AN ACT TO ADD CHAPTER VI-A TO TITLE XXII OF THE GOVERNMENT CODE RELATIVE TO THE CONSUMER POWER LIFELINE ACT.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE TERRITORY OF GUAM: Section 1. Statement of Legislative Findings. The Legislature finds that electricity is an essential life necessity and recognizes that stable pricing for consumer use of electricity is impossible because of the fluctuating international oil market, the negative price impact caused by Federal regulation of the oil industry, the geographical isolation of Guam and the necessity for importation of fuels to meet local energy needs. The Legislature also finds that the Guam Power Authority is a quasi-public agency vested with the responsibility of supplying the public's power needs and ensuring that the consumer's interests in fair, reasonable and adequate rates is protected. Rising power bills cause severe hardship for many poor and limited income persons and electricity has become too costly for a significant fraction of the population. The Legislature also finds that the present rate structure of the Guam Power Authority serves to penalize the individual user of relatively small quantities and, at the The Legislasame time, encourages wastefulness by large users. ture further finds that in order to insure that all residents have the opportunity to consume and benefit from electrical service, the government must regulate power rates and charges. There is, therefore, established a lifeline rate which provides a fixed rate for energy for domestic uses.

Section 2. A new Chapter VI-A is added to Title XXII of 1 the Government Code to read: 2 "CHAPTER VI-A 3 Consumer Power Lifeline 4 Section 21530. Title. Section 3. The Public Utilities Commission shall approve the rate structure required in Section 2 of this Act within one hundred twenty (120) days of the passage of this Act.
