



The Alternate Public Defender's (APD) office is a division of the Public Defender Service Corporation (PDSC). Established in October 2004, APD was created to replace the Associated Defense Advocate office in order to reduce the cost of legal services and representation for indigent defense and juvenile matters to the Government of Guam.


The Alternate Public Defender's Office provides legal services on court appointed matters or conflict cases by the Public Defender Service Corporation to adult,

indigent persons accused of felony and misdemeanor criminal allegations, juveniles prosecuted for alleged conduct that would be criminal if they were adults; individuals involved in juvenile proceedings in which court supervision of minors is sought because of allegations of child abuse or neglect or whose liberty may be affected by the government.

The Alternate Public Defender's office has grown through the years. APD originally operated with a staff of two attorneys, a legal secretary, a legal clerk, and an investigator. As of today, an ever increasing case load has made it necessary to expand the staff to five attorneys, two legal secretaries, two investigators, and two legal clerks.

As the Alternate Public Defender, I am proud of the commitment of our Office to provide legal representation and services mandated by the Constitution and Organic Act of Guam that guarantee indigent persons the effective assistance of counsel before the courts. The attorneys and support staff of this Office seek to provide the mandated legal services in an efficient and cost-effective manner while holding ourselves to the highest professional and ethical standards.

The mission of the Legal Clerical Division is to provide the initial eligibility determination of potential clients as mandated by law for legal representation and performs administrative support services such as reception,





This active caseload is determined by combining the number of cases opened during FY2014 with the number of cases that were opened prior to FY2014 but which are not yet closed or have future events scheduled

Jury Trials

2014 was a very challenging year for trial work. The office has been engaged in much more trial work than in previous years. In 2014, staff attorneys had 20 jury trials, one of which was a multiple homicide case which tied up two attorneys for over six weeks.



Average Careload per Atterney

According to the American Bar Association: Defense Counsels should not carry a workload that interferes with their ability to provide quality representation for their clients. The optimum workload limits for ONE attorney are:

150 Felonies -on- 200 Juveniles -on- 400 Misdemeanors

For the period from January 1, 2014 through December 31, 2014, the PDSC had a total of <u>5,655</u> misdemeanor equivalent cases. Divided by 14.5 staff attorneys that are currently employed at the PDSC, and this averages to <u>390</u> misdemeanor equivalent cases per attorney, putting the PDSC within the ABA's guidelines for being able to provide quality representation.
