14 Section 9. (a) Legislative Intent. During the course of work on the 15 Guam Tax Code Commission, and most especially while creating and reviewing 16 models which may be used in creating a Guam Tax Code, it has become apparent to the Guam Tax Code Commission that Guam lacks the proper income and product 17 18 accounts to measure recent economic activity and forecast future economic 19 performance. These processes go hand-in-hand with development of a Guam Tax Code, and unless they are developed and implemented will hinder finalization of 20 21 the Guam Tax Code Commission's work.

The microsimulation models that have been developed for the Guam Tax Code Commission will be integral to developing income and product accounts. The models will be used to forecast the impact of alternative tax and economic policies and extended to data assessment, account building, and forecasting.

Section 5. Definitions. The following definitions shall apply to this document.

(a) "Budget Digest" consists of all numbers in this document which are contained in Chapter II, and their verbal purposes as stated to the left of them in the left hand column of this document, except for those numbers designated "total", and their verbal purposes as stated to the left of them in the left hand column and which are defined as "appropriations" in Subsection (a) of Section 6 of This Chapter.
 (b) "Capital Outlay" includes:

(1) equipment such as loader trucks, tractors, trailers, automobiles or other
vehicles; machinery; reference books; filing cabinets, typewriters, adding and
calculating machines, other business machines, office equipment; and tools,
implements and instruments which may be used continuously without material
change in physical condition and must have a useful life of one (1) year or longer
and cost not less than Two Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$250) but not more than Two
Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$250,000);

(2) repair, remodeling or alteration of a building or replacement thereof and
 the replacement and renewal of plumbing, wiring and air conditioning systems
 costing more than Thirty Thousand Dollars (\$30,000). Capital Outlay does not include normal maintenance expenditures;

(c) "Committee Report" includes those pages appearing before each territorial agency's operational budget for which appropriations are made in Chapter II of this document entitled "Committee Report", containing public hearing, mark-up, and summary information.

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(d) "Contingency" means expenditure for unbudgeted items.
 (e) "Contractual Semicar" is the second seco

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"Contractual Services" include:

(1) services rendered or performed by business, other government agencies or individuals other than expenses for personnel services;

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Government's contributions to the Government of Guam (2) Retirement Fund and the employer's contribution under the Federal Insurance Contribution Act; and

the Government's contribution for health, dental and life insurance (3) plans.

12 "Supplies and Materials" means materials which by their nature are (s) consumable, which have a useful lifetime of less than one (1) year, and which, after use, 13 undergo an impairment or a material change in physical condition. 14

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"Telephone" includes all charges for telephone service. (**t**)

(**u**) "Toll Calls" includes all charges for long distance telephone calls and 17 facsimile. 18

(**v**) "Territorial Agency", for purposes of this Act, means any office, department, institution, board, bureau, commission, council, authority, or committee of the territorial 19 20 government, the Guam Mass Transit Authority, the Guam Memorial Hospital Authority, the Guam Visitors Bureau, the Public Defender Service Corporation, the Superior Court of -21 22 Guam, and the University of Guam.

(w) "Travel & Transportation" means off-island travel expenses and local mileage reimbursement in accordance with the laws of Guam. 24 25

"Water/Sewer" includes all expenses for the purchase of water and all (x) expenses for waste-water treatment. 26 27

Section 6. General Provisions. The following General Provisions shall apply to the 28 appropriations made in Chapter II of this Act: 29

(a) Except as otherwise specifically provided, and except for all pages with the heading "Summary", amounts which are designated as "totals" in the left hand column of 30 31 this document and are set out under the column heading "FY 1993 GENERAL FUND APPROVED" are appropriated from the General Fund. Except as otherwise specifically 32 33 provided, amounts set out under the column heading "FY 1993 FED/OTHER APPROVED" 34 are appropriated matching funds. Amounts which are not designated as "totals" are 35 provided for use as the Budget Digest only, and are not appropriations, however, the •36 appropriations were derived from the representation that the items and prices in the digest 37 were anticipated expenditures of the government.

For Fiscal Year 1993, appropriations are those amounts as defined in Subsection (a) of this Section and set out in Chapter II of this Act and unless otherwise 2 specified, amounts set out in Chapters III, IV and V of this Act, which are effective October 3 1, 1992, from the General Fund or other funds, as indicated, to territorial agencies named, 4 for the purposes expressed, or so much thereof as may be necessary, within available 5 revenues and unencumbered balances, and unless otherwise specified, amounts which are 6 stated to be appropriated in Chapters III, IV, and V of this Act. 7

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8 Except for the Guam Visitors Bureau, the Superior Court of Guam, and the (c) Public Defender Service Corporation, and the Legislature, the governor or his official 9 designee shall monitor revenue received by territorial agencies from sources other than 10 the General fund and shall order reductions in the operating budget of any territorial 11 12 agency whose revenue from these sources is not meeting budgeted projection.



As Fiscal Year 1993 draws ever closer, it is vital that we address certain funding commitments present in legislation passed this Fiscal Year, but unfunded for the next.

Specifically, I refer to the CAHAT program, the low interest housing loan program, and the Affordable Housing Master Plan, all of these administered in accordance with statute by the Guam Housing Corporation.

CAHAT requires an appropriation of \$6 million for FY 93, the low interest direct loan program requires \$4 million, and the Master Plan requires an appropriation of \$900,000.

All of these initiatives were approved by the Legislature and are vital, as we work to address one of the most important needs of our people at this time; the need for affordable housing. The CAHAT program will allow for low interest loans and will liberate millions in private funds for these purposes as you are aware. The direct low interest loan program is a continuation of the initiative sponsored by Sen. Frank Santos which will provide 6% housing loans. The Master Plan is the first step in our program to provide an affordable housing development on Government property, combining single family and multi

I ask you to use your good offices to introduce measures to provide these programs with funding necessary to ensure that in each case they become a reality and fulfill our mutual commitment and goal to help our people obtain that which is their right -- a decent and affordable home of their own.

It is the further finding of the Legislature that it is necessary to provide a Flood Control Plan for Guam and complete the Agana River Flood Control Project in order 19 to lift the probationary status imposed on Guam by FEMA. In their April 8, 1992 20 letter to Governor Ada, FEMA stated that if the required corrective actions are not 21 22 taken by April 6, 1993, FEMA will recommend to the Administrator of the Federal Insurance Administration that Guam be suspended from NFIP. The Legislature 23 24 further finds that, notwithstanding FEMA, these measures should be taken in the interests of the safety and well-being of the people of Guam. Although the Governor 25 has not requested funding for these two measures, the Legislature finds that these 26 deficiencies cannot be permitted to continue due to the inaction and inattention of 27 the Executive Branch. CHAPTER IV

MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS

There will be few events more 5 important and critical in the history of Guam than the current efforts to 6 establish a dynamic and viable political relationship with the United 7 States of America and understanding the cultural history of Guam. The 8 history and record of all that has transpired, successful or otherwise, should not be lost but rather should be made known to all on Guam. It is 9 10 important for future generations, the children and the youth of Guam, to learn the benefits of past and present political successes and the cultural 11 history of Guam in order to confront the problems which may yet be 12 faced and resolved in the future. It is for the future of Guam, its people, 13 and its children, that the Legislature sees a need to provide continuous 14 educational program which will better prepare the people and pave the 15 way for greater understanding of these efforts toward political growth and 16 17 maturity.

18 The Legislature declares it to be the public policy of the 19 government of Guam to provide leadership for and to support the 20 development of courses of studies on Guam's political history and status 21 development and development of course of studies on Guam's cultural 22 history to be taught at all levels; elementary, middle, high school, and 23 post secondary schools, including the private schools.

The Legislature finds that there are no coordinated courses of 25 studies or textual materials available on Guam's political history or on 26 Guam's cultural history. Such course development is needed and can 27 best be achieved by professionals from the Department of Education, the 28 University of Guam, and the Guam Community College with the 29 expertise in the following subject areas: political science, history, 30 economics, cultural anthropology, research, who should be given the 31 responsibility to develop the courses of studies and coordinate the 32 acquisition of the curriculum materials needed of each level." 33
