## COMMITTEE ON WAYS & MEANS COMMITTEE REPORT

ON

BILL NO. 135: AN ACT TO REPEAL, REENACT AND AMEND CERTAIN SECTIONS OF PUBLIC LAW NO. 20-171 RELATIVE TO THE "MANAMKO YAN MANHOBEN" PROGRAM.

The Committee on Ways & Means conducted a public hearing on Friday, February 4, 1994 beginning at 9:00 a.m. at the Legislative Public Hearing Room to gather testimony on Bill No. 135. Senator Carl T. C. Gutierrez, Chairman of the Committee conducted the hearing, being joined by Senators Ted S. Nelson, David L. G. Shimizu, J. George Bamba, Marilyn D. A. Manibusan, Vicente C. Pangelinan, and Thomas C. Ada.

#### **TESTIMONY**

Ms. Donna Renee Anderson and Mr. Pedro A. E. Manibusan, from the Department of Public Health and Social Services, Division of Senior Citizens, read the written testimony as submitted by the Director. The Department supports the intent of the Bill, however, they would like to see the scope enlarged to encompass more than the Department of Education's Extended Day (DEED) Program.

The Chairman, Senator Carl T. C. Gutierrez informed the members of the committee as well as the public that Bill No. 135 was heard by the Committee on Youth, Senior Citizens and Cultural Affairs (Senator Arriola's Committee) on Tuesday, March 23, 1993. Senator Arriola referred her committee's findings on this Bill on January 12, 1994 to this Committee (Ways & Means).

Senator Arriola's Committee had already taken into consideration the recommendations made by the Department of Public Health and Social Services. Based on this, the Committee on Ways & Means only heard the appropriation section which is Section 4.

Senator Gutierrez asked Ms. Donna Renee Anderson how much money is needed to start this program for this fiscal year (for six months), fiscal year '94? Is Sixty-Five Thousand Dollars enough? Ms. Anderson's respond was yes.

#### **COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION**

The Committee on Ways & Means, after due consideration of the testimony offered in support of Bill No. 135, recommends that Bill No. 135 be reported out to the full Legislature to do Pass as Substituted by the Committee on Youth, Senior Citizens and Cultural Affairs and further substituted by the Committee on Ways & Means.

Dear Senator Gutierrez:

On behalf of the Department of Public Health and Social Services, and the Guam Council on Senior Citizens, I extend our appreciation to your Committee for inviting us to testify on Bill No. 135 (An Act to Repeal, Reenact and Amend Certain Sections of Public Law No. 20-171 Relative to the "Manamko yan Manhoben" Program). We offer the following testimony.

We support the intent of Bill No. 135; however, we would like to see the scope enlarged to encompass more than the Department of Education's Extended Day (DEED) Program. The educational and cultural exchanges meet the minimum need of our island youth; at present, we feel the effects of gang violence in our community and in our schools. Our island's society has changed, and will continue to change. We view the heart of Manamko yan Manhoben as developing interaction between generations that builds character, teaches "getting along with others" skills, understanding the value of an education, learning how to "get along" with parents and other adults, learning to live alone, learning to develop a personal budget, and learning the importance of respect. These can't be taught in a two hour cultural and educational exchange that teaches arts and crafts.

We ask that this bill be a forerunner to future programs that we co-develop with other agencies and organizations to repair our family environment.

We offer the following changes to Bill No. 135:

1. Section 1, lines 4 and 5 should note that the sixteen Senior Citizen Centers are operating with an average of 25 participants per center. The total senior citizen population has increased from approximately 8,500 to under 13,000 since the 1990 census; and, there are approximately 1,500 senior citizen participants in all of the Division of Senior Citizens eight programs.

Commonwealth Now!

- 2. Section 2, line 24 should be amended by deleting the words "two hours". This time limitation is an obstacle to our existing plan for the educational and cultural arts and crafts exchange.
- 3. Section 2, Subsection (b) should be amended to identify only the Guam Council on Senior Citizens, the Territorial Board of Education, and the University of Guam as having the responsibilities identified in lines 8 through 19.
- 4. A new section should be added to include a definition for manhoben to include those under 22 years of age. This will allow students from the University who want to participate in future Manamko yan Manhoben programs.
- 5. Section 4, line 28 should be amended to read: [for Fiscal Year 1994 and thereafter].

In conclusion, Bill No. 135 should be applauded for its foresight in fostering and supporting multigenerational programs.

#### **PREFACE**

A public hearing on Bill 135 was held by the Committee on Youth, Senior Citizens and Cultural Affairs at 2:50 p.m., Tuesday, 23 March 1993, in the Public Hearing Room of the Temporary Legislative Building in Agana.

Present were Chairperson, Senator Elizabeth P. Arriola and attended by Senator Tom Ada.

#### **TESTIMONY RECEIVED**

- •The Committee received written testimony from Leticia V. Espaldon, Director of the Department of Social Services and Jose S. Perez, Chairperson of the Guam Council on Senior Citizens supporting Bill 135, but recommended that permanent funding be identified and that the two-hour time restriction between the manhoben and manamko be removed. They also asked that the Division of Senior Citizens be the lead agency who can network with other agencies; that the definition of "manhoben" should include those under 22 years of age, to involve the college age students at University of Guam; and that Section 2 of Public Law 20-171 is amended to read: "The program established in Section 2 of this Act shall be in place by Fiscal Year 1994."
- •The Committee received written testimony from Mrs. Romana Mendiola requesting that the funding be increased from \$125,000 to \$150,000.

There being no further testimony, Chairperson Elizabeth P. Arriola adjourned the public hearing on Bill 135 at 3:05 p.m.

#### **COMMITTEE FINDINGS**

The Committee on Youth, Senior Citizens and Cultural Affairs finds that the existing Manamko Yan Manhoben Program's continuation and survival hinges on this body's ability to identify permanent funding. It also supports findings that existing Senior Citizens Centers are in dire need of repairs and poses safety problems for purposes of carrying out the Program. While the Committee has taken steps to correct physical deficiencies at the Centers, it finds there exists enough immediate interest, support and personnnel resources for the program to continue its course with alternative facilities and not await completion of renovation projects at the Centers.



On behalf of the Department of Public Health and Social Services and the Guam Council on Senior Citizens, I would like to extend our appreciation to your Committee for your invitation to testify on Bill No. 135 (An act to repeal, reenact and amend certain sections of Public Law No. 20-171 relative to the "Manamko Yan Manhoben" program). I am here today to testify in support of Bill No. 135 with some minor changes.

First of all, the sponsors of Public Law No. 20-171 should be commended for their sincere understanding and support of an Intergenerational Program within the Division of Senior Citizens. For several years prior to the enactment of Public Law 20-171, the Division as part of its on-going activities designed a program to nurture respect and genuine concern between our youths and seniors by allowing cultural and educational exchange on a small scale permitted by the existing budget at the time. Since the enactment of the law, the Division has sponsored several intergenerational activities with funding made possible from other federal funds, Department of Education and Department of Youth Affairs. there are approximately one thousand two hundred (1,200) active participants in the sixteen senior centers and about twelve thousand (12,000) non-participants within our territory who could be tapped for their knowledge of the culture, tradition, and educational skills, it is essential that the program be made into a more permanent set up with sufficient funding.

Bill No. 135 included some of the recommended changes made during our testimony on Bill No. 790 before the Twenty-First Guam Legislature, on March 23, 1992. However, we are recommending some changes to facilitate implementation of the program.

- 1. On page 1, line 24 amend Section 2 subsection
  (a) by deleting the words "two hour". The
  two-hours allowed between the manhoben and
  manamko limits the ability of the Division of
  Senior Citizens to provide a meaningful
  cultural and educational exchange.
- 2. On page 2, line 3 amend Section 2 subsection (b) by deleting the entire paragraph and allowing the Division of Senior Citizens the responsibilities as stated on lines 8 thru 19. The Division of Senior Citizens will solicit assistance as needed from appropriate public and private agencies to determine what is best for the manhoben and manamko.
- 3. Add a new section to include a definition for manhoben to include those under 22 years of age. This will involve not only the manhoben who are not attending elementary and secondary schools but also students from the University of Guam may want to participate.
- 4. Section 2 of Public Law 20-171 is amended to read:

"The Program established in section 2 of this Act shall be in place by Fiscal Year 1994".

Bill No. 135 in summary is well intended and the appropriation sets the tone for the implementation of the intergenerational activities for the coming fiscal year. At the present time we have approximately forty (40) manamko interested in participating in this program. Once implemented and successful, we believe the numbers will increase. Corresponding with the increase of the manhoben and manamko in the program will be the increase in the cultural intergenerational exchange.
