AN ACT TO ADD A NEW CHAPTER 71 TO TITLE 10, GUAM CODE ANNOTATED, RELATIVE TO REGULATING THE USE OF FIREARMS BY PRIVATE SECURITY OFFICERS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE TERRITORY OF GUAM:
Section 1. A new Chapter 71 is added to Title 10, Guam Code
Annotated to read as follows:

#### "CHAPTER 71

## Private Security Organizations

#### Article 1

Title, Purpose and Definitions

Section 70200. Title. This Act shall be known and may be cited as 'The Private Security Regulatory Statute.'

Section 70201. Purpose. The purpose of this Chapter is to prescribe uniform procedures and qualifications throughout the territory for: establishing training standards in the use of firearms by Private Security Officers and restricting the hiring of certain persons as Private Security Officers.

Section 70202. Definitions. For the purposes of this Chapter the following terms, phrases, words and their derivations shall have the meaning given herein. When not inconsistent with the context, words used in the plural number shall include the singular number and words in the singular number shall include the plural number.

(a) The term 'Private Security Officer' means an individual employed by any person, duly licensed and authorized to conduct business in the territory of Guam, to protect a person or persons and/or property from criminal activity and other hazards; whose principal duty is that of a security director, manager, supervisor or

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- institutions, or similar entities.
- The term 'Firearm's Identification Card' means a pocket card issued by the Department of Public Safety to an individual authorizing that individual to own, use or possess a firearm in the territory of Guam.
- The term 'Certifying Authority' means the Department of (e) Public Safety.
- The term Temporary Firearms Identification Card means a pocket card issued by the Department of Public Safety to a resident alien employed as a Private Security Officer authorizing that person to use or possess a firearm in the territory of Guam.

### Article 2

Firearms Training of Private Security Officers Section 70203. Firearms Identification Card.

- All Private Security Officers required to carry a firearm while performing security duties shall be the holder of a valid Government of Guam Firearms Identification Card.
- Upon the written request of an employee, the Director, Department of Public Safety, shall issue a temporary. Firearms Identification Card.
- The temporary Firearms Identification Card shall entitle the holder to use or possess a firearm while actively employed as a Private Security Officer in the territory of Guam.

(d) Upon issuance of a permanent Firearms Identification Card or in the event the individual is no longer employed as a Private Security Officer, the holder of a temporary Firearms Identification Card shall surrender the card to the Department of Public Safety.

- (e) A Private Security Officer in possession of a valid Firearms Identification Card may carry a firearm concealed while on official duty or while traveling to and from his place of duty.
- (f) A Private Security Officer may carry his personally owned firearm while on official security duty provided that the firearm is legally registered and shall first be approved for such use by his employer.

Section 70204. Private Security Officer Firearms Training Requirements. (a) All Private Security Officers in possession of a valid Firearms Identification Card shall receive pre-issue firearms instructions as prescribed in subsection (b) of this Section before being authorized to carry a firearm on duty.

- (b) Pre-issue firearms instructions shall consist of two (2) hours of training including, but not limited, to the following subjects:
  - (1) Legal limitations on the use of firearms;
  - (2) Handling of a firearm; and
  - (3) Safety and Maintenance.
- (c) All Private Security Officers authorized and required to carry a firearm on duty shall also receive initial firearms marksmanship training on an approved firearms target course prescribed by the Certifying Authority. Individuals must obtain a minimum score of sixty percent (60%) on an approved silhouette target.
- (d) All Private Security Officers authorized and required to carry a firearm on duty shall receive annual firearms refresher training as prescribed by subsections (b) and (c) of this Section.
- (e) Upon completion of any training required by Section 70204, the employer shall within thirty (30) days forward a recorded copy of such completion signed by a certified trainer to the Certifying Authority. The original training record document shall be maintained

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Section 70206. Unlawful Acts. (a) It shall be unlawful for any person to knowingly:

- Employ any individual as a Private Security Officer (1) if the individual has been convicted in any jurisdiction of a felony for which a full pardon has not been granted;
  - Violate any provision of this Title;
- Employ any individual as a Private Security Officer (3) Officer who has been discharged from the military service under other than honorable conditions.
- The violation of any of the provisions of this Section shall constitute a misdemeanor punishable by a fine of not more than One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000) or up to one (1) year of imprisonment, or both.

reciprocity shall be Full Reciprocity. 70207. Section accorded to Private Security Officers who are properly certified in another state having selection and training requirements at least equal to the requirements of the Territory of Guam.

### Article 5

#### Insurance

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Section 70208. Each employer of Private sSecurity Officers shall file with the Department of Revenue and Taxation a certificate of insurance evidencing comprehensive general liability coverage for bodily injury, personal injury, and property damage with endorsements for assault and battery and personal injury, including false arrest, libel, slander, and invasion of privacy, in the minimum amount of Three Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$300,000) for bodily or personal injury and One Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$100,0000) for property damage. The certificate of insurance shall contain an endorsement for damage to property in the care, custody and control of the Private The certificate of insurance shall indicate that Security Officer. coverage of the employer is without any deductible amount. If the Insurance Commissioner certifies that the employer is unable to acquire an insurance policy without a non-deductible clause then the insurance Commissioner shall certify that the policy acquired by the employer is a policy with the least deductible amount. The department shall not issue a license to the employer until the certificate of insurance is on If at any time the certificate of insurance is revoked, then the department shall revoke the business license."

Section 2. Severability. If any provision of Chapter 71, Title 10, Guam Code Annotated or the application thereof to any person or circumstance is held invalid, such invalidity shall not affect other provisions or application of Chapter 71 which can be given effect without the invalid provisions or application and to this end the provisions of Chapter 71 are declared to be severable.

Section 3. Effective Date. The provisions of Sections 1 and 2 of this Act shall become effective sixty (60) days from the date of its approval by the Governor or by the operation of law within the Governor's approval.

Section 4. 1 GCA Section 1013.1(a), enacted by Public Law 17-10, "An Act relative to the duties of the Chamorro Language Commission, and for other purposes," is amended to read:

"(a) "Whenever the Guam Island Fair is to be held in a location

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other than the Agana Paseo grounds, than any Civic Organization, as provided herein, may sponsor a Liberation Day Carnival for the same duration as the Guam Island Fair. In this instance, the Commissioner's Council shall appoint a Liberation Day Carnival committee to plan and make appropriate arrangements for the celebration of this Carnival. The Committee shall be composed of members of patriotic, religious, or other civic organization."

Section 5. New Sections 1013.4 and 1013.5 are added to Title 1 of the Guam Code Annotated to read:

Punishment for Obstruction A person commits "Section 1013.4. a petty misdemeanor if, with intent to prevent the issuance of any license or permit as authorized in Section 1013.1(b), he does any act tending to obstruct or interfere with the issuance of any license or permit for the operation of the Liberation Day Carnival as set out in Section 1013.1 of Title 1 of the Guam Code Annotated. In addition, any person guilty of obstruction as indicated above shalf be civilly liable for any losses suffered by any applicant for the arbitrary denial of a license or permit as indicated above, plus cost and reasonable attorneys fees in any civil action to require the proper government officials to issue a permit or license as prescribed. The civil penalty shall be not less than One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) nor more than twice the amount of losses sustained by the applicant for a license or permit as a result of such obstruction.

Section 1013.5. Definition of Obstruction. The term 'obstruction' as used in Section 1013.4 of Title 1, GCA, shall mean the refusal of any government official or employee to issue a license or permit when the applicant qualifies for the permit or license as prescribed by law."

Section 6. A new Section 8010 is added to the Government Code to

"Section 8010. Uniform, insignia and badge of the Guam Police."

(a) The Government of Guam shall provide the police officers with standard uniforms. Subject to detailed regulations and specifications prescribed by the Director, the uniform to be worn by police officers shall be a standard pattern and distinctive design.

- (b) The badge shall be a shield measuring approximately three and one-half  $(3\frac{1}{2})$  inches in length, in the center of which shall be imposed in relief, a facsimile of the seal of the territory of Guam. The badge issued to commissioned officers shall be of a composition metal in similitude of gold and that issued to other officers shall be a composition metal in similitude of silver.
- (c) Service without wearing uniform. The Director may direct that certain police officers serve without wearing uniform, when in his judgement, law enforcement requires such.
- (d) Wearing uniforms by other persons prohibited. No person other than a police officer shall wear, use or order to be worn or used, copy or imitate in any respect or manner the standard uniform and badge pursuant to regulations and specifications prescribed by the Director of the Department.
- (e) Any person violating Subsection (d) of this section is guilty of a misdemeanor."
