AN ACT TO ADD §§18201 THROUGH 18204 TO TITLE 17, GUAM CODE ANNOTATED, TO ESTABLISH THE GUAM TEACHER CORPS AND TO REPEAL AND REENACT §§18101 THROUGH 18107, TITLE 17, GUAM CODE ANNOTATED, RELATIVE TO THE TEACHER EDUCATION SCHOLARSHIP AND ASSISTANCE PROGRAM.

Section 1. Legislative findings. The Legislature finds that bold and 1 innovative programs to attract potential teachers into the practice of 2 education are necessary if adequate numbers of teachers are to be recruited 3 and placed in the classrooms of Guam on a more stable basis. Studies have shown that successful programs have universal qualities, such as a good 5 6 grade point average at the high school level, early declaration of intention or choice of major, and good rapport among participants and program 7 supervisors or mentors. All these qualities were present when the Teacher 8 9 Training Program was attracting and graduating sufficient numbers of teachers to meet the needs of Guam's schools in the Seventies. Lately, 10 however, the Legislature has found that the teacher education program at 1 1 the University of Guam has been unable to produce a sufficient number of 1 2 teachers, consequently necessitating massive off-island recruitment. Recent 13 policy decisions by the University to delay the declaration of education majors 14 to the junior level has added to the difficulty. It is therefore the intention of 1 5 the Legislature to establish a GUAM TEACHER CORPS to identify 16 promising students at the high school and college levels and to nurture their 17 interests in becoming teachers for the schools on Guam. 18

Section 2. §18201 is hereby added to Title 17, Guam Code Annotated, to read:

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"§18201. Teacher Training Council. There is hereby created the Teacher Training Council (the "Council"), the general purpose of which shall be to plan, develop, implement and manage programs for attracting, selecting, orienting and assisting qualified high school and college students to become

- (5) When deemed necessary because of the University of Guam's inability to provide programs which permit the Council to carry out its principal mission, the Council is authorized to enter into contractual arrangements with other accredited institutions of higher education that can respond appropriately to the needs of the Guam Teacher Corps.
- (6) The Council shall appoint a Director of the Guam Teacher Corps whose qualifications and compensation shall be not equivalent to those of the tenured faculty at the University of Guam. The Director shall have a background of experience with teacher education programs and a sensitivity to local teaching requirements.

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§18102. Guam Teacher Corps Scholarship and Financial Assistance Program. (a) Students in the program must complete an application form provided by the Council and satisfy all the requirements set out in §18101, supra.

- (b) A monthly allowance shall be paid to a person who is enrolled pursuant to the following schedule: (1) College freshman, Two Hundred Dollars (\$200) per month; during the period the person is classified academically as a sophomore, Three Hundred Dollars (\$300) per month; during the period the person is classified academically as a junior, Four Hundred Dollars (\$400) per month; senior and above standing, Five Hundred Dollars (\$500) per month.
  - (2) As a condition for continuing full entitlement to the benefits provided in this Chapter, with the exception of high school seniors, recipients must maintain a full-time enrollment of twelve (12) semester credits minimum per semester, six (6) semester credits per summer session, and good academic standing with a grade point average of 2.5 or better. No student may receive benefits beyond the number of calendar years normally required to complete such student's program.
- (c) Registration, tuition, and other related fees normally assessed by the University and an allowance in the amount of Two Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$250) shall be allowed per regular

semester, and One Hundred Dollars (\$100) per summer session in which a person is enrolled to cover costs of textbooks and supplies.

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Senior High School: §18103. advanced placement program. High school seniors with a grade point average of 2.5 or better, and upon the recommendation of their principals, are eligible to participate in the Guam Teacher Corps. The Council shall arrange with the University to enroll these students in the University's advanced placement program wherein students can simultaneously earn college credits while satisfying the requirements for their high school diploma. Normally, these students are expected to earn at least six (6) semester credits of lower division hours which will count towards their education degree. In order not to overly disrupt the schedules of the students and to minimize transportation problems, advanced placement classes, whenever possible should be offered on the campus of the participating schools.

§18104. Teacher Corps Advisor. Each participating high school shall have a Teacher Corps Advisor who shall be appointed from among the school faculty or staff by the principal. The principal, in consultation with the Director of the Teacher corps, shall decide whether this is a full-time or part-time assignment but this decision should be based on the number of participants in each school. The Advisor shall represent the Director of the Teacher Corps and serve as academic planner and advisor to the

students.,

§18105. Academic Advisor and Program Contract. Each Teacher Corpsman shall have an academic advisor who shall with the student, develop a complete academic plan that results in the granting of a teaching degree within a normally prescribed period of time. This plan shall be examined by the appropriate University officials and the Teacher Corps Director, and upon their approval, shall constitute a contract between the student and the Council.

§18106. **Budget and compensation.** The budget for salaries, stipends, travel, and operational requirements shall be submitted annually by the Council for approval by the Legislature. The Legislature shall appropriate funds to the University of Guam which shall disburse them pursuant to the directives and policies of the Council. Unexpended funds shall be maintained in a continuing budget appropriation for use by the Council in succeeding budget cycles.

§18107. Teacher Training Scholarship Program. All existing Teacher Training Scholarship recipients under Chapter 18, Title 17, Guam Code Annotated, shall continue in the program and shall not be adversely affected by these Guam Teacher Corps provisions. The Council, however, has the authority to alter the conditions of the Teacher Training Scholarship Program to those of the new Guam Teacher Corps provisions whenever such changes will impact favorably upon the students. All

responsibilities and properties of the Teacher Training
Scholarship Program are hereby transferred to the Teacher
Training Council of the Guam Teacher Corps."

A public hearing on Bill No. 410 was conducted by the Committee on Education, 21st Guam Legislature, in the Public Hearing Room, temporary Legislative Building, Agana.

MEMBERS PRESENT: Chairperson Madeleine Z. Bordallo; and Committee members, Senators Elizabeth P. Arriola, Michael J. Reidy, George Bamba, Eddie R. Duenas, Doris F. Brooks, and Speaker Joe T. San Agustin.

WITNESSES PRESENT: Dr. Wilfred Leon Guerrero, President, University of Guam; Dr. Gregg C. San Nicolas, College of Education, UOG; Anita Sukola, Director, Department of Education; Dr. Lawrence Kasperbauer, Chairman, Territorial Board of Education; Mr. Stephen Protasio, President, Future Educators of Guam Association; Mr. Albert Perez; and Dr. Patrick Leddy, UOG, College of Education.

#### SUMMARY OF TESTIMONY

Dr. Wilfred Leon Guerrero, President of the University of Guam, was present to answer any questions by the Committee. He requested the permission of the Committee to have Dr. Gregg San Nicolas, Dean of the College of Education at the University of Guam, to read the position of the University in regards to Bill No. 410. The position statement of the university was written in a letter from Mr. Jesus U. Torres, Chairman of the UOG Board of Regents. The University endorses the intent of the legislation and recognizes the immediate need for such a legislation but it recommended several amendments to the bill's present form. The university presently has a recruiter position in the college of education with the primary function and responsibility of attracting and motivating local high school and college students into the field of education with a focus toward teaching. Bill No. 410, in its present form, would essentially create a new group which would carry out the same responsibility. Bill No. 410 should complement the University's existing positions.

Mr. Albert Perez, a public citizen, presented testimony in support of Bill No. 410. The need for local teachers has been increasing over the years. This was evident just recently, when the Department of Education had to go off-island to recruit the necessary teachers for our public school system. Guam has the ability to produce very competent teachers through the University, and Bill No. 410 will assist our educational system in addressing this need. He also stated that the bill would encourage and motivate local people to enter the educational field, in addition to the financial assistance being offered under the provisions of this bill.

Also presenting testimony on Bill No. 410 was the Director of the Department of Education, Anita Sukola, and Dr. Lawrence Kasperbauer, Chairperson of the Territorial Board of Education. The Department of Education has been fortunate in the past to recruit the necessary island teachers for the public schools, from both local and off-island sources. It recognizes the need to address this teacher shortage as soon as possible and if Bill No. 410 would assist in this process then the Department is in support Mr. Stephen Potasio, President of the "Future of the bill. Educators of Guam Association" presented oral testimony in support of Bill No. 410. He stated that Bill No. 410 has several good points which include the idea of reaching into the local high schools for future instructors and it also offers financial support to future educators during their first and second years at the University. It is a good bill and wishes that it will be passed by the Guam Legislature and the Governor of Guam.

Written testimony was subsequently received from Dr. Les McKinney, the Acting President of Guam Community College. The college supports the improvement of opportunities for local citizens to become teachers and professionals to serve the educational community of Guam, but the college suggests that improvements on the present bill should be made. Thus the college is opposing the bill in its present form. Several inquiries were made to the college requesting their reasons for opposing the bill, but no specific recommendations have been received by the college as of the date of this report.

### COMMITTEE FINDINGS/RECOMMENDATIONS

The Committee on Education and the Guam Legislature has recognized the continuing need for the island to encourage and motivate its people to enter the professional field of teaching within Guam's educational system. The island's educational system has continually resorted to recruiting teacher personnel for the Department of Education from off-island. Thus far, minimal programs have been formulated to address the desire for more local teachers to instruct our young students and prepare them for the challenges in the business world. Bill No. 410 is one legislation which tries to address this need, by studying and motivating local

people to enter the professional career of teaching. Therefore, the Committee on Education hereby recommends that Bill No. 410, as amended by the Committee on Education, be favorably considered and passed by the Twenty First Guam Legislature.

Legislative findings:

The Guam Legislature finds that bold and innovative programs to attract potential teachers into the practice of education are necessary if adequate number of teachers are to be recruited and placed in the classrooms of Guam on a more stable basis. Studies have shown that successful programs have universal qualities, such as: good grade point average at the high school level, early declaration of intention or choice of major, and good rapport among participants and program supervisors or mentors. All these qualities were present when the Teacher Training Program was 10 attracting and graduating sufficient number teachers to meet the 11 needs of Guam's schools in the seventies. Lately, however, the 12 Legislature has found that the teacher education program at the 13 University of Guam has been unable to produce sufficient number of 14 teachers, consequently necessitating massive 15 recruitments. Recent policy decisions by the University to delay 16 the declaration of education majors to the junior level has added 17 to the difficulty. It is therefore the intention of 18 Legislature to establish a GUAM TEACHER CORPS to identify 19 promising students at the high school and college levels and to 20 nurture their interests in becoming teachers for the schools on 21 Guam. Now, therefore, 22

BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE TERRITORY OF GUAM:

Section 1. §18201 is hereby added to Title 17, Guam Code Annotated, to read:

\*\$18201. Teacher Training Council: There is hereby created the Teacher Training Council (the "Council") the general purpose of which shall be to plan, develop, implement and manage programs for attracting, selecting, orienting and assisting qualified high school and college students to become teachers for the schools on Guam."

Section 2. §18202 is hereby added to Title 17, Guam Code & Annotated. to read:

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- 1 Assistance Program. (a) Students in the program must complete a application form provided by the Council and satisfy all the requirements in §18101, supra.
- (b) A monthly allowance shall be paid to a person who i enrolled pursuant to the following scnedule: (1) High School Seniors, one hundred dollars (\$100.00) per month; colleg freshman, two-hundred dollars (\$200.00) per month; during th period the person is classified academically as a sophomore three-hundred dollars (\$300.00) per month; during the period th person is classified academically as a junior, four-hundre dollars (\$400.00) per month; senior and above standing, five hundred dollars (\$500.00) per month.

Response to Bill No. 410

The College of Education at the University of Guam stands responsive to the needs of our teachers and public educational system on this island and in Micronesia. This has always been the position and will continue to be for Guam and the Western Pacific. We also understand that we meet some of the needs of some states in the Union since we have graduated numerous teachers from our programs who are teaching elsewhere in the United States. Additionally, the Teacher Training Program has been very successful in graduating countles teachers who are now teaching in the public schools on Guam, Micronesia and the United States.

There are some points to consider reflective of the bill at hand;

- Keep in mind that we have a Professional Recruiter's position already in existence at the 1. College of Education. Every legislation that must be developed should address this and ensure that our recruitment efforts at the College are not duplicated but complemented instead. We have already begun an expansion of this position in terms of activities and responsibilities for student recruitment. The programs we are working on at this time include the following:
  - Fast Track Program where we take students through on a more accelerated basis, particularly those who are not necessarily education majors but are in need of certification credits to teach within our public schools. We will also include in this process students who are second career, mid-life career individuals who are in need of getting through a program fast enough to become the teachers needed in our schools.
  - We are increasing our public relations and recruitments efforts by developing our b. informational data base system to include the full spectrum of the College of Education's baccalaureate and master's degree programs. From this information system, we are able to sell the College's programs because we have a quick response to informational need requests by interested students in the public high schools.
  - We are researching new and innovative ideas on how to attract more students into the c. teaching profession by developing student leaders within the College. We already have a core of students who are perceived to be leaders and we utilize them to model the interest and motivation to become involved in the teaching profession. They have formed an association called Future Educators of Guam Association. We believe that students who have gone trhough our programs would be excellent recruiters themselves for the profession. That was how I got into teaching myself.

- 2. Recall also that our College and the Department of Education have worked long and hard to continue the Reformulation process that will eventually provide us some assurances on how to encourage and motivate our local students to enter into the work and profession of teaching. We should not lose sight of the efforts of countless individuals to keep this collaborative endeavor going and come to its completion in the near future. Any bill or law designed by this body should keep this process in mind. Otherwise, duplication can occur and such efforts pushed aside for the more immediate needs.
- 3. One reason for the delay in terms of our Third Year Entry program was to protect the academic and professional integrity of the teachers we produce for our students. We should not be in the mind frame that anyone can be a teacher on this island. We should be in the mind frame that we have to carefully cultivate individuals who will be responsive to Guam's multicultural needs in the classroom keeping in mind the differences in culture and the student-teacher interaction. I can cite examples of flagrant abuses of teachers on our students in the classroom. These teachers had very limited experiences who are trained through programs with limited multicultural aspects. We believe that our programs are responsive to the multicultural needs of our students.
- We already have provided an incentive for our students by already making the ED 110 Introduction to Teaching a tuition free course. I am confident that we will recruit extensively through this type of arrangement. If we have other courses, perhaps, or means to provide such incentives to our students, we will be able to meet some of the demands for placing teachers in the classrooms of our school system. Let's allow this system to work.

#### Let's now address the contents of the bill at hand:

- 1. The bill has merits in that it will help in our recruitment process. The idea of high school recruitment is excellent. Allow us to do those activities by providing more funding for the recruiter's position to expand the services and responsibilities. Let's build in a component to provide for this collaborative interaction.
- 2. The name: Teacher Corps, perhaps should be changed so that people will not get confused with the old program. If this were to complement the Teacher Training Program and the Recruiter's responsibilities, change the name to reflect the Teacher Training, i.e., Teacher Training High School Component. The teacher Training Program is still a very successful program and should not meet this non-substantive change over to Teacher Corps.
- 3. Whenever we have some problems to address, we need to stay away from forming task forces and committees or councils. Let us use the existing structure, i.e., Professional Recruiter or others that will involve the same individuals in the process. The individuals mentioned in this Bill fit the Reformulation structure with some minor changes. Perhaps, this is a way to go, but this seems like another committee created and added responsibilities to existing workload of individuals mentioned in the Bill.
- 4. The group involved should work closely with our Professional Recruiter to develop, design, and implement recruitment activities to help insure a steady flow of interested students from high school who will feed into our teacher training scholarship program.
- The monetary incentive is reflective of the old Upward Bound Program at the University of Guam. This is a very good idea. However, let us also reward those individuals who make the extra effort in terms of maintaining a high grade point average, perhaps a\$25.00 increase in their stipend.

Although I have many other concerns, these are more reflective of a positive stance on this bill v the points made to keep you and others informed of our progress and continued efforts. We trust that will consider this as you continue in your deliberations. Please keep in mind that we are continuou developing the Professional Recruiter's position and we need to work closer together. Thank-you and Yu'os Maase.





AN ACT TO ADD §§18201 THROUGH 18204 TO TITLE 17, GUAM CODE ANNOTATED, TO ESTABLISH THE GUAM TEACHER CORPS AND TO REPEAL §§18101 THROUGH 18108 AND TO REENACT NEW SECTIONS, ALL OF TITLE 17, GUAM CODE ANNOTATED, RELATIVE TO THE TEACHER EDUCATION SCHOLARSHIP AND ASSISTANCE PROGRAM.

Legislative findings:

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The Guam Legislature finds that bold and innovative programs to attract potential teachers into the practice of education are necessary if adequate number of teachers are to be recruited and placed in the classrooms of Guam on a more stable basis. Studies have shown that successful programs have universal qualities, such as: good grade point average at the high school level, early declaration of intention or choice of major, and good rapport among participants and program supervisors or mentors. All these qualities were present when the Teacher Training Program was attracting and graduating sufficient number teachers to meet the needs of Guam's schools in the seventies. Lately, however, the Legislature has found that the teacher education program at the University of Guam has been unable to produce sufficient number of teachers, consequently necessitating massive off-island recruitments. Recent policy decisions by the University to delay the declaration of education majors to the junior level has added to the difficulty. It is therefore the intention of the Legislature to establish a GUAM TEACHER CORPS to identify promising students at the high school and college levels and to nurture their interests in becoming teachers for the schools on Guam. Now, therefore,

BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE TERRITORY OF GUAM:

Section 1. §18201 is hereby added to Title 17, Guam Code Annotated, to read:

"§18201. Teacher Training Council: There is hereby created the Teacher Training Council (the "Council")the general purpose of which shall be to plan, develop, implement and manage programs for attracting, selecting, orienting and assisting qualified high school and college students to become teachers for the schools on Guam."

Section 2. §18202 is hereby added to Title 17, Guam Code Annotated. to read:

"§18202. Same: Composition. The Council shall be composed of the following officials: (1) Dean, College of Education of the University of Guam who shall serve as the chairperson; (2) Associate Superintendent of Secondary Schools, Department of Education; (3) Associate Superintendent of Special Education, Department of Education; (4) Associate Superintendent of Elementary Schools, Department of Education; and (Vice President of the Guam Community College. The College of Education shall provide the logistics and personnel necessary for the operation of the Council and the University of Guam shall serve as the custodian for the program funds and records.

Section 3. §18203 is hereby added to Title 17, Government Code Annotated, to read:

"§18203. Same: Functions: (1) The Council shall develop plans and programs for the promotion of the teaching profession; and principally, the Council shall conduct programs which identify and recruit bright and talented persons to enroll in the teacher education programs to become educational practitioners on Guam.

- (2) The Council shall establish rules, regulations and appropriate policies in governing the Guam Teacher Corps.
- (3) Based on established criteria of the Teacher Education Programs at the University of Guam, the Council shall select and

award scholarships to participants of the Guam Teacher Corps at both the high school and college levels. This includes the predeclaration of majors period which is generally the freshman and sophomore years.

- (4) The Council shall make a continuing assessment of the staffing needs of the schools on Guam and the adequacy of the University's programming efforts in responding to those needs. The Council shall report its findings and recommendations to the Board of Regents of the University of Guam the Board of Trustees of the Guam Community College, the Board of Education of the Government of Guam, and the Committee on Education of the Guam Legislature.
- (5) When deemed necessary because of the University of Guam's inability to provide programs which prevent the Council from carrying out its principal mission, the Council is authorized to enter into contractual arrangement with other accredited institutions of higher education that can respond appropriately to the needs of the Guam Teacher Corps program.
- (6) The Council shall appoint a Director of the Guam Teacher Corps whose qualifications and compensation shall be not unlike those of the established faculty ranks at the University of Guam. The Director shall have experiences with teacher education programs and a sensitivity to the local teaching requirements.
- (7) The Council shall do any and all things necessary and proper to carry out the intent and purposes of the Guam Teacher Corps.

Section 4. §18204 is hereby added to Title 17, Guam Code Annotated, to read:

"§18204. The Guam Teacher Corps. There is hereby established within the Government of Guam a Guam Teacher Corps whose principal purpose is the production of educational practitioners in sufficient quantity to meet the needs of Guam's schools. It is the intention of the Guam Teacher Corps to identify and encourage potential educational practitioners at the senior high school and college levels and to enroll them in the teacher education programs at the University of Guam. The Guam Teacher Corps shall

consist of programs consistent with the provisions of §§18101, 18102, 18103, 18104 and 18105 of this Chapter.

Section 5. §§18101 through 18108 inclusive of Title 17, Guam Code Annotated are hereby repealed and new sections enacted to read as follows:

"§18101. The Guam Teacher Corps shall consist of students who have declared their intention to become educators and are enrolled in the Teacher Education Programs at the University of Guam or if such programs are not available at the University of Guam at other accredited institutions which have been approved by the Council. Scholarship and financial assistance may be awarded to eligible students who meet the following criteria:

- (a) Be a bona fide resident of Guam;
- (b) Be a citizen of the United States;
- (c) Be a senior or a graduate of an accredited high school with an overall grade point average of not less than 2.5 on a 4.0 scale;
- (d) Be admitted to the University of Guam in accordance to its admissions policies, including advanced placement for high school students.
- (e) Maintain an overall grade point average of 2.5 or better during the term of assistance under this program.
- (f) Agree to practice education in Guam public schools in areas of need upon graduation and certification to practice on Guam. The length of commitment of service to Guam shall be the number of years that the student received the scholarship and financial assistance. The student shall further agree that, in the event of failure or refusal to fulfill this obligation, the student shall then repay to the government of Guam an amount equal to the total monthly allowances paid to the student, including actual cost to the Government of textbooks and supplies.
- (g) Be recommended to the program by (1) the student's high school principal or (2) the mayor of the student's residence or (3) a faculty or teacher of the student.
- 36 §18102. Guam Teacher Corps Scholarship and Financial

Assistance Program. (a) Students in the program must complete an application form provided by the Council and satisfy all the requirements in §18101, supra.

- (b) A monthly allowance shall be paid to a person who is enrolled pursuant to the following schedule: (1) High School Seniors, one hundred dollars (\$100.00) per month; college freshman, two-hundred dollars (\$200.00) per month; during the period the person is classified academically as a sophomore, three-hundred dollars (\$300.00) per month; during the period the person is classified academically as a junior, four-hundred dollars (\$400.00) per month; senior and above standing, five-hundred dollars (\$500.00) per month.
- (2) As a condition for continuing full entitlement to the benefits provided in this Chapter, with the exception of high school seniors, recipients must maintain a full-time enrollment of fifteen (15) semester credits minimum per semester, nine (9) semester credits per summer session, and good academic standing with a grade point average of 2.5 or better. No student may receive benefits beyond the number of calendar years normally required to complete such student's program.
- (c) Registration, tuition, and other related fees normally assessed by the University and an allowance in the amount of two-hundred fifty dollars (\$250.00) shall be allowed per regular semester, and one-hundred dollars (\$100.00) per summer session in which a person is enrolled to cover costs of textbooks and supplies.

§18103. Senior High School, Advanced Placement Program. Seniors with a grade point average of 2.5 or better, and upon the recommendation of their principal, are eligible to participate in the Guam Teacher Corps. The Council shall arrange with the University to enroll these students in the University's Advanced Placement Program wherein students can simultaneously earn college credits while satisfying the requirements for their high school diploma. Normally, these students are expected to earn at least six (6) semester credits of lower division hours which will count towards their education degree. In order not to overly disrupt the

schedules of the students and to minimize transportation problems, advanced placement classes, whenever possible should be offered on the campus of the participating schools.

 \$18104. Teacher Corps Advisor. Each participating high school shall have a Teacher Corps Advisor who shall be appointed from among the school faculty or staff by the principal. The principal, in consultation with the Director of the Teacher Corps, shall decide whether this is a full-time or part-time assignment but this decision should be based on the number of participants in each school. The Advisor shall represent the Director of the Teacher Corps and serve as academic planner and advisor to the students.

§18105. Academic Advisor and Program Contract. Each Teacher Corpsman shall have an academic advisor who shall, with the student, develop a complete academic plan that eventuates in the granting of a teaching degree within normally prescribed period of time. This plan shall be examined by the appropriate University officials and the Teacher Corps Director, and upon their approval, shall constitute a contract between the student and the Council.

§18106. Budget and compensation. Budget for salaries, stipends, travel, and operational requirements shall be submitted annually by the Council for approval by the Legislature. The Legislature shall appropriate funds to the University of Guam which shall disburse them pursuant to the directives and policies of the Council. Unexpended funds shall be maintained in a continuing budget appropriation for use by the Council in succeeding budget cycles.

S18107. Teacher Training Scholarship Program. All existing Teacher Training Scholarship recipients under Chapter 18, Title 17, Guam Code Annotated, shall continue in the program and shall not be negatively affected by the new Guam Teacher Corps provisions. The Council, however, has the authority to alter the conditions of the Teacher Training Scholarship Program to those of the new Guam Teacher Corps provisions whenever such changes will impact favorably upon the students. All responsibilities and properties of the Teacher Training Scholarship Program are hereby
