AN ACT TO APPROPRIATE FIFTY THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$50,000) TO THE DEPARTMENT OF LAW TO FUND CERTAIN TYPES OF OFF-ISLAND TRAVEL AND FOR OTHER PURPOSES.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE TERRITORY OF GUAM:

Section 1. (a) The sum of Thirty Thousand Dollars (\$30,000) is appropriated from the General Fund to the Department of Corrections for the purpose of funding off-island travel for transporting seven (7) prisoners to the mainland, along with two (2) escorts for each prisoner.

- (b) The sum of Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$20,000) is appropriated from the General Fund to the Department of Law for the purpose of funding travel expenses for pretrial detainees, individuals held in protective custody by the government of Guam, essential witnesses or sworn peace officers whose travel is necessary to interview said witnesses and expenses incidental to the prosecution or appeal of litigated criminal matters.
- (c) Notwithstanding any other provision of law, including Section 6113 of the Government Code, as amended, the appropriations made in Subsections (a) and (b) of this Section shall supercede and replace the authorization to expend funds contained in Executive Order 86-11 and all provisions of Executive Order 86-11 are null and void.
- (d) Any unused portion of the appropriations made in Subsections (a) and (b) of this Section shall revert to the General Fund on September 30, 1986.

Section 2. The sum of One Million Five Hundred Ninety-two Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$1,592,500) is appropriated from the General Fund to the Legislature Operations Fund to be allocated by the Committee on Rules for the operation of the Second Regular Session of the Eighteenth Guam Legislature until January 4, 1987. Two Hundred Forty-seven Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$247,500) of the amount appropriated in this Section shall be allocated to the Minority of the Eighteenth Guam Legislature.

- (b) Notwithstanding any other provision of law, any appropriation made to the Eighteenth Guam Legislature for use in Fiscal Year 1986 and the appropriation in Section 2 of this Act shall be available to the Eighteenth Guam legislature until January 4, 1987 and shall be expended to honor any claims for payment.
- Section 3. The Department of Vocational Rehabilitation is authorized to expend Two Thousand Two Hundred Thirteen Dollars (\$2,213.00) from lapsed funds from its Fiscal Year 1986 operating budget and matching federal funds in the amount of Eight Thousand Eight Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$8,850) for off-island travel purposes.
- Section 4. The sum of One Hundred Fourteen Thousand Dollars (\$114,000) is appropriated from the Summer School Fund established pursuant to Section 4 of P.L. 18-10 to the Department of Education for the purpose of implementing and operating the Fiscal Year 1986 Summer School Program.
- Section 5. Part XXXV of Section 1 of Chapter II of Public Law 18-15 is amended to read:

Section 6. The sum of Two Million Six Hundred Thirty-nine Thousand Six Hundred and Nineteen Dollars (\$2,639,619) may be expended from the General Fund by the Department of Education as an advance from the Fiscal Year 1987 Budget to procure textbooks, workbooks and library books for School Year 1986-1987.

Section 7. The sum of Thirty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$35,000) is appropriated from the General Fund to the Department of Labor to cover basic Worker's Compensation Fund liabilities for the remainder of FY'86.

Section 8. The sum of Six Thousand Dollars (\$6,000) is appropriated from the General Fund to the Department of Education for off-island travel.

Section 9. The sum of Thirty Thousand Dollars (\$30,000) from funds appropriated pursuant to Item 230 (Contractual Services) of Part VII (Facilities and Maintenance) of Chapter III (Department of Education) of Public Law 18-15 is reprogrammed from use for termite treatment to use for repair of air conditioners.

Section 10. The sum of Six Thousand Dollars (\$6,000) from lapsed funds from funds appropriated pursuant to Item 2 (Facilities and Maintenance) of Subpart H (Department of Education) of Chapter IX (Capital Outlay Budget) of Public Law 18-15 is reprogrammed to Item 230 (Contractual Services) of Part VII (Facilities and Maintenance) of Chapter III (Department of Education) of Public Law 18-15 to fund repair of air conditioners.

Section 11. Section 23 of Public Law 18-33 is amended to read:

"Section 23. Notwithstanding any other legislation or regulation, the sum of One Hundred Forty-One Thousand Nine Hundred Ninety-Seven Dollars (\$141,997.00) from the contractual category of the Department of Education Fiscal Year 1986 Budget is reprogrammed to cover costs of staff development, payment of retroactive corrective pay adjustment of administrators, and funds to cover overtime costs for Department of Administration to prepare the checks for teacher preparation periods. Any lapsed funds from the current Department of Education budget may be used to supplement this reprogramming but not to exceed a total overall of Two Hundred Thirty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$235,000.00)."

Section 12. The sum of Twenty-Two Thousand Dollars (\$22,000) from Item 290 (Miscellaneous) of Part II (Director's Office) of Chapter III (Department of Education) of Public Law 18-15 is reprogrammed to Item 110 (Personnel Services) of Part I (Territorial Board of Education) of Chapter III (Department of Education) of Public Law 18-15 for the sole purpose of funding the salaries of union negotiators. This appropriation shall be used to pay the union negotiators, who shall have been on full time duty status commencing June 16, 1986, pursuant to the Board-Union Contract, Article XIV, Paragraph 2.

- Section 13. A new Section 6711 is added to the Government Code to read:

 "Section 6711. Charges for copying Government Documents. (a)

 Notwithstanding any other provision of law, no department, agency or
 instrumentality of the government of Guam, including all autonomous agencies
 and instrumentalities, shall charge another branch, department or agency of the
 government of Guam, including the Guam Legislature and members thereof, for
 copies of requested documents, so long as the documents are requested in an
 official capacity.
- (b) Notwithstanding any other provision of law, any department, agency or instrumentality of the Executive Branch of the government of Guam, including all autonomous agencies and instrumentalities, except for the Department of Land Management and the Department of Revenue and Taxation, may charge the media or the general public a copying fee for documents not to exceed ten cents (10¢) for the first page of any requested document, and two cents (2¢) each for any remaining pages. The Department of Land Management

and the Department of Revenue and Taxation may set their charges for documents by rules and regulations pursuant to the Administrative Adjudication Law.

- (c) Any department, agency or instrumentality of the Executive Branch of the government of Guam, including all autonomous agencies and instrumentalities, may choose not to charge the media or the general public a copying fee for requested documents; however, they shall not charge more than indicated in Subsection (b) of this Section."
- Section 14. A new Section 13124 is added to the Government Code to read:

 "Section 13124. Documents Voidable and Not to be Recorded. The
 Legislature finds that all buyers and transferees of real property should be
 aware of the availability of water and power on the land they buy or obtain at
 the time they purchase or obtain it. Therefore:
 - a. No document transfering an interest in real property, except for leases of less than one (1) year, shall be recorded until the transferee has signed and acknowledged a statement, which should be included in the document, indicating that the transferee is aware of the availability or non-availability of power and water on the transferred property. The statement shall be in substantially this form:

AS TO WATER:

WATER IS IMMEDIATELY AVAILABLE ON THE PROPERTY OR WITHIN 100 FEET OF THE PROPERTY.

or

WATER IS NOT AVAILABLE ON THE PROPERTY. THE BUYER (TRANSFEREE) UNDERSTANDS THAT HE WILL HAVE TO PAY FOR WATER HOOKUP AT HIS SOLE EXPENSE. THE GOVERNMENT IS NOT REQUIRED TO PAY FOR THE WATER HOOKUP.

WATER IS NOT AVAILABLE ON THE PROPERTY. THE SELLER (TRANSFEROR) HAS PROMISED TO MAKE WATER AVAILABLE WITHIN ONE YEAR OR LESS. IF THE SELLER (TRANSFEROR) FAILS TO DO SO, THE BUYER (TRANSFEREE) UNDERSTANDS THAT THE GOVERNMENT IS NOT REQUIRED TO PAY FOR WATER HOOKUP.

IF THE SELLER (TRANSFEROR) 24FAILS TO DO THE 25 SO BUYER (TRANSFEREE) 26 UNDERSTANDS THAT THE GOVERNMENT IS NOT 27REQUIRED TO PAY FOR POWER (ELECTRICITY) HOOKUP. 28

(b) In a document transferring an interest in real property except for a lease for less than one (1) year, there is an implied warranty made by the transferor as to the accuracy and correctness of any statement to the effect that water or power or sewer are available on the property or within one hundred (100) feet of the property; and the transferor has impliedly warranted to the transferee that the named utilities are immediately available as of the date of signing the document. Breach of such warranty, whether intentional or unintentional, shall be enforceable in law or in equity in the same manner as any other warranty, and the transferee may also recover costs and reasonable attorney's fees for breach of such implied warranty.

- (c) If there is no disclosure made by the transferor as to the availability or lack of availability of water or power in a document transfering an interest in real property, except for a lease of less than one (1) year, a deed of gift or quitclaim deed given for no consideration, court decrees, tax deeds, marshal's deeds and deeds of administrators or executors of estates, there is an implied warranty made by the transferor to the effect that the utility whose availability is not disclosed is available on the property or within one hundred (100) feet of the property; and the transferor has impliedly warranted to the transferee that the omitted utilities are immediately available as of the date of signing the document. Breach of such warranty, whether intentional or unintentional, shall be enforceable in law or in equity in the same manner as any other warranty, and the transferee may also recover costs and reasonable attorney's fees for breach of such implied warranty.
- (d) Power and water shall be considered immediately available on the property or within one hundred (100) feet of the property at the time the document is signed if utility hookups can be applied for at the office of the utility and can be made within ninety (90) days of the application with a hookup of not more than one hundred (100) feet from the property line. Power and water shall be considered not available on the property if hookups are not immediately available, if the distance to the hookup from the border of the property is more than one hundred (100) feet, or

although applied for at the office of the utility, the hookup cannot be made within ninety (90) days of the application.

- (e) If any document transferring an interest in real property, except for a lease of less than one (1) year, fails to contain such a statement as to water and power as is indicated in Subsection (a) of this Section, the document shall be voidable and the transaction may be rescinded at the sole option of the transferee or his successor for a period to ten (10) years from the date of the transaction if water or power is not available on the property or within one hundred (100) feet of the property. Failure to include such a statement shall not preclude recording if the transferee or successor records an acknowledged statement stating that under no circumstances will the government of Guam be in any way responsible for paying for any required power or water hookups, powerline extensions, or waterline extensions.
- (f) If the transferor agrees to make water or power or sewer available to the property, such shall be stated in the document transferring an interest in the property, and such hookup shall be made available to the property by the transferor within one (1) year or such lesser time as may be agreed upon between transferor and transferee. Failure to make power or water or sewer available to the property within one (1) year or such lesser time as agreed upon will result in the transferee being allowed, at his option, to:
 - (1) rescind the transaction and recover all money paid, reasonable interest, and reasonable costs and attorney's fees; or
 - (2) recover from the transferor all amounts required to make the promised utilities available on the property, plus all related costs and reasonable attorneys' fees.

Failure to put the promise to make a utility available in the document transferring an interest in the property shall not be a defense raised by the transferor.

(g) This Section shall not apply to applicable transfer documents recorded before the effective date of this Act and no implied warranties contained in this Section shall attach to any document signed before the effective date of this Act. This Section shall not apply, for a period of

ninety (90) days, to applicable transfer documents which were signed and not recorded before the effective date of this Act. Thereafter, applicable transfer documents signed before the effective date of this Act may be recorded if the transferee executes and records an acknowledged statement as indicated in subsection (e) of this Section.

- (h) None of the provisions of this Section shall be waived by the parties or by the government of Guam including the Guam Power Authority.
- (i) The disclosures contained in this Section should be placed at the end of the applicable document, immediately before the signature lines of the parties, unless the Department of Land Management designates some other place on the document by rule or regulation, however placement of the required disclosures at some other place in the instrument shall not void the effect of the disclosures.
- (j) Prior to the transferee signing any contract of sale or other document evidencing an obligation to buy an interest in land, any subdivider, except for a parental subdivision, must provide a transferee of land in the subdivision with an accurate written estimated cost of hooking up to power and water if such are not immediately available within one (100) feet of border of the property and are not to be provided within one (1) year or less to the property by the subdivider. Each buyer must acknowledge receipt of the estimate in writing. Failure to provide such estimate shall allow the transferee to rescind the transaction or to recover from the subdivider or from any real estate broker, title insurance company or escrow company involved in the transaction, the cost of hooking up the utility concerned, plus reasonable cost and attorney's fees.
- (k) All provisions of this Section as to breach of implied warranty or express agreements to provide a utility may be enforced by the transferee, his successors in interest or through the Attorney General's Office by the government of Guam."

§6290. Definitions. As used in this Chapter:

(a) "government agency" means a department, agency, bureau or

instrumentality of the Executive Branch of the government of Guam.

(b) "business" means a business as defined in Subsection (c) of Section 16002 of the Government Code.

- (c) "food product" means meat and meat products, fish and shellfish, edible fresh or frozen poultry, poultry meat products, fresh eggs and perishable egg products.
- (d) "perishable agricultural commodity" means groceries, vegetables, fresh fruit and other perishables.
- §6291. Interest Penalties. (a) Each government agency which receives property or services from a business but which does not make payment for each such complete delivered item of property or service by the required payment date, shall pay an interest penalty to such business on the amount of the payment which is due as specified in this Chapter.
- (b) Interest penalties on amounts due to a business under this Chapter shall be paid to the business for the period beginning on the day after the required payment date and ending on the date on which payment of the amount due is made, except that no interest penalty shall be paid if payment for the complete delivered item of property or service is made on or before the fifteenth day after the required payment date, in the case of a food product; or the thirtieth day after the required payment date in the case of a perishable agricultural commodity; or the forty-fifth day after the required payment date, in the case of any other item. Interest shall be computed at the same interest rate assessed on unpaid income taxes owed by taxpayers.
- (c) Any amount of an interest penalty which remains unpaid at the end of any thirty-day period shall be added to the principle amount of the debt and thereafter interest penalties shall accrue on such added amount.
- (d) There is hereby authorized to be appropriated such sums as are necessary for the payment of interest penalties required by this Section.
- §6292. Limitation on Discount Payments. (a) If a business offers a government agency a discount from the amount otherwise due under a contract for property or services in exchange for payment within such specified period of time, the government agency may make payment in an amount equal to the discounted price only if payment is made within such specified period of time.
- (b) Each government agency which violates subsection (a) of this Section shall pay an interest penalty on any amount which remains unpaid in violation

of that Subsection. Such interest penalty shall accrue on such unpaid amount in accordance with regulations prescribed pursuant to Section 6293 of this Chapter except that the required payment date for such unpaid amount shall be the last day of the specified period of time described in Subsection (a) of this Section.

- §6293. Rules and Regulations. The Director of the Department of Administration shall promulgate rules and regulations in accordance with the Administrative Adjudication Law and this Chapter. Such regulations shall specify:
- (a) that for any property or services not covered by items (b), (c) and (d) of this Section, the required payment date shall be the date on which payment is due under the terms of the contract for the provision of such property or service; or, if a specific date on which payment is due is not established by contract or by items (b), (c) and (d) of this Section, thirty (30) days after receipt of a proper invoice for the amount of the payment; and
- (b) in the case of an acquisition of a food product, a required payment date which is not later than fifteen (15) days after the date of delivery of such food product; and
- (c) in the case of an acquisition of a perishable agricultural commodity, a required payment date; and
- (d) in the case of a contract under which property or services are provided in a series of partial executions or deliveries, to the extent that such contract provides for separate payment for such partial execution or delivery, such separate payment dates shall be the required payment dates; and
- (e) a requirement that, within fifteen (15) days after the date on which an invoice is received, that a government agency notify the business of any defect or impropriety in such invoice which would prevent the running of the time period specified in items (a), (b), (c) or (d) of this Section.
- \$6294. Claims: Relation to other Laws. (a) Claims for interest penalties which a government agency has failed to pay in accordance with the requirements of Section 6291 or 6292 of this Chapter may be filed under statutes governing contract disputes with the Government of Guam.

(b) Interest penalties under this Chapter shall not continue to accrue after the filing of a claim for such penalties, or for more than one (1) year, whichever comes first.

- (c) Except as provided in Section 6292 of this Chapter regarding disputes concerning discounts, this Chapter shall not be construed to require interest penalties on payments which are not made by the required payment date by reason of a good faith dispute between a government agency and a business over the amount of that payment or other allegations concerning compliance with a contract. Claims concerning any such dispute, and any interest which may be payable for the period while the dispute is being resolved, shall be subject to appropriate statutes governing contract disputes with the Government.
- \$6295. Legislative Oversight. (a) Each government agency shall file with the Legislature a detailed report of any interest penalty payments made pursuant to this Chapter during the preceding fiscal year.
- (b) The report required by Subsection (a) of this Section shall include the number, accounts, frequency of interest penalty payments and the reasons such payments were not avoided by prompt payment and shall be delivered to the Legislature within sixty (60) days after the conclusion of each fiscal year.
- (c) The Director of the Department of Administration shall submit a report to the Legislature on government agency compliance with the requirements of this Chapter within one hundred twenty (120) days after the conclusion of each fiscal year."

Section 30. A new Subsection (1) is added to 3 GCA \$16301 enacted in P.L. 18-30, Section 52, to read:

"(1) A ballot shall consist of one sheet of paper or whatever other material is used to make up the ballot and names of all candidates for each office shall appear only on the front side of the ballot for that office."

Section 31. 3 GCA \$3104 is amended to read:

"\$3104. Times for registration. Ten (10) days prior to any general, primary or special election, the registration rolls shall be closed for that election, and no further affidavits of registration shall be accepted by the Commission."

Section 32. 3 GCA \$3105, amended by P.L. 18-26, Section 1, is further amended to read:

"\$3105. Place of registration. The registration of electors shall be in progress at the main office of the Commission during such hours as the office is open for business at all times prior to the closing of the registration rolls. Electors shall also be registered at such times and places within the territory as the Commission shall deem advisable and convenient from the time registration is open until twenty-one (21) days prior to an election and the Commission shall deputize volunteers for such purposes who are qualified as set out in Section

3110 of this Title. Between the twenty-first day prior to an election and the close of registration, electors shall be registered at such times and places such as precincts or the main office as the Election Commission shall determine." Section 33. A new 4 GCA §4308 is added to read:

"\$4308. If an employee has authorized a payroll deduction pursuant to \$4307 of this Title and the government fails to pay the payee the amount of the deduction on the day the paycheck is given the employee, then the government shall pay interest and penalty charges as provided in this Section. If the deduction is for savings, then the government shall pay the payee for credit to the employee's account the amount of interest that the employee lost because of the government's late payment. If the deduction is for a loan, then the government shall pay the payee for credit to the employee's account the additional interest and any penalty that for which the employee is liable because of the government's late payment."

Section 34. (a) The sum of Forty Thousand Dollars (\$16,500) is appropriated from the General Fund to the Guam Election Commission for the purpose of hiring two (2) persons temporarily to assist with preparing voter registration lists to be used at the precincts during elections and also to hire programming for the computor known as "Freddie" at the University of Guam to tabulate ballots during elections.

Section 35. A new 3 GCA \$11110.1 is added to read:

"\$11110.1. Tabulating at Precincts. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the Guam Election Commission may authorize ballots to be tabulated at the precincts. Tabulating of ballots by the precinct board shall be a cross-check of the tabulating of ballots by the Election Commission at the election return center."

Section 36. A new Section 17400.1 is added to the Government Code to read:

"Section 17400.1. It is the intention of the Legislature that information concerning elections and candidates be readily available to the general public through road signs on government property. Therefore, notwithstanding any other provision of law:

(a) Candidates for public office or other persons having an interest in an election may place political signs, including posters and banners, advocating voting for or against candidates, or other matters to be considered by the electorate, on government property upon payment of a single One Hundred Dollar (\$100.00) deposit to the Department of Public Works to insure that the signs are removed within two (2) weeks after the election, subject to the following restrictions only:

- (1) Wooden or metal freestanding signs may not be posted within eight (8) feet of the paved traveled portion of the roadway or in such a manner that they impede drivers' visability of other traffic.
- (2) Signs shall not be nailed to trees on government property.
- (3) Signs may not block any sidewalk, road, or driveway.
- (4) Wooden or metal freestanding signs may be placed in parks adjacent to Marine Drive in a zone not less than eight (8) feet nor more than twenty-five (25) feet from the paved traveled portion of the roadway.
- (5) No building permits shall be required for temporary political campaign signs, other than the One Hundred Dollar (\$100.00) deposit required in Subsection (a) of this Section.
- (6) Nothing in this Section shall be construed as authorizing the posting of campaign material of any kind on or in any government building.
- (7) No wooden or metal freestanding sign may be posted at any intersection if it will in any way impede visability of drivers and traffic.
- (8) No sign may be posted in any traffic median strip.
- (9) If signs are not removed two (2) weeks after the day of any general or special election, the single One Hundred Dollar (\$100.00) deposit shall be forfeited as liquidated damages for removal of the signs.
- (10) The Department of Public Works may require each candidate or person or group posting freestanding signs on government

property to provide a list of the approximate location of all signs.

(b) Candidates for public office or other persons having an interest in an election may place political signs which are limited to paper or cloth posters advocating voting for or against candidates, or other matters to be considered by the electorate, on Guam Power Authority power poles or on Guam Telephone Authority poles, subject to the following restrictions and conditions:

- (1) No campaign material of any kind may be posted on or in any buildings belonging to the Guam Power Authority or the Guam Telephone Authority.
- (2) No banner or advertisement may be strung on any of the Authorities' poles.
- (3) No sign or other thing may be attached to any pole of the authorities that will create a hindrance to that pole's accessibility for line repair maintenance work.
- (4) Small-sized paper, plastic or cloth signs or posters, not to exceed eighteen inches (18") by twenty-four inches (24"), may be stapled, taped or glued to the Authorities' poles, provided that the person placing the sign shall remove the same no later than two (2) weeks following the election. Under no circumstances, however, may roofing tacks or nails of any size be used in attaching the signs or posters to the authorities' poles.
- (c) No building permit shall be required for political signs on private property; provided, that the person erecting the sign has the permission of the private property owner first; and further provided, that all such signs shall be removed within two (2) weeks after the election.
- (d) It shall be a misdemeanor for any person to remove, knock down, or take down a political sign, except:
 - (1) A private property owner upon whose land the sign is posted.
 - (2) The person who put up the sign.
 - (3) In the case of a sign advocating the election of a candidate, that candidate or his designee.

(h) Any excess deposits previously paid, whether before or after the effective date of this Act, by any candidate, group or person for the purpose of posting signs and held by Guam Power Authority or Department of Public Works shall be refunded within ten (10) days of the effective date of this Act.

- (i) If any candidate, person, or group has had any deposit forfeited which was posted for purposes of placing signs, by Department of Public Works or by the Guam Power Authority, such deposits which were forfeited shall be returned to the candidate, group or person posting such amount within ten (10) days after the effective date of this Act.
- (j) Any signs which have been previously confiscated before the effective date of this Act shall be returned to the group, person or candidate that put them up.
- Section 37. A New Section 15009.6 is added to the Government Code to read:
 "Section 15009.6. (a) The Commissioner of Agana may set a reasonable
 fee for the use of Sagan Dinana, according to the provisions of the
 Administrative Adjudication Law, and shall collect the fee.
 - (b) There is created a revolving fund within the General Fund, which is to be accounted for separate from other accounts within the General Fund, to be known as the 'Sagan Dinana Revolving Fund'. The fees collected pursuant to Subsection (a) of this Section shall be placed into this revolving fund.
 - (c) The funds placed in the Sagan Dinana Revolving Fund shall be used for maintenance and repair of Sagan Dinana, upon certification for the expenditure of the funds by the Commissioner of Agana."
- Section 38. The sum of One Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$100,000) is appropriated from the General Fund to the Student Financial Assistance Fund of the University of Guam for additional Student Loan awards as approved by the Board of Regents.
- Section 39. A new Item 3. is added to Subsection G of Section 1 of Chapter IX of Public Law 18-15 and the total is amended to read:

(4) Any government employee or any other person, commencing two (2) weeks after the general election or special election.

- (5) A public official or employee may remove a sign, after fifteen (15) days prior notice to the person concerned, because it violates the provisions of this Section.
- (6) A public official may move a sign to a nearby location if the sign constitutes an immediate and substantial hazard and threat to the public health and safety; or if it significantly blocks drivers' visability of other vehicles and constitutes a safety hazard to safe locations nearby. In such a case, the owner of the sign shall be notified.
- (7) In the case of utility poles, by a utility employee because the sign or poster constitutes a hinderance to the maintenance of the poles or utility system.
- (8) A public official may remove wooden or metal freestanding signs anytime Guam is in typhoon condition 1 or 2. Said sign shall be held and returned to the persons who put them up as soon as Guam returns to typhoon condition 4.
- (9) If for any reason a government official or employee needs to temporarily take down a sign, they shall put it back up within two (2) days.
- (e) Political signs may not be erected pursuant to this Section earlier than one hundred eighty (180) days before any special, general, or primary election.
- (f) Any confiscated sign may be picked up by the group, candidate, or person who put it up. The treasurer or candidate involved shall be promptly notified of the confiscation so that the sign may be picked up.
- (g) No other deposit or fee may be required from a candidate or person posting political signs, other than the single One Hundred Dollar (\$100.00) deposit required to be posted with the Department of Public Works. No additional deposit or fees may be charged by the government of Guam, the Guam Power Authority, the Guam Telephone Authority, or any other department or agency.

Section 63. Section 19200 of the Government Code, as amended by Section 32 of P.L. 18-33, is further amended to read:

"Section 19200. Imposition. A license fee is imposed on each of the following amusement devices which are operating to produce revenue in Guam on the effective date of this Chapter (apportioned in accordance with Section 19200.4 of this Chapter), or thereafter manufactured or constructed in, imported into Guam, maintained or permitted in Guam, and operated to produce revenue in Guam, and annually thereafter on July 1, at the rate stated:

- (a) on each pinball machine, One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00);
- (b) on each multiple-coin pinball machine, Two Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$250.00);
- (c) on each coin-activated phonograph or other coin-activated music producing machine, One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) plus Fifteen Dollars (\$15.00) for each coin slot in excess of one (1);
- (d) on each coin-activated kiddie ride, designed for the use of children, Fifty Dollars (\$50.00);
- (e) on each video horse or greyhound race machine and each poker machine, according to the following schedule:
 - (i) Six Hundred Dollars (\$600.00) until June 30, 1986;
- (ii) One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) from July 1, 1986 until June 30, 1989, Four Hundred Dollars (\$400.00) of which may be paid pro rata in equal monthly installments throughout the year;
- (iii) One Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$1,500.00) from July 1, 1989 until June 30, 1991;
- (iv) Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000.00) on and after July 1, 1991; (f) on each coin-activated amusement device not included under Subsections (a), (b), (c), (d) or (e) of this Section, One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00).

No slot machine or amusement device set to make automatic payouts shall be licensed under this Section, provided that such a slot machine or amusement device may be temporarily licensed at the same rate as devices licensed pursuant (f) of this section for operation exclusively during any Guam Island Fair, Liberation Day Carnival or any other fair or carnival for which the Governor has issued a

proclamation. 'Slot machine' has the same meaning in this Section as in Subsection (c) of Section 19200.5 of the Government Code."

Section 65. Subsection (a) of Section 19200.5 of the Government Code is amended to read:

Pursuant to Section 2 of that certain Act of the Congress of the "(a) United States entitled 'An Act to prohibit transportation of gambling devices in interstate and foreign commerce,' approved January 2, 1951, being c. 1194, 65 Stat. 1134, and also designated as 15 U.S.C. 1171-1177 and hereinafter referred to in this Section as the 'Act,' the territory of Guam, acting by and through the duly elected and qualified members of its Legislature, does hereby in this \$19200.5 and in accordance with and in compliance with the provisions of Section 2 of the Act, declare and proclaim that the following devices described under Section 1 of the Act are lawful in Guam: Pinball machines, multiple-coin pinball machines, and poker machines, and other coin-activated devices taxed under \$19200 of the Government Code; provided, however, that this declaration of legality shall not be deemed to apply to any so-called 'slot machine' as defined in Subsection (c) of this Section, which 'slot machine' device is declared to be and remains unlawful in Guam, except during any Guam Island Fair, Liberation Day Carnival or any other fair or carnival for which the Governor has issued a proclamation."

Section 66. If any Section, portion or application of this Act shall be declared invalid, such declaration shall not affect the validity of any remaining Section, portion or application and to this end such remaining Section, portion or application shall be severable.

Section 67. The Guam Legislature considers termination of the Navy Power Pool Agreement (Island Wide Power System), one of the most critical issues facing the Government of Guam; therefore,

- (a) The Guam Power Authority shall provide the Public Utilities Commission and the Speaker of the Guam Legislature with copies of all interim copies, all draft copies, and all complete copies, all final copies of the Ernst and Whinney study relative to terminating the Navy Power Pool Agreement of the Island Wide Power System (IWPS) and all other copies with the Guam Power Authority, within ten (10) days of submission or inspection of such report by the Guam Power Authority or its directors, agents or officers. The copies shall be certified by the General Manager as true and complete copies, and
- (b) The Guam Power Authority shall provide the Public Utilities Commission, the Governor, and the Speaker of the Guam Legislature, with certified copies of the one hundred percent completed Ernst and Whinney study relative to terminating the Navy Power Pool Agreement of the IWPS with the Guam Power Authority for comments and position statements by the Public Utilities Commission, the Governor, and the Guam Legislature no less than two (2) months prior to submittal of said report to the United States Congress, and
- (c) Failure to comply with provisions of this Section shall be deemed unlawful in addition to any other provisions of law. The General Manager and the Board of Directors of the Guam Power Authority shall be held personally liable to a fine not to exceed Eight Thousand Dollars (\$8,000.00) per day for every day the Guam Power Authority fails to provide any copies of the Ernst and Whinney report (in any state of completion) to the Public Utilities Commission, the Governor, and the Speaker of the Guam Legislature as requested by this Section, and
- (d) Furthermore, the Legislature shall be represented at any further meetings, conferences and/or briefings between the Navy, the Guam Power Authority, Ernst and Whinney and the Department of the Interior relative to the termination of said Power Pool Agreement of the IWPS. The Speaker shall appoint three (3) members of the legislature, one (1) of whom shall be a member of the legislature's committee with oversight of utilities, one (1) of whom shall be a member of the legislature's committee with oversight of federal, foreign and legal affairs, and one (1) of whom shall be a member of the

minority, to represent the Legislature at all said meetings, conferences and briefings, and

- (e) In any event, neither the government of Guam nor any of its agencies, autonomous agencies, instrumentalities or autonomous instrumentalities, officers, agents or employees shall be bound by the negotiations entered into, or decisions reached with respect to said Ernst and Whinney study unless the comments of the Public Utilities Commission and the Legislature are included in the submittal of said Ernst and Whinney report to the United States Congress, and such termination shall not be effective until the terms of the termination of the Navy Power Pool Agreement (IWPS) have been ratified by law, and
- (f) The Guam Power Authority shall not have authority, directly or indirectly, to designate any document, records or correspondence as non-public, and
- (g) All meetings of government of Guam departments, agencies, autonomous instrumentalities, and their agents, officers and employees with each other or with the United States government or any other person concerning any aspect of termination of the Power Pool Agreement (IWPS) shall be open and public meetings, noticed and conducted pursuant to the Open Government Law." Section 68. Subsections (i) and (ii) of 3 GCA \$19108(a)(1) are amended to read:
 - "(i) In the case of the candidate, to his own campaign which may include donations to charitable organizations, sponsorship of sports activities, purchase of gifts not to exceed One Hundred Dollars (\$100) to any one (1) donee, or purchase of raffle tickets; or
