

# PROJECTS FOR ASSISTANCE IN TRANSITION FROM HOMELESSNESS (PATH)

## AGREEMENT

I hereby certify that the State of <u>Guam</u>\_agrees to the following:

Section 522(a). Amounts received under the PATH Formula Grant Program will be expended solely for making grants to political subdivisions of the State, and to nonprofit private entities for the purpose of providing the services specified in Section 522(b) to individuals who:

- Are suffering from serious mental illness;
- Are suffering from serious mental illness and have a substance use disorder; and
- Are homeless or at imminent risk of becoming homeless.

Section 522(b). Entities receiving grants under the PATH Formula Grant Program will expend funds for the following services:

• Outreach;

- · Screening and diagnostic treatment;
- Habilitation and rehabilitation;
- Community mental health;
- Alcohol or drug treatment;
- Staff training, including the training of individuals who work in shelters, mental health clinics, substance abuse programs, and other sites where homeless individuals require services;
- Case management services, including:
  - Preparing a plan for the provision of community mental health services to the eligible homeless individual involved, and reviewing such plan not less than once every 3 months;

- o Providing assistance in obtaining and coordinating social and maintenance services for the eligible homeless individuals, including services relating to daily living activities, personal financial planning, transportation services, and habilitation and rehabilitation services, prevocational and vocational services, and housing;
- Providing assistance to the eligible homeless individual in obtaining income support services, including housing assistance, food stamps, and supplemental security income benefits;
- o Referring the eligible homeless individual for such other services as may be appropriate; and
- Providing representative payee services in accordance with Section 1631(a) (2) of the Social Security Act if the eligible homeless individual is receiving aid under Title XVI of such act and if the applicant is designated by the Secretary to provide such services.
- Supportive and supervisory services in residential settings;
- Referrals for primary health services, job training, education services and relevant housing services;
- Housing services [subject to Section 522(h)(1)] including
  - Minor renovation, expansion, and repair of housing: •
  - Planning of housing;
  - Technical assistance in applying for housing assistance;
  - Improving the coordination of housing services;
  - Security deposits;
  - The costs associated with matching eligible homeless individuals with appropriate housing situations;
  - One-time rental payments to prevent eviction; and ٠
  - Other appropriate services, as determined by the Secretary.

Section 522(c). The State will make grants pursuant to Section 522(a) only to entities that have the capacity to provide, directly through arrangements, the services specified in Section 522(b), including coordinating the provision of services in order to meet the

needs of eligible homeless individuals who are both mentally ill and suffering from a substance abuse disorder.

Section 522(d). In making grants to entities pursuant to Section 522(a), the State will give special consideration to entities with a demonstrated effectiveness in serving homeless veterans.

Section 522(e). The state agrees that grants pursuant to Section 522(a) will not be made to any entity that

- Has a policy of excluding individuals from mental health services due to the existence or suspicion of a substance abuse disorder; or
- Has a policy of excluding individuals from substance abuse services due to the existence or suspicion of mental illness.

Section 522(f). Not more than 4 percent of the payments received under the PATH Formula Grant Program will be expended for administrative expenses regarding the payments.

Section 522(g). The State will maintain State expenditures for services specified in Section 522(b) at a level that is not less than the average level of such expenditures maintained by the State for the 2-year period preceding the fiscal year for which the State is applying to receive such payments.

Section 522(h). The State aggress that

- Not more than 20 percent of the payments will be expended for housing services under section 522(b)(10); and
- The payments will not be expended o To support emergency

shelters or construction of housing facilities;

- For inpatient psychiatric treatment costs or inpatient substance abuse treatment costs; or
- o To make cash payments to intended recipients of mental health or substance abuse services.

Section 523(a). The State will make available, directly or through donations from public or private entities, non-Federal contributions toward such costs in an amount that is not less than \$1 for each \$3 of funds provided in such payments. The amount of non-Federal contributions shall be determined in accordance with Section 523(b).

Section 523(c). The State will not require the entities to which grants are provided pursuant to Section 522(a) to provide non-Federal contributions in excess of the non-Federal contributions described in Section 523(a).

Section 526. The State has attached hereto a Statement

- Identifying existing programs providing services and housing to eligible homeless individuals and gaps in the delivery systems of such programs;
- Containing a plan for providing services and housing to eligible homeless individuals, which:
  - Describes the coordinated and comprehensive means of providing services and housing to homeless individuals; and
  - Includes documentation that suitable housing for eligible homeless individuals will accompany the provision of services to such individuals;
- Describing the source of the non-Federal contributions described in Section 523;
- Containing assurances that the non-Federal contributions described in Section 523 will be available at the beginning of the grant period;
- Describing any voucher system that may be used to carry out this part; and
- Containing such other information or assurances as the Secretary may reasonably require.

Section 527(a) (1), (2), and (3). The State has attached hereto a description of the intended use of PATH Formula grant amounts for which the State is applying. This description

- Identifies the geographic areas within the State in which the greatest numbers of homeless individuals with a need for mental health, substance abuse, and housing services are located; and
- Provides information relating to the program and activities to be supported and services to be provided, including information relating to coordinating such programs and activities with any similar programs and activities of public and private entities.

Section 527(a) (4). The description of intended use for the fiscal year of the amounts for which the State is applying will be revised throughout the year as may be necessary

to reflect substantial changes in the programs and activities assisted by the State pursuant to the PATH Formula Grant Program.

Section 527(b). In developing and carrying out the description required in Section 527(a), the State will provide public notice with respect to the description (including any revisions) and such opportunities as may be necessary to provide interested clients, such as family members, consumers and mental health, substance abuse, and housing agencies, an opportunity to present comments and recommendations with respect to the description.

Section 527(c) (1) (2). The services to be provided pursuant to the description of the intended use required in Section 527(a), have been considered in the preparation of, have been included in, and are consistent with the State Plan for Comprehensive Community Mental Health Services under P.L. 102-321.

Section 528(a). The State will, by January 31, 2015, prepare and submit a report providing such information as is necessary for:

- Securing a record and description of the purposes for which amounts received under the PATH Formula Grant Program were expended during fiscal year 2014 and of the recipients of such amounts; and
- Determining whether such amounts were expended in accordance with the provisions of Part C – PATH.

Section 528(b). The State further agrees that it will make copies of the reports described in Section 528(a) available for public inspection.

Section 529. Payments may not be made unless the State agreements are made through certification from the chief executive officer of the State.

### **Charitable Choice Provisions:**

  - Providing assistance in obtaining and coordinating social and maintenance services for the eligible homeless individuals, including services relating to daily living activities, personal financial planning, transportation services, and habilitation and rehabilitation services, prevocational and vocational services, and housing;
  - Providing assistance to the eligible homeless individual in obtaining income support services, including housing
    assistance, food stamps, and supplemental security income benefits;
  - · Referring the eligible homeless individual for such other services as may be appropriate; and
  - Providing representative payee services in accordance with Section 1631(a)(2) of the Social Security Act if the eligible homeless individual is receiving aid under Title XVI of such act and if the applicant is designated by the Secretary to provide such services.
- Supportive and supervisory services in residential settings;
- Referrals for primary health services, job training, education services and relevant housing services;
- Housing services [subject to Section 522(h)(1)] including:
  - Minor renovation, expansion, and repair of housing;
  - · Planning of housing;
  - Technical assistance in applying for housing assistance;
  - · Improving the coordination of housing services;
  - · Security deposits;
  - The costs associated with matching eligible homeless individuals with appropriate housing situations;
  - · One-time rental payments to prevent eviction; and
  - Other appropriate services, as determined by the Secretary.

#### Section 522(c)

The State will make grants pursuant to Section 522(a) only to entities that have the capacity to provide, directly through arrangements, the services specified in Section 522(b), including coordinating the provision of services in order to meet the needs of eligible homeless individuals who are both mentally ill and suffering from a substance abuse disorder.

In making grants to entities pursuant to Section 522(a), the State will give special consideration to entities with a demonstrated effectiveness in serving homeless veterans.

The state agrees that grants pursuant to Section 522(a) will not be made to any entity that:

- Has a policy of excluding individuals from mental health services due to the existence or suspicion of a substance abuse disorder; or
- Has a policy of excluding individuals from substance abuse services due to the existence or suspicion of mental illness.

Not more than 4 percent of the payments received under the PATH Formula Grant Program will be expended for administrative expenses regarding the payments.

3. Intended Use Plans (IUP)

### A. Local Provider Description:

The current PATH provider, WestCare Pacific Island is a non-profit organization with the qualified number of years of service to persons with disabilities will continue receiving PATH funds. The selected vendor will provide services to persons with a mental illness, a developmental disability, or a co-occurring disability (mental illness and developmental disability). The entire island of Guam will be served because of the island's small geographic size.

WestCare, a family of tax-exempt nonprofit organizations, provides a wide spectrum of health and human services in both residential and outpatient environments. The services include substance abuse and addiction treatment, homeless and runaway shelters, domestic violence treatment and prevention, and mental health programs.

GBHWC will contract the services of a non-profit organization for the sum of \$45,700 from the PATH funds. GBHWC will receive \$4,300 for administrative costs from the PATH funds. Finally, GBHWC will also provide \$2,704 of in-kind services to the program to assist in program management.

### B. <u>Collaboration with HUD Continuum of Care Program:</u>

GBHWC and WestCare Pacific Island are active members of Guam's Homeless Coalition, comprised of the various homeless providers. The organizations meet monthly and has created a continuum of care plan that addresses the gaps in services for the island's homeless population. The coalition is administered by the Guam Housing and Urban Renewal Authority and is actively involved in HUD grant funding opportunities.

### C. Collaboration with Local Community Organizations:

The provision of mental health and substance abuse services to homeless individuals are coordinated at the State-level by the GBHWC for the provision of outreach, case management, counseling, mental health and substance abuse services, residential treatment services, and referral services. The Department of Public Health and Social Services for the provision of health care through Medicare, Medicaid and the Medically Indigent Program (MIP), food stamps, general assistance and other generic health and social services. Housing services are coordinated by the Guam Housing and Urban Renewal Agency (GHURA) and the GBHWC. Eligible clients are referred for rehabilitation and sheltered care through low cost Section 8 housing, public housing, Mainstream Program, Shelter Plus Care (S+C), Supportive Housing Program (SHP) or to Guma Ifil (Adult Residential Treatment Facility for individuals, including those who are homeless with (SMI) at the GBHWC. Temporary shelter is also available by non-profit GUAM FY 2014 PATH Block Grant Application

organization Catholic Social Services, through public health or public housing block grants. The Salvation Army's One-Stop Center for homeless services provides information on available services for Guam's homeless population. The one-stop center ensures that the continuum of services is operating in a well coordinated manner and accessible to all homeless individuals.

### D. <u>Service Provision:</u>

- 1. In FY 2013 at least 30 eligible homeless individuals will be contacted and enrolled using PATH funds.
- 2. PATH funds will be used to continue running a drop-in center component of the Sagan Mami ("our place") program for homeless or at-risk of becoming homeless adults with a serious mental illness. Services to include: Screening; referrals; nutrition materials; community resource center.

Housing services are coordinated by the Guam Housing and Urban Renewal Agency (GHURA) and the GBHWC. Eligible clients are referred for rehabilitation and sheltered care through low cost Section 8 housing, public housing, Mainstream Program, Housing 1<sup>st</sup>-Shelter Plus Care (S+C), and Guma Hinemlo a Supportive Housing Program (SHP). Temporary shelter is also available by non-profit organization Catholic Social Services, through public health or public housing block grants. The Salvation Army's One-Stop Center for homeless services provides information on available services for Guam's homeless population. The one-stop center ensures that the continuum of services is operating in a well-coordinated manner and accessible to all homeless individuals.
- 5. Current and anticipated gaps in MH and other needed services that may be encountered by the PATH-funded organization (non-profit organization): Easily accessible transportation; a temporary shelter for homeless adults with a serious mental illness will continue to be gaps for the PATH-funded

organization; and a clubhouse for adults. The Sagan Mami Programs now includes a Supported Employment Program and Enrichment Resource Center.

- 6. GBHWC has a program called Mental Illness and Chemical Abuse (MICA) that serves at-risk of becoming homeless individuals with a co-occurring illness. Group processes focus on education of substance abuse and mental illness. Components of twelve steps, recovery goals, relapse prevention, stress management, and education on psychotropic medications. Each group member is encouraged to attend self-help groups such as Alcoholics Anonymous and Narcotics Anonymous.
- 7. GBHWC's Community Support Services provides case management services to homeless adults with a serious mental illness. Services include: planning of housing; costs associated with matching eligible homeless individuals with appropriate housing situations; and technical assistance in applying for housing assistance.

### E. <u>Data:</u>

GBHWC presently participates in the submission of data to GHC-COC HMIS for its permanent supportive housing program activities and will request for additional technical assistance from PATH and HUD in order to migrate PATH data into the HMIS system within the three to five year period.

### F. SSI/SSDI:

Residents of Guam are not entitled to SSI benefits. However, some homeless individuals receive SSDI benefits. The DPHSS provide in-service training on social security benefits. The GBHWC Community Support Services social workers have participated in the trainings and will assist the PATH provider to help consumers access these benefits.

### G. Access to Housing:

Members of the Sagan Mami Program are provided with information on available housing services. The Sagan Mami participants are referred to the public housing authority and other organizations that provide housing services.

The PATH provider will be an active member of Guam's Homeless Coalition, comprised of the various homeless providers. The organization meets monthly and has created a continuum of care plan that addresses the gaps in services for the island's homeless population. The coalition is administered by the Guam Housing and Urban Renewal Authority and is actively involved in HUD grant funding opportunities.

### H. <u>Staff Information:</u>

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- a. WestCare Pacific Islands staff completed the Culturally and Linguistically Appropriate Service Program (CLASP) interpreter training and continue to participate in trainings offered by the Office of Minority Health services in the Department of Public Health and Social Services. This includes on-going training in Culturally and Linguistically Appropriate Services (CLAS). Additionally, WestCare Pacific Islands offer services through the Guahan Project (such as testing, counseling, outreach, and prevention services). The Guahan Project promotes healthy and safe lifestyle including knowing health risks, HIV/AIDS and STD status and other noncommunicable diseases.
- b. The Sagan Mami Program drop-in center component provides stipends to consumers of mental health services in the operation of the service. The policy for the program will ensure consumer participation in the planning, implementation and evaluation of the service.
- c. Extent to which staff receive periodic training in cultural competence:

GBHWC work with the current PATH provider, WestCare Pacific Islands, to ensure that staffs receive periodic training in cultural competence.

This definition has been expanded to include the term homeless individual as defined in Section 340 (r) of the Public Health Service Act as follows: Homeless Individual means an individual who lacks housing (without regard to whether the individual is a member of a family), including an individual whose primary residence during the night is a supervised public or private facility that provides temporary living accommodations and the individual who is a resident in transitional housing.
Imminent Risk of Becoming Homeless:	b. Imminent Risk of Becoming Homeless: It must be noted that the homeless mentally ill definition includes the population at risk, e.g. persons who might become homeless for lack of care and support.
Serious Mental Illness:	c. Serious Mental Illness: The GMHPC defined this population as follows: Seriously Mentally Ill persons have a major disorder as diagnosed under DMS IV, causing them to suffer ongoing primary deficits which affect their behavior, feelings, thinking, and perception of the world around them to the extent that their level of functioning is impaired, as judged by objective and subjective frames of reference. These conditions prevent the seriously mentally ill person from carrying out major life activities, such as maintaining patterns of eating and sleeping, working and social interaction for an extended period of time lasting at least six months.
Co-occurring Serious Mental Illness and Substance Abuse Disorders:	d. Co-occurring Serious Mental Illness and /Substance Use Disorders: Dually diagnosed individuals are those suffering from serious mental illness as defined by the GMHPC above and from substance abuse as defined under Public Law 17-21 as follows: Drug abuse means the use, without compelling medical reason, of drugs which may result in physiological and psychological dependency and addiction as a function of continued use in such a manner as to induce mental, emotional or physical impairment and cause socially dysfunctional or socially disordering behavior.

Provides services to at least 30 homeless individuals. This number may increase through the year as more homeless individuals become better familiarized and comfortable with the program.

The premise of Peer Support is that people who have faced, endured and overcome challenges can offer useful encouragement, hope and mentorship to others facing similar situations. This program offers members in Sagan Mami the opportunity to do just that. Through this mentorship, consumers will be able to develop positive life skills to cope with life's challenges in the road to recovery and healing.

## IV. DROP-IN CENTER (funded by PATH funds):

Using the International Program for clubhouse Development concepts as a guideline will ensure that all members are made to feel welcomed, important, and wanted. It specifically serves the island wide population of those who are homeless or at imminent risk of becoming homeless, adults with a serious mental illness. GBHWC refers its homeless or at imminent risk of becoming homeless clientele who are ready to function in a community-based program or have graduated/left the GBHWC's Day Treatment program.

Management and operational services include screening, rehabilitation, coordination of community mental health services; assistance in obtaining and coordinating social and maintenance services for eligible homeless individuals.

## Overview of Guam's Continuum of Care

On Guam, the Guam Homeless Coalition-Continuum of Care (GHC-COC) system is made up of a group of government agencies, non-profit organizations and the private sector that come together for the purpose of addressing the needs of homeless youths, adults and families. The Guam Housing and Urban Renewal Authority (GHURA) is the lead agency for GHC-COC.

Organizations involved in GHC-COC include Catholic Social Service, WestCare Pacific Islands, Guam Behavioral Health and Wellness Center, Department of Integrated Services for Individuals with Disabilities, Department of Public Health and Social Services, Habitat for Humanity, Guam Developmental Disabilities Council, The Salvation Army, Guam Police Department, Guma Mami, Inc., Sanctuary, Inc., and the Guam Housing and Urban Renewal Authority. Meetings are held at monthly to coordinate efforts, strengthen member links, and design innovative programs and services to combat issues that may lead to homelessness. Achievements have been made through community workshops, education / prevention campaigns, and focus group meetings conducted by both individual providers and agencies who are active participants in the homeless provider consortium focus groups.

GHC-COC Vision: To use a community based approach to significantly reduce, prevent and end homelessness and at risk homelessness on Guam including:

• Coordinating and /or integrating homeless-related programs for smooth transition throughout our continuum of care system.

- Implement an effective and efficient delivery system of services to prevent
- homelessness and to move homeless families into permanent housing;

• Develop an accessible and comprehensive system which receives individuals and families in need of care and move them through a system towards independent living and sustainability;

• Developing of strong homeless programs/services with sustainable links.

GHC-COC Mission: To empower individuals and families who are homeless and/or at risk of homelessness to achieve self-sufficiency, by providing supports through awareness, education and advocacy.

We will achieve this through:

- 1. Enhancing life skills,
- 2. Accessing to the resources to obtain and sustain permanent housing,

3. Providing the skills necessary to obtain employment.

We will achieve our mission through:

• Building relationships with those experiencing homelessness in our community and those at risk of becoming homeless

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• Assessing the needs of those within our community and recommend strategies to address the gaps in services

- Sustaining of successful programs
- Insuring availability of adequate and appropriate housing for all
- Creating a strong foundation between all members of our community
- Open and inclusive planning
- · Collaboration among all service providers
- · Educating and advocacy

Our local system for meeting the needs of homeless individuals and families is a strong community-based system that provides outreach and assessment, education/prevention services, unique emergency shelters, transitional housing, permanent housing, and supportive services. Over the last four years, consortium members have focused on strengthening individual non-profit programs and services with the use of U.S. HUD Community Planning and Development Division funding. Sources include the Community Development Block Grant, Home Investment Partnership Grant, and Emergency Shelter Grant, all of which are administered by the Guam Housing and Urban Renewal Authority (GHURA).

Projects include funding rehabilitation and new construction projects for Catholic Social Service, Guma Mami, Inc., Sanctuary, Inc., Guam Behavioral Health and Wellness Center to expand their current client capacity for emergency and transitional shelters. Projects also include public service projects for The Salvation Army, Catholic Social Service, and Sanctuary, Inc. to implement new or expand on existing supportive service programs for homeless individuals and families. GHURA has also been working with the local public housing communities to develop family self-sufficiency programs, JOBS program, and G.E.D diploma and associates degree opportunities for individuals and families with the Guam Community College. Non-profit members have also been working to re-evaluate their community objectives and service networks by developing community awareness and outreach programs.

### **G. Process for Providing Public Notice**

Two (2) "Consumer Voices" workshops were facilitated in April 2011 to discuss recommendations for the PATH application. Participants continue to voice approval for the continuation of the drop-in center to be funded through the PATH grant. This year, participants in the Sagan Mami Programs were encouraged to review the PATH applications and RFA and provide feedback. During the most recent visit of SAMHSA monitors in March 2014, participants expressed positive feedback on the Sagan Mami Programs.

Through the Request For Proposals (RFP) process another non-profit organization has been selected. However, due to procurement delays, GBHWC will continue to engage WestCare Pacific Island, a non-profit organization, to manage and operate the Sagan Mami Programs until such time the procurement delay has been resolved.

The municipalities of Hagatña and Tamuning have been identified by the GBHWC and WestCare Pacific Islands as the areas where the greatest concentration of homeless individuals who are mentally ill are located. However, it should be noted that any mentally ill resident in the Territory who is homeless and in need of services will be served at SAGAN MAMI regardless of residence on the island, which is geographically small in size: 32 miles long and 8-12 miles wide.

### J. Location of Individuals with SMI Experiencing Homelessness

J. Location of Individuals with Serious Mental Illnesses who are Experiencing Homelessness:

In FY 2012, approximately 66 homeless individuals with a serious mental illness were served at Sagan Mami during the drop-in center hours (5-9 pm). The Salvation Army in conjunction with the Guam Homeless Coalition conducted an *Unsheltered Homeless Point-In-Time (PIT)* count in January 2012. The PIT was conducted islandwide. During the PIT, there were 1,114 homeless individuals in Guam. In FY 2012, the Guam Homeless Coalition identified in the Homeless service gaps, 34 homeless individuals with serious mental illness and 14 homeless individuals who are dually diagnosed, in need of housing and mental health services.
