

AN ACT CREATING A COMMISSION ON LEGISLATIVE,
JUDICIAL, EXECUTIVE, AND OTHER ELECTIVE
OFFICIAL SALARIES.

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE TERRITORY OF GUAM:

2 Section 1. Statement of Findings. In view of the recent
3 amendments to the Organic Act permitting the people of Guam to
4 elect their own Governor and fix his salary and authorizing
5 the Guam Legislature to meet throughout the year, and in view
6 of the recent legislation considerably increasing the juris-
7 diction and responsibilities of the Island and Police Courts
8 of Guam, and the increased responsibilities given the municipal
9 commissioners, and Guam's Washington Representative, the
10 Legislature feels that a dispassionate and disinterested
11 review of the salaries to be given the elected Governor of Guam,
12 the Guam Senators, the judges of the Island and Police Courts,
13 the commissioners and assistant commissioners, and Guam's
14 Washington Representative should be undertaken to make certain
15 that such salaries are commensurate with the new responsibili-
16 ties and burdens of such offices.

17 Section 2. Establishment of Commission. There is hereby
18 established a Commission to be designated the "Joint Commission
19 on Executive, Legislative, Judicial, and other Elective Official
20 Salaries," to be composed of seven citizens of the United States
21 and residents of Guam who are not employees, officers, or
22 attaches of the government of Guam, or any of its branches,
23 departments, or agencies. Three such members shall be chosen
24 by the Speaker, three by the Governor of Guam, and one by the
25 Chairman of the Judicial Council. The members so chosen
26 shall elect their own chairman.

1 Section 3. Duties of Commission. The Joint Commission
2 shall undertake a study in depth of the appropriate salaries
3 to be paid to the Governor of Guam and to the Lieutenant
4 Governor of Guam upon their assuming office in 1971, to the
5 members of the Legislature, to the judges of the Island and
6 Police Courts of Guam, to the commissioners and assistant
7 commissioners, and to Guam's Washington Representative. Such
8 study shall take into consideration the responsibilities and
9 burdens of such offices, the salaries paid equivalent offices
10 in the United States at large, and such other matters as
11 bear on the appropriate stipends to be paid these officials.
12 The Department of Administration shall render said commission
13 all necessary clerical and other logistic support. The
14 Commission shall conclude its study and make its written report
15 to the Legislature, the Governor of Guam and the Judicial
16 Council, not later than January 15, 1970.
