AN ACT ADDING CHAPTER IV TO TITLE XLVII OF THE GOVERNMENT CODE OF GUAM TO AUTHORIZE THE GIFT OF ALL OR PART OF A HUMAN BODY AFTER DEATH FOR SPECIFIED PURPOSES, AND TO MAKE UNIFORM THE LAWS WITH REFERENCE THERETO.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE TERRITORY OF GUAM:

Section 1. Chapter IV is hereby added to Title XLVII of the Government Code of Guam to read as follows:

"CHAPTER IV

Guam Uniform Anatomical Gift Act

Section 49240. Definitions. (a) 'Bank or storage facility' means a facility licensed, accredited, or approved under the laws of Guam for storage of human bodies or parts thereof.

- (b) 'Decedent' means a deceased individual and includes a stillborn infant or fetus.
- (c) 'Donor' means an individual who makes a gift of all or part of his body.
- (d) 'Hospital' means a hospital licensed, accredited, or approved under the laws of any state or territory of the United States, including a hospital operated by the United States Government or the territory of Guam or any state or territory of the United States, although not required to be licensed under the laws of the territory or state.
- (e) 'Part' means organs, tissues, eyes, bones, arteries, blood, other fluids and any other portions of a human body;
- (f) 'Person' means an individual, corporation,
 government or governmental subdivision or agency, business,

trust, estate, trust, partnership or association, or any 2 other legal entity. 3 (g) 'Physician' or 'surgeon' means a physician or surgeon licensed or authorized to practice under the laws 11 5 of Guam. 6 Section 49241. Persons who may execute an anatomical 7 gift. (a) Any individual of sound mind and eighteen (18) 8 years of age or more may give all or any part of his body 9 for any purpose specified in Section 49242, the gift to 10 take effect upon death. (b) Any of the following persons, in order of 11 12 priority stated, when persons in prior classes are not 13 available at the time of death, and in the absence of 14 actual notice of contrary indications by the decedent 15 or actual notice of opposition by the member of the same 16 or a prior class, may give all or any part of the decedent's 17 body for any purpose specified in Section 49242: 18 (1) The spouse; 19 (2) An adult son or daughter; 20 (3) Either parent; 21 (4) An adult brother or sister; (5) A guardian of the person of the decedent 22 23 at the time of his death; and 24 (6) Any other person authorized or under 25 obligation to dispose of the body. 26 (c) If the donee has actual notice of contrary 27 indications by the decedent or that a gift by a member 28 of a class is opposed by a member of the same or a 29 prior class, the donee shall not accept the gift. The 30 persons authorized by Subsection (b) may make the gift 31 after or immediately before death.

(d) A gift of all or part of a body authorizes any examination necessary to assure medical acceptability of the gift for the purposes intended. 3 (e) The rights of the donee created by the gift 4 are paramount to the rights of others except as provided 5 for by Section 49246(d). 6 Section 49242. Persons who may become donees; 7 purpose for which anatomical gifts may be made. The 8 following persons may become donees of gifts of bodies or 9 10 parts thereof for the purposes stated: (a) Any hospital, surgeon, or physician, for medical 11 or dental education, research, advancement of medical 12 or dental science, therapy, or transplantation; or 13 (b) Any accredited medical or dental school, college 14 or university for education, research, advancement of 15 medical or dental science, or therapy; or 16 (c) Any bank or storage facility, for medical or 17 dental education, research, advancement of medical or 18 dental science, therapy, or transplantation; or 19 (d) Any specified individual for therapy or trans-20 plantation needed by him. 21 Section 49243. Manner of executing anatomical gifts. 22 (a) A gift of all or part of the body under Section 49241(a) 23 may be made by will. The gift becomes effective upon the 24 death of the testator without waiting for probate. If 25 the will is not probated, or if it is declared invalid 26 for testmentary purposes, the gift, to the extent that 27 it has been acted upon in good faith, is nevertheless 28 valid and effective. 29 (b) A gift of all or part of the body under Section 30 49241(a) may also be made by document other than a will. 31

The gift becomes effective upon the death of the donor. The document, which may be a card designed to be carried on the person, must be signed by the donor in the presence of two (2) witnesses who must sign the document in his presence. If the donor cannot sign, the document may be signed for him at his direction and in his presence in the presence of two (2) witnesses who must sign the document in his presence. Delivery of the document of gift during the donor's lifetime is not necessary to make the gift valid.

- (c) The gift may be made to a specified donee or without specifying a donee. If the latter, the gift may be accepted by the attending physician as donee upon or following death. If the gift is made to a specified donee who is not available at the time and place of death, the attending physician upon or following death, in the absence of any expressed indication that the donor desired otherwise, may accept the gift as donee. The physician who becomes a donee under this subsection shall not participate in the procedures for removing or transplanting a part.
- (d) Notwithstanding Section 49246(b), the donor may designate in his will, card, or other document of gift the surgeon or physician to carry out the appropriate procedures. In the absence of a designation or if the designee is not available, the donee or other person authorized to accept the gift may employ or authorize any surgeon or physician for this purpose.
- (e) Any gift by a person designated in Section 49241(b) shall be made by a document signed by him or made by his telegraphic, recorded telephonic, or other recorded message.

If the 2 gift is made by the donor to a specified donee, the will, card, or other document, or an executed copy thereof, may 3 4 be delivered to the donee to expedite the appropriate procedures immediately after death. Delivery is not 5 6 necessary to the validity of the gift. The will, card, 7 or other document, or an executed copy thereof, may be 8 deposited in any hospital, bank or storage facility, or registry office that accepts it for safekeeping or for 9 10 facilitation of procedures after death. On request of any interested party upon or after the donor's death the 11 person in possession shall produce the document for 12 13 examination. 14 Section 49245. Amendment or revocation of the gift. (a) If the will, card, or other document or executed 15 16 copy thereof has been delivered to a specified donee, 17 the donee may amend or revoke the gift by: (1) The execution and delivery to the donee of 18 19 a signed statement; or (2) An oral statement made in the presence of 20 two (2) persons and communicated to the donee; or 21 (3) A statement during a terminal illness or 22 23 injury addressed to an attending physician and communicated to the donee; or 24 (4) A signed card or document found on his 25 person or in his effects. 26 (b) Any document of gift which has not been 27 delivered to the donee may be revoked by the donor in 28 the manner set out in Subsection (a) or by destruction, 29

(c) Any gift made by a will may also be amended or revoked in the manner provided for amendment or revocation of wills or as provided in Subsection (a). Section 49246. Rights and duties at death. (a) The donee may accept or reject the gift. If the donee accepts a gift of the entire body, he may, subject to the terms of the gift, authorize embalming and the use of the body in funeral services. If the gift is of a part of the body, the donee, upon the death of the donor and prior to embalming, shall cause the part to be removed without unnecessary mutilation. After removal of the part, custody of the remainder of the body vests in the surviving spouse, next of kin, or other persons under obligation to dispose of the body.

- (b) The time of death shall be determined by a physician who attends the donor at his death, or, if none, the physician who certifies the death. The physician shall not participate in the procedures for removing or transplanting a part.
- (c) A person who acts in good faith in accordance with the terms of this Act or the anatomical gift laws of a state of the United States or a foreign country is not liable for damages in any civil action or subject to prosecution in any criminal proceeding for his act.
- (d) The provisions of this Act are subject to the laws of this territory prescribing powers and duties with respect to autopsies.

Section 49247. Uniformity of interpretation. This
Act shall be so construed as to effectuate its general
purpose to make uniform the law of the states and
territories of the United States which enact it.
