

AN ACT TO AMEND SECTIONS 9990 AND 9990.2, TO REPEAL SECTION 9990.20(b) OF THE GOVERNMENT CODE OF GUAM AND TO AMEND SECTION 4 OF PUBLIC LAW 12-156 RELATIVE TO THE HEALTH COMMISSION ESTABLISHED BY PUBLIC LAW 12-156 AND FOR OTHER PURPOSES.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE TERRITORY OF GUAM:

Section 1. Section 9990 of the Government Code of Guam is
hereby amended to read as follows:

"Section 9990. The Legislature hereby finds and declares that the cost of health care now exceeds the ability to pay for the average resident of Guam. Expanded insurance protection has been seriously retarded by uncontrolled inflation in health care costs.

Factors responsible for the inflationary spiral in health costs include failure to place primary emphasis on personal disease prevention, and personal maintenance of health and ambulatory health care. To improve this situation, it is necessary to strengthen the planning of operating health services, guarantee quality and accessibility of appropriate health care at all times and require the accountability of the provider to make available that care plus development of standards of quality sufficient to adequately protect patients.

To assure that citizens of the territory will be able to obtain as well as afford necessary health services on an equitable basis, compulsory prepaid health and sickness coverage, accomplished through payroll deduction made by employers and employees, is effective on the

passage on this Act, and operative on the first day of the first calendar year after the rates and benefits proposed by the Commission have been approved by the Legislature."

Section 2. Section 9990.2 of the Government Code of Guam is hereby amended to read as follows:

"Section 9990.2. The Health Commission is hereby created and is the regulatory body which shall set policy and determine regulations which relate to the operation of personal health service of all kinds. The Health Commission shall consist of seven (7) members, appointed by the Governor with the advice and consent of the Legislature, four (4) members of the initial commission to be appointed for one (1) year, three (3) members to be appointed for two (2) year terms. The Commission shall choose from its membership, a chairman. The Director of Public Health and Social Services shall be the Chief Adminitrative Officer and shall carry out the decisions, policies and regulations of the Commission."

Section 3. Section 9990.20(b) is hereby repealed in its

Section 3. Section 9990.20(b) is hereby repealed in its entirety.

Section 4. Section 4 of Public Law 12-156 is hereby amended to read as follows:

"Section 4. The Health Commission, established by
Section 9990.2 of this Code is directed by to consult
with an actuarial firm to determine the costs of Consumer
Health Protection to persons covered by this Act; their
employers and self-employed persons. Such consultation
shall be completed in a written report prior to 1 September
1975. The Commission shall examine and report on the
feasibility of two types of health program benefits. Type I
shall provide that there will be no deductibles,

co-payments, waiting periods, cut-offs or patient fees. Type II shall provide that deductibles, co-payments, waiting periods and patient fees will be allowed in such a manner as affordable by an average family. The written report shall include a schedule of recommended fees and incidental costs upon which the premium shall be based, provided, however that no fee schedule shall be implemented without the prior approval of the Legislature."

Section 5. Section 9990.3 of the Government Code of Guam is hereby amended to read as follows:

"Section 9990.3. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, no contract for provision of health care services executed after the operative date of this Act between individuals and fiscal intermediaries or groups of any type and fiscal intermediaries, may be issued or renewed without approval of the Commission and in compliance with the standards as set forth in Part III, but all such existing benefit coverage shall remain in full force and effect until its date of expiration, provided that such time period does not exceed a date four (4) years from the effective date of this Act, except that existing programs may be renewed if, the Commission has not been established and has not developed 'standards' as required."
