
Dear Madam Speaker:

*Hafa Adai!* This is a transmittal to *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* of Proposed Rules and Regulations pursuant to the Administrative Adjudication Law.

The Division of Environmental Health (DEH) of the Department of Public Health and Social Services held a public hearing to receive public comments on DEH's proposed *Rules and Regulations Governing the Contracting of an Independent Environmental Health Inspection Company to Conduct the Inspections of Temporary Workforce Housing.* These proposed regulations are also known as *Rules and Regulations for Third Party Inspection of Temporary Workforce Housing.* The hearing was held on May 1, 2015, from 1:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m. The procedures provided in the Administrative Adjudication Law (Title 5 GCA Chapter 9, Article 3) were followed in notifying and conducting the public hearing. No oral or written testimony was received from the public regarding DEH's proposed regulations for third party inspections.

Prior to the public hearing, on April 26, 2015, the proposed rules and regulations were posted to the DEH webpage, and five copies were available at the DEH office to the public for review.

No Economic Impact Statement was prepared for these proposed regulations because the annual economic impact to the public in adopting this proposal will be less than \$500,000, as determined by the Department.



The proposed draft of these rules and regulations was submitted for review to the Office of the Attorney General on November 5, 2015. Approval as to form of the proposed rules and regulation was received by DPHSS on January 15, 2016 (copy enclosed).

A copy of the letter posted on the webpage of the Compiler of Laws which states, "Compliance with the recommended format will be de facto indication that the submission is in a format approved by the Compiler of Laws." is enclosed. The proposed rules and regulations are in compliance with the recommended format.



### **GUIDANCE FOR FORMATTING RULES AND REGULATIONS (GAR)**

The Office of the Compiler of Laws is statutorily mandated to "[u]ndertake the publication of the continuing Administrative Rules and Regulations" of Guam. 1 GCA § 1602(c). The authority for the rule-making procedures of government of Guam agencies, departments, and other entities are set forth in Title 5, Guam Code Annotated, Chapter 9, Article 3, entitled "Rule-making Procedures." As part of this process, the rules are statutorily required to be "in a form approved by the Compiler of Laws." 5 GCA § 9303(a).

To assist government of Guam agencies, departments, and other entities, with the process of publishing submissions for including in the Guam Administrative Rules & Regulations (GAR), the Office of the Compiler of Laws has prepared this document to give guidance in the drafting process. It is strongly encouraged that those responsible for drafting rules and regulations review the recommendations and utilize the standard format herein, which was approved by the Guam Code Advisory Commission on June 21, 2005. Compliance with the recommended format will be de facto indication that that the submission is in a format approved by the Compiler of Laws.

#### Recommendation 1


Please compose GAR sections according to the diagram below. It is helpful to know that the GAR is divided into the following subdivisions in descending order:

#### Title (mandatory)

Division (if necessary) Part (if necessary) Chapter (mandatory) Article (if necessary) Section (mandatory) Subsection (if necessary)

Note that Title, Chapter and Section designations are required for any codification scheme. Division, Part and Article designations are sometimes not used in particular codification schemes. We recommend that whenever possible, Article designations be used. The following diagram shows an example of the general codification scheme for the GCA, which similarly applies to the GAR:

#### **Recommendation 2**

Please draft GAR sections according the example below and identify subsections in the following format.

#### § 1101. Name or Title of Section.

In the section title, the first letter of each major word is capitalized. Do not capitalize minor words such as conjunctions and articles (e.g. and, but, or, the, a, etc.). The text of the section should be written as shown in this example.

(a) First subsection. The first subsection (if any) is designated with small letters in parentheses.

(1) Second subsection. The second subsection (if any) is designated by Arabic numerals in parentheses.

(A) Third subsection. The third subsection (if any) is designated by large capital letters in parentheses.

(i) Fourth subsection. The fourth subsection (if any) is designated by small Roman numerals in parentheses.

(aa) Fifth subsection. If necessary, a fifth subsection is designated by double lower case letters in parentheses and the cycle repeats as follows.

(1) Sixth subsection.

(AA) Seventh subsection.

(i) Eighth subsection.

#### **Recommendation 3**

Please use Microsoft Word for creating new legislative documents. The Compiler's Office now uses Microsoft Word exclusively for processing the GAR. Legal publishers such as Lexis and West require transmittal of Word files. Use of MS Word will minimize glitches and errors caused by conversions of files created with other word processing software such as WordPerfect.

SUBJECT: Proposed Rules and Regulations Governing the Contracting of an Independent Environmental Health Inspection Company to Conduct the Inspections of Temporary Workforce Housing

Pursuant to §9303, Division 1, Chapter 9 of Title 5 GCA, the Division of Environmental Health (DEH) of this Department is submitting the proposed draft *Rules and Regulations Governing the Contracting of an Independent Environmental Health Inspection Company to Conduct/the Inspections of Temporary Workforce Housing* for your review and approval, and its onward transmittance to the Legislative Secretary.

The proposed rules and regulations were posted to the website of the Guam Department of Public Health and Social Services (www.dphss.guam.gov) on April 26, 2015. Five copies of the proposed rules and regulations have been continuously on file at the Division of Environmental Health (DEH) since April 17, 2015.

No Economic Impact Statement was prepared for these proposed regulations because the annual economic impact to the public in adopting this proposal will be less than \$500,000, as determined by the Department.

A Public Hearing was held on May 1, 2015, on these proposed rules and regulations. Announcements were printed in the Marianas Variety on April 17 and 30, 2015 (copies attached). No members of the public attended the hearing, nor were there any written testimonies submitted to our office after the Public Hearing. The minutes of the Public Hearing are attached.

The proposed draft of the rules and regulations was submitted for review to the Office of the Attorney General on November 5, 2015. Approval as to form of the proposed rules and regulation was received by DPHSS on January 15, 2016 (copy attached).

A copy of the letter posted on the webpage of the Compiler of Laws which states, "Compliance with the recommended format will be de facto indication that the submission is in a format approved by the Compiler of Laws." is attached. The proposed rules and regulations are in compliance with the recommended format.

# Tears, anger mark 1st anniversary of South Korean ferry disaster

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) - Tears and grief mixed with raw anger Thursday as blackclad relatives mourned the 300 people, mostly high school kids, killed one year ago when the ferry Sewol sank in cold waters off the southwestern South Korean coast.

In contrast to the near universal shock and outrage in the weeks following the sinking, the first anniversary of one of the nation's worst disasters saw more complicated emotions.

There is widespread frustration among many South Koreans who see their government as having failed to meaningfully improve safety standards and hold high-level officials accountable for a disaster blamed in part on incompetence and corruption. Some also express fatigue with the continuing focus on the sinking.

Hours before she was to leave on a diplomatic trip to Colombia. South Korean President Park Geun-live visited a small port on a southwest island near the site of the sinking to offer her condolences to the bereaved relatives. However, the relatives refused to meet her to protest the government's handling of the sinking, the presidential Blue House said.

Flags in public buildings were lowered to half-staff and a minute of silence was observed in Ansan, the city that lost nearly an entire class of high school students on a doomed field trip to a southern resort island. A total of 304 people died when the ferry Sewol sank

The city was expecting thousands of visitors at an afternoon memorial service at its mourning site, where Prime Minister Lee Wan Koo visited in the morning, only to be turned back by angry relatives.

Relatives of the victims threatened to cancel the service if the government didn't amounce firm plans to salvage the ship and promise a new investigation into the cause of the sinking, according to Pil Kyu Hwang, a lawyer repre-

senting the families.

The estimated cost of raising the ferry is between \$91 million and \$137 million, and it could take as long as 1 1/2 years.

Many relatives gathered in Ansan. Some wept and touched pictures of their lost loved ones as they recalled helplessly watching on television as the ferry slowly sank into the sea. Hundreds also gathered at Paengmok Port hours before Park's visit. Dressed in black, they walked to a lighthouse where hundreds of yellow ribbons were fied to handrails

in memory of the victims. A candle light vigil was planned in downtown Seoul, where relatives of the victims have been holding protests for months.

Also Thursday, South Korean lawmakers adopted a resolution arging the government to salvage the ferry. Of the 165 lawmakers in the

National Assembly session, 161 voted to adopt the resolution, two voted against it and two abstimed.

# Nigerian military focus on area abducted girls believed held

LAGOS, Nigeria (AP) – Nigerian military operations against Boko Haram are focusing on a northeastern forest where officials believe more than 200 schoolgirls kidnapped a year ago are being held, the government's counter-insurgency spokesman said Wednesday.

Parents and community leaders from Chibok town dismissed the statement as political grandstanding.

The outgoing government of President Goodluck Jonathan "remains resolute in finding and returning them (the girls) to their homes." said Mike Omeri of the National Information Centre at a news conference in Abuja, the capital.

A military offensive has driven the Boko Haram Islamic extremnsts out of all strongholds except the northeastern forest, said Omeri.


"Presently, the military is moving into the Sambisa Forest," he said, "Our intelligence indicates that the present military operation is focused in the area where the girls are believed to be held."

His statements are a far cry from the uncertainty about the girls fate expressed Tuesday by President-elect Muhammadu Buhari, who pledged to be honest with the parents. Speaking on the first antiversary of the kidnapping, Buhari said he would not make any promises to find the girls because their whereabouts remain unknown.

Parents and community leaders told The Associated Press that their information indicates the girls were moved from Sambisa within weeks of their abduction. They insisted on anonymity for fear of attack by Boko Haram.

Community leader Pogu Bitrus said the last reported sighting of the ghls was last year in the Alagamo forest. Nigecia's military said it drove Boko Haram from Alagamo last week, but added there were no signs of the girls.

"They are using our girls for political purposes," Bitrus said.



# Feared drowning of 400 migrants in shipwreck raises alarms in Europe

MILAN (AP) – The feated drowning of 400 migrants in a shipwreck this week in the Mediterranean Sea – one of the deadicst such tragedies in the last decade – raised alarms Wednesday amidian unprecedented wave of migration toward Europe from Africa and the Middle East.

The U.N. religes agency expressed shock at the scale of the deaths in Monday's capsizing and renewed calls on European governments to redouble search and ascess efforts, while the International Organization for Migration maintained that the sination had neached "crisis proportions."

The Mediterranean "has emerged as the most dangerous" of four major sea routes used by the world's refugees and migrants, taken by 219,000 people last year. U.N. High Commissioner for Refugees Antonio Guterres said. The Italian Coast Guard rescued some 140 people of

rescued some 140 people of the coast of Libya on Monday

 and recovered nine bodies, but could see immediately from the size of the capsized smuggler's boat that there had fikely been hundreds more on board.

The rescue was made during a five-day surge that saw Italian ships save nearly 10.000 people at sea since Friday – an unprecedentedrate insuch asbort period, according to Cmdr Filippo Marini, a Coast Guard spokes man. The number is only likely to grow, with semmer weather encouraging even more people fleeing poverty and conflict to make the perflous crossing.

Survivors of Monday's shipwreck reported that as many as 550 people were on board according to aid workers. "Of course this is an estimate

No one who travels knows exactly the number. They don't get a ticket that says: No. 550," said. Barbara Molinario, the U.N. High Commissioner for Refugees spokes woman in thaly Accounts by survivors, mostly sub-Saharan Africans, indicate the ship capstead when men on the upper deck rushed to wave down a ship they believed to be a rescue vessel, said IOM spokes-

man Joel Millman in Geneva. "Many were waving and gesticulating to get attention and that caused the vessel to capsize, with the speculation that women and childran who were below deck were drawned instantly." Millman said.

The rescued migrants arrived Wednesday at the southern Italian port of Corigliano, where aid workers dressed in white protective jumpsuits gloves and masks worked to process them. A precise accounting of the number of dead will never be known. The search operation was called off after the recovery of just nine bodies due to the depth of the sea, meaning there will be no body count to verify survivors accounts.

# home prices accelerated in February as sales rise

WASHINGTON (AP) -- U.S. home prices climbed at a faster pace in February than the previous month, driven by higher sales and a limited supply of available houses.

The Standard & Poor's/Case-Shiller 20-city home price index. rose 5 percent in February from 12 months earlier, S&P said Tuesday. That is up from a 4.5 percent pace in January.

Faster sales likely drove the price gain. Signed contracts to buy homes jumped in February. yet the number of Americans listing their homes for sale remains low. That has led to bidding wars in some cities.

Home prices are increasing at a more sustainable pace than in the past two years, when they rose at a double-digit pace for 14 straight months. Yet some economists warn that the ongoing increases may price many would-be buyers out of the market, particularly as pey gains remain weak.





(i) *Temporary workforce housing* means any enclosures of living spaces,
reasonably contiguous, together with the land appertaining thereto, established, operated
or used as living quarters and, at a minimum, fifty-one percent (51%) of the residents are

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temporary workers, including, but not limited to, facilities known by varying
 nomenclatures or designations as dormitories, hotels, motels, travel lodges, or tourist
 homes.

4 (j) *Temporary workforce housing operator* or *Operator* means a person, or 5 business entity, who owns, leases or manages, or proposes to own, lease or manage, a 6 temporary workforce housing.

**§42104.** Independent Environmental Health Inspection Company. Pursuant to Title 10 GCA, Chapter 26A, Section 26A102.2(h), the Director of DPHSS shall contract with an independent environmental health inspection company only as a last resort, after attempting to hire environmental health personnel pursuant to the merit system, and only if unable to fill the positions after utilizing all local potential sources of recruitment, including GCC, UOG, and other entities.

13 §42105. Contracting of Services. Contracting of services for the sanitary 14 inspection of temporary workforce housing by an Independent Environmental Health 15 Inspection Company shall be done in accordance with the Government of Guam 16 procurement procedures. Contracts to inspect temporary workforce housing shall only be 17 awarded to those businesses and firms that have been certified with the DPHSS to 18 conduct such inspection. Additional requirements may be identified by the DPHSS 19 during the procurement process for the services.

20 §42106. Authority to Certify, Enter, and Terminate Contract. The Division of Environmental Health (DEH) of the Department of Public Health and Social Services held a public hearing to receive public comments on DEH's proposed *Rules and Regulations Governing the Contracting of an Independent Environmental Health Inspection Company to Conduct the Inspections of Temporary Workforce Housing*. These proposed regulations are also known as *Rules and Regulations for Third Party Inspection of Temporary Workforce Housing*. The hearing was held on May 1, 2015, from 1:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m. The procedures provided in the Administrative Adjudication Law (Title 5 GCA Chapter 9, Article 3) were followed in notifying and conducting the public hearing. No oral or written testimony was received from the public regarding DEH's proposed regulations for third party inspections.

Prior to the public hearing, on April 26, 2015, the proposed rules and regulations were posted to the DEH webpage, and five copies were available at the DEH office to the public for review.

No Economic Impact Statement was prepared for these proposed regulations because the annual economic impact to the public in adopting this proposal will be less than \$500,000, as determined by the Department.

The proposed draft of these rules and regulations was submitted for review to the Office of the Attorney General on November 5, 2015. Approval as to form of the proposed rules and regulation was received by DPHSS on January 15, 2016 (copy enclosed).



## Tears, anger mark 1st anniversary Nigerian military focus on area of South Korean ferry disaster LAGOS, Nigeria (AP) - Nige-

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) - Tears and grief mixed with raw anger Thursday as blackclad relatives mourned the 300 people, mostly high school kids, killed one year ago when the ferry Sewol sank in cold waters off the southwestern South Korean coast.

In contrast to the near universal shock and outrage in the weeks following the sinking, the first anniversary of one of the nation's worst disasters saw more complicated emotions.

There is widespread frustration among many South Koreans who see their government as having failed to meaningfully improve safety standards and hold high-level officials accountable for a disaster blumed in part on incompetence and corruption. Some also express fatigue with the continuing focus on the sinking.

Hours before she was to leave on a diplomatic trip to Colombia, South Korean President

port on a southwest island near the site of the sinking to offer her condolences to the bereaved relatives. However, the relatives refused to meet her to protest the government's handling of the sinking, the presidential Blue House said.

Flags in public buildings were lowered to half-staff and a minute of silence was observed in Ansan, the city that lost nearly an entire class of high school students on a doomed field trip to a southern resort island. A total of 304 people died when the ferry Sewol sank. The city was expecting thousands of visitors at an afternoon memorial service at its mourning site, where Prime Minister Lee Wan Koo visited in the morning, only to be turned back. by angry relatives.

Relatives of the victims threatened to cancel the service if the government didn't announce firm plans to salvage the ship and promise a new investigation into the cause of the sinking, according to Pil

senting the families.

The estimated cost of raising the ferry is between \$91 million and \$137 million, and it could take as long as 1 1/2 years.

Many relatives gathered in Ansan. Some wept and touched pictures of their lost loved ones as they recalled helplessly watching on television as the ferry slowly sank into the sea. Hundreds also gathered at Paengmok Port hours before Park's visit. Dressed in black. they walked to a lighthouse where hundreds of yellow ribbons were tied to handrails in memory of the victims.

A candle light vigil was nlanned in downtown Secul where relatives of the victims have been holding protests for months Also Thursday, South Korean

lawmakers adopted a resolution urging the government to salvage the ferry. Of the 165 lawmakers in the

National Assembly session, 161 voted to adopt the resolution, two voted against it and abducted girls believed held

rian military operations against Boko Haram are focusing on a northeastern forest where officials believe more than 200 schoolgirls kidnapped a year ago are being held, the government's counter-insurgency spokesman said Wednesday.

Parents and community leaders from Chibok town dismissed the statement as political grandstanding.

The outgoing government of President Goodluck Jonathan remains resolute in finding and returning them (the girls) to their homes," said Mike Omeri of the National Information Centre at a news conference in Abuia, the capital.

A military offensive has driven the Boko Haram Islamic extremists out of all strongholds except the northeastern forest, said Omeri.

Presently, the military is moving into the Sambisa Forest," be said, "Our intelligence indicates that the present military operation is focused

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in the area where the girls are believed to be held."

His statements are a far cry from the uncertainty about the girls' fate expressed Tuesday by President-elect Muhammadu Buhari, who pledged to be honest with the parents. Speaking on the first anniversary of the kidnapping, Buhari said he would not make any promises to find the girls because their whereabouts remain unknown.

Parents and community leaders told The Associated Press that their information indicates the girls were moved from Sambisa within weeks of their abduction. They insisted on anonymity for fear of attack by Beke Haram.

Community leader Poeu Bitrus said the last reported sighting of the girls was last year in the Alagamo forest Nigeria's military said it drove Boko Haram from Alagarno last week, but added there were no signs of the girls.

"They are using our girls for political purposes." Bitrus said.

MILAN (AP) - The feared drowning of 400 migrants in a shipwreek this week in the Mediterranean Sea - one of the deadliest such tragedies in the last decade - raised alarms Wednesday amid an unnrecedented wave of migration toward Europe from Africa and the Middle East.

The U.N. refugee agency expressed shock at the scale of the deaths in Monday's capsizing and renewed calls on European governments to redouble search and rescue efforts, while the International Organization for Migration maintained that the situation had reached "crisis proportions." The Memberanean "bas

emensed as the most damerous of four major sea routes used by the world's refugees and migrants. taken by 219,000 people last year. U.N. High Commissioner for Refugees Antonio Guterres said.

The Italian Coast Goard rescued some 140 people of the ceast of Libya on Monday

and recovered nine bodies, but could see immediately from the size of the capsized smuggler's boat that there had likely been hundreds more on board.

The rescae was made during a five-day surge that saw Italian ships save nearly 10,000 people. at sea since Friday - an unprecedentedrate insuch a short period. according to Crudr. Filippo Marini, a Coast Guard spokesman. The number is only likely to grow, with summer weather encouraging even more people fleeing poverty and conflict to make the perilous crossing.

Survivors of Monday's shipwreck renorted that as many as 550 people were on board. according to aid workers. Of course this is an estimate.

No one who travels knows exactly the number. They don't get a ticket that says: No. 550," said Barbara Molinario, the U.N. High Commissioner for Refugees spokes woman in trafy.

Accounts by survivors, mostly sub-Saharan Africans, indicate the ship capsized when men on the upper deck rushed to wave down a ship they believed to be a rescue vessel, said IOM spokesman Joel Millman in Geneva.


"Many were waving and gesticulating to get attention and that caused the vessel to capsize, with the speculation that women and elubdren who were below deck were drowned instantly," Millman said.

The rescued migrants arrived Wednesday at the southern Italian port of Corigliano, where aid workers dressed in white protective iumpsuits, gloves and masks worked to process them, A precise accounting of the

number of dead will never be known: The search operation was called off after the recovery of just nine bodies due to the depth of the sea, meaning there will be no body count to verify survivors' accounts.

# US home prices accelerated in February as sales rise

WASHINGTON (AP) - U.S. home prices climbed at a faster pace in February than the previous month, driven by higher sales and a limited supply of available houses.

The Standard & Poor's/Case-Shiller 20-city home price index rose 5 percent in February from 12 months earlier, S&P said Tuesday. That is up from a 4.5 cercent pace in January.

Faster sales likely drove the price gain. Signed contracts to buy homes jumped in February. yet the number of Americans listing their homes for sale remains low. That has led to bidding wars in some cities.

Home prices are increasing at a more sustainable pace than in the nast two years, when they rose at a double-digit pace for 14 straight months. Yet some economists warn that the ongoing increases may price many would-be buyers out of the market, particularly as pay gains remain weak.

While slow and steady growth throughout the country may sound like an unambigu-





#### Twitter cuts revenue forecast, shares slump exacerbated when the results

NEW YORK (Reuters) Twitter Inc. reported quarterly revenue that fell short of Wall Street estimates and cut its full-year forecast because of weak demand for its new direct response advertising, sending shares down as much as 24 percent on Tuesday.

User growth was off to a slow start in April, the company said. even though it hit its own target for the just-ended first quarter.

Twitter forecast 2015 revenue of \$2.17 billion to \$2.27 billion. down from its earlier forecast of \$2.3 billion to \$2.35 billion. Analysts on average had been expecting \$2.37 billion.

Twitter said its new direct response ads, intended to

encourage actions such as clicking on a link to an advertiser's website, did not produce the revenue expected. Advertisers limited their spending and the click rate on Twitter's ads fell, but the company expects improvement in the second half of 2015, Chief Financial Officer Anthony Noto said on a call with analysts.

The company, which allows users to broadcast 140-character messages, said revenue rose to \$436 million in the first quarter, from \$250.5 million a year earlier. This was below the average analyst estimate of \$456.8 million, according to Thomson Reuters. Concerns about Twitter were

### **GUIDANCE FOR FORMATTING RULES AND REGULATIONS (GAR)**

The Office of the Compiler of Laws is statutorily mandated to "[u]ndertake the publication of the continuing Administrative Rules and Regulations" of Guam. 1 GCA § 1602(c). The authority for the rule-making procedures of government of Guam agencies, departments, and other entities are set forth in Title 5, Guam Code Annotated, Chapter 9, Article 3, entitled "Rule-making Procedures." As part of this process, the rules are statutorily required to be "in a form approved by the Compiler of Laws." 5 GCA § 9303(a).

To assist government of Guam agencies, departments, and other entities, with the process of publishing submissions for including in the Guam Administrative Rules & Regulations (GAR), the Office of the Compiler of Laws has prepared this document to give guidance in the drafting process. It is strongly encouraged that those responsible for drafting rules and regulations review the recommendations and utilize the standard format herein, which was approved by the Guam Code Advisory Commission on June 21, 2005. Compliance with the recommended format will be de facto indication that that the submission is in a format approved by the Compiler of Laws.


### **Recommendation 1**

Please compose GAR sections according to the diagram below. It is helpful to know that the GAR is divided into the following subdivisions in descending order:

Title (mandatory) Division (if necessary) Part (if necessary) Chapter (mandatory) Article (if necessary) Section (mandatory) Subsection (if necessary)

Note that Title, Chapter and Section designations are required for any codification scheme. Division, Part and Article designations are sometimes not used in particular codification schemes. We recommend that whenever possible, Article designations be used. The following diagram shows an example of the general codification scheme for the GCA, which similarly applies to the GAR:

### **Recommendation 2**

Please draft GAR sections according the example below and identify subsections in the following format.

### § 1101. Name or Title of Section.

In the section title, the first letter of each major word is capitalized. Do not capitalize minor words such as conjunctions and articles (e.g. and, but, or, the, a, etc.). The text of the section should be written as shown in this example.

(a) First subsection. The first subsection (if any) is designated with small letters in parentheses.

(1) Second subsection. The second subsection (if any) is designated by Arabic numerals in parentheses.

(A) Third subsection. The third subsection (if any) is designated by large capital letters in parentheses.

(i) Fourth subsection. The fourth subsection (if any) is designated by small Roman numerals in parentheses.

(aa) Fifth subsection. If necessary, a fifth subsection is designated by double lower case letters in parentheses and the cycle repeats as follows.

(1) Sixth subsection.

(AA) Seventh subsection.

(i) Eighth subsection.

### **Recommendation 3**

Please use Microsoft Word for creating new legislative documents. The Compiler's Office now uses Microsoft Word exclusively for processing the GAR. Legal publishers such as Lexis and West require transmittal of Word files. Use of MS Word will minimize glitches and errors caused by conversions of files created with other word processing software such as WordPerfect.

Please use Times New Roman font in documents. Times New Roman seems to be used universally and is a true-type font necessary for embedding in documents to be published. We use this font exclusively in all GAR documents.

		The promulgation of rules and regulations are governed by the Administrative Adjudication Law (Title 5, Chapter 9), and Section 9301 of that law requires that 10 days before the public hearing, a notice must appear in the newspaper of general circulation in Guam announcing the date, time, and place of the public hearing. The Department did comply with that provision by publishing the announcement in the Marianas Variety on April 17, 2015. The Department published a second announcement on April 30, 2015.
