Committee Report

• Bill 901 An act amending item (5) of subsection (m) of section 6 of Public Law 22-19 to use educational bond proceeds for the construction of the University of Guam's College of Education Building 1.

I. OVERVIEW

The Committee on Economic-Agricultural Development and Insurance, having been referred Bill 901 conducted a public hearing on March 17, 1994. Notice of public hearing were published in the Pacific Daily news on Thursday, March 10, 1994. Committee Chairman, Ben Pangelinan presided along with committee member Sen. Ted Nelson.

Background. Having found that the instructional, research and administrative facilities of the University of Guam needed to be upgraded, a Physical Master Plan was drawn up in 1989. The Plan called for the implementation of several capital improvement projects, including the College of Education Building Project, on campus to provide facilities that would be more conducive to the students' learning process. Upon the Board of Regents' approval of the Plan, P.L 20-41 was signed into law which appropriated \$4.8 million from the General Fund for the implementation of Phase I of the Plan; the expansion, construction and renovation of the Micronesian Area Research Center, Library and Computer Center.

Subsequently, P.L 20-165 was passed in May 1990, appropriating five additional payments of \$4.8 million each from government revenues collected in each of the following five fiscal years: 1991, 1992, 1993, 1994, and 1995. Furthermore, a supplemental appropriation totaling \$8.9 million was granted with the passage of P.L. 20-221 in December of 1990. At the time P.L. 20-165 and P.L. 20-221 were enacted, the government of Guam was enjoying substantially increased revenues from the apparent economic boom.

However, economic hardships experienced in the ensuing years created cash flow problems in the government's General Fund which in turn created difficulties for the University in paying its contractor who had already begun construction on the College of Education Building. According to the University, only \$1.3 million of the estimated \$2.9 million needed to complete the construction of the College of Education Building I have so far, been disbursed from the General Fund under the two appropriations.

Consequently, the University has requested the Governor to include the College of Education Building project in P.L. 22-19, the law which allowed the government to issue general obligation bonds for the purpose of implementing certain capital improvement projects including certain educational facilities projects at the University.

II. SUMMARY OF TESTIMONY

Oral Testimony:

EAD&I Committee Report Bill 901

Dr. James Craig, Dean of the College of Education, testified orally regarding the need to construct the College of Education (COE) building using fund proceeds from the Educational Bond. Dr. Craig stated that while the COE building was originally funded through an appropriation made from the General Fund, the cash flow problems have created serious difficulties in paying the contractor in a timely manner. So having the Bond funds available would allow UOG to continue paying for the construction. He mentioned that they are well ahead of schedule in the construction of the building and would probably have the building finished by mid summer and ready for use in the fall semester. He also mentioned he would make sure that the Committee receives an accounting of all buildings to be constructed.

Dr. John Salas, president of the University of Guam, gave oral testimony to relay UOG administration's full support for Bill 901 and strongly urged an early and favorable response from the Legislature. Dr. Salas explained that UOG has obligated itself to \$28 million of the \$175 million Educational Bond issued in October of 1993. Of the \$28 million, \$24.1 million has already been obligated for projects identified in the bond. He went on to explain that the COE building is being constructed at a cost of \$3.4 million and that since UOG is already paying the debt service for the \$28 million of the Education Bond, it would be just as practical an idea to relieve the General Fund of the immediate cash flow requirement and obligate the balance of the bond fund for construction money for the COE Building. Dr. Salas reassured the Committee that the original infrastructure projects under the Physical Master Plan such as the renovation and addition to the Health Science building and the Plant Maintenance building would continue to be funded.

In closing, the Chairman asked that the a technical amendment be made on the language of the Bill to place "College of Education building" right after the "College of Agriculture and Life Sciences" in order to prevent any legal question as to which buildings get funded first. Dr. Salas responded favorably to the amendment and stated that the Bill would allow for the efficient usage of funds and since the Chairman is the initiator of the original Educational Bond bill that it is also consistent with the Chairman's intent to use this money to the maximum.

Written Testimony:

Mr. J.U. Torres, chairman of the University of Guam Board of Regents submitted written testimony expressing the University's full support for Bill 901. He stated that the passage of the Bill would enable the University to complete the construction of the much-needed College of Education (COE) building and that the use of the bond proceeds would conserve the resources of the General Fund. The structure would be used to provide vitally-needed space for all of the major academic programs of the COE and would create 8 additional classrooms and 25 faculty offices.

Mr. Wilfred Aflague, director of the Department of Administration, submitted written testimony in favor of amending P.L. 22-19 to include one more CIP Project, the College of Education building. He strongly favors the Bill since it lessens reliance on the General Fund for which revenues are reaching a shortfall this fiscal year. He also noted that as of November 30, 1993, the Unreserved Fund Balance in the General Obligation Bonds, Series 1993 A Capital Projects Fund was \$18,995,508, which indicates sufficient amount of funding available for the project.

III. FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

EAD&I Committee Report Bill 901

The Committee finds it necessary to use the Educational Bond Funds for the construction of the University of Guam's College of Education Building I.

The Committee recognizes that the Territory's educational system has been faced with numerous problems, including the shortage of qualified teaching professionals to adequately fill the vacancies at the various schools around the island. In light of this fact, the Committee supports the University of Guam's mission to facilitate programs that encourage more local students to take up the field of education as their choice for post-secondary study and subsequently as their career. The early completion of the College of Education Building I, would assure UOG can continue its mission by providing the vitally needed classrooms to improve the learning environment for the students and office space to better accommodate the faculty members.

The Committee also realizes that the General Fund is experiencing cash flow problems and that it is currently not in a position to continue financing the construction in a timely manner. Moreover, since there is adequate funds available in the \$28 million obligation under the Educational Bond, the Committee finds that the COE building 1 should be included as part of the list of buildings to be financed through the Bond issue.

In expressing its support for the inclusion of the College of Education building as an additional capital project to be financed through the Educational Bond, the Committee finds it appropriate to request UOG and the Department of Administration to provide full disclosure of all financial statements relating to the use of the bond funds and the UOG Bond Fund.

The Committee does hearby report Bill 901 out of Committee with a recommendation TO DO PASS as substituted.





BUILDING B EXPANSION—COLLEGE OF EDUCATION

The College of Education will be getting a new facility. The construction of this facility includes a detached two-story building housing 23,000 square feet of offices, classrooms and specialty clinics for the College of Education.

There are eight new general use classrooms, several with special features built-in:

- One large classroom can be divided into four spaces for smaller groups.
- Two of the classrooms are connected by a one-way viewing window for training.

All classrooms have built-in lockable storage units, natural light from exterior wirndows, and fluorescent lighting on dimmers for flexibility of room use. Cable TV connections, as well as computer-grade power and networking capability are provided in each classroom for accommodation of all types of teaching techniques.

Additional rooms are equipped for specialized uses and teacher training:

- A Computer Lab that can be divided into two separate teaching/work areas;
- A Media Lab that includes unique spaces for training in Materials Production, Desktop Publication, Equipment Operation and Darkroom;
- A Reading Clinic with four separate Group Rooms, monitored by closed circuit television from a control room;
- A Clinic Observation Suite with four Testing Rooms for various sized groups or individuals, also monitored by closed circuit television from a separate control room.

The building houses a new Dean's Office for COE, as well as offices for 24 faculty members. All offices are equipped with telephone, computer-grade power, and computer networking capability. Energy-efficient lighting controls will automatically turn off lights at offices when no one is there. Other facilities include a Faculty Meeting Room and four Seminar Rooms.

All rooms including classrooms are provided with networking to the campus computer system, and color coding of the power outlets identifies the computer-grade circuits connected to the power conditioner.

The central air conditioning system is zoned for energy-efficiency, with separate temperature controls for the different use areas such as classrooms, offices or labs.


The building is designed to be fully accessible to the disabled, with accessible restrooms on both floors, level entrances at ground level and elevator access to the second floor.



The new College of Education building, to be completed in August of 1994, is a two (2) story structure defining 23,000 square feet of classrooms, offices, and laboratories.


