AN ACT TO AMEND SECTION 123 OF THE CODE OF CIVIL PROCEDURES TO INCLUDE WITHIN THE RULE MAKING POWER OF THE JUDICIAL COUNCIL, THE POWER TO PRESCRIBE STANDARDS AND ESTABLISH CRITERIA RESPECTING INDIGENT LITIGANTS AND DEFENDANTS IN THE COURTS OF GUAM.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE TERRITORY OF GUAM:

Section 1. Section 123 of the Code of Civil Procedures
is hereby amended to read as follows:

"Section 123. Rules of Procedure. The Judicial Council shall have the power to prescribe by general rules, the forms of process, writs, pleadings, and motions, and the practice and procedure of the courts of Guam in both civil and criminal actions, and appeals therein, the practice and procedure in the proceedings for the judicial review of enforcement of orders of administrative agencies, boards, commissions, and officers, and the standards and criteria for determining the indigency that requires the appointment of counsel and waiver of fees for indigent litigants and defendants in the courts of Guam.

Such rules shall not abridge, enlarge or modify any substantive right and shall preserve the right of trial by jury as a common law and as declared by the Sixth and Seventh Amendments of the Constitution.

Such rules shall not take effect until they have been reported to the Legislature by the Chairman of the Judicial Council at or after the beginning of a regular session thereof but not later than the first day of May,

and until the expiration of ninety days after they have been thus reported.

All laws in conflicts with such rules shall be of no further force or effect after such rules have taken effect. Any such rules heretofore prescribed by the Judicial Council shall remain in effect but shall be reported to the Legislature by January 15, 1969.

Any rule may be annulled or amended by a law limited to the purpose."

Section 2. This Act is an urgency measure.
