AN ACT TO CREATE THE COMMISSION ON SELF-DETERMINATION FOR THE PEOPLE OF GUAM AND TO APPROPRIATE THE SUM OF ONE HUNDRED FIFTY THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$150,000.00) TO CARRY OUT THE ACTIVITIES OF THE COMMISSION.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE TERRITORY OF GUAM:

Section 1. A new Chapter XII is added to Title II of the Government Code to read:

"CHAPTER XII

Commission on Self-Determination

for the People of Guam

Section 1960. Statement of Legislative Purpose.

Noting that the unincorporated territory of Guam is the only organized government in the Western Pacific whose political status has remained unchanged for the last thirty years, finding that the people of Guam demand a mechanism whereby the status of their government vis-a-vis the United States and the rest of the world be redefined, and acknowledging that past attempts to

change the status of the territory by means of constitutional conventions have failed because the views of the people of Guam were not sought prior to the initiation of such proposed constitution, the Legislature declares that the time has come for the people of Guam to choose their future political status and then, having made such choice, to actively seek the same from the Congress of the United States. The purpose of this Chapter is to establish a Commission on Self-Determination for the people of Guam empowered to so ascertain the will of the people of Guam and to thereafter represent them in manifesting such will to the Congress and to the government of the United States.

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There is established a Commission Section 1961. on Self-Determination for the people of Guam which shall be composed of eleven (11) members including the Chairman. The Governor shall serve as Chairman of the Commission. Five (5) members of the Commission shall be appointed by the Governor, at least three (3) of which shall be from the private section in the community of Guam; three (3) members shall be appointed by the Speaker; and two (2) members shall be appointed by the Commissioners Council. No person shall be eligible to serve as a member of the Commission unless he or she shall be a citizen of the United States qualified to vote on Guam. Members (except for the Chairman) shall serve throughout the life of the Commission and shall elect from among themselves a Vice-Chairman who shall serve as Chairman in the absence of the Governor. Vacancies in the membership

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shall be filled in the same manner as the original appointment.

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Section 1962. The general purpose of the Commission is to ascertain the desire of the people of Guam as to their future political relationship with the United States of America. Once the desire of the people of Guam is ascertained, the Commission shall be the primary advocate in the government of Guam for the relationship that the people of Guam desire with the United States.

Section 1963. The Commission shall appoint one (1) Task Force composed of seven (7) advocates of Statehood for the territory of Guam. The Task Force shall draw upon the resources of the Commission and conduct an extensive study on the consequences of Statehood for Guam. The Task Force shall prepare a position paper which presents well reasoned advocacy for Statehood. The Task Force shall advise the Commission as to the feasibility of Statehood within the immediate or foreseeable future. The Task Force shall assist the Commission in preparing a public education program on the consequences of Statehood.

Section 1964. The Commission shall appoint one
(1) Task Force composed of seven (7) advocates of
Independence or Free Association with the United
States for the territory of Guam. The Task Force shall
draw upon the resources of the Commission and conduct
an extensive study on the consequences of Independence
or Free Association for Guam. The Task Force shall
prepare a position paper which presents well reasoned
advocacy for Independence or Free Association. The

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Task Force shall advise the Commission as to the feasibility of Independence or Free Association within the immediate or foreseeable future. The Task Force shall assist the Commission in preparing a public education program on the consequences of Independence or Free Association.

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Section 1965. The Commission shall appoint one (1) Task Force composed of seven (7) advocates of Incorporated Territorial Status with the United States for the territory of Guam. The Task Force shall draw upon the resources of the Commission and conduct an extensive study on the consequences of Incorporated Territorial Status for Guam. The Task Force shall prepare a position paper which presents well reasoned advocacy for Incorporated Territorial Status. Task Force shall advise the Commission as to the feasibility of Incorporated Territorial Status. Task Force shall advise the Commission as to the feasibility of Incorporated Status within the immediate or foreseeable future. The Task Force shall assist the Commission in preparing a public education program on the consequences of the Incorporated Territorial Status.

Section 1966. The Commission shall appoint one (1) Task Force composed of seven (7) advocates of Commonwealth Status with the United States for the territory of Guam. The Task Force shall draw upon the resources of the Commission and conduct an extensive study on the consequences of Commonwealth Status for Guam. The Task Force shall prepare a position paper which presents well reasoned advocacy

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for Commonwealth Status. The Task Force shall advise the Commission as to the feasibility of Commonwealth Status within the immediate or forsceable future. The Task Force shall assist the Commission in preparing a public education program on the consequences of Commonwealth Status.

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Section 1967. The Commission shall appoint one
(1) Task Force composed of seven (7) advocates of a
continuation of Guam's current relationship with the
United States. The Task Force shall draw upon the
resources of the Commission and conduct an extensive
study on the consequences of continuing the Status
Quo. The Task Force shall prepare a position paper
which presents well reasoned advocacy for continuation
of Guam's current relationship with the United States.
The Task Force shall assist the Commission in preparing
a public education program on the consequences of the
continuation of Guam's current relationship with the
United States.

Section 1968. The Commission shall prepare a proposed Territorial-Federal Relations Act which addresses immediate concerns on or before January 1, 1981.

Section 1969. Following public input, a final draft of the Act shall be completed on or before June 1, 1981, such document reflecting the views of the people of Guam. A referendum on the proposed Act shall be held on September 12, 1981.

Section 1970. The Commission shall retain the services of at least five (5) experienced researchers so that at least one (1) researcher may be assigned

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to each Task Force to assist the Task Force in its research and preparation of its position paper. Such other clerical and administrative help as is necessary may be retained by the Commission.

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Section 1971. No later than ten (10) months after the appointment of the five (5) Task Forces, each Task Force shall present its position paper to the Commission. The Commission shall prepare an educational program based on the position papers presented by each Task Force.

Section 1972. On September 12, 1981, the Guam Flection Commission shall conduct a plebiscite at which the following question shall be asked:

'As the ultimate goal of the territory of Guam, do you favor:

Section 1973. If no one political status proposal receives majority of the votes cast in the above plebiscite, a run-off plebiscite shall be held sixty (60) days from the date thereof between the two status proposals receiving the highest number of votes.

Section 1974. After the results of the plebiscite are made known, the Commission shall reduce the desires

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of the people of Guam to a written covenant, if necessary, to be submitted to the Congress of the United States as the manifest will of the people of Guam on the question of their relationship with the government of the United States of America. The Commission shall represent the people of Guam in negotiating with the Congress of the United States the implementation of such covenant.

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Section 1975. General Powers. The Commission shall have, and may exercise, the following general powers in carrying on the activities specified in this Chapter:

- (a) To acquire, in any lawful manner, any property real, personal, mixed, tangible or intangible to hold, maintain, use and operate the same; and to sell, lease, or otherwise dispose of the same, whenever any of the foregoing transactions are deemed necessary or appropriate to the conduct of the activities authorized by this Chapter, and on such terms as may be prescribed by the Commission.
- (b) To enter into and perform such contracts, leases, cooperative agreements or other transactions with any person, firm, association, corporation, or any agency or instrumentality of the government of Guam or of the United States or of any state, territory or nation, or any political subdivision thereof, as may be deemed necessary or appropriate to the conduct of the activities authorized by this Chapter, and on such terms as may be prescribed by the Commission.
- (c) To execute all instruments necessary or appropriate in the exercise of any of its functions.

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To appoint, without regard to the provisions 1 of the Personnel and Compensation Laws, such officers, 2 agents, attorneys, consultants, and employees as may 3 be necessary for the conduct of the business of the Commission; delegate them such powers and to prescribe 5 for them such duties as may be deemed appropriate by 6 the Commission; to fix and pay such compensation to 7 them for their services as the Commission may determine, ô without regard to the provisions of the Personnel and Compensation Laws. In the appointment of officials 10 7 and the selection of employees, agents and consultants 11 i for the Commission, no political test or qualification 12 13 shall be permitted or given consideration, but all such appointments shall be given and made on the basis 14 of merit and knowledge. The Commission shall give due 15 consideration to residents of Guam in the selection of 16 its officials, attorneys, agents, consultants and 17 18 employees.

(e) To accept gifts or donations of services, or of property - real, personal, or mixed, tangible or intangible - in aid of any of the activities authorized by this Chapter.

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(f) To adopt rules and regulations governing operations of the Commission and to take such other action as may be necessary or appropriate to carry out the powers and duties herein specified or hereafter granted to or imposed upon it.

Section 1976. The Micronesian Area Research Center shall be the depository of all records and materials pertaining to political status of the territory of Guam. The Commission shall transfer all of its official

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documents to the Center upon completion of its work." Section 2. The sum of One Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$150,000.00) is appropriated from the General Fund to the Commission on Self-Determination for the people of Guam created 5 by this Act for the purpose of carrying out the activities as authorized by this Act.

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Section 3. The appropriation made in Section 2 of this Act shall be administered and authorized to be expended by the 9 Commission on Self-Determination for the people of Guam in 10 accordance with its rules. Notwithstanding any other provision 11 of law, the certifying officer with respect to such appropriation 12 shall be designated by the Chairman of the Commission.
