

Anticipated Activities List

The Anticipated Activities List is the means by which the Annual Grant Application recognizes the activities that Guam will carry out, which in part, will help achieve goals and objectives established in the NPS-approved Guam Comprehensive Statewide Historic Preservation Plan.

Project activities include: new projects; projects that are continued every fiscal year; or projects that lacked funding in FY 2013, will be implemented in FY 2014.

Anticipated activities are described briefly for each NPS-approved program areas. They are correlated with planned goals and objectives contained in the approved "State Plan."

1. Administration Program Area (Goal 5)

All routine activities associated with budget formulation and execution, finance, personnel management, property management, equal opportunity, and other duties and functions not directly attributable to the other five program areas fall under Administration Program Area. All activities are <u>directly</u> related to managing HPF activities of the State Historic Preservation Office.

a. Title: Management of State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO) website www.historicguam.org.

Description: Procure a qualified Vendor/Consultant to provide technical services to manage the SHPO website. Website has existed since 2006 and has been very useful in establishing a "presence" on the internet. Project activities include upgrading to the most current software version; updating information; posting announcements; documents and plans; site records; providing additional linkages to enhance its attractiveness; providing staff training; and other activities as needed.

b. Title: Digitize Guam and National Register Site Files, and State Inventory

Description: This is an In-House Project that started in FY 2011. The plan then, was to make available in the State Historic Preservation Office, a copier with high efficient capabilities in scanning, storing, retrieving, electronic mail, and other useful features. This has been accomplished. One staff has been and will continue to dedicate time to digitizing the entire Guam Historic Properties (State) Inventory, Review and Compliance Project Files, Survey Reports, Supplemental Site Files, Photo Files. It is anticipated that this project will continue for the next 3 – 5 years, and will continue to be updated in order to conform to new technology and retrieval system.

c. Description: SHPO Server

Description: FY 2011 began the initial process for procuring computer systems, a program server, and GIS hardware and software. Except for the GIS (ArcView) software and one more computer system, everything else has been procured. The next step is to

procure through an RFP for the development and management of the SHPO Server. Once the Server and protocols are established, the public can retrieve information on sites and access reports.

d. Title: Adequate Staffing and Training

Description: Continue to provide training for technical and administrative staff in formulating databases for all records to improve accuracy and efficiency in entering, retrieving disseminating, and storing program information. Training will include Govt. of Guam Dept. of Administration sponsored training in various skill sets in program administration and personnel management.

- 2. Survey and Inventory Program Area (Goals 1, 2, 3, 4, 5)
 - a. Title: Central Villages Guam Architectural Survey, Phase I

Description: This project is required by NPS. It involves a reconnaissance level survey of ten central villages to identify and characterize the range, number, and locations of historic properties in the project areas that are not presently on the National Register; and to determine the significance and eligibility of buildings, structures, sties, and objects. The survey will be conducted by NPS-qualified consultants.

A Project Notification will be submitted to NPS for review and approval. Technical reports will comply with the Secretary of the Interior's Standards and Guidelines for Identification and Evaluation and other acceptable standards for such survey.

b. Title: Guam Historic Properties Inventory System Assessment, Phase II, Implementation

Description: Issue a request for proposals to conduct Phase II as recommended in Phase I of this phased project.

c. Title: In-House Survey

Description: In keeping with the Annual HPF Grant Agreement, an In-House survey will be implemented within the respective grant period. The State Archaeologist will determine which area and/or site to survey that is under Government of Guam jurisdiction or ownership, and prepare for NPS review and approval the Project Notification, which will include a Scope of Work. The survey will adhere to the Secretary of the Interior's Standards for Identification and Evaluation. The final products of this project will include, a Technical Report, and the Guam Historic Properties Inventory Data Form, if appropriate, and if eligible a draft National Register Nomination.

d. Title: Guam Historic Sites Geographic Information System.

Description: Continue to develop, update, and improve the historic sites GIS by assigning the GIS Mapping Technician, upon hiring, to perform all the tasks and duties required to establish a reliable, dependable, useful, and public accessible Geographical Information System. The purchase of essential GIS software and GIS field equipment, such as the Trimble GEO latest model, may be necessary. The GISMT will review all site records and documents contained in the Guam Historic Properties Inventory to ensure accurateness.

- 3. Review and Compliance Program Area (Goals 1, 2, 4, 5)
 - a. Title: Regulatory Reviews Routine

Description: Continue conducting state and federal regulatory project reviews; attend meetings and working sessions; and assist and guide state, federal, and private entities through the consultation process relative to state and federal historic preservation responsibilities and requirements. Continue reviewing, developing, and implementing forms, procedures, requirements, and guidelines, to expedite reviews, and ensure program data entries are matched to cumulative products.

b. Title: Section 106 Seminar

Description: Procure a knowledgeable and expert trainer to conduct a seminar in Section 106. This training is usually provided to state and federal agencies every two years. The last seminar was conducted in 2010. It is critical for such a seminar to occur in 2014 or 2015 because of the increase in permit and project reviews, and more importantly to help both state and federal representatives become familiar and/or re-acquainted with the 106 process.

c. Title: Programmatic Agreement on the Military Relocation - Project Reviews

Description: Continue to implement the March 9, 2011 Programmatic Agreement. The Agreement contains approximately 165 Dept. of Defense (DoD) projects that will require Section 106 reviews. These projects will take an inordinate amount of time to review, most especially if they require scopes of work, research designs, and various plans to address monitoring, discovery, and data recovery to mitigate adverse effects. A DoD-funded Liaison has not been hired to assist in the workload imposed by the Buildup due to a funding shortfalls.

- 4. National Register Program Area (Goal 1)
 - a. In-House National Register Nomination

Description: Professional NPS qualified staff will nominate one site, as required in the Annual HPF Grant Agreement. The nomination may include sites that have been listed on the Guam Register; the Tarague Beach District; Pictograph (cave wall paintings) –

thematic nomination; and Two Lovers' Point – traditional Cultural Property; just to name a few. A Project Notification will provided to NPS review and approval.

- 5. Planning Program Area (Goals 1, 2, 3, 4, 5)
 - a. Title: Continue Implementing the 2007 -2011 NPS-Approved State Plan

Description: NPS has approved SHPO's request to extend Guam's planning cycle.

b. Title: State Plan Update

Description: Advertise for request for proposals to Update the Guam Comprehensive Historic Preservation Plan. The Consultant selected must comply with the Secretary of the Interior's Standards and Guidelines for Planning and other NPS requirements. Project activities will include generating public interest and active involvement in preservation planning, conducting meetings, preparing a draft and final for NPS review.

- 6. Other Program Area Public Awareness (Goals 2 and 3)
 - a. Title: Community Training in National Register Documentation, Basic Reconnaissance Survey Skills, or HABS/HAER Documentation.

Description: This project will continue to be included in future HPF Grant Applications. The project will entail an internship program with the University of Guam and Guam Community College that specifically focuses on history, anthropology, archaeology, and historic preservation related disciplines. Projects may also be pursued with other entities interested in providing training to the community. Projects may include survey projects, National Register nomination documentation projects, and such other projects.

b. Title: Production, publication, and printing of historic preservation program-related literature.

Description: Publication of historic preservation related literature is a continuing project. It has been proven that the written word can be a significant factor in the way the public responds to preservation efforts. With the Military Relocation occurring in the next 4-5 years, the interest in preserving Guam's historic sites is more urgent. The Guam SHP Office will assess what needs to be produced, published, printed, or be involved in. Literature may include: "protection of sites," "the value of preservation," "careers in historic preservation," posters, and other literature that espouses preservation, protection, registration, and presentation of cultural resources, specifically, historic properties.

c. Title: Partnerships

Description: Develop and establish partnerships through letters of agreement or other conveyances, with groups and organizations that promote cultural preservation, land conservation, coral reef conservation, student achievement, magazines geared toward

students, environmental awareness, such as, the Humåtak Community Foundation, the Tourism Education Council, Dept. of Education Chamorro Culture and Language Program, Playground Magazine, and such others.

d. Title: Public Awareness and Public Education

Description: Continue to provide assistance, lectures, exhibits, displays, and presentations on historic preservation, history of Guam, historic sites, current issues on historic preservation, and similar, to engender more interest in historic preservation. Events may include Chamorro Month, Career Day, Charter Day, Youth Tourism Summit, Village Events and Fiestas, and such other that require staff participation, or considered beneficial to the community.

Program Overview

Administration. The Department's greatest internal need is to recruit for more staff for the review and compliance program, survey and inventory, and administrative/grants management. Not only does the Guam Historic Resources Division manage the (Federal) HPF Program, it also administers the State program pursuant Tile 21, Guam Code Annotated, Chapter 76, Historical Objects and Sites.

Administration staff will continue performing daily routine tasks and duties in grants management, administrative oversight, personnel matters, project and program coordination, State Board support functions, just to name a few.

<u>Survey and Inventory</u>. Another large survey is planned – it is the second phase of the NPS required architectural survey. Central villages will be surveyed this fiscal year. The project will be procured through an RFT. Another required survey is the in-house survey. The State Archaeologist will select a site owned by, or under the jurisdiction of the Government of Guam.

Several priorities will be highly regarded this fiscal year, as it relates to the State Inventory, i.e., Guam Historic Properties Inventory. Priorities include updating several digital layers on the GIS; preparing for the GHPI System Assessment; and continuing to digitize site files, reports, supplemental site files, and such other files. This is an on-going activity that will become routine once the digitization project is complete. Once the inventory system and its protocols are established, researchers, planners, archaeologists, and the public can rely on accessing data and information.

The Final Proposed Guidelines for Conducting and Reporting Cultural Resources Survey on the Island of Guam is a work in progress and should be completed by December 31, 2014.

Review and Compliance. The Division conducts routine reviews amidst other program and/or project matters. Reviews include state and federal projects, such as, but not limited to: construction development projects; permit applications for clearing, grading, foundation, building, use of easements, and other permits issued by the Guam Dept. of Public Works; Guam Land Use Commission Applications for zone changes, commercial development, and other GLUC applications; Guam Attorney General probate and land matters; USDA Loan Applications and other federal loans; HUD projects; USEPA projects; and other reviews regulated under 36 CFR 800, and Title 21 Guam Code Annotated, Chapter 76. Ninety percent of the technical staff time is dedicated to this program. The Military Relocation also accounts for the increase in submittals requiring staff review.

A Section 106 Seminar is planned within the next to years. It's important for staff and agencies to understand the fundamentals of preparing the required 106 documentation before submitting it to SHPO for review. So much of Division staff time is spent training State and Federal agency staff on the process and on the required documentation. A seminar on this will likely benefit these agencies – and Division staff.

National and Guam Register. The large survey mentioned above under Survey and Inventory, will

determine what properties are eligible for listing on the National and Guam registers. One In-House (Division) nomination will be completed for the fiscal year. Other nominations planned include the Tarague Beach District, Two-Lovers' Point (Traditional Cultural Property), or Pictograph – Cave Wall Paintings – Thematic Nomination.

<u>Planning.</u> An RFP will be advertised to Update the Guam Comprehensive Historic Preservation Plan.

Other - Public Awareness. The most demanding and pressing threats and dangers to cultural resources are neglect, vandalism, and looting. The Department plans to pursue a stronger partnership with the Guam Preservation Trust to restore, repair, and/or rehabilitate historic structures and buildings.

The Department will produce literature on preservation – examples are listed in the Anticipated Activities List (Item 4).

Partnerships will be developed through letters of agreement or other conveyances that establishes partnering efforts in preservation.

Treatment of fringe benefits: Fringe benefits applicable to direct salaries and wages are treated as direct costs; fringe benefits applicable to indirect salaries and wages are treated as indirect costs.

Section II: General

Page 1 of 2

- A. Limitations: Use of the rates contained in this agreement is subject to any applicable statutory limitations. Acceptance of the rates agreed to herein is predicated upon these conditions: (1) no costs other than those incurred by the subject organization were included in its indirect cost rate proposal, (2) all such costs are the legal obligations of the grantee/contractor, (3) similar types of costs have been accorded consistent treatment, and (4) the same costs that have been treated as indirect costs have not been claimed as direct costs (for example, supplies can be charged directly to a program or activity as long as these costs are not part of the supply costs included in the indirect cost pool for central administration).
- B. Audit: All costs (direct and indirect, federal and non-federal) are subject to audit. Adjustments to amounts resulting from audit of the cost allocation plan or indirect cost rate proposal upon which the negotiation of this agreement was based will be compensated for in a subsequent negotiation.
- C. Changes: The rates contained in this agreement are based on the organizational structure and the accounting system in effect at the time the proposal was submitted. Changes in organizational structure, or changes in the method of accounting for costs which affect the amount of reimbursement resulting from use of the rates in this agreement, require the prior approval of the responsible negotiation agency. Failure to obtain such approval may result in subsequent audit disallowance.

- D. Fixed Carryforward Rate: The fixed carryforward rate is based on an estimate of the costs that will be incurred during the period for which the rate applies. When the actual costs for such period have been determined, an adjustment will be made to the rate for a future period, if necessary, to compensate for the difference between the costs used to establish the fixed rate and the actual costs.
- E. Agency Notification: Copies of this document may be provided to other federal offices as a means of notifying them of the agreement contained herein.
- F. Record Keeping: Organizations must maintain accounting records that demonstrate that each type of cost has been treated consistently either as a direct cost or an indirect cost. Records pertaining to the costs of program administration, such as salaries, travel, and related costs, should be kept on an annual basis.
- G. Reimbursement Ceilings: Grantee/contractor program agreements providing for ceilings on indirect cost rates or reimbursement amounts are subject to the ceilings stipulated in the contract or grant agreements. If the ceiling rate is higher than the negotiated rate in Section I of this agreement, the negotiated rate will be used to determine the maximum allowable indirect cost.
- H. Use of Other Rates: If any federal programs are reimbursing indirect costs to this grantee/contractor by a measure other than the approved rates in this agreement, the grantee/contractor should credit such costs to the affected programs and the approved rates should be used to identify the maximum amount of indirect cost allocable to these programs.
- I. Central Service Costs: Where central service costs are estimated for the calculation of indirect cost rates, adjustments will be made to reflect the difference between provisional and final amounts.

J. Other:

- 1. The purpose of an indirect cost rate is to facilitate the allocation and billing of indirect costs. Approval of the indirect cost rates does not mean that an organization can recover more than the actual costs of a particular program or activity.
- 2. Programs received or initiated by the organization subsequent to the negotiation of this agreement are subject to the approved indirect cost rate if the programs receive administrative support from the indirect cost pool. It should be noted that this could result in an adjustment to a future rate.
- 3. New indirect cost proposals are necessary to obtain approved indirect cost rates for future fiscal or calendar years. The proposals are due in our office 6 months prior to the beginning of the year to which the proposed rates will apply.

PAG pledges revenue to service debt | New models seen to spur

THE Port Authority of Guam is now on the final stages of closing a \$10 million loan agreement with the Bank of Guam. which is requiring the agency to submit a financial statement that guarantees its consistent > ability to service the debt.

Bank of Guam has asked the s port authority to provide a fiscal है report detailing funding sources in case of payment default. In particular. BOG requires the seaport management to pledge a portion of its annual cargo and facility rental revenues to cover its debt payments in the event of a default.

Cargo revenue represented \$1.14 percent or \$28.4 million of the port authority's year-todate July 2013 earnings, white 18.9 percent or \$6.6 million came from facilities, leases and other services. Compared with the budgeted amount of \$34 million, overall operating revenues posted a 2 percent growth.

PAG reported that this year's cargo revenue swelled 24 percent from last year's \$22.9 million and at least 1 percent higher than the projected amount of \$28.1 million, Earnings from facilities, leases and other services also jumped 8 percent from the previous year's \$6.2 million and are about \$400,000 higher than the

\$6.2 million projection.

As part of the \$10 million loan's terms, BOG also requires PAG to maintain a 1.5 debt service coverage ratio, Port Authority Deputy General Manager Maria Taitano told the Board in a public meeting held Thursday.

Debt service coverage ratio is a benchmark used in the measurement of an entity's ability to produce enough cash to cover its debt payments. Breaching a debt service coverage ratio agreement can be considered, in some cases, an act of default.

Taitano said the seaport management has identified funding sources for this pledge and will submit the financial report to BOG and the Guam Economic Development Authority, which is facilitating the loan on PAG's behalf.

Proceeds from the BOG toan will be used for PAG's wharf i construction and repair project. 1 The port authority is looking to execute the project contract by December and begin construction work by April, following the completion of the permitting process.

Project designs, plans and estimates for the wharf construction and repairs have been completed. The Committee on Public

Safety, Infrastructure & Mari-Transportation earlier enacted Bill 86, now Public Law 32-43, to clear the way for a commercial loan with BOG. P.L. 32-43 authorizes PAG to waive sovereign immunity to satisfy a prerequisite for approval of the \$10 million loan from BOG.

The Bureau of Statistics and Plans reported that imports under transportation and parts category - including automobiles - nearly quadrupled to \$19.2 million in May from \$5.3 million in February.


