



Our Children still seek services from Child Protective Services, Guam Early Intervention, Project Karinu, DPHSS, DMHS and DOE.

### Alee I Catherine's Home: Family Violence Domestic Assault Shelter

Alee I Family Violence Domestic program had sheltered ten (10) women and sixteen (16) children. In October, we received three (3) women and six (6) children. Seven (7) Women and ten (10) children were still housed at the shelter from prior months. Alee I received fifty—seven (57) calls through the hotline, forty-six (46) client related, six (6) office related, one (1) hang up and four (4) for donations.

October 3, 2013: Client 2180 exited the shelter after applying for a Protection Order through Guam Legal Services Corporation (GLSC).

Alee Shelter Quarterly Report For the period of October, November, December 2013 Page 4 of 15 October 4, 2013: Clients 2176 and 2186 exited the shelter. Client 2186 did not file a Protection Order because she felt safe enough to return home after abuser was arrested. Client 2176 was granted a Protection Order through applying as a Pro-Se.

October 5, 2013: Client 2185 breached confidentiality and exited the shelter on this day.

October 13, 2013: Client 2078-1 was granted a Protection Order with the assistance of GLSC and exited the shelter.

October 14, 2013: Client 2187 exited the shelter to reside with an aunt prior to applying for a Protection Order.

Client 2178 transferred to Guma San Jose Homeless Shelter, she exited our shelter on October 24. She was granted Protection Order with the assistance of GLSC.

Still housed in the shelter are client 1436-2 and 2188. Client 1436-2 was granted a Protection Order and is waiting for the transition programs through Oasis. Client 2188 applied for a Protection Order through GLSC and is scheduled to meet with her attorney.

Alee I Family Violence and Domestic Assault Program Received Nine (9) clients related, one (1) hung up and thirty-one (31) office related calls. A total of six (6) women were provided services at Catherine's Home; Two (2) Chamorro, One (1) Saipananese, One (1) Carolinian, One (I) Filipino and One (1) Chuukese. Along with them there were sixteen (16) children; nine (9) boys and seven (7) girls.

Client 1436-2 a repeat client from September 30, 2013 and was referred for services and applied for a Temporary Protection Order (TPO) at Guam Legal Services Corporation (GLSC) and was granted a Protection Order on the day of exited November 13, 2013.

Client 2188 was referred for services and applied for a Temporary Protection Order (TPO) at Guam Legal Services Corporation (GLSC) and was granted a Protection Order. Client was referred to Guma San Jose however declined the service and exited to family member's household on November 14, 2013.

Client 1896-3 a repeat client was referred for services on November 6, 2013 however refused to apply for a Temporary Protection Order (TPO) and exited to a family member's household on November 7, 2013.

Client 2189 was referred for services on November 21, 2013 however refused to apply for a Temporary Protection Order (TPO) and client exited the same day.

Client 2190 was referred for services on November 24, 2013 refused to apply for a Temporary Protection Order (TPO) stating that the Stay Away Order was sufficient for her protection.

Client 2191 was referred for services on November 29, 2013 and exited the Shelter on the same day without applying for a temporary Protection Order (TPO).

December was a strenuous month for Alee I Catherine's Home for Family Violence Domestic Assault shelter.

A total of Three (3) clients for the month of December, two (2) new clients and one (1) from the previous month, who exited the beginning of the month of December.

Client 2191 exited on December 1, 2013 was taken to Guam Legal Services Corporation to apply for Temporary Protective Order, however changed her mind and exited.

Client 2192 had already sought legal services prior to entering the shelter. Her attorney prepared a Petition for Protection from her alleged abuser. Her Protection Order was pending upon exiting the shelter.

Client 2193 was taken to Guam Legal Services to apply for a Temporary Protection Order; her appointment with her attorney is set for January 30, 2014. She was also referred to Guma San Jose, Oasis Empowerment Center, The Salvation Army and Guam Housing & Urban Renewal Authority seeking temporary housing.

Fifty-nine (59) callers called, Nine (9) were referred to other agencies; Three (3) were referred to Adult Protective Services, Two (2) to Guma San Jose, One (1) to Child Protective Service, Two Alee Shelter Quarterly Report

(2) to The Oasis Empowerment Center, One (1) to The Salvation Army. Out of Forty-two (42) calls; Eleven (11) are client related, Sixteen (16) office related, Two (2) hang up calls, and Thirteen (13) Donations calls.

### Alee II Shelter for abused or Neglected Children

As of today, we currently have fourteen (14) Children who were placed by Child Protective Services as a result of physical neglect; Seven (7) Chamorro and seven (7) Pohnpeians. The shelter provides Personal Care, Teaching Life Skills, Transportation and Recreational Outings.

We have two (2) Pohnpeian Siblings who still have furloughs at their Potential Foster Parents home. The potential Foster Parent is working to develop a relationship with the children before permanent placement is made.

We have a Chamorro Family of Three (3) who currently have supervised visitation with their Biological Mother at Child Protective Services. The children receive services from l'famagunta, Guam Early Intervention and Client Services from the Superior Court. The shelter provides transportation to and from destination.

We have a Chamorro Family of Four (4) who still have supervised visitation once a week at Child Protective Services with their Biological Parents. The shelter provides transportation to and from site.

We have a Pohnpeian Family of Five (5) who still has visitations at Child Protective Services with their Biological Parents on different days. One (1) child out of the five (5) receives counseling services at l'Famagunta. The shelter provides transportation to and from site.

Our Children receive services from Child Protective Services, Project Karinu, Department of Public Health and Social Services, Guam Behavioral and Wellness Center and the Department Of Education.

October 19, 2013: Alee Shelter II staff Octavia Cruz and Dana Molly attended CPR Training.

October 23, 2013: Alee Shelter Children attended a special dinner at Santa Barbara Church.

October 27, 2013: Alee Shelter Children attended Halloween Party at the Dededo Sports Complex sponsored by the Alee Shelter.

Lastly, we still receive calls for donations from different donors, but all calls are referred to our Program Manager.

As of today, Alee II has fourteen (14) Children who were placed by Child Protective Services as a result of physical neglect; Seven (7) Chamorro and seven (7) Pohnpeians. The shelter provides Personal Care, Teaching Life Skills, Transportation and Recreational Outings.

We have two (2) Pohnpeian Siblings of which one (1) was placed with a Foster Parent and exited the shelter on November 8, 2013. The other sibling continues to have weekend furloughs with the same Foster Parent and eventual transition is likely.

We have a Chamorro Family of Three (3) who currently have supervised visitation with their Biological Mother at Child Protective Services. The children receive services from I'famagunta, Guam Early Intervention and Client Services from the Superior Court. The shelter provides transportation to and from destination.

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Our Children receive services from Child Protective Services, Project Karinu, Department of Public Health and Social Services, Guam Behavioral and Wellness Center and the Department Of Education.

Lastly, we still receive calls for donations from different donors, but all calls are referred to our Acting Program Manager.

December was a busy month for the Abused/Neglected Children Shelter. For the month of December, we had numerous outings from different donors and sponsors. We have fifteen (15) Children this month, which were placed by Child Protective Services. The shelter continues to provide Personal Care, Teaching Life Skills, Transportation and Recreational Outings.

For the Month of December we have a total of fifteen (15) Children who are Physically Neglected. Six (6) Pohnpeians, Seven (7) Chamorro and Two (2) Chuukese.

We have one (1) Pohnpeian who still continues to have sleepovers at his potential foster parent's house. He spent Christmas break with them. At school, he continues to seek services from Special Education and is being monitored by a one to one. Transportation under SPED is still pending. An Individual Education Plan (IEP) meeting is scheduled for some time in April for a re-evaluation. Overall Child is doing well.

A Chamorro Family of Three (3) has supervised visitations for two hours at Erica's House. The children receive services from I'Famagunta, Guam Early Intervention and Client Services. The Shelter provides transportation to and from destination.

A Chamorro Family of Four (4) has un-supervised visitation once week with Biological Mom. They no longer see their Bio Dad, due to being incarcerated. The Shelter provides transportation to and from site. Overall the children are healthy and doing well.

A Pohnpeian Family of Five (5) has supervised visits with Biological Parents at Paseo Park on separate days. The children visit Dad every Tuesday of the week and Mom on every Thursday of the week. One child still seeks counseling services from I' Famagunta once a month or when needed. One child is being observed for his behavior with Project Karinu. Assessments are still ongoing with the child. The Shelter provides transportation to and from site for visitation and Appointments.

A Chuukese Family of two (2) came to us on December 7, 2013. They were placed by Child Protective Services. The children have supervised visits with parents once a week at Child Protective Services. Overall, both children are adjusting well with their peers and environment.

### **Transitional Housing**

### For the month of October

Three (3) no-cost, safe, and secure two-bedroom apartment units are rented under the Alee Shelter's TH Program (Grant No. 2011-WH-AX-0005). The program currently serves a total of three (3) clients. The Alee Family Violence Domestic Shelter referred all clients.

The client that entered the program on January 4, 2013 has full custody of her one (1) minor child. Client is employed and attending college. Her school tuition is paid through a Pell Grant. Client acquired forms to visit her father in California. Client's father is currently incarcerated. Client followed up with Guam Housing and Urban Renewal as to where on the list for Section 8 she falls and was informed that she is number 2,775. Client has been working diligently to budget and save money. Client would like to work more hours but is unable to due to unreliable childcare for her son. Client does not receive child support but is trying to seek sole custody of her son. The Social Worker conducted a unit inspection and found living areas and furniture/appliances to be well kept and clean.

The client that entered the program on July 9, 2013 has one (1) child. Client is a single parent to an 11-year-old son. Client has been experiencing medical issues and is receiving medical treatment. Client is working with an attorney to determine whether or not she will pursue a claim against the Guam Memorial Hospital.

The client that entered the program on August 27, 2013 has two (2) children. Client and her former husband are working with Erica's House to coordinate visitation. Client is now receiving SNAP benefits. Client is having some difficulties with the transition to her apartment unit because of feelings of loneliness and isolation. Client was given a Guam Housing and Urban Renewal application packet. Client was also provided with contact information to ISA Psychological Services to set up counseling sessions for both her and her children.

The Social Worker attended to issues concerning TH units:

- Unit B1: No maintenance required at this time.
- Unit B5: Client reported to SW that the commode is still leaking and the air conditioning unit in one of the rooms is not working. SW will continue to follow-up with Realty Agency about maintenance for the commode.
- Unit B7: No maintenance required at this time.

### The month of November

The social worker and Program Manager continue to look for training opportunities that will enhance the TH program and services provided to the TH clients.

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The Social Worker attended to issues concerning TH units:

- Unit B1: No maintenance required at this time.
- Unit B5: No maintenance required at this time.
