The Month of January

The shelter received a total of Thirty-Seven (37) calls. One (1) call was for client intake; Thirty-six (36) calls were referred to the following organizations:

Five (5) client referred to Guma San Jose, seven (7) calls pertaining to clients personal affairs (outsource services GLSC, Oasis, etc), seven (7) calls were office related, five (5) called and decided to stay elsewhere, twelve (12) clients called inquiring about service, but did not call back to be picked up.

Four (4) clients from the previous month; and one (1) new client; a total of five (5) clients were sheltered for the month of January.

Alee Shelter Administration Monthly Report For the period of January, February & March 2015 Page 2 of 24 (Client #2227) Client and her two (2) children, ages seven (7) and five (5), entered the Catholic Social Service- Alee Family Violence Domestic Shelter on November 20, 2014 at 5:50pm. Client is a 23 year old, single Chamorro woman of U.S. citizenship. Client was assisted with transportation in regards to picking up and dropping off her children to and from school, dropping off her kids to the client's babysitter, applying for Public Assistance benefits to include; Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program and Welfare benefits, following up with the client's Guam Housing Urban Renewal Authority status, to include providing the necessary documents to help promote client's status on wait list, transportation to Salvation Army to inquire and seek possible assistance from their housing program, grocery shopping transportation, and apartment seeking transportation. Upon client's stay at shelter, client was able to find an extension unit that was available for rent, which the client then transitioned to upon exit. Client exited on January 18, 2015 at 3:00pm.

(Client #2234) Client and her two (2) children, ages seven (7) and one (1), entered the Catholic Social Service- Alee Family Violence Domestic Shelter on January 10, 2015 at 11:50pm. Client is a 34 year old, married Filipino woman of U.S. citizenship. The service provided to the client was hours of shelter until the client was able to obtain her airplane ticket and board her flight with her children, with the assistance from the *Guam Police Department-Victims' Assistance Unit*. Client exited the shelter on January 11, 2015 at 3:10am.

(Client #2229) Client entered the shelter on December 01, 2014 at 5:30pm with two (2) of her minor children, ages three (3) and one (1). Client is a 42 year old single Pohnpeian woman of FSM citizenship, who is a permanent resident alien. Client provided most of her transportation because she had her own vehicle. Client was assisted with applying and obtaining a job and filing for a protective order. Client was assisted with applying for the *Child Care and Development Block Grant (CCDBG) Program* under the *Department of Health and Social Services*, with providing the necessary documents (Verification of Residency) to allow the client to receive the CCDBG grant. Client was also assisted with transportation and the monetary funds to apply for a copy of her birth certificate from the *Federated States of Micronesia Consulate*.

(Client #2231) Client entered the shelter on December 14, 2014 at 8:55pm with her minor child who is four (4) years old. Client is a 30 year old single Chuukese woman of FSM citizenship, who is a permanent resident alien. Client was assisted with applying for public benefits (i.e. welfare, Supplemental Assistance Nutritional Program) and obtaining the required documents for the application at the Department of Public Health and Social Services, applying for a protective order, transportation and accompaniment to the client's Protective Order hearing, and transportation to the Federated States of Micronesia Consulate to apply for a copy of the

Client was assisted with transportation to *Lots of Art* where she received tattoo removal treatment as part of her tasks in order to fully enlist with the United States Army. Client was assisted with taking her passport picture in order to renew her passport, picking up the passport renewal packet from the *Department of Revenue and Taxation* and inquiring about transferring the guardian rights of her children to her former boyfriend. Transportation was also provided with bank and grocery errands.

The Month of February

The shelter received a total of twenty-one (21) calls. Five (5) calls were for client intake; sixteen (16) calls were referred to the following organizations:

One (1) client referred to Guma San Jose, eight (8) calls pertaining to clients personal affairs (outsource services GLSC, Oasis, etc), two (2) calls were office related, one (1) called and decided to stay elsewhere, four (4) clients called inquiring about service, but did not call back to be picked up, or simply hung-up.

A total of eight (8) clients were sheltered for the month of February. Three (3) clients from the previous month; and five (5) new clients.

(Client #2229) Client entered the shelter on December 01, 2014 with 2 (two) of her minor children, ages three (3) and one (1). Client is a 42-year-old single Pohnpeian woman of FSM citizenship, who is a permanent resident alien. Client provided most of her own transportation due to client having her own vehicle. Client was assisted with applying for and obtaining a job, filing a police report, and applying for a protective order, and transportation and accompaniment to the client's Protective Order hearings, and transportation to the Federated States of Micronesia Consulate to apply for a copy of the client's birth certificate. Client was assisted with applying for the Child Care and Development Block Grant (CCDBG) Program under the Department of Health and Social Services, by providing the necessary documents (Verification of Residency) to allow the client to receive the CCDBG grant. Client was also assisted with transportation and the monetary funds to apply for a copy of her birth certificate from the

Client was also assisted with taking her passport picture in order to renew her passport, picking up the passport renewal packet from the *Department of Revenue and Taxation* and inquiring about transferring the guardian rights of her children to her children's father. Transportation was also provided with bank and grocery errands. Group counseling services were provided on a once a week basis.

Upon entry, client was assisted with transportation with picking up her children from school. However, after client's entry, client provided her own transportation with her personal vehicle which she brought to the shelter. Group counseling services were provided on a once a week basis.

Client was assisted with filing a police report, applying for a protective order, and assistance with transferring the client to "head of household" status with her *Department of Public Health and Social Services* Public Assistance benefits- to include; *Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program* (SNAP) and Welfare. Client was also assisted with transportation to meet her family members who assisted client with monetary funds, which the client will use for her passport application. Respite services to include babysitting were provided. Group counseling services were provided on a once a week basis.

(Client #2237) Client entered the shelter on February 20, 2015 12:30am with four (4) of her minor children, ages thirteen (13), fourteen (14), fifteen (15), and seventeen (17), and her eldest adult child, who has a separate file than the client. Client is a 40-yr-old, married Chuukese woman who is a citizen of the *Federated States of Micronesia*, and is residing on Guam with a FSM Visa. Client was assisted with transportation to help obtain her eldest child's wallet, picking up and depositing her eldest's child's employment check, and with grocery shopping. Client and her children resided at shelter until time of perpetrator's arrest. Upon the arrest of her perpetrator, client and her children transitioned back to their residence. Client was interested in applying for a Protective Order, however was not able to do so during time of stay.

(Client #2238) Client entered the shelter on February 20, 2015 at 12:30am with her four minor siblings, ages thirteen (13), fourteen (14), fifteen (15), and seventeen (17), and her mother, age forty (40), who has a separate file than that of the client. Client is a 19-yr-old, single Chuukese woman of U.S. citizenship and was six (6) months pregnant at time of entry. Client was assisted with transportation to help obtain her wallet, picking up and depositing her employment check, and assistance with grocery shopping. Client, along with her mother and siblings, resided at shelter until time of perpetrator's arrest. Upon the arrest of her perpetrator, client and mother and her siblings transitioned back to their residence. Client was interested in applying for a Protective Order, however was not able to do so during time of stay.

(Client #2239) Client entered the shelter on February 25, 2015. Client's two (2) minor children, ages five (5) and eight (8) later entered the shelter with the assistance from the *Guam Police Department-Victims' Assistance Unit*. Food commodities were provided to the client and her children. Client plans on applying for a protective order.

Client is a twenty four (24) year old single Chuukese woman who is a Permanent Resident Alien. Client was assisted with filing a police report and transferring the client to "head of household" status with her *Department of Public Health and Social Services* Public Assistance benefits- to include; *Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program* (SNAP) and Welfare. Client was also assisted with transportation to meet her family members who assisted client with monetary funds, (which the client planned on using for her passport application), and transportation to her six (6) month's old medical check-up. Respite services to include babysitting were provided when client filed a police report and applied for a protective order. Group counseling services were provided on a once a week basis. Client was assisted with applying for a protective order, however later decided to discontinue the process. Client exited the shelter due to eviction and moved back with her perpetrator on March 04, 2015 at 4:00pm.

(Client #2105-1) Client entered the shelter on December 29, 2014 at 3:05pm. Client is a thirty four (34) year old single Chuukese woman of U.S. citizenship. Client was assisted with transportation to the *Guam Capital Investment Corporation* building, where the client enlisted with the United States Army. Client was also assisted with transportation to *Lots of Art* where she received tattoo removal treatments as part of her tasks in order to fully enroll with the United States Army. Client was also assisted with taking her passport picture in order for passport renewal, picking up the passport renewal packet from the *Department of Revenue and Taxation* and inquiring about transferring the guardian rights of her children to her children's father. Transportation was also provided with bank and grocery errands and with picking up the client's employment check. Group counseling services were provided on a once a week basis. Client was assisted with applying for a protective order; however was not able to receive the order due to

Transportation and accompaniment to the client's protective order hearings, and transportation to the Federated States of Micronesia Consulate to apply for a copy of the client's birth certificate were also provided. Client was assisted with applying for the Child Care and Development Block Grant (CCDBG) Program under the Department of Health and Social Services, by providing the necessary documents (Verification of Residency) to allow the client to receive the CCDBG grant. Client was also assisted with transportation and the monetary funds to apply for a copy of her birth certificate from the Federated States of Micronesia Consulate. Regarding housing assistance, client was assisted with applying for the Guam Housing Corporation Rental Housing Assistance and the Oasis Empowerment Center: Animu Program. Client was assisted with transportation in meeting her mother at the Alee Shelter pick-up/ drop-off station, where she and her mother did errands on their own regarding continuing the process for applying for a protective order, filing for divorce with her husband, filing for full custody over her children, and applying for *Woman, Infant, and Children* (WIC) benefits. Client was assisted with applying for the *Guam Housing Corporation Rental Housing Assistance* and the *Oasis Empowerment Center: Animu Program* by giving the application to the client; however client did not submit the application to the respective agencies during time of stay. Respite services were provided to the client. Group counseling services were provided on a once a week basis. Clients were assisted with applying and obtaining Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), Medicaid, and Welfare assistance, enrolling three (3) of the four (4) children in school; high school (2) and middle school (1), assisting the remaining child with enrolling and taking the GCC-GED examination placement exam and enrolling the child with the I'Famagunta GED Program, transportation services to and from all related appointments mentioned above to include grocery shopping and laundry services. Assistance was also provided with the I'Famagunta SW, to set up a home orientation of I'Famagunta services. Client (mother) was also assisted with helping client's child (youngest son) with reporting bullying incidents to the child's vice principal.

January 2015 Update:

This month we served a total of fifteen (15) children. All the children served this month were all Chamorro. All children here at the shelter are placed here by Child Protective Services (CPS). The shelter continues to provide Personal Care, Teaching Life Skills, Transportation and Recreational Outings for all of the children in the shelter.

We continue to serve the family of seven (7) children, two (2) boys and five (5) girls. They range in age from one (1) – thirteen (13) years old. All seven (7) of the children had one (1) visit this month with their grandmother and great-grandmother. The oldest girl had three (3) visits with her father, while the four (4) youngest had four (4) visits with their father. All visits were supervised by Child Protective Services staff. The two (2) oldest children had two (2) sessions at

Alee Shelter Administration Monthly Report For the period of January, February & March 2015 Page 18 of 24 Project Karinu. The four (4) year old girl completed necessary dental work this month. All of the children have assimilated well into the shelter and work well with staff.

A family of three (3) boys, a five (5) year old, four (4) year old and a two (2) year old transitioned this month to foster care. During the month, the boys had no contact with family members. The five (5) year old started Headstart at Chief Brodie Elementary.

A family of two (2) girls remains at the shelter. The Program Manager accompanied the sixteen (16) year old to her prenatal appointments, which were scheduled on Saturdays in order to minimize the amount of time she would miss from school. The sixteen (16) year old gave birth to a healthy baby girl weighing in at 7lbs and 4 ounces on January 26. When the minor was discharged and returned to the shelter, shelter staff explained to her that her baby is her responsibility and that the staff will be there to guide her. The first night home, the minor experienced some challenges with nursing, but the staff continued to encourage her and by day two baby was able to latch and nurse. Shelter staff gave minor a notebook so that she can log when she nurses and changes the baby. Minor is doing really well. Both girls had one (1) appointment with Dr. Hope Cristobal for counseling. The Program Manger accompanied the girls to this appointment. The girls continue to have no contact with any family members.

A family of two (2) boys ages five (5) and four (4) were placed early in the morning on January 31. The CPS worker who brought the boys to the shelter informed the staff that this is an ongoing CPS case and she will have the assigned CPS worker contact Shelter first thing Monday morning.

The shelter continues to provide Personal Care, Teaching Life Skills, Transportation and Recreational Outings for all the children in the shelter.

We continue to serve the family of seven (7) children, two (2) boys and five (5) girls. They range between the ages of two (2) years old to thirteen (13) years old. All seven (7) of the children had one (1) overnight visit with their biological grandmother and one (1) visit at Ypao Beach Park. The oldest girl had five (5) visits with her father, while the four (4) youngest had five (5) visits with their father. All visits are supervised by Child Protective Services staff during the week and unsupervised during the weekend. The oldest boy and 2nd oldest girl started overnights with their maternal grandmother. The two (2) oldest had two (2) counseling sessions at Project Karinu. There have been issues regarding Medicaid coverage for the children and their Case Worker has been informed and is working on rectifying the situation. All the children are doing really well and we have not experienced any problems with them.

A family of two (2) girls, mother and child are still residing here at the shelter. The sixteen (16) year old mother has returned to school and her infant remains with the shelter staff. When mother returns from school the care of her daughter is returned to her. The staff assists when needed, however, most of the care remains with the mother. The minor continues to see Dr. Cristobal once a week. Minor still has not had any contact with family other than her siblings.

We received a family of two (2) boys ages ten (10) and eight (8) years old. These siblings currently have another sibling already residing in the shelter. The boys were both given uniform vouchers from the Rigalu Foundation and uniforms were picked up the following day. The two (2) boys are adjusting to the shelter's rules and routines.

We also have a one (1) year old boy who has family members residing in the shelter. This minor has had no contact with any other family except for the ones currently in the shelter. The minor is adjusting to the shelter staff, rules and routines.

We had two (2) sibling boys ages five (5) and four (4) years old. The boys where here for the weekend only. The boys returned to their father.

This month the children did not have any outings because almost all of the children were sick.

We continue to serve the family of seven (7) children, two (2) boys and five (5) girls. They range between the ages of thirteen (13) years old to two (2) years old. The oldest boy had one (1) counseling session, and the oldest girl had two (2) counseling sessions at Project Karinu. The oldest boy is still participating in soccer and is enjoying it and is doing well. The four (4) younger ones continue to have visit with their father, two (2) took place at Ypao Beach Park with a CPS Homemaker supervising the visit. They also had three (3) overnight visits during the weekend from Friday to Sunday. The oldest girl had eight (8) visits with her father during the weekend. She has not had any overnights as of yet as she is still not comfortable enough to do

The oldest boy and the second to the oldest girl had overnight visits with their grandmother. They transitioned to maternal grandmother on the 20^{th} of this month. The rest of the children that are still in the shelter are doing very well.

We continue to serve two (2) boys ages ten (10) and eight (8). The boys have adjusted to the shelter rules and routines. In the first week at the shelter the two (2) boys were sent home several times by the school nurse as they said they were not feeling good. Both boys have been medically cleared from PMC Clinic two (2) days after arriving at the shelter. Shelter staff was informed that both boys have had issues with numerous missed days of school. Staff was also informed that if this continues they will be referred for truancy. CPS worker was informed. The boys currently have no contact or visit with any family members.

The one (1) year old boy continues to reside here at the shelter. He had five (5) CPS supervised visits with his mother at CPS offices in Hagatna. The minor is still adjusting to being in the shelter.

We received a two (2) year old boy late in the month. The minor does not speak very much and is adjusting to the shelter. He currently has no contact with any family member.

A family of two (2) girls, a sixteen (16) year old mother and newborn baby are no longer in the shelter. Before leaving the shelter the mother had two (2) counseling sessions with Dr. Hope Cristobal, one (1) WIC appointment, and one (1) court hearing in which her caseworker from CPS accompanied her. The minor continues to attend school at John F. Kennedy High School. As for the newborn she had her first appointment at the Department of Public Health and Social Services in which a CPS Homemaker transported both baby and mother. The children have been placed with a paternal uncle and his wife on the thirteenth of this month. We hope and pray everything works out for the girls.

On March 26, 2015, Department of Public Health and Social Services office of Environmental Health conducted an unscheduled inspection of the Children's Shelter. There were no areas of concern and Alee 2 maintains an "A" rating.
