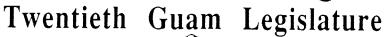

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COMMITTEE REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON WAYS AND MEANS ON BILL NO. 803

AN ACT TO APPROPRIATE SUPPLEMENTAL FUNDS TO THE AGENCY FOR HUMAN RESOURCES DEVELOPMENT.

PREFACE

A public hearing on Bill No. 803 was held by the Committee on Ways and Means on Wednesday, July 19, 1989, at the Legislative session hall.

Present at the hearing were Chairman Senator Carl Gutierrez , Vice-Chairman Senator Ted Nelson, and Senator Don Parkinson.

BACKGROUND

Bill No. 803 is an act appropriating the sum of One Hundred Forty Four Thousand Two Hundred Thirteen Dollars (\$144,213) from the General Fund to the Agency for Human Resources Development to supplement its personnel requirements for Fiscal Year 1990. This sum will assist the Agency for Human Development in meeting its personnel salary requirements for the upcoming year's budget.

TESTIMONIES

Present to testify in favor of Bill No. 803 was Mr. Michael Reidy, Director for the Bureau of Budget and Management Research. Mr. Reidy gave an oral testimony in support of Bill No. 803 and stated that the supplemental request is included in the Governor's Fiscal Budget for 1990.

In addition to Mr. Reidy's testimony for Bill No. 803, Ms. Julie M. Perez, Director of the Agency for Human Resources Development, presented written testimony in which she explained the necessary increase in the agencies budget for the upcoming fiscal year. The supplemental appropriation of funds are needed to cover the costs of the Option I and Option II increases within the agency for 1990. Ms. Perez stressed the need for the additional funds and stated that the agency is in full support of Bill No. 803.

FINDINGS

It has been brought to the attention of the Committee on Ways and Means that the requested appropriation sum of One Hundred Forty Four Thousand Two Hundred Thirteen Dollars (\$144,213) from the General Fund to the Agency for Human Resources Development is included in the Governor's 1990 Fiscal Budget. The Additional Appropriation is necessary to defray costs which result from the unanticipated salary increases in Option I and Option II.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATIONS

The Committee on Ways and Means to which was referred Bill No. 803 "AN ACT TO APPROPRIATE SUPPLEMENTAL FUNDS TO THE AGENCY FOR HUMAN RESOURCES DEVELOPMENT" has had the same under consideration, and now wishes to report back with the recommendation TO DO PASS.

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TESTIMONY ON BILL NO. 803

"AN ACT TO APPROPRIATE SUPPLEMENTAL FUNDS TO THE AGENCY FOR HUMAN RESOURCES DEVELOPMENT."

GOOD MORNING MR. CHAIRMAN AND MEMBERS OF THE COMMITTEE ON WAYS AND MEANS:

I am Julie M. Perez, Director of the Agency for Human Resources Development. Before I begin my testimony on Bill No. 803, I would like to thank you and the members of your Committee for allowing me the opportunity of appearing here today to provide some insights on this measure.

Bill 803, "An Act to Appropriate Supplemental Funds to the Agency for Human Resources Development," is a measure which is vitally needed by the Agency to defray costs incurred as a result of unanticipated Option II and Option I salary increases.

Under the Job Training Partnership Act (JTPA), there are three (3) cost categories in which salaries for personnel and other operational costs are to be charged. These cost categories are: Administrative, Support Services and Training. Included also is a separate cost category of State Administration. Along with these cost categories are cost limitations which are mandated by the Job Training Partnership Act and the Governor-Secretary Agreement. A breakdown of the cost categories and assigned cost limitations are:

- > State Administration: 5% of the total allotment;
- > Administrative Cost Pool: 15% of the 95% of the total allotment;
- > Support Services: 15% of the 95% of the total allotment; and
- > Training: Balance of the total allotment.

It should be noted that these cost limitations must be complied with and no waivers from the Federal Government to increase or decrease these limitations will be granted.

Since the inception of JTPA in October of 1983, annually thereafter a minimum of 10 to 12% of the total allocation is reduced. Although funding levels continue to be decreased, operational costs — including those of personnel — continue to rise. In the early years of JTPA, we have been able to absorb all costs of personnel and operations, however, with the unanticipated salary increases under Option I and II, the effects have taken its toll on our financial posture, and most heavily in the Administrative Cost area. As it stands, there are 30 full-time staff in the Agency. Of the 30 staff members, 17 personnel salaries are charged or prorated 20-100% to Admin Cost while the remainder are charged 100% to

Training. Personnel cost-wise this may not seem like much, however, when you take into consideration all other operational costs, such as office rental, supplies, off-island travel, printing/copying services, maintenance agreements for equipment, local mileage, etc., also prorated to the Admin Cost Category, you can then begin to see why we need to seek local appropriation. Therefore, in an attempt to alleviate some of these costs on the grant, the Agency has no alternative but to seek supplemental funding from the Local Government.

AHRD has requested supplemental funding through the Bureau of Budget & Management Research (BBMR) and the approval for the ceiling amoung of \$144,213\$ was granted. Although this ceiling amount is slightly insufficient to cover personnel costs from Option I and II, we will be more than happy to secure any amount to help defray some of these costs.

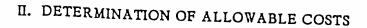

All materials, supplies, equipment, office space, utilities, and telephone costs related to the above positions shall be charged to the Administrative Cost Category.

Other Administrative Costs include:

Staff Training Indirect Costs Solicitation of Bids Publishing of Local Plans Printing of Forms Membership in Organizations Personal Liability Staff Bonding Insurance for PIC Members Public Notices Advertising for Personnel -Subscriptions Storage costs associated Printing, reproduction of with records, equipment, materials not used in providing and materials training to participants

B. PARTICIPANTS SUPPORT COST CATEGORY

Participants support costs include:

- Needs-Based Payments
- Employment generating activities to increase job opportunities for eligible individuals.
- Child Care, Health Care, transportation, counseling, residential (lodging), meals, personal property, relocation expenses and other miscellaneous participant services.
- Fifty percent (50%) of any work experience activity which:
 - 1. Is not more than six (6) months in length.



- 2. Is combined with classroom or other training activities.
- 3. Participant does not enter another work experience activity;
- 4. Wages do not exceed the prevailing entry-level for the same occupation.
- One Hundred percent (100%) of any work experience activity which does not meet the above requirements.

C. TRAINING COST CATEGORY

The salaries, benefits, and travel costs of personnel directly engaged in providing the following shall be charged to the Training Cost Category:

- Training
- Remedial Education
- Job-Related Counseling
- Employability Assessment
- Enrollment and Selection Process
- Job Search Assistance
- Outreach
- Employer Outreach necessary to obtain job listings or job training opportunities

All materials, supplies, equipment, office space, utilities, and telephone costs related to the above functions shall be charged to the Training Category.

The following activities are chargeable to Training:

- Institutional Skill Training
- Job Search
- Training Services
- On-the-Job Training
- Pre-Employment Training
- Remedial and Basic Skill Training
- Retraining
- Tryout Employment
- Upgrading
- Fifty percent (50%) limited work experience (As described in the Participant Support Cost Category.)

Other training costs shall include:

- Books and other teaching aids.
- Equipment and materials used in providing training.
- Classroom space and related utility and telephone.
- Tuition and entrance fees that represent instructional costs

which have a direct and immediate impact on participants.

- Construction costs when the funds are used to purchase equipment, materials, and supplies for use by the participants while on the job and for use in the training of the participants. This will be limited to handtools, workclothes, uniforms, and safety equipment.
- Costs of training program in a construction occupation including costs such as instructor's salaries, training tools and books.

Costs which are billed as a single unit charge do not have to be allocated or prorated among the several cost categories, but may be charged entirely to training when the agreement:

- Is for training.
- Is a fixed-unit price.
- Stipulates that full payment for the full unit price will be made only upon completion of training by the participant and placement of the participant into unsubsidized employment in the occupation trained for and at not less than the wage specified in the agreement.
