

AN ACT TO APPROPRIATE TWENTY-FIVE THOUSAND FOUR HUNDRED EIGHTY-SEVEN DOLLARS TO THE GOVERNMENT OF GUAM CLAIMS FUND TO COMPENSATE AND PROVIDE SUBSTITUTE FUNDING TO THE OCEANVIEW HIGH SCHOOL STUDENT FUND.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE TERRITORY OF GUAM: Section 1. The Legislature finds that the Department of Education was lax in monitoring the student funds hereinafter described and is responsible for the losses therefrom. Accordingly, Twenty-Five Thousand Four Hundred Eighty-Seven Dollars (\$25,487) are appropriated from the General Fund to the Government of Guam Claims Fund to cover claims filed by all persons who suffered losses from the Oceanview Student Activities Fund

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during previous School Years. Any funds not expended from this appropriation shall revert to the General Fund within one (1) year from the effective date of this Act. The statute of limitation on claims filed in connection with the Oceanview Student Activities Fund for such school year is hereby tolled. This appropriation is intended to right the wrong which occurred when funds raised by the students and placed in the Oceanview High School Student Fund were discovered missing. The Legislature intends that the fundraising efforts and hard work of the students be recognized through the payment of any valid claim. If the government of Guam is able to recover the missing funds, or any portion thereof, the same shall be deposited in the General Fund.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE TERRITORY OF GUAM:

2 Section 1. A new Section 3361.26 is hereby added to Chapter III, Title II, Part

I, Division Four of the Civil Code to read:

"Section 3361.26. (a) Legislative Intent.

WHEREAS, the sum of Twenty-Five Thousand Two Hundred Dollars (\$25,200) accumulated in the Student Fund of Oceanview High School cannot be found; and

WHEREAS, the missing funds were intended for the benefit of the graduating classes of 1988, 1989 and 1990, the one of 1990 to graduate in June of 1990, it is therefore the intent of the legislation to provide the Class of 1990, Oceanview High School with the interim funding in the amount of Eight Thousand Four Hundred Dollars (\$8,400) from the unexpended funds accumulated to date in the Criminal Injuries Compensation Fund.

(b) The provisions of Public Law 16-86 (1)-(4) notwithstanding the clerk of the Superior Court of Guam shall, within thirty (30) days of the passage of this Act into law, disburse the sum of Eight Thousand Four Hundred Dollars (\$8,400) from funds held by the court in the Criminal Injuries Compensation Funds account to the Student Fund of the Oceanview High School.

(c) In the event that Section 3361.26 of the Civil Code is declared invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction and an appropriation of Eight Thousand Four Hundred Dollars (\$8,400) is hereby made out of the General Fund to accomplish the purpose of this Act as delineated in Subsection (a).

COMMITTEE REPORT

BILL 1197

AN ACT TO ADD SECTION 3361.26 TO THE CIVIL CODE TO PROVIDE SUBSTITUTE FUNDING TO THE OCEANVIEW HIGH SCHOOL STUDENT FUNDS IN THE AMOUNT OF EIGHT THOUSAND FOUR HUNDRED DOLLARS (\$8,400).

The Committee on Ways & Means held a public hearing on Tuesday, February 13, 1990 at 7pm at the Agat Community Center to gather testimony on Bill 1197. Committee Chairman Carl T. C. Gutierrez conducted the hearing, being joined by Senators Tony Unpingco, Elizabeth Arriola, Doris Brooks, Martha Ruth, Gordon Mailloux, and Ted Nelson.

BACKGROUND

Approximately 3 years ago, an incident occurred at OHS (OHS) whereby money place into student account funds were discovered to be missing. The funds were audited and it was determined that \$25,487.38 was missing from the funds. P.public Law 14-130 requires non-appropriated funds to be deposited into the an account with the school treasurer responsible for keeping records for the account. The students at OHS were victims of a crime whereby money that they had worked hard to raise was stolen. To this date, no one has been prosecuted for the theft and no money has been recovered or paid back to the students or the student fund. Bill 1197 is an attempt to rectify this wrong by way of partial compensation. As originally introduced, Bill 1197 appropriates \$8,400 to be paid to the Student Fund at OHS. This amount was originally inserted in the bill because even though the original amount missing is more than \$25,000, several classes have already graduated and therefore could not benefit from compensation paid to the Student Fund at OHS for this year. Bill 1197 is an attempt to correct a wrong, since government officials by law were responsible for the funds raised by the students.

TESTIMONY

Written testimony in favor of Bill 1197 was submitted by Lawrence J. Cunningham, teacher at OHS; Anita A. Sukola, Director, Department of Education; Kenneth P. Chargualaf, Principal, OHS; Karolyn Duponcheel, Principal, Simon Sanchez High School (SSHS); Ramon Fleiseig, Advisor, OHS Close-Up Club; Mary M. Tenafiel, junior, OHS, Elizabeth Barrett-Anderson, Attorney General of Guam. Some handwritten testimony in the form of notes from several Oceanview students was also submitted along with oral remarks

Numerous individuals also showed up to testify orally. A summary of their testimony is as follows:

1. LAWRENCE J. CUNNINGHAM

Mr. Cunningham testified as a teacher from OHS, a parent, a member of the Parent Advisory Council at OHS. Mr. Cunningham had submitted a written letter to the Committee and read this letter for the record. To summarize, he felt that the funds were entrusted to the government and therefore the government is responsible for the restitution. The students should be taught that crime does not pay. Although \$25,000 was taken no justice has yet been done.

2. KENNETH P. CHARGUALAF

Mr. Chargualaf testified personally. He testified on behalf of himself and also as a representative of Anita A. Sukola Director, DOE. Mr. Chargualaf read the letter from Ms. Sukola for the record. The letter is in favor of the bill, and indicates that some steps had been taken by the department to avoid any future problem of this nature. Mr. Chargualaf then read into the record his letter of testimony as principal. He was also in favor of the bill.

3. KAROLYN DUPONCHEEL

Ms. Duponcheel testified as a parent, a former teacher and activity director, and as principal of SSHS. She read her testimony into the record. In summary she felt that Bill 1197 indicated that adults with political power will fight for the rights of the young to see that justice is done.

4. RAMON FLESEIG

Mr. Fleseig read his letter of testimony into the record. He indicated that \$2,500 was stolen from a previous Close-Up Club but this money should be returned to the present Close-Up members to assist them.

5. AGAT MAYOR ANTONIO C. BABAUTA

Mayor Babauta read a statement of support of the bill for the record. He did not submit written testimony, however. Mayor Babauta indicated that although the amount of money appropriated in Bill 1197 was a good start he hoped more funds are appropriated later to cover the entire amount of the theft.

6. SANTA RITA MAYOR GREG BORJA

Mayor Borja indicated that he was a representative at the OHS Council. He echoed Mayor Babauta in asking the committee to return the entire amount stolen to the OHS Student funds.

7. PITI MAYOR ISABEL HAGGARD

Mayor Haggard testified as a parent of a 1989 student who graduated from OHS. She expressed sympathy with the problem and indicated that it has been more than two years since the incident and hoped that something is done to rectify the situation.

8. ROSE DAMIEN

OHS senior class president, Ms. Damien, read a handwritten statement before the committee. Ms. Damien indicated that the students had waited for three years for help in this situation and had been ignored until the hearing on this bill today. Ms. Damien emphasized that money is not what really matters but that she had been brought up as a young person to respect our government. She wants to see this wrong corrected and that this type of incident not occur in the future.

9. DARYL GARCIA

OHS senior, Mr. Garcia read a handwritten statement into the record. He will graduate in 1990. He stated that the students had struggled with difficulty to pay off all the debts that they owed and that the situation was aggravated by the theft of the \$25,000. He indicated that the appropriation in Bill 1197 would now enable the students to pay off their own expenses.

10. DARLENE DELOSO

Youth Congress representative from OHS, Ms. Deloso, read a handwritten statement into the record. She indicated that the students had spent a great deal of time, effort to bring spirit, leadership and respect to the meaning of hard work but that the fruits of their labors were taken away from them for selfish reasons by someone who stole from them. Ms. Deloso said the students wanted a chance to enjoy what they worked for. She also indicated that money isn't everything, but is a new start and a chance for new pride and strength. She also stated that it was sad to testify on such an incident and that the students reaction to the coming appropriation was not to celebrate but to ask for help and to fight for what was right and restoration of their hope.

11. LAURA ESPINOSA

Student Body President, OHS, Ms. Espinosa, read a handwritten testimony into the record. She indicated that she could not substantiate the amount that is missing from the Student Body Association account, however the money that was taken from student accounts indicates that the government needs to look into the provisions of P. L. 13-130 which requires the students to deposit money into an account established by the school and she recommends that a change be made to this requirement.

12. JENNIFER CRUZ

OHS Yearbook Editor, Ms. Cruz, testified to the committee that although the event took place three years ago and that the students have had to work twice as hard to put out a yearbook that the amount appropriated will be quite appreciated and will enable them to put out a yearbook.

After the above testimony was received a period of questions and answers followed. Chairman Gutierrez questioned Daryl Garcia regarding the whole amount that was missing. The Chairman indicated that the reason the \$8,400 was placed into the bill is that the former students would not benefit if the entire \$25,000 amount missing

was appropriated. Mr. Cunningham explained the various clubs and bills to be paid and also indicated that he felt the full amount should be appropriated because there is a dire need for these funds to pay bills and implement the club programs. The Chairman indicated that when the bill is reported out that the whole amount would be included since he is satisfied that that would be appropriate considering the use of the funds. The Chairman also mentioned that the AG of Guam recommends a different procedure for the return of the funds to OHS and that it be appropriated to the Claims Fund rather to the Victim Compensation Fund and be awarded to OHS upon a claim from OHS for the money.

COMMITTEE FINDINGS

All persons submitting written and oral testimony testified in favor of Bill 1197. A number of individuals suggested that the bill be amended to include the entire amount or at least more than what is presently stated in the appropriation in order to adequately compensate the students at OHS. Bill 1197 needs redrafting and the recommendations of the AG should be followed to appropriate the full amount to the government Claims Fund, to be dispersed to the OHS Student Funds upon claim by OHS students. The reason for this is that the present language of the bill requires the disbursement of the funds be from the Criminal Injuries Compensation Fund but an appropriation to the government Claims Fund is a more appropriate route.

A fiscal note was not part of the testimony on Bill 1197.

RECOMMENDATION

The Committee on Ways and Means recommends that a substitute Bill No. 1197 be passed by the Twentieth Guam Legislature.

Re: Bill No. 1197

Dear Mr. Chairman and Members of this Committee:

We have reviewed Bill No. 1197, an act to add a new Section 3361.26 to the Civil Code of Guam for purposes of compensating the students of Oceanview High School for losses to their Student Activities Fund. This is a matter which our department is keenly aware of, and a matter which the Director of Education and I have discussed at length. We are encouraged by your efforts on behalf of the students injured due to losses suffered to their account.

For practical reasons, I would like to suggest that the bill be redrafted to consider an appropriation of the stated sum directly to the Government Claims Fund as an appropriate fund to handle this matter. The Criminal Injuries Compensation Commission is presently defunct due to a sunset provision in the original law which caused the Commission to expire December 31, 1986.

I would like to strongly recommend that the Legislature directly appropriate the stated amount to the Government Claims Fund for the specific intention of entertaining a potential claim by the students upon the Fund. Any remaining funds not approved upon presentation of claims for review could either be returned to the General Fund, or directed to the Department of Education

for educational purposes related to the students of Oceanview High School. We have given the use of the Government Claims Fund our review, and suggest this avenue of approach as an alternative to use of the Criminal Injuries Compensation Fund. We would like to prepare a substituted version for the Committee's consideration and subsequent approval.

On behalf of the students of Oceanview High School, I would like to take this time to express my heartfelt appreciation to the Committee on Ways and Means for taking the impetus to address the three year issue of Oceanview's missing student funds in the amount of \$25,487.38.

The students have waited for such a time for this. It is, however, unfortunate that there are some classes that will not benefit from this gesture. Nonetheless, the appropriation of \$8,400.00 from either the Criminal Injuries Compensation Funds held by the court or from the General Fund will be greatly appreciated by the students.

The Department of Education has taken the following steps to curtail any mishandling of funds in future by providing inservice training for Department employees regarding Guam laws in managing funds in their immediate possession. The Attorney General's Office, the Bureau of Budget and Management Research and the Department of Revenue and Taxation were also made part of this training of nonappropriated funds awareness, Principals were instructed that they were no longer to sign for funds for PTA/PTOs as they are nonprofit organizations, independent of the Department of Education.

The Department is thankful for the opportunity to testify at this public hearing on Bill No. 1197. Along with the students and faculty of Oceanview High School, we await the passage of this bill.

Dear Senator Guiterrez and members of the Committee on Ways and Means.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank you for giving me this time to testify in favor of Bill No. 1197. Bill No. 1197 has been long awaited for by our student body and faculty.

I was the assistant principal here at Oceanview High School at the time the money was discovered missing. Upon learning of the alleged theft, I requested that an audit be made of the hon-appropriated funds which are mainly student account funds. At the time the audit was conducted, \$25,487.38 was discovered missing. Immediately thereafter, I requested the possible responsible person to be removed from here in order to preserve the integrity of the student account records. Meanwhile, I insisted that the matter be brought before the Attorney General's Office for possible criminal investigation.

For three years the students, faculty, and the school community continued to battle for justice to prevail! We have requested repeatedly to receive compensation for the money that is rightfully the students'. Money that the Government of Guam requires to be deposited into an account for non-appropriated funds as per Public Law 14-130. The School Treasurer is responsible for keeping the records of such accounts. Since this is a law mandating such process, we feel that the Government of Guam is primarily responsible in the reimbursement of the missing funds.

I am glad to see that our leaders have taken it upon themselves to see that the students receive compensation for the funds that were missing. Our students can now feel that their voices are being heard when they ask for justice. Bill No. 1197 is the answer to the "cry" of help to the students. The \$8,400.00 from either the Criminal Injuries Compensation Fund or the General Fund will be greatly appreciated by Oceanview High School and the community it services.

On behalf of the student body, faculty, and everyone who has taken this burden as their cross, I would like to again thank you for this opportunity to publicly state my opinion.
