



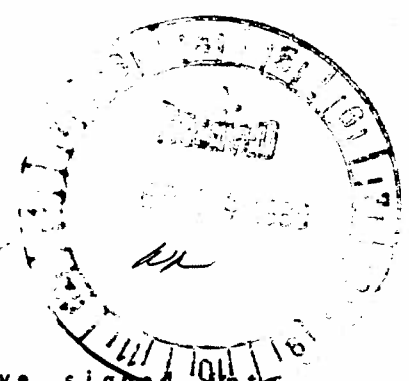

Dear Mr. Speaker:

Transmitted herewith is Bill 701, which I have signed into law this date as Public Law 20-71.

I join the Legislature in a commitment to continue fighting crime. However, since precinct offices are currently available to our police in these three villages, albeit inadequate, I suggest that these new facilities be carefully planned. At this time sites have not been identified for the proposed substations nor have plans been prepared. Realistically, it will take one year to choose the sites, prepare the plans and prepare the construction bids. Therefore, in order to better manage our resources, I request that the legislature amend Section 1 of the law to provide:

"Section 1. Appropriation. One Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$100,000) are appropriated from the fiscal year 1990 revenues of the General Fund to the Guam Police Department and Eight Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$800,000) are appropriated from the fiscal year 1991 revenues of the General Fund to the Guam Police Department for design and construction of three (3) police substations in the municipalities of Tamuning, Dededo and Agat, at sites to be identified by each municipality's Planning Council and the Guam Police Department."





COMMITTEE REPORT ON BILL NO. 701

AN ACT TO IDENTIFY SUITABLE GOVERNMENT LAND IN TAMUNING, DEDEDO, AND AGAT, AND TO APPROPRIATE NINE HUNDRED THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$900,000) TO CONSTRUCT POLICE SUBSTATIONS, TO DO PASS AS SUBSTITUTED.

PREFACE

The Judiciary and Criminal Justice Committee convened at 9:00 a.m., Friday, June 30, 1989, in the Legislative Session Hall at Agana, Guam to hear testimony on Bill 701. Committee Members in attendance, alongside with Chairwoman Pilar C. Lujan were Ted S. Nelson, Elizabeth P. Arriola, Edward R. Duenas, and Martha C. Ruth.

OVERVIEW

In familiarizing and updating Committee Members with operations of departments which the Committee directly oversees, Committee Chairwoman Pilar C. Lujan scheduled a tour and inspection of the Guam Police Department (GPD) facilities on April 4, 1989.

During that day-long tour of GPD facilities throughout the island, it was observed that operations are hampered with existing facilities.

Specifically noted as a concern by the Committee was the limited, dilapidated conditions of each precinct reviewed.

Currently, GPD has satellite operations situated in Dededo, Tumon, and Agat. The Dededo and Agat Commissioners have allowed GPD to establish these bases within their facilities at no charge. The Tumon operation is located next to the Old Guam Memorial Hospital and is for the Neighborhood Patrol Program.

It was further noted that the current bases of operations pose problems with facilitating suspects and allocating resources. With no holding cells or rooms to detain suspects, personnel almost invariably have to transport suspects to Central Precinct in Agana for processing and then on to Rosario Detention Facility for confinement. As a consequence of the lack of adequate facilities, personnel are taken away from "beats" and patrol areas.

In striving to ensure that neighborhoods and residents are properly served, the Committee Chairwoman has introduced Bill 701 to construct three (3) Police Precincts in highly populated areas.

CONTENT OF BILL 701

Section 1 of Bill 701 directs the Department of Land Management to identify parcels of government property in the villages of Dededo, Tamuning, and Agat where the substations would be constructed. Additionally, notification and legal descriptions of the sites must be transmitted to the Department of Public Works.

Section 2 of Bill 701 provides for an appropriation of \$900,000 to construct the three (3) substations. Each substation is priced at a cost of \$300,000.

TESTIMONY

Chief-of-Police Adolf Sgambelluri testified in favor of the measure and noted that the Bill is "so timely introduced because it is parallel to the Department's reorganizational plan to improve our Out Reach program to make our services more easily and readily accessible to the people we serve."

The Police Chief added that the Bill "would enable the Department's patrol services to design, develop, and finally implement patrol operational programs most appropriate to police environment."

Also expressed as points of concern were that witnesses and suspects are unnecessarily exposed because of the limited facilities which GPD personnel currently base operations. Additionally, the Chief noted concern with security of documents, equipment, and materials.

Department of Land Management representative Jennifer Reyes appeared before the Committee and noted that joint consultation has taken place with GPD and that specific sites have already been identified.

The Dededo substation is slated to be constructed on the lot immediately past the Guam Telephone Authority Exchange, in front of the shopping area. The Agat substation is proposed to be situated on property adjacent to the existing Fire Station. And, the Tamuning substation is pegged to be erected in front of the Old Guam Memorial Hospital.

COMMITTEE FINDINGS

The testimony of the GPD Chief and Land Management representative illustrates that efforts to construct the substations are coordinated.

Concerns with the Tamuning substation site were expressed by Committee members. The Chairwoman noted that several proposals to develop or lease the Old GMH sites may affect the construction of a substation in the vicinity. The Chief pointed out that contact with Land Management revealed no definitive or documented plans for development.

Additionally, the Chief noted that the appropriation amount is sufficient.

CONCLUSIONS & RECOMMENDATIONS

In the survey and assessment of Bill 701, the Judiciary and Criminal Justice Committee concludes the following:

- (1) THAT there always exists the necessity to show that the criminal justice system is strong, effective, and efficient; and, further,
- (2) THAT the instrumentalities of the criminal justice system be provided with necessary equipment and facilities to carry out their respective missions; and, further,
- (3) THAT Bill 701 be amended since the specific sites for buildings have been identified by the Department of Land Management.
- (4) THAT the government immediately appropriate necessary resources for the criminal justice system instrumentalities to execute such missions in an effective and efficient manner.

THE COMMITTEE, BASED ON THE AFOREMENTIONED FINDINGS AND CONCLUSIONS, RECOMMENDS THAT:

- (1) Substitute Bill 701 be passed at the soonest date possible to strengthen efforts in protecting and serving the public; and,
- (2) Substitute Bill 701 be passed into law since it would help to foster efficiency and effectiveness within the criminal justice system and would provide for a more safe, secure Guam.




