

earthquake killed at least 65 people, injured nearly 2,000 and caused landslides that blocked roads and slowed the delivery of relief supplies.

"There is danger" the officials called out over the bullhorns. "Leave the buildings!"

Most people, though, had fled into the open day before, and had spent the night in tents or under plastic tarps.

Tuesday's quake battered Chaufara, a foothills town that became a hub for rescuers and humanitarian aid after the first earthquake. Officials there said at least three people had died Tuesday, and more than 60 were injured.

Meanwhile, a U.S. Marine Corps helicopter, carrying six Marines and two Nepalese soldiers, was reported missing while delivering disaster aid in the country's northeast. U.S. officials said, although there have been no indications the aircraft crashed.

Home ministry official Laxmi Dhakal said Wednesday that army helicopters were scoring the Sunkhami area, nearly 80 kilometers (50 miles) northeast of Kathmandu, for the missing helicopter.

Tuesday's magnitude-7.3 quake, centered between Kathmandu and Mount Everest, struck the foothills of the Himalayas. Most of the 65 people confirmed dead by Wednesday morning were in Dolakha district, northeast of Kathmandu.

"People are terrorized. Everyone is scared here. They spent the night out in the open. Lamichane said, adding the administration was running out of relief material.

With thousands more believed to be in the busy Malacca Strait and nearby waters — some stranded for more than two months — activists believe many more boats will try to make land in the coming days and weeks.

Those aboard one boat several kilometers (miles) off Malaysia's Langkawi Island, said after four days without food or water that they needed to be rescued. They reported seeing a patrol boat with flashing lights approach late Tuesday, and then slowly pass them by.

Chris Lewa, director of the nonprofit Arakan Project, was on the phone with them when it happened, saying she heard their first hopeful cheer return into sobs and screams.

Labeled by the U.N. one of the world's most persecuted minorities, the Rohingyas have for decades suffered from state-sanctioned discrimination in Myanmar.

east Asian nation, refused to offer refuge to boatloads of hungry men, women and children.

Smugglers have fled wooden trawlers in recent days as fears grew of a massive regional crackdown on human trafficking syndicates, leaving the migrants to fend for themselves.

The United Nations pleaded for countries in the region to keep their borders open and help rescue those stranded while some parliamentarians slammed the "non-in-my-back-yard" attitude.


"We won't let any foreign boats come in," Tan Kok Wee, first admiral of Malaysia's maritime enforcement agency, said Tuesday.

Guam Housing and Urban Renewal Authority (GHURA) will receive sealed proposals to up-grade of Astumbo Garden Park, in Dededo until 2:00 pm on June 2, 2015, in the Board Room located at Main Office in Sinajana. Bid proposals received after this time will not be considered. On May 18, 2015 at 10:00 am, GHURA will conduct a prebid conference at GHURA office in Sinajana. Site visit will be arranged by GHURA staff after the prebid conference to anyone who desires an onsite visit. All interested bidders are encouraged to attend both the prebid conference and the site visit.

Copies of the bidding documents may be purchased by qualified contractors from the **GHURA Main Office**. A non-refundable deposit of \$75,000 is required for each set of bidding documents. Copies of the bidding documents will be on file and available for inspection beginning on **May 17, 2015** between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 3:00 p.m. and between 1:00 p.m. and 4:00 p.m. Monday through Friday except on holidays.

A Bid Guarantee in the amount of 5% of the total base bid must accompany each bid, which exceeds \$100,000.00. Bid guarantee shall be a Bid Bond secured by a surety company authorized to do business in Guam and listed in the latest Department of Treasury Circular 570 published in the Federal Register, or as permitted by state law, a certified check, bank draft, or U.S. Government Bond at par value. If bid security is not submitted with the bid, GHURA shall reject the bid. All Bid Guarantees must be made payable to **GHURA**. **Personal checks will not be accepted.** In addition, a Non-Collusive Affidavit must be supplied with each bid that exceeds \$10,000. GHURA reserves the right to waive irregularities and to reject any or all bids. Failure to submit a bid properly shall result in rejection of the bid.

For all contracts, which exceed \$100,000, the successful bidder will be required to furnish and pay for satisfactory Performance and Payment bonding for 100% of the contract price. Attention is called to the fact that not less than the minimum of salaries and wages as set forth in the specifications must be paid on this project. The Contractor must not discriminate on the basis of race, color, religion, gender, age, disability, or national origin in employment or the provision of services.
