AN ACT TO ADD A NEW TITLE XLVIII TO THE GOVERNMENT CODE RELATIVE TO ESTABLISHING THE GUAM CRIMINAL JUSTICE PLANNING AGENCY.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE TERRITORY OF GUAM: Section 1. A new Title XLVIII is added to the Government Code to read:

"TITLE XLVIII

Guam Criminal Justice Planning Agency

Section 64000. Findings and Purpose. The Legislature finds and declares that:

(a) the control of crime and delinquency are essentially local problems;

(b) crime and delinquency are complex social phenomena requiring the attention and coordinated effort of the criminal justice system, territorial government, and private citizens alike;

(c) the establishment of appropriate goals, objectives and standards for the reduction of crime and delinquency and for the administration of justice must be a priority concern;

(d) the functions of the criminal justice system must be coordinated more efficiently and effectively;

 (e) the full and effective use of resources affecting the criminal justice system requires the complete cooperation of all relevant government agencies;

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(f) training, research, evaluation, technical assistance, and public education activities are necessary for the improvement of the criminal justice system and the generation of effective methods for the prevention and reduction of crime and delinquency; and

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(g) for continued access to funds available through the Omnibus Crime Control and Safe Streets Act of 1968, as amended in 1976, it is required in Section 203.(a)(1) of this Act that a criminal justice planning commission or agency for Guam be authorized by statute no later than December 31, 1978.

Section 64001. Guam Criminal Justice Planning Agency. There is within the Office of the Governor of Guam the 'Guam Criminal Justice Planning Agency', which is designated as the state planning agency for carrying out Title 1, Law Enforcement Assistance Administration, of the Omnibus Crime Control and Safe Streets Act of 1968, U. S. Public Law 90-351, as amended, and the Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention Act of 1974, U. S. Public Law 93-415, as amended, and other Federal Acts as required by the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration. The Agency shall have all powers granted by such Acts to state planning agencies and shall be subject to the jurisdiction of the Governor of Guam as required by the Safe Streets Act.

Section 64002. Powers and Duties of Agency. The Agency shall:

(a) advise and assist the Governor in developing policies, plans, programs, and budgets for improving the coordination, administration, and effectiveness of the criminal justice system in Guam;

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(b) establish goals, priorities, and standards for the reduction of crime and the improvement of the administration of justice in Guam;

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(c) assist law enforcement and criminal justice agencies in identifying their needs and problems and in establishing and achieving their objectives and goals by means of the development of long-range plans;

(d) encourage and coordinate comprehensive criminal justice planning efforts;

(e) develop programs for the effective utilization of existing facilities, for the encouragement of cooperative arrangements between law enforcement, criminal justice, and other related agencies, and for innovations in the design of institutions and facilities;

(f) prepare and update, as necessary, a State Comprehensive Criminal Justice Plan, on behalf of the Governor, for submission to the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration, U. S. Department of Justice;

(g) provide for the production and dissemination of necessary data, analysis and projections to assist in the establishment of priorities, selection of programs, and identification of needs and problem areas within Guam's Criminal Justice System;

(h) monitor and evaluate programs and projects, funded in whole or in part by the territorial government aimed at reducing crime and delinquency and improving the administration of justice;

(i) provide recommendations to local criminal justice agencies on the use of advanced techniques and practices for reducing crime;

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(j) assist and advise in the development and promotion of programs directly relating to crime prevention, detection, deterrence, apprehension, and confinement, as well as non-institutional rehabilitation programs outside the institutional settings;

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(k) assist in public education efforts relating to juvenile delinquency, crime prevention, and functions of the law enforcement and criminal justice system by means of programs for children and adults in the school system, and provide forums in the villages, and encourage creative use of the media to increase community awareness in relation to these concerns;

(1) assist and provide for guidance and technical assistance to aid in the education and training of law enforcement officials and criminal justice officials;

(m) have the authority to collect from any local governmental entity information, data, reports, statistics or such other material which are necessary to carry out the Agency functions;

(n) provide information and outline procedures for grant applications to prospective aid recipients;

(0) coordinate the Comprehensive State Plan with other federally-supported programs relative to or having an impact on law enforcement and criminal justice;

(p) establish priorities for providing funds and technical assistance in the areas of juvenile delinquency prevention, crime control, and improvement of law enforcement and criminal justice agencies;

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(q) set forth policies and procedures designed to ensure that Federal funds will be used to supplement rather than supplant local funds for law enforcement and criminal justice;

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(r) apply and account for, receive, allocate, monitor, audit, and disburse or subgrant funds made available by the U. S. Federal Government and the government of Guam for the purposes provided for in this Title; and

(s) perform such other duties as may be necessary to carry out the purposes of this Title, or as the Governor may assign.

Section 64003. Executive Director and Staff. (a) The Governor may appoint an Executive Director for the Agency, with the advice and consent of the Legislature, who shall serve at the pleasure of the Governor. The Executive Director shall be paid a salary in accordance with Section 4106 of the Government Code. The Executive Director may employ such personnel and contract for such consulting services, as may be necessary and authorized to carry out the purpose of this Title.

(b) Staff, other than the Executive Director, must be included within the territory's existing personnel system. This requirement is not meant to preclude exemption for other key personnel if appropriate under territorial law.

Section 64004. Supervisory Board. The Governor shall establish a Supervisory Board which shall be responsible for the general oversight of the operation of the Agency.

(a) The Supervisory Board shall consist of the following members or their designees:

(1) The Attorney General of the territory of Guam;

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(2) The Director of the Department of Public Safety;

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(3) The Director of the Department of Corrections;

- (4) The Director of the Public Defender Service Corporation;
- (5) The Chairman of the Juvenile Justice Advisory Group;
- (6) The Presiding Judge of the Superior Court;
- (7) The Executive Director of the Department of Youth Affairs;
- (8) The Chief Judicial Administrative Officer; and

(9) The Executive Director of the Agency. Each of the members serving pursuant to this Section shall serve by virtue of his position with the designated agency or institution and shall serve as long as he remains in that position. Should any cease to hold the position by whose virtue he is a member of the Supervisory Board, membership on the Supervisory Board shall terminate immediately. The successor to any of the above listed positions will succeed to membership on the Supervisory Board.

(b) The Governor shall appoint the remaining six (6) Supervisory Board members, which shall include one (1) Municipal Commissioner and five (5) representatives of the general public, none of which shall be fulltime employees of the government. Two (2) of these five (5) representatives shall also serve on the Juvenile Justice Advisory Group. The remainder shall represent citizen, professional and community organizations.

(c) Members shall serve for a term of five (5) years, and may be reappointed for no more than one (1) additional consecutive term; except that the terms of those members who

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serve by virtue of the office they hold shall be concurrent with their services in the office from which they derive Supervisory Board membership.

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(d) Vacancies occurring, other than by those of members who are on the Supervisory Board by virtue of their position or the expiration of a term, shall be filled in the same manner as the original appointment within thirty (30) days of the vacancy.

(e) The Governor, or his designee, shall serve as convener of the Supervisory Board until such time as a Chairman can be selected by a majority vote of the Supervisory Board membership.

Section 64005. Same: Compensation and expenses. Members of the Supervisory Board shall receive the amount of \$50 per meeting, but not to exceed \$100 per month, and shall be reimbursed for the expenses actually and necessarily incurred by them in the performance of their duties as required under this Chapter, provided funds are available.

Section 64006. Powers and Duties of Supervisory Board. (a) The Supervisory Board shall:

(1) act as an advisory body to the Governor and Executive Director of the Agency in identifying problems and developing policies, plans, programs, and budgets for improving the coordination, administration, and effectiveness of the criminal justice in Guam; and

(2) have the responsibility for reviewing, approving, and maintaining general oversight of the state plan and its implementation.

Section 64007. Meetings; Quorum; Committees; By-Laws. (a) The Supervisory Board shall meet at such times and places as prescribed by rules or regulations. All supervisory Board meetings shall be opened to the public.

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(b) Eight (8) members shall constitute a quorum.

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(c) The Supervisory Board may establish committees and/ or task forces as it deems advisable and feasible to assist in the completion of its duties and responsibilities.

(d) All meetings of the Supervisory Board, or any committee or task force thereof, at which public business is discussed or formal action is taken shall conform to all territorial laws and regulations requiring public access to such meetings.

(e) The Supervisory Board and any other committee or organization established to carry out the purposes of this Title shall provide for public access to all records except as are required to be kept confidential by any other provision of territorial or Federal law.

(f) The Supervisory Board shall promulgate rules of procedures governing its operations, provided they are in accordance with the provisions of this Act and laws and regulations of the territory of Guam relevant to administrative procedure.

Section 64008. Legislative Review. The Agency shall make available to the Legislature the Comprehensive State Plan, and substantial modifications and updates thereto, for its advisory review of the goals, priorities, and policies contained therein. This Plan shall be submitted at the request of the Legislature to the Legislative Committee on the Judiciary & Criminal Justice. The Agency shall provide notification to the Legislature of the Comprehensive State Plan readiness for review.

Section 64009. Cooperation of other departments. Each agency, department, office, commission, or part of the government of Guam is authorized and instructed to render assistance, information, and cooperation to the Agency as is necessary for it to perform its duties as provided in this Title.

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Section 64010. Limitations. Nothing in this Title shall be construed as authorizing Guam Criminal Justice Planning Agency to undertake direct administration or operation of any criminal justice or law enforcement agency."

Section 2. On the effective date of this Act, all previous directives and executive orders pertaining to the establishment and operation of the Territorial Crime Commission are rescinded and null and void. All personnel, property, and budget items of the Territorial Crime Commission are transferred to the Guam Criminal Justice Planning Agency.

Section 3. A new Section 49003.1 is added to the Government Code to read:

"Section 49003.1. Notwithstanding the provisions of any law to the contrary, the schedule of fees (causing an increase of approximately 20.5% over fees previously in effect) to be charged for care and services at or by the hospital, including care and services for the mentally-ill, to be implemented during October 1978 shall be suspended for one (1) year from the date of enactment of this Act.

The Board of Trustees shall study and reevaluate the current fee schedule to determine if it can be revised to reduce fees in light of appropriation of local funds to the Guam Memorial Hospital Authority and receipt of Federal funds in the amount of Twenty-Five Million Dollars (\$25,000,000) by the end of this calendar year and another Ten Million Dollars (\$10,000,000) within six (6) months. The Board of Trustees shall report its findings to the Governor and the Legislature."

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Section 4. Section 3 of Public Law 14-5, as amended by Public Laws 14-57 and 14-92, and further amended by Public Law 14-137, is again amended to read:

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"Section 3. The Board of Commissioners of Guam Housing and Urban Renewal Authority is directed to create a special fund for the Authority and to deposit into it the proceeds of sales it makes at the GHURA 500 project. The fund so created shall be reserved by the Authority to reimburse the General Fund of the government for the \$1.0 Million appropriated by Section 2 of this Act not later than December 30, 1978."

Section 5. Subsection (a) of Section 8981 of the Government Code is amended to read:

Every person who served in active duty in the "(a) Armed Forces of the United States in World War II, the Korean War, or the Indo-China Conflict, who at the time of entering such service, was a resident of Guam, and who was separated or discharged from his or her respective branch of service under conditions other than dishonorable or who is still in active or reserve service shall be entitled to receive a bonus of Thirty Dollars (\$30.00) for each month of active service during World Nar II, the Korean War or Indo-China Conflict. The bonus for a fraction of a month of service shall be determined on the basis of One Dollar (\$1.00) for each day of service, except that bonuses shall not be given to any person who received from another state or territory of the United States a bonus of a like nature as is provided in this Chapter. The maximum payment under this Chapter shall not exceed the sum of Seven Hundred Twenty Dollars (\$720.00)."

Section 6. A new Subsection (c) is added to Section 8981 1 2 of the Government Code to read: 3 "(c) If a veteran is entitled to a Guam Veterans bonus under this Chapter, and he or she was killed in action, the 4 amount of compensation payable under (b) above shall be 5 Seven Hundred Twenty Dollars (\$720.00)." 6 Section 7. Section 8982 of the Government Code is amended 7 to read: 8 "Section 8982. Application for bonuses. All applica-9 tions for bonuses authorized by this Chapter must be made 10 to the Office of Veteran's Affairs on or before December 31, 11 1978. Each applicant shall furnish to the Office of Veteran's 12 Affairs evidence of his eligibility for a veteran's bonus. 13 Eligibility may be evidenced by authenticated copies of 14 records or certificates issued by the Department of Defense, 15 U. S. Military Service Department, or any other authorized 16 agency having such evidence in its possession." 17 Section 8. The Governor is authorized to dedicate government 18 owned real property not to exceed two (2) hectares to the Guam 19 Football Association for the construction of a soccer playing 20 Said dedication shall provide if any of the property field. 21 dedicated shall not be used and maintained for the aforesaid 22 purpose, or if any part shall cease to be used and maintained 23 for such purpose, or if any part shall be used for any other 24 purpose inconsistent with such purpose, then all right, title, 25 and interest in and to the property and to the improvements there-26 on, shall revert to and revest in dedicator, government of Guam. 27

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Section 9. Section 1.g of Public Law 14-132 is hereby amended 1 to read: 2 3 "l.g. Office of Aging 4 1. Section 11. There is hereby appropriated from the General Fund the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) to the Department of Parks and Recreation to underwrite the study of children's Zoo.

Section 12. Section 13971 of the Government Code (Public Law 14-136) is amended to read:

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"Section 13971. Creation of Land Survey Fund. There is within the government of Guam a special fund known as the 'Land Survey Fund'. The Land Transfer Fund is abolished and all moneys therein, except those moneys derived from the program of clearing the fractional lots in the city of Agana, are transferred to the Land Survey Fund. The Land Survey Fund shall be under the administration of the Director of Land Management but no moneys shall be expended therefrom except by appropriation of the Legislature, provided, however, that the Legislature shall not make any appropriation under this Section until the Director of Land Management has submitted to the Legislature the systematic program of planned surveys required by Subparagraph (5) of Section 13970 of this Chapter. All proceeds from the sale and lease of public lands, from land permit fees and all other income derived from the operation of the Department of Land Management, including recording fees but excluding the Document

Tax proceeds, shall be covered into the Land Survey Fund; provided, however, that the maximum amount of said fund shall not exceed Nine Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$900,000), all such income in excess of said amount to be covered into the General Fund. The Land Survey Fund shall cease and terminate on December 30, 1978 and moneys in said fund at such time shall be covered into the General Fund." Section 13. Section 7 of Public Law 14-136 is amended to read:

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"Section 7. There is hereby appropriated from the General Fund the sum of Thirty-Eight Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$38,500) to the Land Survey Fund." Section 14. Section 255.1 is added to the Code of Civil Procedure to read:

"Section 255.1. Referees; appointment; term; compensation; qualifications. The Presiding Judge of the Superior Court of Guam may appoint one or more juvenile court referees to serve on a full-time or part-time basis. A juvenile court referee shall serve at the pleasure of the appointing judge, and unless the appointing judge makes his order terminating the appointment of a juvenile court referee, such juvenile court referee shall serve as such until the appointment of his successor. The amount and rate of compensation to be paid juvenile court referees, the qualifications of juvenile court referees, and the duties and powers of juvenile court referees, shall be fixed by the Judicial Council, provided, however, that the individual appointed as a referce shall be an attorney licensed to practice law in the Territory of Guam."

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Section 15. The new reassignment of pay ranges for Corrections Officer class series, I to III, as approved by Civil Service Commission on July 5, 1978 is hereby authorized to be implemented upon the Governor's approval of this Act.

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Section 16. The Civil Service Commission is hereby directed to perform and recommend the feasibility of a reassignment of all other Corrections Officer class series in the Department of Corrections to receive equal pay with Police Officer positions.

Section 17. Part One, Section 1, Subsections II., C., a. of P. L. 14-132 is hereby amended for the purpose of implementing Section 15 of this Act as follows:

"II. For Public Safety

C. Department of Corrections

a. Personnel Services

(not to exceed 75

positions)

\$968,000".

Section 18. There is hereby appropriated from any available balance of the Unappropriated Surplus of the Tourist Attraction Fund, the sum of Two Hundred Fifty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$255,000) for the purpose of making restorations to the Plaza de Espana in Agana.

Section 19. The appropriation made under Section 18 of this Act is to be composed of One Hundred Thirty Thousand Dollars (\$130,000) local funds from the Tourist Attraction Fund, and One Hundred Twenty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$125,000) federal funds to be sought from the National Park Service. All funds reimbursed by the National Park Service shall revert to the Unappropriated Surplus of the Tourist Attraction Fund.

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Section 20. Renovations made to the Plaza de Espana shall be inclusive of interior and exterior repairs and shall be approved by the State Historic Preservation Officer prior to commencing such restroation.

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Section 21. There is hereby appropriated from the General Fund the sum of Two Hundred Seventy-Five Thousand Seventy-Three Dollars (\$275,073) to adequately provide for critical overtime payment to the Department of Public Safety accrued in Fiscal Year 1978.

Section 22. The new reassignments of pay ranges for Customs Officer Class Series I and II, as approved by the Civil Service Commission on July 5, 1978, except that the pay range for Customs Officer I shall be 22 and the pay range for Customs Officer II shall be 24, are authorized to be implemented effective upon the enactment of this Act.

Section 23. The Civil Service Commission is directed to perform a study and recommend to the Legislature the feasibility of reassignment of all other Customs Officer class series in the Department of Commerce to receive equal pay with Police Officer positions.

Section 24. Notwithstanding any law, rule or regulation to the contrary, the Department of Commerce is authorized to use any unencumbered and unexpended balance in any category for any division of its FY 1978 appropriation to implement the provisions of Sections 21 and 22 of this Act.
