

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US trade deficit May as exports struggle

WASHINGTON (AP) - The US trade deficit widened slightly in May, reflecting declines in sales of American made aircraft and machinery as exports continued to soffer from a strong dallar

The deficit increased 2.9 percent to \$41,9 hillion in May up from an April imbalance of \$40.7 billion, the Commerce Department reported Tuesday

Imports fell 0 i percent to \$230.5 billion. Exports slid at a faster pace of 0.8 percent to \$188.6 billion. American producers have been hurt this year by a rising value of the dollar, which makes U.S. goods less competitive in oversees markets

Even with the slight rise in May, the deficit over the past two months is averaging less than in the first quarter. That should help boost growth in the second quarter.

Trade slashed nearly 2 percentage points off growth during the first three months of the year. The big drag from trade combined with an unusually severe winter sent the economy into reverse, confracting at an annual rate of 0.2 percent in the January-March period

Analysts believe that a surrowing of the trade deficain the April Lune period will be a major factor in reviving overall growth. They forecast s retroored to an annual grewith rate of around 2.5 percent as measured by the gross domes-

Paul Ashworth, chief U.S. economist at Capital Economics, said that the dollar's rise in value over the past 12 months will likely mean that trade will remain a small drag on the economy for the rest of this year. But he added that with the dollar's increase slowing in recent months, its drag on growth should fade in 2016.

The deficit with China jumped 15 percent in May to \$30.5 billion. So far this year, it is running 11.1 percent higher than the same period a year ago, putting the country on track to hit another annual

His story is perhaps the higgest reason for Subway's amage over the years as a healthy place to eat.


Soon after, Subway's advertising agency reached out to Fogle and asked if he wanted to be in a TV commercial. The ensuing ad campaign resonated in part because Fogle seemed like such a regular guy, which made weight loss seem simple and achievable.

Of course, Fogle wasn't the only reason for Subway's growth over the years, its \$5 Footlong was popular with possible look-ing for a deal, and some likes that they would curasmize their sundwiches. And even while souting its "Ent Fresh" motto, the chain extend to people who just wanted cornething filling with options like mentical selected a chicken enchilada meli staffod with Fritos.


Still. Fogle was instrumental in Subway's success over the years. The company's continued relationship with Fogle until Tuesday is also a restament to his enduring

importance to the company in 2013. Subway celebrated the 15-year anniversity of Fogle's famous diet by featuring him in a Super Bowl of and making him ble to news organizations for interviews. At the time, Fogle said he still traveled regularly throughout the year on behalf of Subway. He also said be had a Subway "Black Card," which lets him en as the chain for free.

The Superintendent announced that there is a quorum. (By law, five voting members constitute a quorum. Nine (9) voting members were present for this meeting.)

1) 2015-2016 School Calendar

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Jon J. P. Fernandez GDOE Superintendent Mrs. Tainatongo reported that on July 13, 2015, the calendar committee met and adopted and is moving for the board's approval of a revised SY 15-16 calendar. The Board needed to adjust the calendar due to Public Law 33-31 which use of make-up days during Christmas and Easter break. The Public Law 33-31 did provide flexibility to meet the 180 school calendar day requirement by allowing GDOE to meet the 180 day requirement or its equivalence. In order for GDOE to comply with the law of 300 minutes per instructional day, there was a need to also adjust the times of the schools.

For the elementary, GDOE increased the time by 28 minutes; at Southern High School, GDOE increased it by 30 minutes; middle schools remain status quo; and the rest of the high schools are also status quo because they exceed the Carnegie unit requirements. School still starts on the 17th of August for the students. The 1st quarter will be 44 days, 2nd quarter will be 43 days, 3rd quarter will be 43 days, and the 4th quarter will be 43 days. The last day for the students is on May 20, 2016, at 173 instructional days. For the teachers, their last day will be on June 2, 2016. On top of the additional professional days, we have the (2) teacher work day and the (2) parent teacher conference.

The Superintendent responded that this year presents unique circumstances as the board is well aware, including Public Law 33-31 and our effort to support FESTPAC. FESTPAC 2016 will begin May 22 and end on June 1. The revised calendar will respond to these circumstances but also provide much-needed professional development opportunities for teachers, responding to teachers who have asked for more time to collaborate and for more opportunities to expand teacher participation in training. Going forward, there will now be certainty with regard to Easter Break, Christmas Break, and summer vacation, and teachers, as well as parents and students, can plan ahead.

Deputy Superintendent Erika Cruz worked closely with this board as well as the Department of Public Works and the bus system to come up with a schedule that worked and met all the requirements that we just discussed.

The new calendar will result in the adjusted school hours as shared below:

Mrs. Tainatongo made a motion to approve the changes for SY 2015-2016.

Mrs. Tainatongo moved, seconded by Mr. Chargualaf, to approve the revised school calendar and hours for 2015-2016. The Board voted by a show of hands and approved the motion with a vote of 9-0.

Dr. Cruz commented that we are revising the approved calendar; we already approved the calendar so therefore this is a revision and not an adjustment. He questioned whether board policy was sufficient in terms of addressing the required number of instructional days and minutes. He also asked to further discuss, later on, the way in which GDOE provides students opportunities to recover credits.

Mr. Chargualaf added that the document provided by the Superintendent specifies board policy 346 that guides the total instructional minutes for elementary schools but also agrees with Dr. Cruz that perhaps, with the middle schools, the Board needs to reassemble and look at developing a policy that would clearly define the total number of instructional minutes for the middle school. The High school is guided by the Carnegie unit 60 contact hours per semester and 120 per year.

Mrs. Concepcion asked what the start time is for half-days.

The Superintendent responded that we have not determined that at this time.

Ms. San Nicolas moved, seconded by Mrs. Tainatongo to adjourn the meeting at 6:25 pm.
