### **OCCUPANT PROTECTION PLAN {23 CFR 1200.21(d)(1)}**

Department of Public Works-Office of Highway Safety serves as the lead agency for the coordination of Occupant Protection Programs. The DPW-Office of Highway Safety has two program coordinators under the Occupant Protection program; respectively managing the 405b and 402 grant. Program emphasis will focus on continued participation to the national high-visibility safety belt and child safety seat enforcement mobilization having identified "Click It or Ticket" as the major core component of the Occupant Protection Program; to maintain adequate child restraint inspection stations and continue to provide the needed credentials of Child Passenger Safety technical support; and to develop and implement strategies that will enhance educational awareness consistent to Guam's growing and diverse population.

Guam's CIOT comprehensive campaign will include funding safety belt enforcement through checkpoints and roving/saturation patrols both day and night to crack down on seat belt nonuse. The DPW-OHS will encourage participation in nighttime safety belt enforcement and track data from this initiative during the national mobilizations. DPW-OHS will continue to provide funding for observation surveys before and after enforcement waves measuring the effects of the campaign and determining the safety belt use rate.

The DPW-Office of Highway Safety will continue to fund for salary and fringe for one (1) Program Coordinator to administer and enforce the policy issues concerning Occupant Protection. \$44,647.00 (MAP-21) and \$19,848.00 (Carry-forward). The purpose of this project is to encourage States and Territories to adopt and implement effective programs to reduce highway deaths and injuries resulting from individuals riding unrestrained or improperly restrained in motor vehicles. This project addresses child restraint use by infants and young children as well as seat belt use by adults and older children.



It is the goal of the Occupant Protection Program to improve aggressive, highly visible Public Information and Education campaigns, increase seat belt and child restraint usage, and participate in the national campaigns, such as: "Click It or Ticket" mobilization and Child Passenger Safety Week and maintain certified Child Passenger Safety technicians and Instructors and to sustain utmost occupant protection for the community of Guam.

Congruent to the challenge to persuade all passenger vehicle occupants to buckle up is the language barrier - non-English speaking, or English as a second language, indicative of Guam's growing and diverse population ethnicity, and consistent to the rising number of immigrants from Chuuk:

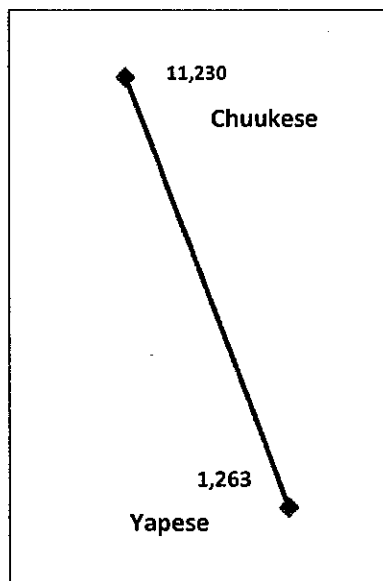
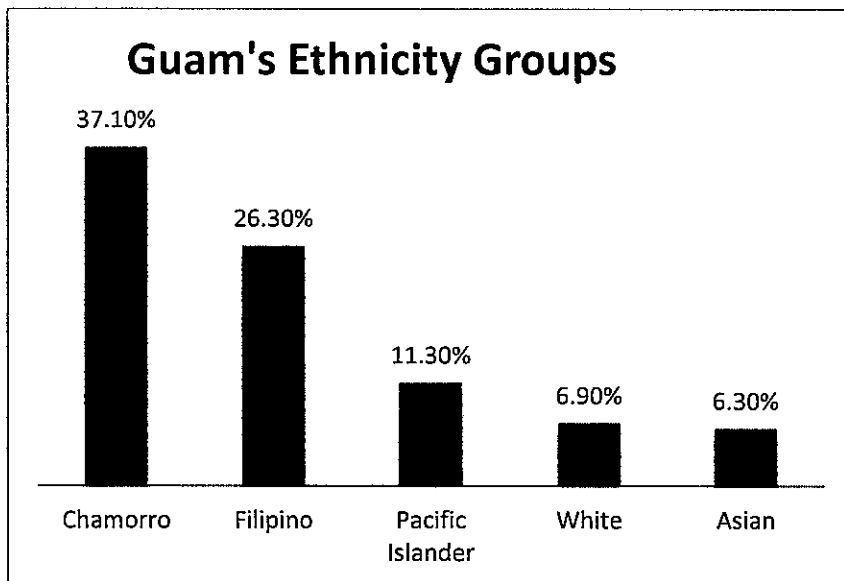

2010 Total Population - 159,358    2.9% increase since 2000

2010 Chamorro            - 59,381    3.6% increase since 2000

2010 Asian                - 51,381    2.1% increase since 2000

The number of Chuukese grew by 80.3% from 6,229 in 2000, to 11,230 in 2010. The Yapese population grew 84.1% from 686 in 2000 to 1,263 in 2010.



Noted also is the vast majority of Guam residents, 144,429, identify themselves as being of one ethnic origin or race. An increase of 8.4% since 2000. Just 14,929 acknowledge 2 or more ethnic or racial origins. That is a decrease of 30.7% since 2000.

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In 2013, Guam's seat belt survey recorded a significant 93.81% high seat belt and car seat usage rate. Attributing to this notable accomplishment is the development and implementation of educational strategies that stimulate changed attitude and behavior. Guam will continue to use strategic outreach concepts, i.e. a mascot whose presence impresses a desire to learn and encourage the use of seatbelts and car seats while riding on Guam's roadways. Multi-language materials will be made and distributed through the island focusing on Guam's diverse population and the need for translation of laws and the message encouraging Guam's motoring community to always use the seatbelt and car seat on roadways. There's still more work to be done to address the issue of non-compliance consistent to Guam's growing and diverse population. The most effective strategy for achieving and maintaining high belt use is highly publicized high-visibility enforcement of strong occupant restraint use laws. The effectiveness of high visibility enforcement has been documented repeatedly in the United States and abroad.

To meet all the Goals and Objectives of this project, the DPW-Office of Highway Safety will procure educational materials and walking billboards on information on seat belt and child restraint systems, including air bag safety. Materials will also be produced in various languages as this is an inherent problem associated with the overall impact of vital highway safety educational programs. The DPW-Office of Highway Safety will contract services to conduct training for the development of the Seat Belt Survey and Assessment. \$6,381.91 (Carry Forward) and \$5,000.00 (MAP-21) for supplies and materials; \$6,000.00 (MAP-21) for contractual services and \$8,000.00 (MAP-21) to procure equipment in support to program management and photographic documentation of program activities.



Positive interaction and participation of children of all ages, parents, caregivers, families and Guam's general population through educational awareness and outreaches together with high visibility enforcement have contributed to Guam's accomplishment in attaining its current high seat belt use rate of 93.81%.



### Goals and Objectives:

- To continue to fund for salary and fringe for one (1) Program Coordinator to administer and enforce the policy issues concerning Occupant Protection. \$19,848.00 (MAP-21 Carry Forward) and \$44,647.00 (MAP-21)
- To produce and procure educational materials and walking billboards on the importance of child safety seats, seat belts, and air bags. In addition, funding will be used to contract services for training to develop and assess Guam's Seat Belt Law. \$6,381.91 (Carry Forward) and \$5,000.00 (MAP-21) for supplies and materials; and \$6,000.00 (MAP-21) for contractual services
- To procure equipment that serve as tools necessary for program management and photographic documentation of program activities (enforcement, training, check-ups and others related): (1) multi-media projector, (1) Digital Camera complete with Case and Tripod, (2) calculators and other related equipment.

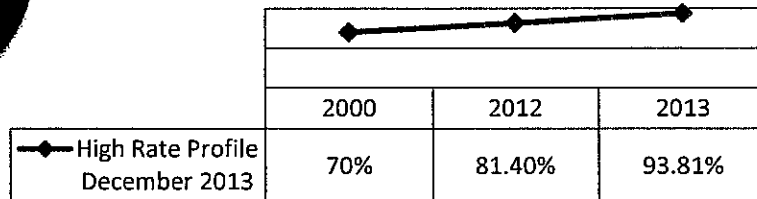

Click It or Ticket mobilization campaign has been identified as the major core component of the Occupant Protection Program, bearing critical role of keeping people safe on Guam's roadways. The Department of Public Works Office of Highway Safety through its Occupant Protection Program serves as the lead agency in development, implementation and coordination for all occupant protection initiatives for the island of Guam. This effort is not limited to just the annual observation of Click It or Ticket, but is a continual daily endeavor for maximum occupant protection on Guam's roadways.

The Department of Public Works-Office of Highway Safety and the Guam Police Department and the Guam International Airport Police Division will join efforts to conduct "Click it or Ticket" campaigns incorporating "Zero Tolerance" enforcement from May 4<sup>th</sup> to June 11<sup>th</sup>, 2015. During this period, Guam Police Department and GIAA Airport Police Division will conduct high visibility saturated and stationary enforcement within their respective jurisdictions, and together they will conduct synchronized Click It or Ticket enforcement strategic to roadways characterized with high risk areas for seatbelt and child restraint violations. Coherent to high visibility enforcement activities, paid advertising and the support of government agencies, local coalitions, and school officials will enhance increased safety belt use and education the public in defense against one of the greatest threats to us all-serious injuries or death in traffic crashes.

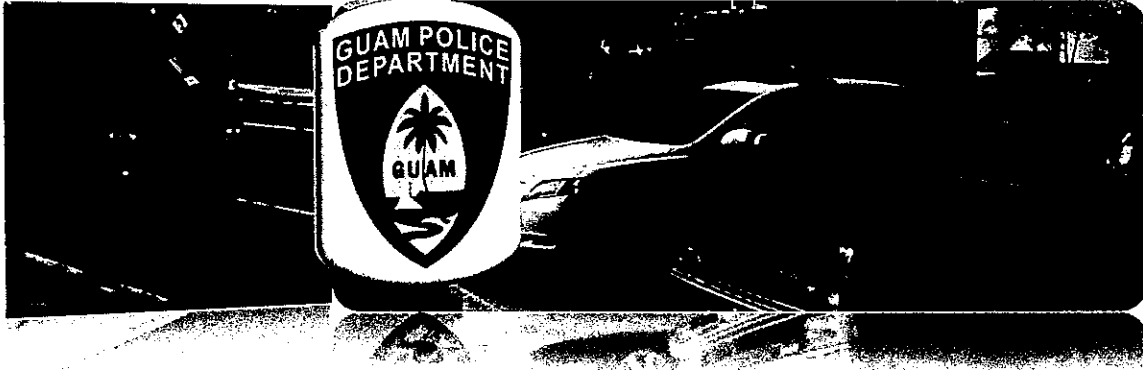

# Project Title: Operation S.C.O.P.E. (Seatbelt, Child Restraint, Occupant Enforcement)

**The goal of the Occupant Protection program through Operation SCOPE is :**

To increase seat belt usage from 93.81% in 2013 to 95% in 2014.

The purpose of this project is to encourage States and Territories to adopt and implement effective programs to reduce highway deaths and injuries resulting from individuals riding unrestrained or improperly restrained in motor vehicles. This project addresses child restraint use by infants and young children as well as seat belt use by adults and older children. It is the goal of the Occupant Protection Program to improve aggressive, highly visible Public Information and Education campaigns, increase seat belt and child restraint usage, and participate in the national campaigns, and Child Passenger Safety Week.

MAP-21 amended Section 402 which sets forth the minimum requirements with which each State highway safety program must comply, to require the Highway Safety Plan to provide for a data-driven traffic safety enforcement program to prevent traffic violations, crashes, and crash fatalities and injuries in areas most at risk for such incidents.

This project involves project strategies that may include but not limited to working with other law enforcement agencies to increase occupant restraint citations through increased enforcement, officer training, and monitor the judicial disposition of occupant restraints citations.

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Operation S.C.O.P.E. project will increase the compliance relating to seatbelt and child restraint usage, which will result a safer roadways for our citizens. As part of this operation, GPD-HPD will use the same concept during the Click It or Ticket mobilization and Child Passenger Safety week. In 2014 during CIOT week, the GPD-HPD issued 157 citations.

The Guam Police Department (GPD)-Highway Patrol Division (HPD) has traffic enforcement jurisdiction of the entire island, which covers 100% of the population and is more than the 70% as required by the grant criterion. The Guam Police Department-Highway Patrol Division will conduct 30 enforcement activities, which includes day and nighttime seat belt enforcement and saturation patrols in FY2015. The GPD-HPD will continue to conduct high-visibility enforcement activities during the national "Click It or Ticket" mobilization by implementing an effective program to reduce highway fatalities and injuries resulting from individuals riding unrestrained or improperly restrained in motor vehicles.

Due to the easy access of our island's youth to motorized vehicles and the high number of incidents of illegal activities involving youths on the public highways, it has been acknowledged that public awareness is the key to educating our island youths on the use of safety devices or safety restraints.

In the past years, the Guam Police Department (GPD)-Highway Patrol Division (HPD) has taken the lead in enforcing Guam's seatbelt laws. From 2008 – 2009, (prior to the amendment of the Guam Seatbelt Law), GPD issued 2441 and in 2010 to 2012, when the Guam Seat Belt law took effect, the Guam Police Department issued 9462 traffic citations related to the seatbelt and child restraint laws.

In 2012 there were 16 fatalities, three (3) of those fatalities involved victims not wearing their seatbelt. In 2013 there were 18 fatalities, five (5) of those involved victims who were not wearing their seatbelt. DUI, unrestrained occupants, and speeding are the deadliest combination of factors that lead to such tragic circumstances.

In 2011, there were 6,705 crashes and 916 or 13% involved injury related crashes, 15 were fatal. In 2012 there were 6,604 crashes, and 1,108 or 17% involved injury related crashes, 16 were fatal, and two (2) of those fatalities involved non use of seatbelts. In 2013 there were 6,547 crashes and 1,121 or 17% involved injury related crashes, where 18 were fatal and five of those fatalities involved non use of seatbelts.

Seat Belt enforcement activities are also programmed into their DUI checkpoints, Red Light Running enforcement, and Selective Traffic Enforcement Activities...day and night.

This activity will include working with GPD precincts, the GIAA-Airport Police Division, Port Police, and the Military installations to conduct seatbelt and child restraint stationary and saturation operations during Click It or Ticket and Child Passenger Safety Week.
- To decrease the number of unrestrained passenger fatalities from 5 (five) in CY2013 to zero (0) in CY2015 by increasing HPD's combined enforcement activities to 30 seatbelt enforcement, 28 for DUI checkpoints, 30 for Speed, and 30 for Distracted Driving, day and night. The GPD-HPD will coordinate the enforcement for GPD.

- To increase the number of certified child passenger safety technicians from 41 to 51 in FY2015 by conducting one (1) Standardized Child Passenger Safety Technician Training and fund the certification process. Training participants will include law enforcement agencies, public health, education, nurses from the Guam Memorial Hospital and Naval Hospital, and the Guam Fire Department. The DPW-Office of Highway Safety is located in the upper central part of the island and serves as the most active fitting station in Guam's Inspection Station network. The DPW-OHS has five (5) certified child passenger safety technicians and two (2) certified child passenger safety instructors, who are readily available to assist parents/caregivers wishing to have their child restraints inspected. Its office location is within proximity of the island's most populated villages...central and northern. The DPW-Office of Highway Safety partners with local and military hospitals and also the Joint Region Marianas (Naval Installation located in the southern part of the island and the Air Force installation located in the northern part of the island) by providing information on child restraints to expectant mothers.
- **Guam Police Department – Highway Patrol Division**, 1240 Army Drive, Barrigada, GU 96921. Telephone Number: (671) 475-8463-5. The Guam Police Department-Highway Patrol Division currently has eleven (11) child passenger safety technicians. The GPD-HPD covers 100% of Guam's roadways, which is over the 70% requirement for this grant. The GPD-HPD is located in the central part of Guam. While conducting enforcement activities, an officer who comes across a child restraint system that is not properly installed, the officer will refer them to GPD-HPD office to have their child restraint inspected as well as educate the parent on the proper installation of their child restraint system.
- **Guam International Airport Authority – Airport Police Division**, P.O. Box 8770, Tamuning, GU 96931. Telephone Number: (671) 898-9387 or (671) 727-6098. The Airport Police Division is centrally located at the Guam International

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Airport. Since becoming a permanent CPS Inspection Station, the Airport Police Division implemented educational training to all Airport Authority staff on the importance of using child restraint system for their children. APD officers often roam the airport parking area and meet with parents with child restraint system and inspect and educate them on the proper installation of a child restraint system. The GIAA-APD currently has six (6) certified child passenger safety technicians.

- The Guam Fire Department is the island's first responder to all threats to life, property and the environment. There are seven fire stations located throughout the island with a 24/7 operation and of which three (3) have been identified as fitting stations (Yona, Agat and the Fire Prevention Office in Tamuning). Currently there are eight (8) certified child passenger safety technicians who can readily assist the public on proper use of child restraint systems and can provide assistant at various times of the day/night.
- **Department of Public Health & Social Services – EMS for Children**, 194 Hernan Cortez Ave – Suite 213A, Hagatna, GU 96910. The Department of Public Health and Social Services serves a versatile population through its programs such as the Women Infant Care, Primary care Clinics, Immunization Program, as well as welfare and medically indigent programs. DPHSS' currently one (1) child passenger safety instructor.
- **CarsPlus Guam** (Auto Dealers). The CarsPlus Dealership currently has three (3) certified child passenger safety technicians. Child restraint systems are inspected when a vehicle comes into the dealership for service and customers are asked whether they would like to have their child restraint inspected. Notices are sent to their customers offering free child seat inspection.

The Department of Public Works-Office of Highway Safety continues to participate with the Department of Public Health & Social Services-Emergency Medical Services for Children and the Guam District Nurses by providing free immunization and the role of DPW-OHS is to provide awareness and prevention on the importance of restraining their child(ren) in an approved child restraint system as well as the importance of adults being secured in a seat belt. This outreach is conducted at underserved areas known as "Ground Zero", which are heavily populated by the "less fortunate and needy" families, mostly Micronesian descent; who come from outer islands that do not have a "Seat Belt" or "Child Restraint" laws; and who are unemployed and receiving public assistance. According to the 2010 U.S. Census for Guam reflects that 11.3% of the population is Pacific Islanders. A majority of them live in the northern part of Guam are

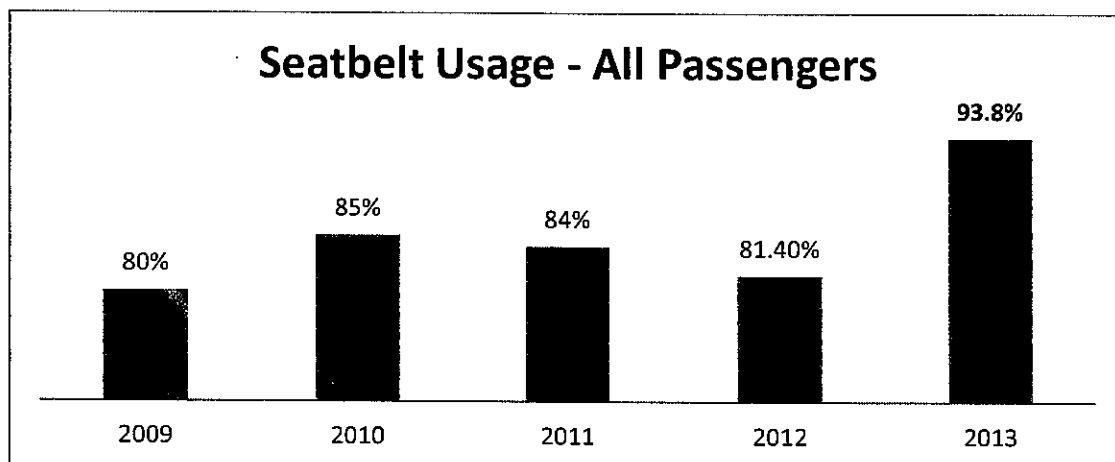
considered as high-risk non-usage of seatbelt and child restraints. On a case by case basis, DPW OHS provides child restraint systems as needed and if seats are available.

The Department of Public Works-Office of Highway Safety will dialogue with GMH, Naval Regional Hospital and the new privately owned Guam Medical Center Nursing and Pediatrics Department, expanding the Partners for Highway Safety for greater educational awareness on occupant protection and other highway safety initiatives. The goal is to make every effort to ensure proper use and installation of car seats and seat belts and so doing by increasing Guam's pool of CPS Technicians and explore potential fitting stations in the medical arena.

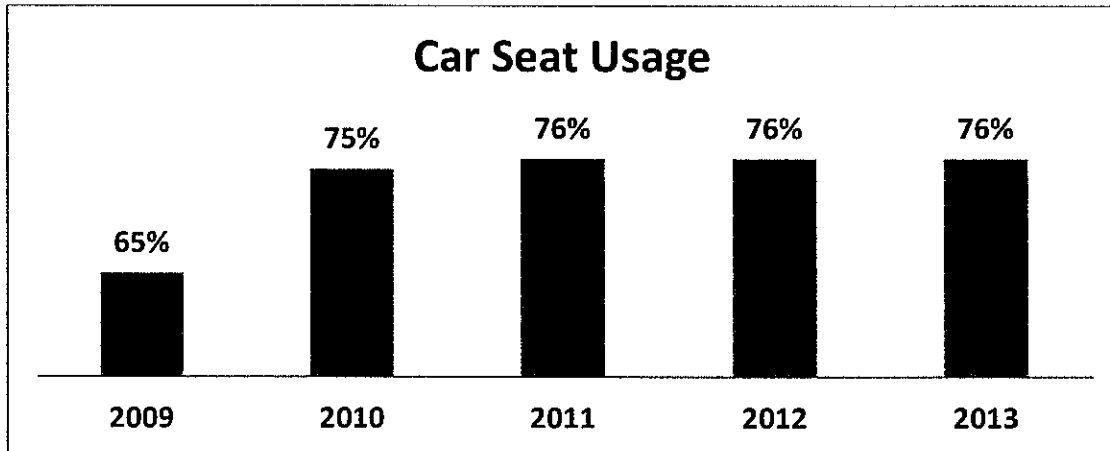

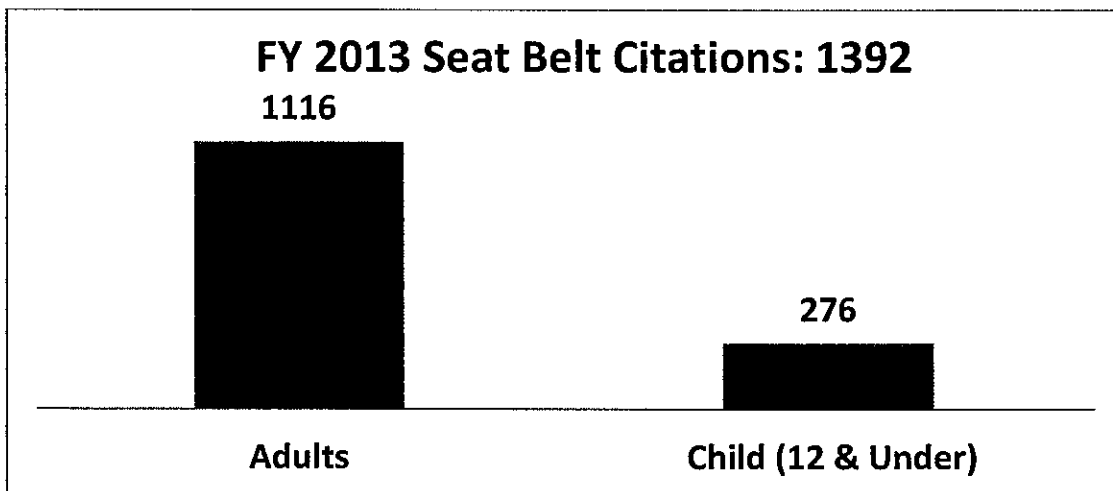

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Qualification criteria for High Seat Belt Use Rate State {23 CFR  
1200.21(d)(1)}

In December 2013, Guam submitted its Seat Belt Observation Study, as this was the first year using new sampling procedures which were put into effect by the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA). Guam's new methodology was approved in 2013 and will be used for the new four years. The study revealed that Guam's seat belt usage increased from 81.4% in 2012 to 93.8% in 2013. Guam will continue to conduct high visibility enforcement efforts and an increase in educational outreach to the schools, communities, and to Government of Guam agencies/departments. The effectiveness of high visibility enforcement has been documented repeatedly in the United States and abroad. Because of the high use rate, identifying and directing efforts toward the high risk groups that comprise the 7% who do not comply with the law continue to be a major focus of the program in FY2015.

MAP-21 provides that a high seat belt use State may qualify for funds by submitting an occupant protection plan and meeting three programmatic criteria (Click or Ticket, child restraint inspection stations, and child passenger safety technicians).

Participation in Click-it-or-Ticket national mobilization: {23 CFR  
1200.21(d)(2)}

The Guam Police Department Highway Patrol Division and the Guam International Airport Authority Airport Police Division will conduct high-visibility "publicized" enforcement activities of occupant restraint use laws throughout FY2015. The three strategy components – laws, enforcement, and publicity – cannot be separated: effectiveness decreases if any one of the components is weak or lacking.

The Guam Police Department –Highway Patrol Division currently conducts short-term, high-visibility belt law enforcement activities in May of each year as part of the national seat belt mobilizations during Click It or Ticket in May, Child Passenger Safety Week in September, and Buckle Up America in November. GPD HPD will continue to conduct seat belt enforcement throughout the year at various high-risk areas and at various traffic intersections. The GIAA Airport Police Division through the Buckle Up Guam project will conduct high-visibility enforcement at the traffic light control areas entering and exiting GIAA's Main Route 10A and three main highways, namely, Route 1, Route 8 and Route 16.

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- The Guam Fire Department is the island's first responder to all threats to life, property and the environment. There are seven fire stations operating on a 24/7 schedule and of which three (3) have been identified as fitting stations:
    - one (1) central location includes Yona
    - one (1) southern location – Agat, and
    - one (1) in the Tamuning Fire Prevention Office.

Currently there are eight (8) certified child passenger safety technicians from the Guam Fire Department who can readily assist the public on proper use of child restraint systems .

- Department of Public Health & Social Services – EMS for Children, 194 Hernan Cortez Ave – Suite 213A, Hagana. GU 96910. The Department of Public Health and Social Services serves a versatile population through its programs such as the Women Infant Care, Primary care Clinics, Immunization Program, as well as welfare and medically indigent programs. DPHSS' currently has one (1) child passenger safety instructor.
- CarsPlus Guam (Auto Dealership) – 647 Route 8, Maite, GU 96910. Telephone Number: (671) 477-7807. The CarsPlus Dealership currently has three (3) certified child passenger safety technicians. Child restraint systems are inspected when a vehicle comes into the dealership for service and customers are asked whether they would like to have their child restraint inspected. Notices are sent to their customers offering free child seat inspection.

### Child Passenger Safety Technicians: {23 CFR 1200.21(d)(4)}

The Department of Public Works Office of Highway Safety maintains the credential of two nationally certified CPST Instructors who provide training and ensure retention of nationally Certified Child Passenger Technicians for the island and so as to staff each fitting station and inspection events throughout the year. In FY 2014, the number of Fitting Stations has increased from five (5) to eight (8), of which seven (7) are government of Guam agencies and one (1) private auto dealer organization. It plans to expand the pool of fitting stations from eight (8) to ten (10) and Certified Child Passenger Safety Technicians from forty-one (41) to fifty-one (51), inclusive of interested private sectors, particularly the medical arena.
