
CERTIFICATION OF PASSAGE OF AN ACT TO THE GOVERNOR

AN ACT TO AMEND SECTION 418 OF THE PENAL
CODE OF GUAM TO INCLUDE WITHIN THE DEFINITION
OF "FORCIBLE ENTRY AND DETAINER" THE CRIME
OF GATE CRASHING.

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE TERRITORY OF GUAM:

2 Section 1. Section 418 of the Penal Code of Guam is
3 hereby amended to read as follows:

4 "Section 418. Forcible entry and detainer; gate
5 crashing. Every person using or procuring, encouraging,
6 or assisting another to use, any force or violence in
7 entering upon or detaining any land or other possessions
8 of another, except in the cases and in the manner allowed
9 by law, is guilty of a misdemeanor. For purposes of this
10 section, the phrase 'any force or violence in entering
11 upon or detaining any land' shall include the willful
12 and uninvited entry into an inhabited dwelling house
13 during the course of a party or other gathering of people
14 therein, except that no person shall be convicted of an
15 offense under this definition unless the owner of the dwell-
16 ing or the host of the party or any responsible adult,
17 including a peace officer, shall have first requested
18 such uninvited person to leave and he shall fail to do
19 so."

20 Section 2. This Act is an urgency measure.
