



Dear Mr. Speaker:

Transmitted herewith is Substitute Bill 184 which I have signed into law this date as Public Law 20-100.

This measure will assist the territory in its beautification program and reduce traffic hazards on our highways. The Guam Police Department has advised that it will begin work on regulations for the implementation of the measure.

The Attorney General indicates that the new Paragraph (4) will not be enforceable as it is unconstitutionally vague, 1 request that the Legislature consider amending this provision to provide definite standards similar to those set forth in Paragraphs (1) through (3). Paragraph (5) should be relocated.

AN ACT TO REPEAL AND REENACT SUBSECTION (f) OF SECTION 5108 OF 5, CHAPTER TITLE 16, GUAM CODE ANNOTATED, RELATIVE TO THE OPERATION OF CERTAIN VEHICLES WITH HAZARDOUS LOADS ON GUAM HIGHWAYS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE TEERITORY OF GUAM: Section 1. Subsection (f) of Section 5108, Chapter 5, Title 16, Guam Code Annotated, is hereby repealed and reenacted to read:

4 "(f) Vehicles operated on any highway and loaded and carrying 5 any of the following loads shall have said load covered and secured in 6 such manner as to prevent said load or covering from being loosened, 7 detached or in any manner creating litter or constituting a hazard to 8 other users of the highway: (1) Any trash, refuse or garbage of composition which is of such nature as to permit any portion or piece of such to be loosened or detached.

(2) Sand, soil, crushed rocks or aggregate of less than four inches (4") per unit/pebble or other standard measure for such aggregate.

(3) Any liquid or similar load that if leaking will cause a road hazard.

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
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(4) Any other load, which in the opinion and discretion of the Guam Police Department, the Guam Environmental Protection Agency, the Department of Public Health and Social Services, or the Department of Parks and Recreation, poses a potential hazard or potential litter if such load were not covered and/or secured."

14 The Guam Police Department shall promulgate rules and (5) 15 regulations, pursuant to the Administrative Adjudication Law, governing the enforcement of this subparagraph (f), which 16 regulations shall not include any requirement for a permit for the 17 private hauling of loads unless the same are hazardous and being 18 19 hauled commercially, but shall include a requirement that trucks 20 must be equipped with mudflaps to prevent their tires from 21 ejecting pebbles and other debris to following vehicles."

22 Section 2. The effective date of this Act shall be sixty (60) days after 23 the promulgation of rules and regulations by the Guam Police Department as 24 required in Section 1 of this Act. Until that date, the Guam Police 25 Department may only issue warning tickets to those drivers found to be in 26 violation of the provisions contained in Section 1.

AN ACT TO REPEAL AND RE-ENACT §5108 (f) of 16 GCA Chapter 5 RELATIVE TO THE OPERATION OF CERTAIN VEHICLES ON GUAM HIGHWAYS

Section 1. §5108 (f) of Title 16 Guam Code Annotated Chapter 5 is hereby repealed and re-enacted to read:

(f) "Vehicles operated on any highway and loaded and carrying any of the following loads shall have said loads covered and secured in such manner as to prevent said load or covering from being loosened, detached or in any manner creating litter or constituting a hazard to other uses of the highway:

(1) Any trash, refuse or garbage the composition of which is of such nature as to permit any portion or piece of such to be loosened and or detached.

(2) Sand, soil, crushed rocks or aggregate of less than four inches (4") per unit/pebble or other standard measure for such aggregate.

(3) Any other load, which in the opinion and discretion of the Guam Police poses a potential hazard or potential litter if such load were not covered and/or secured.

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## COMMITTEE ON JUDICIARY & CRIMINAL JUSTICE REPORT ON

#### BILL 184- An act to repeal and re-enact §5108 (f) of 16 GCA Chapter 5 relative to the operation of certain vehicles on Guam highways.

#### **PREFACE**

The Judiciary and Criminal Justice Committee convened at 9:00 a.m., Tuesday, May 16, 1989 in the Legislative Session Hall at Agana, Guam to hear testimony on Bill 184. Committee members in attendance, alongside with Chairwoman Pilar C. Lujan were Ted S. Nelson, Martha C. Ruth, and Edward R. Duenas.

#### **OVERVIEW**

In curtailing hazards and curbing litter along highways, Bill 184 was introduced by Senator Francisco R. Santos.

The measure mandates that all loads (e.g. dirt, trash, sand) be <u>covered and secured</u> when being transported along territorial highways.

Enforcement of such law, if passed, is assigned to the Guam Police Department.

Current statutes do not mandate loads to be covered and secured. Additionally, enforcement authority is assigned not only to the Police Department, but also the Guam Environmental Protection Agency, Department of Public Health and Social Services, and Department of Parks and Recreation.

## **COMMITTEE FINDINGS**

Bill 184 - An act to repeal and re-enact §5108 (f) of 16 GCA Chapter 5 relative to the operation of certain vehicles on Guam highways.

Despite extending invitations to government officials, no witnesses appeared before the Committee to testify on the measure. However, Acting Chief-of-Police Adolf Sgambelluri submitted written testimony in support of Bill 184. (ATTACHMENT I)

Guam Environmental Protection Agency Administrator Fred Castro was subsequently contacted by Committee staff and expressed support for the measure.

Further, the GEPA Administrator informed Committee staff that fines range from \$200.00 to \$500.00 for violators.

### COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATIONS

In ensuring that the Territorial highways are safe and litter-free for motorists, pedestrians, and all residents, the Committee finds that Bill 184 strengthens existing statues governing transportation of loads by mandating such loads be covered and secured.

Citation authority for violations should not be limited to the Guam Police Department and should include government officials currently empowered with such capacity. Therefore, the Committee recommends modification of Subsection (3) to include the Guam Environmental Protection Agency, Department of Public Health and Social Services, and Department of Parks and Recreation. (See Substitute Bill)

In conclusion, the Committee recommends that Substitute Bill 184 be passed.



Dear Senator Lujan:

The Guam Police Department supports Bill Nos. 184 and 323:

However, the department's position on Bill No 286 is twofold:

- The provision of Bill No. 286 requiring licensing of operators of mopeds and motor scooters of not more than two horsepower is favorable. The bill should further address incorporating a temporary license for tourist who are on island for vacation only.
- The provision of Bill No. 286 to repeal Section 2. 23116.5 of the Government Code (16 GCA 3305) which requires the operators of motorcycles to wear safety helmets is opposed. The rational that safety helmets present hazards to the operators of motorcycles since it may interfere with their hearing and vision is absolutely false. It has been proven that safety helmets do save lives of motorcycle accident victims throughout the Police departments on the national and nation. international level do require safety helmets for their officers assigned to motorcycle detail for safety reasons. Furthermore, there are no statistics or research available to prove that safety helmets present hazards to the operators of motorcycles since it may interfere with their of motorcycles since it may interfere when that hearing and their vision. It is recommended that safety helmets with dark-tint facial shields be made illegal to wear.

Lastly, the Guam Police Department also supports Bill No. 320 with a minor modification. It is recommended that violation of this Act will result in the impoundment of the vehicles involved and when the operators are found guilty of the violation, the vehicles will subsequently be forfeited.
