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AN ACT TO ADD SECTION 22.35 AND ARTICLE 2 TO CHAPTER 43 OF THE CRIMINAL AND CORRECTIONAL CODE RELATIVE TO UNLAWFUL RESTRAINT AND DEFINING RETAIL THEFT AND

PROVIDING PUNISHMENT THEREFOR. 1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE TERRITORY OF GUAM: Section 1. Section 22.35 is added to the Criminal and 2 3 Correctional Code to read: "Section 22.35. (a) A person commits the offense of unlawful restraint when he knowingly, without legal ä ć authority, detains another. 7 (b) Unlawful restraint, punishment for. Unlawful 8 restraint is a misdemeanor." Section 2. Article 2 is added to Chapter 43 of the Criminal and Correctional Code to read: 10 11 "ARTICLE 2 12 Rotail Theft 13 14 Article, the words and phrases defined in Sections 43.82 through 43.92 have the meanings ascribed to them in those 15

Section 43.80. Definitions. For the purposes of this sections unless a contrary meaning is clear from the context.

Section 43.81. To 'conceal' merchandise means that although there may be some notice of its presence, that merchandise is not visible through ordinary observation.

Section 43.82. 'Full retail value' means the merchant's stated or advertised price of the merchandise. Section 43.83. 'Merchandise' means any item of
tangible personal property.

Section 43.84. 'Merchant' means an owner or operator
of any retail mercantile establishment or any agent,

employee, lessed, consignee, officer, director, franchise or independent contractor of such owner or operator.

Section 43.85. 'Minor' means a person who is less than eighteen (18) years of age, is unemancipated and resides with his parents or legal guardian.

Section 43.86. 'Person' means any natural person or individual.

Section 43.87. 'Peace Officer' has the meaning ascribed to that term in Section 5.55 of the Criminal Procedure Code.

Section 43.88. 'Premises of a retail mercantile establishment' includes, but is not limited to, the retail mercantile establishment; any common use areas in shopping centers and all parking areas set aside by a merchant or on behalf of a merchant for the parking of vehicles for the convenience of the patrons of such retail mercantile establishment.

Section 43.89. 'Shopping cart' means those push carts of the type or types which are commonly provided by grocery stores, drug stores or other retail mercantile establishments for the use of the public in transporting commodities in stores and markets and, incidentally, from the stores to a place outside the store.

Section 43.90. 'Under-ring' means to cause the cash register or other sales recording device to reflect less than the full retail value of the merchandise.

2 knowingly: 3 (a) takes possession of, carries away, transfers or causes to be carried away or transferred, any merchandise displayed, held, stored or offered for sale in a retail mercantile establishment with 7 the intention of retaining such merchandise or with 8 the intention of depriving the merchant permanently of the possession, use or benefit of such 10 merchandise without paying the full retail value 11 of such merchandise: 12 (b) alters, transfers, or removes any label, 13 price tag, marking, indicia of value or any other 14 markings which aid in determining value affixed to 15 any merchandise displayed, held, stored or offered for sale in a retail mercantile establishment with 17 the intention of depriving the merchant of the full 18 retail value of such value of merchandise; 19 (c) transfers any merchandise displayed, held, 20 stored or offered for sale in a retail mercantile 21 establishment from the container in or on which such 22 merchandise is displayed to any other container with 23 the intention of depriving the morchant of the full retail value of such merchandise; 25 (d) under-rings with the intention of depriving 26 the merchant of the full retail value of the 27 merchandise; or 28 (e) removes a shopping cart from the premises 29 of a retail mercantile establishment without the 30 consent of the nerchant given at the time of such

Section 43.91. A person is guilty of theft if he

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removal.

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Section 45.92. Presumptions. If any person:

- (a) conceals upon his person or among his belongings, unpurchased merchandise displayed, held, stored or offered for sale in a retail mercantile establishment; and
- (b) removes that merchandise beyond the last station for receiving payments for that merchandise in that retail mercantile establishment, such person shall be presumed to have possessed, carried away or transferred such merchandise with the intention of retaining it or with the intention of depriving the merchant permanently of the possession, use or benefit of such merchandise without paying the full retail value of such merchandise.

Section 43.93. Detention. Any merchant who has reasonable grounds to believe that a person has committed retail theft may detain such person, on the premises of a retail mercantile establishment, in a reasonable manner and for a reasonable length of time for all or any of the following purposes:

- (a) to request identification;
- (b) to verify such identification;
- (c) to make reasonable oral inquiry as to whether such person has in his possession unpurchased merchandise and, to make reasonable investigation of the ownership of such merchandise;
- (d) to inform a peace officer of the detention of the person and surrender custody of that person to a peace officer; or
- (c) in the case of a minor, to immediately inform a peace officer and the parents or guardian or

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other private person interested in the welfare of that minor of this detention and to surrender custody of such minor to such person.

Section 43.94. Affirmative Defense. A detention, as permitted in this Article, does not constitute an arrest or unlawful restraint, as defined in Section 22.35 of this Code, nor shall it render the merchant liable to the person so detained unless said detention is done unreasonably or without proper cause or justification.

Section 43.95. If any part of this Article is declared invalid by a court, then the remainder of this Article shall still be in effect."

Section 3. A new Item (3.5) is added to Section 80.10 of the Criminal and Correctional Code to read:

"(3.5) to report to the court administered alternative community service program to perform services for the community as said program shall provide. A person ordered to perform such services shall be ordered to work for a specific number of hours. This work shall be certified to the court by the supervisor of the alternative community service program."

Section 4. A new Chapter 31 is added to the Criminal and Correctional Code to read:

"CHAPTER 81

Reduction of Sentences

Section 81.19 (a) Any person in custody of the Department of Corrections may work at cleaning up littered areas and beaches of the island of Guam, provided, that the Director of Corrections (1) determines the person merits such privilege and is physically able to do such work and (2) can provide supervision of crews.

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(c) The Directors of the Departments of Public Works and Parks and Recreation shall cooperate with the Director of the Department of Corrections in choosing areas for work."
