birthday party for one of the birthday celebrants.
- -Ms. Vesna Gaddy through Natalie de Leon of Erica's House baked and delivered a birthday cake for the January birthday celebrants.
- -Ms. Celeste Almira delivered 5 packages of 8 paper towel rolls and two cases of real fresh milk.
- Our Lady of the Blessed Sacrament Chapel donated canned goods and miscellaneous items for shelter use.
- The George Washington High School students under the instruction of Melissa Palomo for Early Childhood Program made valentine cards, crafts and candies for the children's valentine activity.
- -PBS Guam KGTF Channel 12 together with Ambros Inc., Macy's, Big Fish, Graphic Center Inc. paid a Valentine's Day visit on February 14th to Alee Shelter Office and brought Clifford the Dog, toiletries, cereals, and coloring books for the children.
- Leila-Rae Duenas 2013 Bella BMX Purple 20" bicycle for girls valued at \$140.00
- A/C Technology, Francisco Perez, Owner donated his services valued at \$100 for office's a/c maintenance and service
- -Our Lady of the Blessed Sacrament Chapel donated canned goods and miscellaneous items for shelter use.
- -International Distributors donated a case of hotdog meat and a case of fuji red apples for Alee Shelter's contribution to the CPS Easter Egg Hunt held March 24th.

INKIND DONATIONS continue to be dropped at the office, which consist of clothing, toys, house wares, furniture, and miscellaneous supplies, which are being distributed amongst the shelter clients as well as Guma San Jose and CSS main office. However, most of the donations are used and not very pleasing.



SUMMARY OF ACTIVITIES:

The 1st quarter for fiscal year 2013 was extremely busy with various activities and program challenges. This quarter started with the National Domestic Violence Awareness Month and ended with all the holiday festivities. The program took part in the 2012 Domestic Violence Counts National Census of Domestic Violence Services. Mr. Buddy Cabanero from BOSSA who performs the quarterly site visits retired and replaced by Ms. Elizabeth Ignacio. The Community-Defined Solutions to Violence Against Women Grant Program (C-DS VAW) extended to June 30, 2013. The program's maintenance pick-up truck 2006 Ford Ranger was damaged and repaired costing the program \$2,202.19. Because the damaged was part of maintenance person's negligence, the program arranged a payment plan for the staff to reimburse the program.

Catherine's Home Fire Alarm Preventive Maintenance is set for four quarters and it is a subcontract of Orion Construction the contractor for the building. Catherine's Home is relieved of any fees associated for the first year's fire alarm maintenance. Thus, the 1st quarterly fire alarm preventive maintenance was conducted on October 19.

The Family Violence Shelter served fifteen women. One of the biggest events that took place this quarter was the Telethon for Rigalu House slated by the First Lady of Guam and the Rigalu House Foundation.

Alee Shelter participated in activities, trainings/conferences, and meetings.

Alee I Family Violence Domestic Program- received **fifteen (15)** women and their **fourteen (14)** children. All fifteen women exited the shelter. One of the fifteen qualified for Alee Transitional Housing Program who will transitioned in January after the holidays. During this quarter, the Program Manager and the Administrative Assistant remain on stand-by for shifts lacking staff. The Program Manager manages the hotline when there is no staff on duty. Staffs continue to work together to ensure that the program delivers its services to the women and their children accordingly. This quarter, a total of four applicants were interviewed. One of the four was a replacement for a staff who only showed up for a day and resigned due to emergency family matters off-island. To date, there are three (3) shelter workers with one vacancy for full-time and one for part-time.

The Transitional Housing Program served **three** (3) women and **eight** (8) children. The women have goals to work with while in the program. In the absence of a social worker/case manager, the program manager and administrative assistant continue to provide service to the clients under this program. All three units (B1, B5, & B7) were occupied except for B1, the unit became vacant on December 26th.

The leased vehicle under the TH program had to be relinquished back to Payless Car Rental on November 28th. The leased vehicle was under the previous grant number 2005-WH-AX-0097 which expired on June 30, 2012. Because of the reduction in the new grant number 2011-WH-AX-0005, a budget for a leased vehicle was not included.

This quarter on December 26th, the social worker position was filled after being vacant for five months. Alee Transitional Housing welcomes C. Tenorio.

The Alee II Children's Shelter served **twenty** (20) children for the quarter. By the end of the quarter, sixteen (16) children exited the shelter. The children's ages varies from nine months old to fifteen years old.

In October, the shelter continued to experience low water pressure after remedying the booster pump and pressure tank situation. Another plumbing service performed further investigation to address the problem. Investigation results brought about new problems such as electrical overloading and piping connections. The program alerted the property owner of the investigation results who then worked together with the program to resolve these problems. The shelter's low water pressure and booster pump crisis had been resolved on November 29th. Because of the multiple reports of problem with the building since May, the property owner verbally advised the program prior to the renewal of the rental agreement in September to look for another home.

Having experienced these multiple problems, the program religiously started looking for other means to improve the shelter environment where it would comply with the Child Care License and as a result, led to the Rigalu House project. The program's goal was to obtain a permanent home conducive to the needs of the children and to comply with the Child Care License. First Lady Christine Calvo offered her support in making this a reality through the Rigalu Foundation. The First Lady's project is called Rigalu House. The initial meeting regarding this project took place on November 5th at Catholic Social Service. Present at this meeting were CSS Executive Director, Alee Shelter's Program Manager, BOSSA Administrator, CSS Development Office Staff, First Lady and Governor's Office Staff. The first event for the Rigalu House project was on December 12th called the telethon, where different organizations are invited to share about their programs and viewers will be calling in to make pledges for this cause. Along with that, raffle tickets at \$5.00 are being sold. All the organizations are given 200 tickets to sell, 20% of that 200 tickets sold will be given back to the organization. The goal for the pledges was \$100,000 and pledges that night exceeded by \$19,000. Following the telethon event, a moving forward meeting for the Rigalu House project took place on December 18th. Present in the meeting were First Lady, Rigalu Foundation Board Member, CSS-Alee Shelter, Department of Public Health Director, BOSSA Administrator, Land Management, GHURA Acting Executive Director, Representative from Governor's Office.

The child care license that expired on September 19 was renewed for another six months, and the new expiration date is March 19.

Alee Shelter Quarterly Report For the period of October, November, December 2012 Page 3 of 5 The Part III (age 3 - 6 years) of the Project Karinu "Incredible Years" program conducted by group leaders Terry Aguon and/or Dr. Lilli Perez resumed on September 18, 2012. This program of nine sessions was completed November 2012.

Alee Shelters program manager and staff continue to strive to support and give utmost dedication to serving the women and children that arrive at the doors.

During the months of October, November, December Alee I sheltered <u>fifteen</u> (15) women, three (3) Chamorro, six (6) Chuukese, two (2) Caucasian, one (1) Japanese, one (1) Filipino, one (1) Mexican, and one (1) Filipino/Japanese and their <u>fourteen</u> (14) children.

Alee Children's shelter completed the quarterly count with **twenty (20)** children. Three of the children are returning clients. Our records show **two (2)** Pohnpeian, **nine (9)** Chamorro, **three (3)** Chuukese, **one (1)** African American, **one (1)** Chamorro/Pohnpeian, **one (1)** Caucasian/Filipino, **one (1)** Japanese/Filipino.

Crisis Hotline Alee Shelter I responded to **two hundred sixty-five** (265) inquiry and intake calls for the quarter. Of the two hundred sixty-five, **twenty-six** (26) were eligible. Fifteen (15) women were received into the shelter, zero (0) stayed elsewhere, eleven (11) did not call back for services. **One hundred ninety-four** (194) were not eligible for services but referred to other agencies or miscellaneous calls. One (1) Adult Protective Services, fifteen (15) were referred to Guma San Jose homeless shelter, two (2) GHURA, zero (0) Counseling, nineteen (19) Alee Office, five (5) GPD, zero (0) Salvation Army, zero (0) Navy Family Advocacy, zero (0) Office of the Attorney General, six (6) Immaculate Heart of Mary (IHOM), three (3) Department of Mental Health, zero (0) Parenting Class, one (1) CPS, three (3) Guam Legal Services, zero (0) Japan Consulate, zero (0) Community Habilitation Program, zero (0) VARO, one (1) One Stop Career Center, two (2) Catholic Social Service, one (1) Ina'fa Maolek, one (1) Guma Mami, one (1) Guam Family Justice Cener, one (1) Disability Program, two (2) Emergency Receiving Home, one (1) LIHENG, fifty-eight (58) Client related, seven (7) Donation, twenty-four (24) office related, forty (40) miscellaneous calls. **Forty-five (45)** women were seeking information only.

INKIND DONATIONS continue to be dropped at the office, which consist of clothing, toys, house wares, furniture, and miscellaneous supplies, which are being distributed amongst the shelter clients as well as Guma San Jose and CSS main office. However, most of the donations are used and not very pleasing.
