5.1.a. YTD Balance

Joe Quinata reported the current fund available is \$4,654,804.47. A total of \$774,462.22 is available for grants and projects.

The accounting summary was reviewed by the Budget & Finance Committee meeting to identify unexpended project and grant balances. The committee identified approximately \$210,000.00 that will be available for projects in queue. Joe Quinata will prepare a report for action to be made at the next Board meeting.

5.1.b. FY15 Audit - Highlights

Joe Quinata reported the FY15 Audit has been completed.

A copy of the Public Auditor's Highlights was circulated for review.

GPT received a clean audit for FY 2015.

Joaquin Perez requested the highlights identify the sites instead of naming the villages of the GPT properties.

The Board requested a formal presentation be made by Ernst & Young.

Staff recommended a board orientation is needed for the benefit of the new Board members. The orientation would be an ideal opportunity to schedule a formal presentation by the auditor and investment managers.

Staff will prepare and present a budget to conduct the orientation for Board's approval.

Asian and Pacific Islanders Historic Preservation Forum

2016 Conference Stockton California

Overview

This trip had two specific components, the APIA Hip Forum in Stockton California and then separately I was invited to the Scripps Institute of Oceanography which is launching its Marine Archeology program

The Stockton forum had differences from previous forums which were held in robust cities like San Francisco, Los Angeles and Washington DC. In general the scale of the conference was smaller than prior conferences.

Representatives from the National Parks Service and the National Trust for Historic Preservation were present (including Bryan Turner) and California Heritage (Anthea and Hugh) and participated in panel discussions and moderated.

Overall the attendance was lower from the prior year and California based groups and preservation professionals were the majority of attendees this year.

- Highlights included the showcasing of the Sikh Community Historic
 Preservation efforts and landmarks and the story of the Sikh Gudhwara
 which is seeking a national landmarks designation. This was the first and
 likely most successful effort to assimilate the Sikh Preservation story into the
 APIA effort.
- Sikh representatives were present and participated in the opening Lungar (open meal) that kicked off the conference.
- Also three Hawaii SHPO and state office employees attended and presented at the conference.
- A variation on the conference sessions was to provide a 30-40 minute pop-up session where participants could spend time with three of the 7 topic session and team up on hypothetical problem sessions.
- 3 tours or site visits were offered although the conference would have benefitted from more field visits.

- The Awards ceremony was held at the Bob Hope Theater and featured cultural dancers for entertainment and the awardees represented three Little Tokyo, Little Manila and Chinatown.
- Prior conferences had strong representation and participation from local or regional universities and schools – this conference did not have such a robust post secondary representation- although there was a very interesting presentation by two Indian (Sikh) Berkely graduates who talked about radical activism on the Berkely campus and tied it to social and civil struggles in India as well as the work of the Stockton Gudwara in the social struggles and political upheaval in India.
- There was consistent recognition of Guams participation in the formation and maintenance of the APIA forum.
- The conference would have benefitted from more outreach and representation from Pacific islands including Micronesia, American Samoa, in addition to Hawaii.
- There was some discussion about reaching out to NPS about funding for travel and participation of Pacific islander Preservation representatives.
- I was able to have a lengthy discussion with the two representatives from Advisory Council for Historic Preservation (ACHP) about issues and concerns with the ongoing funding for Guams programs, communication and access too information about Guam's military buildup, military build up on surrounding islands such as Tinian and Saipan and Community and Preservation Planning in general.
- There was a lot of interest from ACHP about Guams Historic District revitalization masterplanning program and offers to provide links for technical assistance and possible grant money.


Trip report – Scripps Institute for oceanography (and Marine Archeology)

Coinciding with the trip to Stockton, I was invited to a tour of Scripps facilities in San Diego. This visit was amazing and generated a lot of discussion about opportunities to collaborate with them on preservation work, and to link them to the University of Guam.



I was invited by Tom Hom, who is a doctoral candidate at Scripps. Tom was also a producer and host for an environmental documentary television program called "Ecotrek". The tour also included:


- Dr Tom Levy who recently concluded a survey expedition of areas around the Holy Land and was able to uncover archeological and anthropological information during the time of the exodus from Egypt.
- Dr Christian McDonald- who heads the Scripps Pier and part of the Oceanography program. Christian had worked on the Marine surveys of Alaska and Antarctica related indigenous peoples fishing and shoreline lifeways.
- Dr Greg Rouse, who recently completed survey work in Australia and Marine Biodiversity and Conservation program.
- The tour included visiting refuge areas along the La Jolla coastline where indigenous peoples had villages and burial sites and the original Scripps Laboratory which is California Landmarks location.
- Tom Holm provided a presentation of his work related to the "Island of the Blue Dolphins". Holm was instrumental in linking the remains on the island to the Luiseno tribe of native americans, who then asserted their rights to the remains (sparking a controversy in the southern California Archeology community).
- A very relevant discussion was included about the shoreline settlements and burial grounds of Native Americans relative to Guam's Indigenous peoples burial grounds and settlements.






Guam Preservation Trust FY 2015 Financial Highlights

May ___, 2016

The Guam Preservation Trust (GPT) closed fiscal year (FY) 2015 with a significant decrease in net position by \$722 thousand (K) due mainly to the decrease in building permit fees and increase in grants and projects expenditures. In FY 2014, GPT had an increase in net position due to properties donated to GPT with a market value of \$9.9 million (M). Independent auditors, Ernst & Young, LLP, issued an unmodified (clean) opinion on GPT's FY 2015 financial statements. There were no material weaknesses or significant deficiencies identified in GPT's Report on Internal Control Over Financial Reporting.

As a future commitment to preserve and protect historic structures and sites in Guam, the GPT's Board of Directors (BOD) approved \$4.4M worth of grants and projects in FY 2015. The top three projects are for the (1) rehabilitation of the Guam Legislature/Guam Congress Building (\$2.8M), (2) demolition of the Manuel Guerrero Building (\$1.0M), and (3) architectural and engineering design of the FQ Sanchez School Facility (\$208K).

Revenues Decreased and Expenditures Increased

GPT's revenues decreased by \$523K or 33%, going from \$1.6M in FY 2014 to \$1.1M in FY 2015. The movement in revenues was due to three items. First, the building permit fees as administered by the Guam Department of Public Works decreased by \$489K because of the reduction in construction activity in Guam compared to FY 2014. In addition, GPT experienced slower collection of building permit fees from the Government of Guam through the Department of Administration in FY 2015. Second, no grants and other support was received in FY 2015 as opposed to \$64K received in FY 2014. Lastly, investment income increased by \$30K despite the balance decreases in cash equivalents and investments because of the increase in interest rates, which averaged .46% in FY 2015.

GPT's overall expenditures increased by \$539K or 50%, going from \$1.1M in FY 2014 to \$1.6M in FY 2015. GPT's largest expenditure relates to program services and grants, which accounted for 64% or \$1.0M of total expenditures in FY 2015. This is an increase of \$453K or 80% from FY 2014. The primary reason for the increase pertains to the architectural and engineering design and/or restoration projects on the following: (1) Guam Legislature/Guam Congress Building with an increased expenditure of \$203K, (2) FQ Sanchez School Facility with an increased expenditure of \$122K, and (3) Plaza De España with an increased expenditure of \$48K. These projects existed since prior year and are still on-going for the current year.

Meanwhile, the second largest expenditure was for personnel costs, which increased by \$78K or 24% from \$330K in FY 2014 to \$408K in FY 2015. This is due to additional staff hired, incentive bonus awards, and salary increases. Other expenditures included contractual services, travel

expenses, trust fund and investment fees, supplies and other miscellaneous expenses, which collectively amounted to \$177K in FY 2015, a minimal increase of \$8K or 5%.

Cash Equivalents and Investments

Total cash equivalent and investment accounts decreased by \$873K or 13% from \$6.7M as of FY 2014 to \$5.8M as of FY 2015. The decline in total balance relates mainly on the decrease in net position in FY 2015 of \$722K and net increase in property and equipment amounting to \$125K. Cash equivalents consist of money market accounts, while investments consist of portfolios in mutual funds, fixed income, and equities.

Status of Historic Preservation Projects

Of the \$4.4M in grants and projects approved by the BOD in FY 2015, \$536K was expended. As of FY 2015, outstanding encumbrances for all on-going projects is \$4.0M.

Rehabilitation of Guam Legislature/Guam Congress Building

GPT entered into an agreement with the Guam Legislature to rehabilitate the Guam Legislature Building, formerly known as the Guam Congress Building. Total construction costs are estimated at \$8.0M, which is sourced through a \$4.0M bank loan, the \$3.4M overall commitment of GPT, and the remainder through the Guam Legislature's Capitol District Fund. Estimated completion date of the project is August 2016. As of FY 2015, outstanding encumbrances on this project amounted to \$2.7M.

Acquisitions of Historic Properties

GPT acquires properties through donation or purchase. In FY 2015, an Inarajan property was purchased at a cost of \$63K with plans to rehabilitate the 1918 house as a showcase for pre-war homes. In FY 2014, properties with a market value of \$9.9M were donated by a private company to develop Guam's first heritage preserve. The donated properties consist of 175 acres located in Piti and Santa Rita, stretching up to the foot of Mount Tenjo.

Report on Compliance and Internal Control and Management Letter

In FY 2015, the independent auditors did not identify any material weaknesses or significant deficiencies in GPT's internal control over financial reporting or in GPT's compliance in accordance with Government Auditing Standards.

The management letter stated that GPT currently has no written approved policies addressing situations wherein use of GPT's vehicles for personal use is not permitted. It is recommended that the draft vehicle use policy presented to the BOD be implemented as soon as it is approved. In addition, a significant number of travel and expense report documents were not submitted. Hence, it is recommended that the trip and expense report policy be enforced.
