

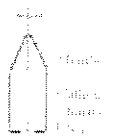

October 2015 Alee 1

During the month of October 2015, the Alee I Catherine's Home for Family Violence Domestic Assault shelter received a total of sixty four (64) calls:

Eleven (11) possible client referral calls from agencies, to include self-referrals and a referral from the National Domestic Violence Crisis Hotline, nine (9) active clients inquiring/giving information, one (1) past client inquiring/giving information, four (4) calls for active clients, four (4) calls for former clients, twenty-four (24) outside agency calls inquiring/giving information, four (4) program/staff related calls, four (4) donation inquiry/pick-up calls, two (2) wrong number calls, and one (1) hang up.

Alee I provided services for a total of five (5) clients for the month of October, three (3) new clients and two (2) clients from the previous month.

Active clients for October 2015:

Client #2262 Client entered the shelter on September 09, 2015 at 5:30pm with her minor child, age four (4). Client is a twenty six (26) year old single Chamorro woman who is a U.S. citizen. Client was assisted with transportation pick-up for client's eldest child (who does not reside with client at the shelter) from school and to meet with client's sister who took in client's eldest son to live with her. Client was assisted with transportation to the *Attorney General's Office- Victim Witness Ayuda Services* where she received a copy of her stay away order, transportation to her *Woman, Infants, and Children (WIC)* appointment, transportation to the *Department of Public Health and Social Services (DPHSS)* in order for her to receive a purified protein derivative (PPD) clearance shot for client's job application process, grocery shopping, and transportation to meet with family members who assisted client with personal errands. Client was also assisted with referring her child to *Karinu* and with transportation to the child's *Karinu* assessment appointment. Client was also assisted with applying with the *Guam Agency for Human Resources Development (AHRD)* for assistance with employment. In regards to housing, client was assisted with applying for the *Guam Housing Urban Renewal Authority (GHURA)- Public Housing* program and the *Guam Housing Corporation (GHC)*. Client was in the process with applying with the *Salvation Army's Emergency Solutions Grant Program Homelessness Prevention and Rapid Re-Housing Program (ESG-HPRRP)*, which the client was given an

application form for. Client was provided with the necessary documentation to accompany all housing application packets. Client was assisted with applying and receiving a protective order which client was also assisted with transportation and accompaniment to the protective order hearing. Client was evicted due to safety concerns, which included endangering another client with the possibility of revelation of the Shelter's location. Client transitioned to her boyfriend/perpetrator upon exit/ eviction on October 18, 2015 at 8:05pm.

Client #2266 Client entered the shelter on October 07, 2015 at 1:17pm. Client is a forty-five (45) year old married Chamorro woman who is a U.S. citizen. Client was assisted with applying for Public Benefits to include; Supplemental Nutritional Assistance Program (SNAP), Welfare, and Medicaid, with the Department of Public Health and Social Services (DPHSS), and was able to receive all applied for except for Welfare (client exceeded the number of years allowed to receive Welfare benefits). Client was also assisted with the monetary funds and assistance to retrieve her birth certificate from the Saipan Vital Statistics Office, grocery shopping, and applying for divorce. Client was assisted with applying and receiving a protective order, which client was also assisted with transportation and accompaniment to the protective order hearing. Client was granted the full protective prior to exit. However, at the time of exit, client was not able to fully receive her full protective order due to the document not being fully processed and ready for pick up by the legal services agency. Upon exit, client had a temporary protective order. Client transitioned to family, specifically her grandmother, upon exit on October 26, 2015 at 6:10am.

Client #2265 Client entered the shelter on September 23, 2015 at 4:45pm with three (3) of her minor children, ages; five (5) months, one (1), and two (2) years old. Client is a twenty two (22) year old single Chamorro woman who is a U.S. citizen. Client was assisted with obtaining a mayor's verification and providing the necessary documentation for client's *Department of Public Health and Social Services (DPHSS)*- Public Benefits change report and updating the children's shot records at the *Department of Public Health and Social Services (DPHSS)*. Client was also assisted with the monetary funds to retrieve her youngest child's birth certificate from the *Department of Public Health and Social Services- Office of Vital Statistics*, with assistance in obtaining the necessary documents from the DPHSS to apply for a social security card for her youngest child at the *Guam Social Security Office*, transportation the *Woman, Infants, and Children (WIC)* Office in order to add her youngest child to her WIC benefits and for renewal of her WIC benefits, and transportation to attend a WIC Nutrition Class for Breastfeeding moms at the WIC Office at the DPHSS. In regards to housing, client was assisted with applying for the *Guam Housing Urban Renewal Authority (GHURA) - Public Housing* program and the *Guam*

Housing Corporation (GHC). Client is in the process with applying with the *Salvation Army's Emergency Solutions Grant Program Homelessness Prevention and Rapid Re-Housing Program (ESG-HPRRP)*, which the client was given an application form for. Client was provided with the necessary documentation to accompany all housing application packets. Client is not interested in applying for a protective order. Client is an active client.

Client #2197-3 Client entered the shelter on October 21, 2015 at 10:30pm with three (3) of her minor children, ages; ten (10) months, one (1), and eight (8) years old. Client is a twenty seven (27) year old single Phonpeian woman who is a Permanent Resident Alien. Client was assisted with transportation with pick-up and drop-off to and from client's child's school, assistance in obtaining the necessary documents from the DPHSS to apply for client's child's social security card and client's social security card at the *Guam Social Security Office*, transportation to the *Woman, Infants, and Children (WIC) Office* in order to renew her WIC benefits, and assistance with applying for her birth certificate at the *Federated of States of Micronesia (FSM) Consulate*. Client had an active protective order against her perpetrator, which expired on September 30, 2015. As of now, client is not interested in reapplying for a protective order. Client is an active client.

Client # 2267 Client entered the shelter on October 26, 2015 at 12:44pm. Client is a forty five (45) year old married Chamorro woman who is a U.S. citizen. Client was assisted with clothing, food, shelter, and transportation to meet with friends who assisted client with personal errands. Client had an active protective order against her perpetrator which on October 8, 2015. Client was not interested in applying for a protective order. Client exited on October 30, 2015 at 3:55pm.

- On October 29, 2015, Department of Public Health and Social Services Bureau of Social Services Administration conducted their quarterly inspection. There were no concerns brought to our attention.

November 2015 Alee I

During the month of November 2015, the Alee I Catherine's Home for Family Violence Domestic Assault shelter received a total of eighty six (86) calls:

Twelve (12) possible client referral calls from agencies, to include self-referrals, referrals from The Department of Public Health and Social Services Women, Infant and Children (WIC) Program, The Salvation Army, and the Guam Police Department-Domestic Assault Response

Team, twenty (20) active clients inquiring/giving information, nineteen (19) outside agency/people inquiring/giving information, eight (8) program/staff related calls, five (5) calls for active clients, two (2) calls from potential clients, seven (7) past client calls inquiring information, five (5) calls for former clients, five (5) donation inquiry and pick-up calls, and three (3) hang ups/no answer.

Alee I provided services for a total of nine (9) clients for the month of November, seven (7) new clients and two (2) clients from the previous month.

Client is a twenty-seven (27) year old single Phonpeian woman who is a Permanent Resident Alien. Client was assisted with transportation with pick-up and drop-off to and from client's child's school, assistance in obtaining the necessary documents from the *Department of Public Health and Social Services (DPHSS)* to apply for client's child's social security card at the *Guam Social Security Office*, transportation to the *Woman, Infants, and Children (WIC)* Office in order to renew her WIC benefits, and assistance with applying for client's birth certificate at the *Federated of States of Micronesia (FSM) Consulate*. Regarding housing, client was assisted with applying for the *Guam Housing Urban Renewal Authority (GHURA) - Public Housing* program and the *Guam Housing Corporation (GHC)*, which the client was giving the application forms for. Client was provided with the necessary documentation to accompany all housing application packets. Client had an active protective order against her perpetrator, which expired on September 30, 2015. Client was not interested in reapplying for a protective order. Client moved back with her boyfriend/ perpetrator upon exit on, November 05, 2015 at 1:24pm.

Client #2273 Client entered the shelter on November 25, 2015 at 11:15am with three (3) of her minor children, ages; two (2), three (3), and seventeen (17) years old. Client is a forty (40) year old divorced Caucasian woman who is a U.S. Citizen. Upon entry, client brought her personal vehicle to the shelter which client utilized for transportation. Client was assisted with shelter. Client was interested in applying for a protective order, however was unable to do so during the duration of her stay. Client transitioned back home upon exit on, November 25, 2015 at 4:26pm.

Client #2270 Client entered the shelter on November 05, 2015 at 5:10pm with four (4) of her minor children, ages; one (1) month, one (1), four (4), and six (6) years old. Client is a thirty-one (31) year old single Chuukese woman who is a Permanent Resident Alien. Client was assisted

with updating client's children's immunization records at the *Department of Public Health and Social Services* and transporting client to the *Guam Memorial Hospital* when client and client's children needed emergency medical assistance. Client was assisted with making a referral for psychological and physical assessment services with *Karimu* for client's child. Client was also assisted with starting the process of registering her six (6) year old child into kindergarten. Client was also assisted with transportation to meet with family members who aided client with personal errands. Client was not interested in applying for a protective order. Client transitioned to family upon exit on, November 26, 2015 at 8:44am.

Client #2271 Client entered the shelter on November 15, 2015 at 9:05pm. Client is a thirty-two (32) year old single Chamorro woman who is a U.S. citizen. Client is a person with physical disability, who is wheelchair dependent. Client was assisted with cooking, bathing, and using the commode. Client was also assisted with starting the process of transferring guardianship of her child to her mother with the *Guam Legal Services- Disability Law Center*. In regards to housing client was assisted with applying for the *Guam Housing Urban Renewal Authority (GHURA) - Public Housing* program and the *Guam Housing Corporation (GHC)*, which the client was giving the application forms for. Client was not interested with applying for a protective order. Client transitioned to a friend upon exit on, November 29, 2014 at 10:09am.

Client #2265 Client entered the shelter on September 23, 2015 at 4:45pm with three (3) of her minor children, ages; five (5) months, one (1), and two (2) years old. Client is a twenty-two (22) year old single Chamorro woman who is a U.S. citizen. Client was assisted with obtaining a mayor's verification and providing the necessary documentation for client's *Department of Public Health and Social Services (DPHSS)- Public Benefits* change report, applying for Welfare, and updating the children's shot records at the *Department of Public Health and Social Services (DPHSS)*. Transportation was also provided to the client's child's doctor's appointment, when child needed to see a medical specialist. Client was also assisted with the monetary funds to retrieve her youngest child's birth certificate from the *Department of Public Health and Social Services- Office of Vital Statistics*, assistance in obtaining the necessary documents from the DPHSS to apply for a social security card for her youngest child at the *Guam Social Security Office*, transportation the *Woman, Infants, and Children (WIC) Office* in order to add her youngest child to receive WIC benefits and for the renewal of her WIC benefits, and transportation to attend a WIC Nutrition Class for Breastfeeding moms at the WIC Office at the DPHSS. Client was assisted with making a referral for psychological and physical assessment services with the *Guam Early Intervention System (GEIS)* for client's child. Regarding housing, client was assisted with applying for the *Guam Housing Urban Renewal Authority (GHURA) -*

Public Housing program and the *Guam Housing Corporation (GHC)*, and was assisted with transportation and respite babysitting services in order for the client to attend her GHURA Orientation in one of the GHURA Amp Offices. Client was also assisted with applying with the *Salvation Army's Emergency Solutions Grant Program Homelessness Prevention and Rapid Re-Housing Program (ESG-HPRRP)*. Client was provided with the necessary documentation to accompany all housing application packets. Client is not interested in applying for a protective order. Client is an active client.

Client #2268 Client entered the shelter on November 01, 2015 at 9:10pm with four (4) of her minor children, ages; one (1) month, one (1), six (6), and nine (9) years old. Client is a thirty one (31) year old single Chamorro woman who is a U.S. citizen. Upon entry, client brought her personal vehicle to the shelter which client utilized for transportation. Client was assisted with making referrals for psychological and physical assessment services with the *Guam Early Intervention System (GEIS)* and with *I'Famagu'on-ta* for client's children. Regarding housing, client was assisted with applying for the *Guam Housing Urban Renewal Authority (GHURA) - Public Housing* program and the *Guam Housing Corporation (GHC)*, which the client was giving the application forms for. Client was provided with the necessary documentation to accompany all housing application packets. Client is not interested in applying for a protective order. Client is an active client.

Client #2269 Client entered the shelter on November 05, 2015 at 10:45am with three (3) of her minor children, ages; ten (10) months, seven (7) and fourteen (14) years old. Client is a forty six (46) year old married Chamorro woman who is a U.S. citizen. Client was assisted with transportation with pick-up and drop-off to and from client's child's school, and with applying for and receiving Public Benefits, specifically from the *Supplemental Nutritional Assistance Program (SNAP)* and Welfare, from the *Department of Public Health and Social Services*. Client was also assisted with transportation to the *Guam Memorial Hospital* when client's child needed emergency medical assistance. Client was assisted with transportation to meet the *Bureau of Social Services Administration (BOSSA)- Child Protective Services' (CPS)* social worker at *I'Famagu'on-ta* regarding psychological assessment services for client's eldest child, and the transportation of client's eldest child to *Sanctuary Inc*. In regards to housing, client was assisted with applying for the *Guam Housing Urban Renewal Authority (GHURA) - Public Housing* program and the *Guam Housing Corporation (GHC)*. Client was provided with the necessary documentation to accompany all housing application packets. Client is not interested in applying for a protective order. Client is an active client.

Client #2272 Client entered the shelter on November 23, 2015 at 4:38pm with three (3) of her minor children, ages; two (2), five (5), and eight (8) years old. Client is a twenty six (26) year old single Chuukese woman who is residing on Guam with a Visa from the Federated States of Micronesia. Client was assisted with transportation with pick-up and drop-off to and from client's child's school. Client is not interested in applying for a protective order. Client is an active client.

Client #2274 Client entered the shelter on November 30, 2015 at 10:45 am with two (2) of her minor children, ages; eleven (11) and twelve (12) years old. Client is a forty eight (48) year old married Chamorro woman who is a U.S. citizen. Upon entry, client brought her personal vehicle to the shelter which client utilizes for transportation. Client was assisted with food and shelter. Client is interested in applying for a protective order and is in the process of doing so. Client is an active client.

On November 4, 2015 Karen Carpenter began facilitating Parenting Classes for the women in the Shelter. Classes are conducted once a week on Wednesdays, beginning at 1pm.

On November 4, 2015 we submitted a request for Charitable Donation to the Guam Naval Officer's Spouses Connection. The request was made to fund the purchase of a Security System from G4S for the shelter.

December 2015 Alee I

During the month of December 2015, the Alee I Catherine's Home for Family Violence Domestic Assault shelter received a total of one hundred thirty two (132) calls:

Twenty five (25) possible client referral calls from agencies, to include self-referrals and a referral from the National Domestic Violence Crisis Hotline, forty four (44) active clients inquiring/giving information, two (2) past client inquiring/giving information, eighteen (18) calls for active clients, nine (9) calls for former clients, four (4) outside agency calls inquiring/giving information, fifteen (15) program/staff related calls, nine (9) donation inquiry/pick-up calls, four (4) wrong number calls, and two (2) hang ups.

Alee I provided services for a total of thirteen (13) clients for the month of December, eight (8) new clients and five (5) clients from the previous month.

Active clients for December 2015:

Client #2274 Client entered the shelter on November 30, 2015 at 11:45am with two (2) of her minor children, ages; eleven (11), twelve (12) and one (1) years old. Client is a forty-eight (48) year old married Chamorro woman who is a U.S. Citizen. Upon entry, client brought her personal vehicle to the shelter, which she utilized for transportation. Client was assisted with food and shelter. Client was interested in applying for a protective order, however was unable to do so during the duration of her stay. On December 02, 2015 at 7:08am, client exited the shelter on a personal outing, and when contacted that same day by Alee staff, client disclosed that she will not be returning back to the shelter and that she was in the process of reconciling with her husband. Client moved back with her husband/ perpetrator on December 02, 2015 at 7:08am.

Client #2275 Client entered the shelter on December 4, 2015 at 8:55am and was later joined by her five (5) minor children, ages; five (5), six (6), seven (7), eight (8), and ten (10) years old. Client is a thirty-four (34) year old married Chamorro woman who is a U.S. Citizen. Client was assisted with submitting client's change report for her Department of Public Health and Social Services (DPHSS): Public Benefits to the *Department of Public Health and Social Services (DPHSS)* and with transportation drop off to meet with family who assisted client with personal errands. In regards to housing, client was given applications for the *Guam Housing Urban Renewal Authority (GHURA)* and for the *Guam Housing Corporation (GHC)*. Client was not interested in applying for a protective order. Client transitioned to family, specifically her brother, upon exit on December 12, 2015 at 7:05pm.

Client #2276 Client entered the shelter on December 11, 2015 at 12:41pm with her minor child, age one (1) years old. Client is a twenty (20) year old single Chamorro woman who is a U.S. Citizen. Client was assisted with food, shelter, and transportation to meet with family and friends who assisted client with personal errands. Client was also assisted with transportation to the *Guam Regional Medical City (GRMC)*, when client's child needed emergency medical attention. Client was not interested in applying for a protective order. Client transitioned to family, specifically her cousin upon exit on, December 14, 2015 at 9:41am.

- A new bush cutter was purchased after an assessment was done on the one we had and it was determined that it would be less expensive to purchase a new one rather than having the old one repaired.
- The dryer in the shelter is not working at this time. We are awaiting the arrival from off island of the part needed to make the repair.

Alee 2 Children's Home

October 2015

This month we served a total of thirteen (13) children; twelve (12) Chamorro and one (1) Chuukese. All children here at the shelter are placed by Child Protective Services (CPS). The shelter continues to provide Personal Care, Teaching Life Skills, Transportation and Recreational Outings for all of the children.

On October 05, 2015 the shelter received a ten (10) year old Chuukese boy. This minor is wheelchair bound. On minors first couple of days here at shelter he cried and expressed that he really misses his siblings. Since placement minor has adjusted to the shelter. Minor had one (1) visit with his siblings this month. Minor returned from visit visibly upset and expressed that he missed his siblings. Minor is adjusting well to being in the shelter however needs to be reminded that although he is very independent he still needs to have staff present when transferring in and out of his wheelchair. Minor was transferred to Tamuning Elementary School on October 13, 2015 and as per his teacher, he is adjusting well. Minor has had one (1) home visit from His CPS Case Worker Norma Roberto and Guam Legal Services and Disability Law Corporation (GLS) Advocate Naomi Sanchez.

On October 8th shelter received a call from Arlene Gadia (CPS Supervisor) about placement for a nine (9) year old Chamorro girl. Minor attends school at Astumbo Elementary and is currently in the 3rd grade.

Minor has adjusted well to the rules and routines of the shelter and gets along well with both staff and other children. Minor has had no contact with family.

On October 5th the family of two (2) boys; ages nine (9) and six (6) year were transitioned to the Godmother of one of the boys. Prior to the placement, the boys had a weekend furlough with her. The visit went well and the transition took place the following week. A couple of weeks after placement, the Godmother called the shelter and shared that she was having behavioral issues with the older of the boys. She was instructed to speak with their CPS Case Worker Mari Blas for

guidance. Shelter staff informed Case Worker M. Blas about the phone call.

On October 7th the family of four (4) siblings; eleven (11), five (5) and one (1) year old boys, and a three (3) year old girl were reunited with their mother. While the children were at the shelter they had one (1) visit with their mother at the office of CPS.

The family of three (3) siblings; a three (3) year old boy and two (2) girls' ages two (2) and one (1) were transitioned to Foster Homes. The two (2) older children departed the shelter on October 16 while the younger child transitioned on October 20. Prior to transitioning from the shelter, all three (3) children were taken for full physicals and had their shots updated. They also have appointments for more follow up shots.

A sixteen (16) year old girl and her infant baby girl they are no longer with us at the shelter. On October 20th they were placed with an aunt. Minor did well caring for her infant and was assisted by staff on school nights. Prior to leaving the shelter, minors had three (3) visits with parents/grandparents at the CPS office.

- On October 29, 2015, Department of Public Health and Social Services Bureau of Social Services Administration conducted their quarterly inspection. There were no concerns brought to our attention.

November 2015

This month we served a total of seven (7) children; two (2) Chamorro and five (5) Chuukese. All children are placed by Child Protective Services (CPS). The shelter continues to provide Personal Care, Teaching Life Skills, Transportation and Recreational Outings for all the children in the shelter.

A ten (10) year old Chuukese boy remains in the shelter. The minor had one (1) visit this month with his siblings at the office of Child Protective Service with a Homemaker supervising the visit. Minor is doing well. He continues to attend school at Tamuning Elementary. This month minor was chosen to perform a solo for his school's Thanksgiving Program. Program Manager was in attendance. Minor enjoys dancing, singing and playing with the other children. Minor has adjusted well to the rules and routines of the shelter.

A nine (9) year old Chamorro girl continues to reside in the shelter. Minor has not had any contact with family members. Minor did have an interview with the Guam Police Department on November 10, 2015 at the office of Child Protective Service in regards to her case. She continues to attend school at Astumbo Elementary and is doing well. Minor gets along great with the other children. A visit with her mother was scheduled but subsequently cancelled as per

her CPS worker T. Tayama.

On November 23, 2015 CPS Supervisor requested placement for a one (1) month old Chamorro baby boy. Baby has had no contact with family and is doing well in the shelter.

On November 26, 2015 CPS Crisis Worker M. Chapa arrived with four (4) siblings; a fifteen (15) year old boy, thirteen (13) year old girl, eight (8) year old girl and a five (5) year old boy. The minors will return to their respective schools on December 1, 2015 after CPS delivers their uniforms. The fifteen (15) year old attends tiyan High School, the thirteen (13) year old attends Jose Rios Middle School and the two (2) younger children attend J. Q. San Miguel Elementary School. The minors have had no contact with family and are adjusting well to the rules and routines of the shelter.

December 2015

This month we served a total of seven (7) children; two (2) Chamorro and five (5) Chuukese. All children are placed here by Child Protective Services (CPS). The shelter continues to provide Personal Care, Teaching Life Skills, Transportation and Recreational Outings for all the children in the shelter.

The nine (9) year old Chamorro girl continues to reside in the shelter. Minor has had two (2) supervised visits at Child Protective Services with her sister. Minor also had one (1) with her guardian-ad-litem from Guam Legal Services Corporation - Disability Law Center. Minor continues to attend Astumbo Elementary School.

A ten (10) year old Chuukese boy transitioned to a foster family on December 30, 2015. Prior to his departure from the shelter, minor had four (4) visits with his siblings at Child Protective Service office with a Homemaker supervising the visit. Minor also had ten (10) visits with his potential foster parents.

On December 16, 2015 the two (2) month old baby boy transitioned to a foster home. While residing at the shelter, minor had no contact with family members.

On December 16, 2015 the family of four (4) siblings; a fifteen (15) year old boy, thirteen (13) year old girl, eight (8) year old girl and a five (5) year old boy departed the shelter and were placed with relatives. While in the shelter, minors had no contact with family members.

On December 16, 2015, Department of Public Health and Social Services office of Environmental Health conducted unscheduled inspection an of the Children's Shelter. There were no areas of concern and Alee 2 maintains an "A" rating.

October Maintenance Issues:


