## TENTH GUAM LEGISLATURE 1969 (FIRST) Regular Session

Bill No. 165

Introduced by R. J. Bordallo R. F. Taitano

AN ACT TO CALL A SPECIAL ELECTION IN GUAM TO PERMIT THE VOTERS OF GUAM TO EXPRESS THEIR VIEWS ON THE POLITICAL REINTEGRATION OF THE MARIANAS ISLANDS AND TO INVITE THE MARIANAS DISTRICT OF THE TRUST TERRITORY OF THE PACIFIC ISLANDS TO CONDUCT A SIMILAR ELECTION AMONG THE VOTERS OF SAID DISTRICT AT THE SAME TIME.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE TERRITORY OF GUAM: Section 1. The Legislature finds that:

(1) It is a truism that the inhabitants of Guam are of the same ancestry, practice the same religion, have an identical culture and practically the same history as the inhabitants of the other islands of the Marianas, the two peoples being for most purposes indistinguishable, despite the fact that those in Guam are U.S. citizens while those in the rest of the Marianas are not, this artificial and deeply tragic political division between an homogeneous and closely related group of people being deplored throughout the Marianas;

(2) In response to the rising demand for action to terminate this artificial separation of kindred people, the legislative bodies of both the Marianas District of the Trust Territory and of Guam have adopted resolutions and set up special committees to attempt to decide what steps should be taken to achieve reintegration;

(3) In addition to such legislative activities, the island of Saipan, the principal population center of the Marianas District, has on two separate occasions in the post-war years conducted a referendum among its inhabitants as to reintegration, and the results of both such referenda were overwhelmingly in favor thereof, these referenda, together with the many informal petitions and requests,

being indisputable and irrefutable evidence that reintegration is not merely the desire of ambitious politicians but the fervent hope of all the people of these islands, who, in many respects, are out ahead of their leaders on this question and are demanding action;

(4) Further study and investigation must therefore cease since what is now required is action leading toward reintegration, the resolutions, study committees and referenda having again and again established the legal, political, moral, and historic justification for reintegration, and that what remains to be done now is joint action to bring it about; and

(5) The first such action to be taken should be to conduct among all the people of the Marianas a joint plebescite to be held both in the Marianas District of the Trust Territory and in Guam, this plebescite to demonstrate once and for all to the United Nations and to the United States of America, the trustee of the Marianas, that the people of the Marianas are united behind reintegration and that the sole remaining issue is not how, but when, Section 2. There shall be held in Guam a Special Election to submit to the voters of a special question, as hereinafter set out, to determine the will and desire of the people of Guam thereon. Said Special Election shall be held on the

Tuesday next after the first Monday of November, 1969, and the Governor shall issue a proclamation calling such Special Election for such date, to be held in accordance with the election laws of Guam and the provisions of this Act.

Section 3. In said Special Election, each qualified elector shall be given a special ballot, to be prepared and furnished by the Election Commission, which shall be in substantially the following form:
