health care providers. However, there is a limited number of nurses who have graduate degrees. It is the intent of the Legislature to expand the nursing professional pool to accommodate the needs of the full-time nursing school faculty of the University of Guam and for leadership and specialized nursing positions in the government and private sectors by affording loan awards to locally committed nurses to pursue graduate degrees in graduate nursing programs, including "summer-long" programs.

8 Section 2. A new Article 6 is added to Chapter 15, Title 17, Guam 9 Code Annotated, to read as follows:

"ARTICLE 6

NURSING LOANS

12 Students Entitled to Loans. §15601. There are established three 13 (3) annual loan awards for graduate studies in nursing, including 14 'summer-long' programs. Funds appropriated for the purpose of providing annual nurse loan awards, and which are not totally 15 16 expended may be used in succeeding years so as to increase the 17 number of annual awards or loans. Annual awards shall be given to 18 those applicants who have been accepted or who have been admitted to 19 a graduate program in nursing, including a 'summer-long' program. 20 The awards provided in this Article are subject to the following 21 limitations:

(a) A recipient must be a bona fide resident of Guam and a
United States citizen or a permanent resident alien and must have
achieved an overall grade point average of 3.0, based on a 4.0
maximum grade point system, in such applicant's undergraduate
studies or an irrevocable letter of acceptance from an accredited
professional school.

(b) The applicant must agree that after completion of the
course of studies for which the award was granted, such
applicant will return to work on Guam in the nursing profession
for a period of one (1) year for each Three Thousand Dollars
(\$3,000) received under the award.

21 Every student awarded a loan pursuant to this Article (a) 22 shall execute a promissory note, guaranteed by such other 23 person(s) as the Board requires, agreeing to repay said loan 24 over a period to be determined by the Board, but not to exceed 25 ten (10) years from the contemplated date of completion of the 26 course of studies for which the award was approved. Said 27 promissory note shall be non-interest bearing except that it shall 28 provide for interest in the amount of six percent (6%) on unpaid 29 delinquent amounts which are due and payable under the terms of 30 the note.

31(b) Every student awarded a loan pursuant to this Article32shall receive credit against amounts due under the promissory33note as follows:

1(i) At the rate of Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) for2each year during which such borrower is employed in the3nursing profession on Guam. No amounts under a4promissory note executed pursuant to this \$15603 shall be5considered due and payable during the period that any such6person is so employed.7\$15604

\$15604. Repayment of Tuition, Fees and Transportation.

8 Every student awarded tuition, fees and transportation (a) 9 pursuant to paragraphs (a) and (b) of \$15603 of this Article shall execute a promissory note agreeing to repay said tuition fees and 10 11 transportation costs over a period not to exceed ten (10) years in the event that such borrower does not return to Guam within 12 three (3) months following completion of such student's course of 13 14 studies and become employed in the nursing profession on Guam 15 for a period of not less than five (5) years.

16 In the case of the failure of a student to return to (b) 17 Guam within three (3) months following completion of such 18 student's course of studies or to be employed in the nursing profession on Guam for a period of not less than five (5) years, 19 20 the Board shall declare in effect the repayment provisions 21 provided in subsection (a) of this \$15604; provided, however, 22 that the Board may extend the time of return for a period of not 23 to exceed two (2) years upon written request of the student and 24 upon a showing to the satisfaction of the Board of good cause for 25 such extension.

Section 2. Seventy-Five Thousand Dollars (\$75,000) are appropriated from the General Fund from FY '89 to the University of Guam to fund five

Section 3. The University of Guam is authorized to begin negotiations and to execute a contract with a U.S. mainland university to provide an advanced degree nursing program at the University beginning in the summer of 1990. The University shall submit an appropriation request to effectuate such contract within one hundred twenty (120) days after the enactment of this Act."

10 Section 4. (a) One Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$100,000) are hereby 11 appropriated from the General Fund to the University of Guam for analyzing 12 the human remains and archaeological relics discovered at Gonga Beach and 13 Agana by the Micronesian Area Research Center. This is a continuing 14 appropriation.

(b) A continuing appropriation of One Hundred and Two Thousand
 Dollars is hereby authorized for Fiscal Year 1990 from the General Fund to
 the University of Guam to complete the second year of the project.

18 (c) The Director of the Micronesian Area Research Center shall make 19 a report to the Legislature within thirty (30) days of the completion of the 20 research funded by this section. COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION COMMITTEE REPORT BILL NO. 326

"AN ACT TO ADD A NEW ARTICLE 6 TO SECTION 15101 17 GCA CHAPTER 15, RELATIVE TO CREATING A FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE PROGRAM FOR NURSES PURSUING A GRADUATE DEGREE IN NURSING."

The Committee on Education conducted a public hearing on Wednesday, April 5, 1989 at the Legislative Session Hall at 9:10 a.m. to hear public input on Bill No. 326. Joining Chairman Franklin J. Quitugua were Senators Carl T. C. Gutierrez, George Bamba, Marilyn Manibusan and Elizabeth Arriola.

In attendance were University of Guam officials Anne W. Rohweder, Director of the Nursing Program and Robert Prelosky representing the President.

BACKGROUND

The health care needs of our people require nursing professionals to serve in multiple and complex roles. Nurses are needed to function in specialty areas, as faculty, as supervisors and as administrators. There is a demand for nurses who have the educational qualifications to hold leadership positions at the Department of Public Health and Social Services, the Department of Mental Health and Substance Abuse, Guam Memorial Hospital, the University of Guam School of Nursing as well as the private sector health care providers. However, there is a limited number of nurses who have graduate degrees. It is the intent of this bill to provide opportunities for nurses to pursue their education and to achieve a masters degree in nursing.

TESTIMONY

Mrs. Anne W. Rohweder, Director of the Nursing Program submitted written testimony in support of the Bill. (See Exhibit A) She explains that there is only a few local nurses with master degrees. In anticipation of the retirement of several of her staff members in the nursing program at the University, there needs to be opportunities as provided by this bill to develop the local nursing expertise to fill positions at UOG and throughout the health community. She is also consulting off-island universities with nursing programs which will be interested in bringing their "summers only" program to Guam. Two programs have expressed interest and approximately 15 students from Guam have indicated of their plans to achieve a degree if such program would come to Guam.

She requested that the bill reflects the real cost of attending a summer's program and Section 1 line 2 subsection (b) should be amended to read \$5,000 per year.

Robert Prelosky representing UOG President Leon Guerrero submitted written testimony in support of the Bill. (See Exhibit B) The bill will provide opportunities to students to attend school in "summers only" program. UOG has had a longstanding problem in the recruitment of nursing faculty. Five local nurses with Baccalaureates in Nursing degrees, have been identified and have made a commitment to pursue a degree of Master of Nursing or Master of Science or Arts with a major in Nursing, and to return as full-time permanent nursing faculty if this bill becomes law. He cites that the proposed \$25,000 annual grant loan will not be enough to cover air transportation cost and dormitory and other living expenses.

Governor Ada submitted written testimony in support of the Bill. (See Exhibit C)

FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

The Committee finds that the Professional and Technical Awards program is not available for student who are only pursuing a "summer's only" program. The bill takes into consideration that most nurses prefer to attend a "summer's only" program instead of the regular academic year. The current nursing shortage will be further compounded if nurses leave to attend a regular academic year thus supports the idea to allow nurses to continue to work in their respective jobs and various health agencies while seeking their education in a summer's program.

The Committee recommends that the bill be amended to reflect the concerns of the public. The Committee further recommends the passage of Bill 326 by the Twentieth Guam Legislature.

Testimony in favor of Bill No. 326(COR) AN ACT TO ADD A NEW ARTICLE 6 TO SECTION 15101 17 GCA CHAPTER 15, RELATIVE TO CREATING A FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE PROGRAM FOR NURSES PURSUING A GRADUATE DEGREE IN NURSING.

We welcome this additional opportunity to support a bill which will help, we hope, to literally change the face of nursing on Guam. As the introduction to the bill states, there are only two local nurses with graduate degrees in nursing (actually, we only know of one). There are others who have graduate degrees in Public Health, Business Administration, Counselling and Guidance, etc., but these degrees do not meet National League for Nursing or Guam Board of Nurse Examiners recommendations for faculty positions at the University of Guam. As a result, the University must attempt to find mainland nurses who will come to Guam on two or three year contracts, with the hope that they will stay longer; it is rare that they do. For the past 15 or so years, the University has been fortunate in having five or six faculty members who stayed from six to 15 years; all of those nurses are contemplating retirement in the near future (or have already retired). It is imperative that these five or six faculty be replaced by others who will also remain on faculty for long periods, to form the "backbone" of the Nursing Department at the University of Guam.

This bill is very timely. Prior to 1982, the University did not have a Second Step Baccalaureate in Nursing program that would permit Associate Degree graduates to attain the B.S. degree on island. There are now five local graduates of the Second Step program, with eight more graduating this year and an anticipated additional six or seven in 1990. These nurses add to the pool of B.S.N. graduates who attained their B.S.N. off-island, so that we have a sizeable number of potential candidates for graduate programs in nursing. Now that we have a generic B.S. in Nursing program, there will be a future continuous supply for local nurses who may aspire to the graduate degree. This bill will help Guam to attain it's own "home grown" supply of nursing faculty and nursing leadership in health agencies, ultimately eliminating the dependence on off-island recruitment and coincidental military dependent faculty.

This bill is particularly important because it permits nurses to attend the "summers only" programs that exist for graduate nursing programs. Some of our local nurses will, hopefully, elect the existing professional-technical scholarships for regular academic year programs, but nurses (mostly women) find it extremely difficult to leave their family for one or two years to go to school. Others will be able to work during the academic year and attend school for three or four summers to attain their Master's in Nursing.

Page 2, Testimony for Bill No. 326(COR)

The University of Guam Nursing Programs plans for the next 2-6 years includes, if approved by UOG administration, allocating up to five positions for Assistant Instructors (local nurses with B.S. in Nursigg degrees) who will make a definite committment to a future career in nursing education. These nurses would be employed as clinical instructors, to assist the Master's prepared faculty assigned as lead teachers. They would be able to work during the school year and attend graduate programs during the summer, with the expectation that they would become the future full-time lead faculty.

We have only addressed the value of this bill in terms of the future of nursing education on Guam. Undoubtedly, there are nurses who would be willing to go to school summers (as opposed to academic years) to achieve graduate degrees in nursing with intent to prepare for advancement in such areas as clinical nurse practitioner, specialty practice in a clinical area, or supervisory/administrative positions in hospital, Public Health or other health agencies. It is entirely possible that, after the first year or two, the three annual awards allowed by Bill No. 326 would be totally inadequate to meet the demand.

There are two items that might be addressed for practical purposes. In Section I "there are established three (3) annual nurse awards for graduate studies in nursing." The further statement allows for accumulation of funds to increase the awards should funds for any given year be left over. Is it possible to word the bill in such a way that the Board of Regents would have the authority, under appropriate circumstances, to award more than three scholarships if funding permitted? We raise this question in view of very recent developments. . . . Prior to this year, the Director of Nursing Programs at the University had located and contacted "summers only" programs that would be willing to accept our graduates (without NLN accreditation). There are several such programs, with two of them definitely interested in accepting our students. Only very recently have we been approached with the possibility of bringing the summers only program to Guam, via one of the programs already identified. In the event that " one or more programs could bring their "summers only" program to Guam, it would be possible to provide support to considerably more than three students annually, since off-island living expenses and transportation would not be required. At least fifteen people have already indicated serious interest in achieving a graduate degree if we could bring the program to Guam, rather than having nurses leave island.

The other practical consideration has to do with Section 2 (Benefits). If sub-section (a) which allows for tuition and fees includes, as part of fees, dormitory and meal fees, there is no problem. If, on the otherhand, fees only include those additional fees associated with tuition and registration, there is a problem. Section 2 (b) only allows for an annual grant loan of not more than \$2,500 per year to cover everything except "tuition and fees." \$2,500 per year, for summer's only or academic year programs, would only cover one annual round trip from Guam to the college location, plus about \$500 for books. It would not cover living expenses at all. If the Board of Regents has the authority to include dormitory and meal expenses in the "fees" section, the specifications of the bill are quite adequate. We have attached a copy of information from two accredited programs to illustrate the cost of "summers only" programs, exclusive of book costs. At the moment, book costs are prohibitive, with some nursing texts costing up to \$75.00 per text.

Page 3, Testimony for Bill No. 326(COR)

The attached examples are illustrative only and relect 1988-89 costs, not increases expected for 1989-90 and beyond. It will be noticed that the average summer costs run very close to \$5,000 per summer, depending on the school selected. Costs in Kansas and Texas, two other "summers only" locations, would probably be about the same.

Again, thank you for the opportunity to support this legislation. We are aware of the Chairman's continuing interest in education, including nursing education, as demonstrated in past efforts.

Data regarding summer school costs for nurses in graduate programs, with "summers only" options. Ball State, Muncie, Indiana Tuition and fees: Regular school year, total for estimated 5 quarters...non resident \$6,611 Summers only, estimated 5 summers, not counting work to be done on Guam.....non resident 3,966 (Approximately \$1300 per summer) Dormitory, including meals, summers, grad. student dorm..... 2,000 Transportation to clinicals not needed, since hospital is across street from campus. Bus can be taken to any other community agency. Dear Chairman Quitugua:

Thank you for the opportunity to testify on behalf of Bill No. 326 (COR), "An Act to Add a New Article 6 to Section 15101 GCA Chapter 15, Relative to Creating a Financial Assistance Program for Nurses Pursuing a Graduate Degree in Nursing."

As the Senators are very much aware, the University of Guam has had a longstanding problem in the recruitment of nursing faculty. Part of the problem is the necessity to <u>recruit</u>, in the first place. Recruitment, for nursing faculty, automatically means seeking qualified persons from Off-island. Besides being an expensive process, off-island recruitment is not very successful in terms of long range planning. Recruited faculty seldom stay longer than the initial two to three year contracted period and some break their contracts and leave even earlier.

Long range planning for the nursing programs includes identification of at least five local nurses, with Baccalaureate in Nursing degrees, who will be willing to seek a degree of Master of Nursing (or Master of Science or Arts with a major in Nursing), with intent to become full-time permanent nursing faculty. If the University had a permanent core group of nursing faculty, recruited nurses and nurses coming on island as military dependents, could be used most effectively to provide the necessary variety recommended by accrediting bodies. Without such a core group, nursing programs have the stability and orderly growth required for desired National League for Nursing accreditation.

Professional-technical awards are available for nurses who can leave island for a full academic year.

Unfortunately, most nurses find themselves unable to leave home and family for the one and a half to two years necessary to accomplish the graduate degree. There are programs, in fully accredited and reputable schools, that recognize this problem and allow attendance in summers only for three to four summers. The professional technical awards do not permit attendance in "summers only" programs, hence the need for this Bill No. 326.

In addition to the severe shortage of nursing faculty at the University, the Territory of Guam needs nurses with graduate degrees to fill leadership and specialized program positions in almost every agency offering organized nursing services. Given the extreme shortage of nurses in clinical agencies, it is equally important that these nurses also have an opportunity to attend school in summers only, in addition to having access to academic year professional-technical awards.

The bill has only one possible drawback. Section 2 (Benefits), (a) provides for payment of tuition and fees, which should be ample for any program a candidate might select. (b) allows for an annual grant loan of not more than \$2,500 per year to be disbursed in accordance with regulations adopted by the Board of Regents. Unless the "fees" in section (a) can cover dormitory fees as well as other fees, the \$2,500 per year would be inadequate to cover costs of living on campus (or off-campus) and once yearly air fare. If the "fees" section covers dormitory fees, there is no problem with the amount allocated, given the Board's mandate to develop rules and regulations.

The nursing program is crucial if the University is to accomplish its mission to provide leadership and services for the Territory and Micronesia. There is so very much that needs to be done in the area of health care. Without a committed cadre of local professionals devoted to the region and its people, the University nursing program will never completely fill its potential. This bill will provide that needed cadre.

ACT ARTICLE 6, AN TO ADD A NEW TITLE 17, CHAPTER 15, GUAM CODE RELATIVE TO ANNOTATED, CREATING A ASSISTANCE FINANCIAL PROGRAM FOR NURSES PURSUING A GRADUATE DEGREE IN NURSING AND TO APPROPRIATE \$75,000 FROM THE GENERAL FUND FROM FY '89 TO THE UNIVERSITY TO FUND FIVE NURSING LOANS, AND FOR OTHER PURPOSES.

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE TERRITORY OF GUAM: 2 Section 1. Legislative Intent. The Legislature finds that the health 3 care needs of the people of Guam require nursing professionals to serve in multiple and complex roles. 4 Nurses are needed to function in specialty 5 areas, as faculty, as supervisors and as administrators. There is a demand 6 for nurses who have the educational qualifications to hold leadership 7 positions at the Department of Public Health and Social Services, the 8 Department of Mental Health and Substance Abuse, Guam Memorial Hospital, 9 the University of Guam School of Nursing as well as the private sector

health care providers. However, there is a limited number of nurses who have graduate degrees. It is the intent of the Legislature to expand nursing professional pool to accommodate the needs of the full-time nursing school faculty of the University of Guam and for leadership and specialized nursing positions in the government and private by affording loan awards to locally committed nurses to pursue graduate degrees in graduate nursing programs to include "summer-long" programs.

8 Section 2. A new Article 6 Section 15601 is added to 17 GCA Chapter 9 15 to read as follows:

10 "Section 15601. Students Entitled to Loans. There are established three (3) annual/loan awards for graduate and/or summer's-11 Funds appropriated for the purpose of only studies in nursing. 12 providing loans and annual nurse awards, and which are not totally 13 14 expended may be used in succeeding years so as to increase the 15 number of annual awards or loans. Annual awards shall be given to 16 those applicants who have been accepted or who have been admitted to 17 a graduate program in nursing and or a 'summer-long' program. programs and or a "summer-long" program to pursue a graduate 1 2 degree in nursing. 3 The UOG Board shall select recipients of the loans upon (d) 4 the basis of scholastic ability, financial need, aptitude and health as well as the likelihood of the recipient returning for employment 5 6 in the nursing profession on Guam. 7 Section 15602. Benefits. Students eligible loans pursuant to this 8 Article shall receive the following benefits: 9 (a) Payment of tuition and fees for a period of not more 10 than four (4) scholastic years. 11 (b) An annual grant loan of not more than Five Thousand 12Dollars (\$5,000) per year to be disbursed in accordance with 13 regulations adopted by the Board, such loans to be non-interest 14 bearing except as to unpaid delinquent amounts. (a) Every student awarded tuition, fees and transportation pursuant to Paragraphs (a) and (b) of Section 15603 of this Article shall execute a promissory note agreeing to repay said tuition fees and transportation costs over a period not to exceed ten (10) years in the event that he/she does not return to Guam within three (3) months following completion of his/her course of studies and become employed in the nursing profession on Guam for a period of not less than five (5) years.

Said promissory 12 note shall be non-interest bearing except that it shall provide for 13 14 interest in the amount of six percent (6%) on unpaid delinquent amounts which are due and payable under the terms of the note. 15

16 (b) Every student awarded a grant loan pursuant 17 to this Article shall receive credit against amounts due under the 18 promissory note as follows:

19 (i) At the rate of Three Thousand Dollars
20 (\$3,000) for each year during which he is employed on Guam.

No amounts under a promissory note executed pursuant to this Section shall be considered due and payable during the period that any such person is so employed.

24 Section 4. Repayment of Tuition, Fees and25 Transportation.

26 (a) Every student awarded tuition, fees and
 27 transportation pursuant to Paragraphs (a) and (b) of Section 3 of
 28 this Article shall execute a promissory note agreeing to repay said

1 tuition fees and transportation costs over a period not to exceed ten
2 (10) years in the event that he does not return to Guam within three
3 (3) months following completion of his course of studies and become
4 employed on Guam for a period of not less than one (1) year.

In the case of the failure of a student to 5 (b) 6 return to Guam within three (3) months following completion of his course of studies or to be so employed on Guam for a period of not 7 less than one (1) year, the Board shall declare in effect the 8 repayment provisions as provided in Subsection (a) foregoing; 9 10 provided, however, that the Board may extend the time of return for a period of not to exceed two (2) years upon written request of the 11 student and upon a showing to the satisfaction of the Board of good 12 cause for such extension. 13

Section 5. Forfeiture of Awards.

15 Expulsion from a school or institution attended, or suspension for a period of the same or greater than one academic 16 17 semester or its equivalent in such school or institution, or failure to complete the program for which the award was granted, or failure 18 to comply with the regulations of the Board shall result in 19 forfeiture of the award provided by this Article. For purposes of 20 this Article a person shall be considered to have completed his 21 22 course of studies upon the event or events of forfeiture as provided 23 in this Section.
